We cut fire-wood all day. Went out to the road this evening; carried out some butter (for Isaac) and ground our axes etc.

Clouded up and began to storm about 2 o'clock P. M. Stormed all the afternoon.

The Select-Men, with Mr. E. R. Smart surveyor, came and laid out "a town way" from near H. Motz's house running to the corner of my and Mr. Smith's "Corner".

Father's team hauled wood to P. Cushing's. He sold him $\frac{1}{2}$ cord ^{2 of 3}. He has a very lame back. Mr. Smith is not very well to-day.

Rained about all last night. Cleared off. pleasant and warm this morning.

I went to the Corner this fore-noon (9) and got back about 3 o'clock this afternoon. Got a barrel of flour and three bags of meal. I changed the locks in the doors. Willie cut fire-wood.

(Mrs. Smith and ^{went to lady's} Elias) went to the Corner. Grace came home from Mr. Reynolds.

Rained hard about all night last night. Cleared off pleasant and warm. Cloudy to night.

We went out and ground our axes this morning and then cut fire-wood in the swamp. I went out as far as Father's to go to meeting.

Mrs. Smith went out to Smith's. Mother is quite sick and no better.

Mr. Smith is not very well.
