TUES. JULY 3, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant and warm.

Mowed weeds, etc from a piece for turnips this morning. Worked on our road about all day. After supper Clara, Estella and I went over to the Corner. (Had father's wagon.) Got home about 12 o'clock to night. Carried "Tip" over to Woodworth's (Col. Lang)

Grace and Sarah kept house. Mr. Smith went to Denningville and got his alivins.

Elias went to the Corner this fore-noon.

Mr. David Bryant died this afternoon after a long and painful illness. (Wm.)

Pleasant and warm.

I horse-hoed potatoes for Mr. Smith this morning. Elias plowed a piece for turnips, for me this fore-noon. I hoed peas, corn, beans, etc.

Went down to meeting this evening. Bro. Brown did not come over and we had a prayer-meeting.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith went over to the funeral. Mr. Smith came right back.

WED. JULY 4, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant and warm.

I harrowed and furrowed for turnips this fore-noon, and went gooseberrying this after-noon. We all went over to the other house to dinner.

Elias went to Denny'sville. Father came out a few minutes tonight.

Mr. Smith and Aunt Edna went over to the Corner this after-noon. Sarah went over and back this fore-noon.

THURS. JULY 5, 1888

Wea.

Churned

Pleasant and warm.

I planted turnips. Went out to the road and got the steel yards to weigh the butter.  $10\frac{1}{4}$  lbs. from "Susie" in one week.

Mr. Smith went over to the Corner this fore-noon, and down the road this after-noon.

Clara worked butter, scrubbed, ironed, etc.

Mrs. Smith and Grace went out to the road this morning.

88 FRI. JULY 6, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant. A Cloudy and quite cool this after-noon. I cultivated and hoed potatoes, planted turnips, etc.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanson, <sup>Blanch</sup> came across the river and came out to Mr. Smith's to dinner and here to supper.

Mr. Smith went to Jenningsville this morning. He and Mrs. Smith went out to the road to-night.

SAT. JULY 7, 1888

Wea.

Shower this morning; pleasant and warm. Thunder shower to-night.

I finished planting turnips and cabbages, worked amongst my potatoes, etc.

Mrs. Bosworth came out to Mrs. Smith's this fore-noon; she Mrs. Smith and Sarah went to the Corner this afternoon.

Pleasant.

I went to Sunday School  
this fore-noon. Preaching  
by Rev. V. E. Brown directly af-  
ter Sunday-School.

I hoed amongst my cucum-

**Grace** started for the West today Mrs. Smith went to Eastport with her. Went down with Will Woodworth.

Clara, Sarah, Miss Curtis and Mrs. Dunn went berrying most all day.

THURS. JULY 12, 1888

Wea.

Heavy rain and wind last night. Quite pleasant this forenoon. Raining and wet part of the after-noon. I went out to the road this morning. Worked on my hay-rack. Father came out this after-noon and helped me get out some rack-stakes. I carried cow (Susie) out to J. Cushing's to night. Uncle Ira finished Mr. Smith's barn-door today. Elias went to the Corners.

Churned.

Pleasant. Light showers this after-noon.

Churned two churns this fore-noon; worked on my hay-rack etc. Went out to the road to night.

Father (James) brought his black cow out to pasture here for beef.

Mr. Smith went to Xenoville this fore-noon; worked round his barn.

Ther.

SAT. JULY 14, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant and warm. Light shower this after-noon.

I worked on my rack this fore-noon. This after-noon Clara, Carroll and I went up to Cross-Roads. Got supper to Mrs. Smith's. Got tips shaw set to N.C. Brown's.

Mr. Smith commenced haying up to Dennyville.

Sarah went to the Corner this after-noon.

SUN. JULY 15, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant. Thundered some about 11-12 o'clock noon. Very little rain.

I went to Sabbath-School this fore-noon.

Father went to Sabbath-School. Mr. and Mrs. Smith came over a little while after supper.

MON. JULY 16, 1888

Wea.

Pleasant and warm.  
I went out and ground  
my scythe this morning  
and commenced **mowing**.  
I hoid a few potatoes to-  
wards night.

Mrs. Eliza Dunn came  
out strawberrying and got  
supper here.  
Clara washed etc.  
Father went to Eastport  
to day after mother.

Commenced haying in the

over to Mrs. Smith's and  
called here.

Pleasant. Clouded up and sprinkled some. Pleasant.

I got in one load of hay this after-noon. (Elias with steers) Hoed potatoes, went out and ground my scy the etc.

Mr. Smith hauled his last load of hay from Lemmyville. I went up to Mr. Brown's and had a shoe put on "Tip".

Rainy and wet.

I finished hoeing potatoes, hoed cucumbers, citron, hoed and staked tomatoes, fixed up in and under the barn, etc.

Elias went over to the Corn, with the steers this afternoon. Mrs. Smith went up to Cross Roads.

Quite Pleasant.

Went to Sunday-School and meeting this fore-noon, preaching by Rev. P. E. Brown.

Went over to Mr. Smith's to dinner.

Abel & Owen came out with me.

I went out this morning and got Father's mowing machine, and mowed most all day, — all I could cut by machine. Carried machine out. tonight

Clara washed.

I raked hay, and got in two loads. I went out to see how Mother was this morning. She is little or no better to-night.

Wea.

Pleasant.

Mowed some this morning, went out to the road at noon, got in two loads of hay this after-noon — finished what I mowed with machine. Eli's helped me this after-noon.

Mother is about the same. Mr. Smith worked for J. K. Wilder.

Mrs. Smith went to the Corner — attended the funeral of Mrs. Benj. Hatton.

I mowed in the "Swamp".

Got Father's wagon and we went to the Corner after supper, - Clara carried over Mrs. Clark's socks.

Mother is little or no better to-day.

Churned.

Stormy and wet.

I raked up a little hay this morning and mowed some.

Sarah went up to Cross-Roads this morning. Mrs. Smith went over to the Head of the Tide.

Chas. and Clara Owen came across this way en route for Father's. Mr. Smith went down to Hemmings this morning.

SUN. AUG. 5, 1888

Wea.

Rained hard part of last night, and some this morning. Cloudy.

Very few to Sunday-School. Clara, Clara, and the children were here to supper en route for home.

Mother is a little better. Sarah came home from Cross Roads to night.

Cloudy. Wind East. I cultivated and hoed my rock-weed potatoes this forenoon. Mowed rough stuff round the house. Went out to the wood and ground my scythe and ax.

Mr. Smith mowed some grass etc, down in Heman's field.

Mrs. Smith and Sarah went to the Corner this afternoon.

Churned

Cloudy. Looked like a storm.

Cut bushes etc. this forenoon. Clara and I and Sarah went raspberrying this afternoon. Carried them over to the Corner to-night but could not sell them. Sarah went over with me.

Mr. Smith, has been fixing "other room" — lathing etc.

Wea.

Cloudy. Cleared up this after-noon. Pleasant to-night. I Carried Clara and the children down to Ezra Lyons' this morning and went after them to-night. Moved and raked hay etc.

Ezra Lyons and Mysses went down to Subee this after-noon to get a chance to work.

Mr. Smith hauled in a little load of hay from Herman's field.

 came out and called me  
 this morning.

Mr. Smith has been casing  
 his windows etc. today.  
 Clara made boat-sail for Mr.  
 Benj. Doolley, on machine.

Mr. Frost, J. Doolley's meat man,  
 came through this way and  
 got dinner to Mr. Smith's.
