## **TOWN OF CHERRYFIELD WASTE DISPOSAL INFORMATION**

The Transfer Station is open every Friday and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for our residents to dispose of solid waste matter. You will notice that the Recycle cans are no longer on site. The Town's solid waste is now being taken to the Fiberight Plant and is separated at their site to take out recyclable items. Therefore, you will throw all of your regular solid waste into the regular waste roll-offs.

You will continue putting bulky waste and demolition debris into the special cans and metals into the can set up for metal just as we have been doing right along. If you have any question as to where to put your items just please ask Deb or Adam and they will be glad to help you. We are taking tires, but there is a limit of 2 tires per week ,and if you have large truck tires, there is a fee of \$15.00 per tire as it costs the town that much to get them hauled away. There is a fee of \$20.00 for refrigerators and freezers and anything that would have to have the coolant removed.

The Town **cannot** accept certain items for disposal. If you have fluorescent light bulbs, crushed lamps, vehicle batteries, mercury containing devices, TV's computers, monitors and other electronic devices you will need to take them elsewhere for disposal. Dear Friends,

As 2019 ends and 2020 begins, I am pleased to report that Congress made progress on a number of issues important to Maine families despite the polarization in our country.

In a major win for surviving military and retiree spouses to whom we are deeply indebted, I was proud to co-lead the repeal of what is often referred to as the "Military Widow's Tax," an unfair offset of survivor benefits that has prevented as many as 67,000 surviving spouses—including more than 260 from Maine—from receiving the full benefits they deserve.

The high cost of health care and prescription drugs continues to be a top issue for families and seniors. To provide continued relief for more lower- and middle-income individuals, I led the charge to extend for another two years the medical expense tax deduction that I included in the 2017 tax law. Without this extension, nearly 20,000 Mainers and millions of Americans with high medical expenses, including many with preexisting conditions, would have faced an increased tax burden. In other good news, the CREATES Act I cosponsored became law. It will prevent pharmaceutical companies from blocking access to a sufficient supply of brand-name drugs needed for the studies that allow less expensive alternatives to enter the marketplace.

Improving people's health and wellbeing remains my priority. On a per capita basis, Maine has the highest incidence of Lyme disease in the country. In August, I held a Senate hearing at the University of Maine's Tick Lab on this growing public health crisis. A comprehensive public health strategy to combat this epidemic is needed, and the new law I authored will do just that.

In addition, I helped champion another \$2.6 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health, our nation's premiere biomedical research institution, including significant boosts for Alzheimer's disease and diabetes research. Last year, NIH funded more than \$111 million for research at 14 Maine institutions.

To help prepare the graduates of Maine Maritime Academy, I secured \$300 million for a new training ship, which will ensure rigorous instruction for MMA students for decades to come.

Significant federal funding was approved for work at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Funding appropriated by Congress will pay for three new destroyers, make a down payment on an additional ship, and finance infrastructure improvements at PNSY.

As Chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have led efforts to improve our nation's crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine's housing needs are addressed. For Maine's roads, bridges, airports, and seaports, tens of millions in federal funding will help make urgently needed upgrades and improve safety. Funding will also support housing assistance to low-income families and seniors and aid communities in reducing homelessness among our youth. The Community Development Block Grant program will assist numerous towns and cities in our State.

The Aging Committee I chair has continued its focus on financial security for our seniors. A new law I authored will make it easier for small businesses to offer retirement plans to their employees. Our Aging Committee's Fraud Hotline fielded more than 1,200 calls this year. Congress passed a new law to crack down on robocallers who are often the perpetrators of these scams. And a new law I authored will expand the IRS' Identity Protection PIN program nationwide to prevent identity theft tax refund fraud.

At the end of 2019, I cast my 7,262nd consecutive vote. In the New Year, I will keep working to deliver bipartisan solutions to the challenges facing Maine and the nation. To the Citizens of Washington County  
January 2020

The last year saw many successes in the Sheriff's Office, thanks to the hard work of all of our staff. There were too many achievements to list here, but I'd like to touch on the highlights.

May, 2019 saw the culmination of many months of work by an incredible team when we arrested and charged thirty people in one day for drug-related crimes. This effort was spearheaded by the drug enforcement division of the Sheriff's Office, but we had cooperation from an unprecedented number of others. Over 150 officers from local, county, state, and federal agencies joined together for this round-up to fight drugs being brought in from other states. Some of those arrested are being charged in-state, while others are being charged on the federal level.

To help inmates at the Washington County Jail who are fighting addiction, we have implemented a Medically Assisted Treatment program. In addition, a new camera system in the jail with more coverage has increased inmate and officer safety.

Two members of the Department traveled out of state this year for special purposes. A member of Patrol went to Arizona to train as a Drug Recognition Expert, while a member of Dispatch was invited by Dell to go to Texas to help them develop software essential for law enforcement in rural areas. We are very proud of both of these members of our department.

Dispatch received over 23,000 calls for service in 2019, which was an increase of over 11% from the previous year. Patrol increased traffic stops by almost 47% during the year, for a total of over 5,300 stops.

While we have done all of this great work on the street-level, we need to make sure that the courts are allowed to do their part in the flow of justice. To that end, we have proposed a bill that would allow Washington County to have its own District Attorney for the first time in forty-five years. We feel there is just too much going on here for a shared DA.

This coming year will have many important elections, all the way from town and county positions up to the Presidential election. I encourage all of you to take the opportunity to practice your civic duty. Please go out and vote at every election.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

2019 was a normal year. Business as usual with our Selectmen's meetings still on the last Tuesday of each month at 6:00 at the Town Office.

Several things happened during 2019 that we would like to mention. The Fire Department got voter approval to purchase a good used Gear truck from a Fire Department in New York. The truck has now been well equipped and is in service. With a \$25,000 grant from the Stephen King Foundation the Department was able to upgrade the lighting etc. on the truck and get new turnout gear, and other things they needed. The Town will be making 4 annual payments of \$27,386.00 on the truck loan.

The Ambulance Service crew has worked hard to keep the service up and running with what few people they have. The Service also received a \$40,000 Stephen King Grant to purchase the power lift and large sized stretcher that has proved very valuable in being able to transport patients. The Town has 2 more annual payments of \$28,444 to pay off the new ambulance. As usual, if you are interested in being a part of the Ambulance Service you should contact Robert Peterson, Ambulance Service Director.

As most of you have probably noticed, there has been a change at the Transfer Station. We no longer have the recycling cans. Since the Town now sends our MSW to Fiberight for disposal it isn't necessary to separate cardboard, paper, etc. as the recycling is done right at the Fiberight plant. Now you just need to throw all household MSW into the regular roll-off cans. You will continue to put Demo and Bulky debris in the designated cans, metal in the metal can and clean wood in the burn pile.

The Town Office and the Emergency building have been retrofitted with new LED lighting. This change should result in cost savings on utility bills. New doors were installed on the Sand Salt building as required by our insurance company.

In the Spring of 2019 the Alewife harvest was really good and netted the Town \$10,695.00. The contract for the Alewife harvest expired during the summer but the Selectmen have awarded to Rick Santerre again.

There was a lot accomplished on Town Highways during the year. The Road Commissioner's Report will explain further. The Town has been approved for an \$89,000.00 grant to help with the repair of the bridge on Willey District Road. It's been a while coming but repair of that bridge required involvement and permission from State Agencies and the work has to be done between July and September. With that in mind it is our hope that the project will be completed this summer. Hopefully the Town will only need to put approximately \$40,000 with the grant to get the work done.

The snowplow contracts expired in November of 2019. The Selectmen awarded the town highways contract to Cherryfield Farm again and the contract for the Municipal parking lots, hydrants and the Transfer Station was awarded to Perry Trucking.

The issue with water running over the sidewalk in front of the Legion and the Bandstand was repaired in the fall. There is still cosmetic work to be taken care of and that should be done in the spring.

As always, this Board tries very hard to keep costs in line, hoping to keep taxes down as much as possible. That is quite a feat as Cherryfield experiences very little growth that would provide valuation to help decrease the mil rate. People are exasperated over the taxes but

most folks don't look at the whole picture. The tax rate is arrived at by adding the amount of money raised to spend at Town Meeting, the County Tax bill and our Education costs. That total minus any anticipated revenues through the year, the Homestead funding from the State, and other reimbursements we receive from the State calculated with what our total Town valuation is gives the Board the mil rate that they have to use for your taxes.

It is difficult for the Board to find people willing to serve on Boards and Committees. If you have an interest in participating when there is an opening, please contact your Selectmen or the Town Office.

As previously mentioned, our regular meetings are held on the last Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m.. If there is need for a special meeting or a cancellation it will be posted.

We would like to thank our employees and Board and Committee members for their hard work and say that we are looking forward to 2020 as being another good year.

The following roads were paved:


- \*Church Street



Three Board members resigned in 2018, and Kathy Upton graciously joined the Board to reach a quorum of 3 and keep the Board functioning. Kathy stepped down in April 2019 when we welcomed Charemon Davis and Jean Mathews to the Board. Steve Rees was on the Board for many years and brought a great amount of skill and commitment to the more difficult processes and questions faced by the Board. He has moved out of state and resigned in May, but we thank him for his service! Laurie Lee joined the Board in July and bolstered our numbers. We're going to thank our 5<sup>th</sup> member in advance who has yet to volunteer, but we know you're out there!

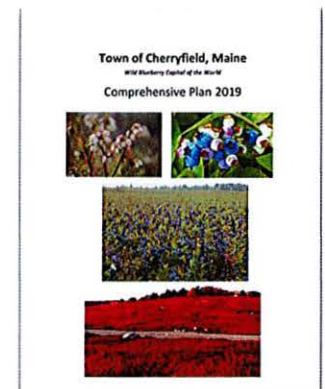

When it comes to questions about our scheduled meetings, meeting minutes, general questions about the Land Use Ordinance, or if you are submitting an application for a Change of Use or Minor Site Plan review, please contact the Planning chair at the new gmail address: [townofcherryfieldplanningchair@gmail.com](mailto:townofcherryfieldplanningchair@gmail.com). This year, the Board is planning on preparing a guide for residents to the permitting process and updating many of our forms. In 2019, we approved 3 new projects that required minor site plan reviews: Dollar General, B&S Bait, and Kids and Caboodle Daycare (change of use).

The Cherryfield Comprehensive Plan Committee submitted the updated Cherryfield Comprehensive Plan to the State and it was found to be consistent with the Maine Growth Management Act by the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation in June, 2019. In 2020, the Plan Committee will make final edits, hold a public comment period, public hearing, and town vote (special town meeting) to accept the Plan. The library would like to thank our Board Members: Stephanie VerWey – President, Cindy Smith- Vice President, Heather Carney - Treasurer, and Zandra Campbell- Secretary. Our deepest gratitude goes out to two Board members who resigned during this past year- Kristine Beal and Jessica Stubbs. As a non-municipal Library our Board is the governing body responsible for making sure the library is here providing services for the community for many generations to come and they are immensely appreciated.

The partnership with the Cherryfield Elementary School is still going strong and we are so proud to be able to offer this to our community. The partnership allows the school to continue to have a fully functioning library for the students and staff and it allows us to develop deeper relationships with our local students and teachers. We continue to provide Interlibrary Loan books to classes which need materials we don't have on hand. We read to the Pre-K, Kindergarten, 1<sup>st</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup> grade classes. Along with our usual services this year, we were able to help provide the First grade class with books from Maine Author Cynthia Lord and help them contact her through letters the students wrote. They are excitedly waiting for her replies. We also provided a teaching moment for the First grade class on how to find materials in the library using our online catalog.

For the first time we have been able to count the number of users for our WiFi connection. We are happy to announce that Internet connections were made nearly 4,000 times over the past year using the Library's FREE access. This connection is available 24/7 with no password required. Access is granted by using the "Guest" Connection and agreeing to the terms of service.

We continue to fundraise as often as we can. In August, we had our second annual "End of Summer Spectacular" Carnival! It was, once again, a huge hit with all who joined us. We had vendors, food, games, a photo booth, face painting, temporary tattoos, the Darling's Ice Cream Truck, and a bounce house. We are already starting to plan the 2020 Carnival and hope to make it bigger and better! We'd are hoping to add live music on both days of the event this year. For information about our Fundraisers and events keep an eye on our Facebook pages and our Website.

The Cherryfield Public Library is a private non-profit institution. This means we are not a municipal organization and are not governed or funded by the Town of Cherryfield. We do not receive any state or federal funding. Awards have included a coach for a severely handicapped child, summer camps, T-shirts for the PeeWee Program, sports gear, winter clothing and foot gear, summer schools, special programs, music camp, scout programs, therapeutic equipment and Healthcare Camp.**

## **ARTICLE 26**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property, such real estate to be sold as follows:

- (1) A notice of intent to sell such property shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in Washington County at least three weeks prior to such a sale, inviting interested parties to submit sealed bids thereon.
- (2) The parties from whom the property has been taken for non-payment of taxes thereon may purchase said real estate from the Town at any time before the expiration of fourteen days from the date of such publication, plus interest, lien costs, and the cost of the publication of the notice plus the cost of the quitclaim deed.
- (3) In the event the parties from whom the real estate was taken by the Town for unpaid taxes fail to redeem the property as provided in paragraph 2, the Board of Selectmen may sell the property to the highest sealed bidder or the property may be kept and maintained by the Town should the Selectmen decide this to be more advantageous.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Municipal Officers to make final determination regarding the closing or opening of roads to winter maintenance pursuant to 23 MRSA ss2953

## **ARTICLE 28**

(Note: In previous years the money has been appropriated to the Snowmobile Club for the purpose of maintaining their trails. If all or part of these funds are appropriated for the Snowmobile Club one of the conditions of the appropriation must be that the Club's trails are open to public use.)

## **ARTICLE 29**



To see if the Town will vote authority to the Board of Selectmen to use and expend unanticipated income received by the Town in the year of 2020 for such purposes as they may deem wise, necessary or expedient or take any action relating thereto

### ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote authority to the Board of Selectmen to appropriate the income from the Amasa Willey Fund (Wells Fargo) to General Assistance

To see if the Town will vote to increase the property tax limit established for the Town of Cherryfield by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under preceding articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than that property tax levy limit..


To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay tax abatements from overlay.
