Cloudy; squally.

I went out and ground the ax. Went up to Uncle John's, bought flip for (for) promising
 went out to the Corner, got my pay for teaching school \$75.00
 Played Hatch, & Vilder.

Mr. Smith helped Paia kill his hog.
 Daniel Carter called a few minutes.

SUNDAY 13

Wea.

Cloudy; cool.

Mrs. Smith and Grace went over to the Vesting top meeting; Mrs. Smith went up to Cross-Roads to see Emily Ward. (Sick) Mr. Smith, Clara and I went up to Cross-Roads to meeting this evening (Mr. Elk leader) Grace took care of the children.

MONDAY 14

Wea.

Pleasant.

I went out and ground my ax this morning. Elias and I worked on our "lane" leading to the road.

Mr. Smith went up in the woods (Chynwade)

Mrs. Smith came over this evening a little while.

TUES. NOV. 15, 1887

Wea.

Rained hard all day.

I worked on the barn-door some. Did very little.

Eliay plowed a while for Mr. Smith. Clara washed.

Father came out a little while.

William Antone went home Saturday night, has not been back yet, has sore throat.

Willie came at noon. Churned.
 Cloudy, Mild.

I went over to the Head of the tide this fore-noon. I went out with Elias after the tub and to grind my butcher-knife and ax. Cut wood.

Eliay came out and plowed for Mr. Smith a little while; broke a bolt and could not plow.

Quite pleasant.

I helped Mr. Smith butcher his hog and he helped me.

Earnest was taken very sick to-day; we went out to see him tonight; I came home and went after Dr. Rogers. He and Mr. Lincoln were both there tonight.

FRI. NOV. 18, 1887

Wea.

Pleasant.

I went out to the road this morning and after-noon. Cut wood and cut my hog up. (weight 885)

Earnest O. Carter died this morning - probably from the effects of diphtheria - age 2 yrs. 1 month

SATURDAY 19

Wea.

Pleasant this fore-noon. Clouded up and began to rain about 4 o'clock. I went to the Corner and up to Mrs. Thais this fore-noon. to the funeral this after-noon - Uncle John's home.

Willie went home to night.

Wea.

Rained hard most of last night. Cloudy to-day. Warm all day.

MON. NOV. 21, 1887

Wea.

Clear up pleasant about noon.

Willie came over this morning and we cut wood.

Mr. Smith went in the woods cutting lath wood. Elias carried his things to Lemysville, got 2 barrels of flour. Elias, Willie and I went out and ground our corn ^{this evening}.

Deborah Dunn came out and we all went over to Mrs. Smith to dinner and she came over here to supper. I went up to Uncle Thais and to the Head of the Tides. Ulysses got home last night. Elias went up to Cross-Roads.

Ther. FRIDAY 25 Wea.

Snowed most of the forenoon. Rained part of the afternoon.

Father and Elly worked on the road an hour or two.

I banked the house some. Went down to Uncle Isaac and paid him \$10. on wagon. Made front door door.

Ther. SATURDAY 26 Wea.

Rainy and wet all day.

I fixed up the old hog pen and Elias and I put the pig in. I went out to the road and got the wheel-barrow. Elias piled up some wood for me.

I went up to Uncle Thais and bought his horse. Got part of harness etc. of Phiney.

Ther. SUN. NOV. 27, 1887 Wea.

Cloudy and damp.

Home about all day; went over to Mr. Smith's a few minutes. Mr. and Mrs. Smith came over a little while this evening. Father and Ulysses came out a little while.

Matthias Ward stayed with Elias last night.

Ther. MONDAY 28 Wea.

Cloudy, windy, squally to night. I finished banking the horse; finished ditching; worked some on the road etc.

I have a very lame back to night. Father and Elly went to East-port to day; Father went to the Corner.

Ther. TUESDAY 29 Wea.

R. I. Sighton brought pump.

Pleasant, windy, cold, rough. I worked on the road, fixed up pig pen, etc. Elias and I went over to the Corner after my saddle and bridle but only got the saddle.

Arthur got home from Isaac. Father and Elly worked on the road. Mrs. Smith went up to see John Anthons.

Pleasant, windy, cold.
I fixed the driveway in the
barn-floor, pig-pen, put pump
in the well, etc.

Mr. Smith and Elias went to
the Corner. — Father and Elley
worked on the road.

Brother came out a little
while. **Killed hens.**

night and all day.

I fixed pump in the well,
fixed pig-pen, etc. Went over
to the Head of the Tide this evening.

up from Eastport.

I carried eight hens and chick-
ens out to Father's for Clara Owen
to carry to Eastport. I went up
to Lemingtonville and this after-

Snowed, rained, cleared off pleasant.
I hauled brush and barked H. E.
end of barn; hauled (2) tur loads
of stove-wood, etc.

We went over to the "other
house" to supper.

Elias has been wheeling and pil-
ing wood.

Quite pleasant.

Lizzie came out (Eliphail came
with her) and stayed all day.

I went out to the road a few
minutes this after-noon. Carroll
went with me. "Mint Betsy came
up from Ezra Syon's and will stay
to Mr. Smith this to-night. — Mr. Ellis
will stay with us to-night.

Rained all the after-noon and evening.
I commenced my 18th term of school
at Cross-Roads — 6th term at this

This is the great national farmers' organization. Its methods are co-operative. Its workings are of the greatest benefit. Every farmer should join.

The aim is to labor for the good of the order, the country, and of mankind.

The object is to elevate and educate the farmer and his family, and to develop a better and a higher manhood and womanhood.

The purpose is to learn to farm better, and strengthen attachment to farm life. To band together for mutual assistance and protection.

Now is the time to organize and act together. Every farmer and farmer's wife, son and daughter, needs the kindly offices and helpful privileges of the Grange. Why stand ye here idle outside the gates?

The New England farmers are undoubtedly the most enterprising and energetic of the Granger fraternity on this continent, comparing well in progressive spirit and action with their ingenious brethren in other respects. They cultivate the least productive natural soil, combat with the most rigorous climate, and yet by dint of industry and skill their labors annually produce the most liberal returns.

When the farmer shall be brought to a full realization of the immense power and benefit of the three words, "association, co-operation, education," then will he be given the proper station that he is entitled to among his fellow men.

This seems to be the day of association, co-operation and corporation. It seems that the farmer is almost the last person to call to his aid this immense power in the management of his domestic economy.

In Maine there are 207 Granges, and 15,000 members. There is a Mutual Aid Life Insurance Society, two fire insurance companies, which for the past ten years have cost less than one dollar per year on the thousand. It is the only agricultural organization that covers the whole country and the Dominion of Canada. Every farmer needs the Grange.
