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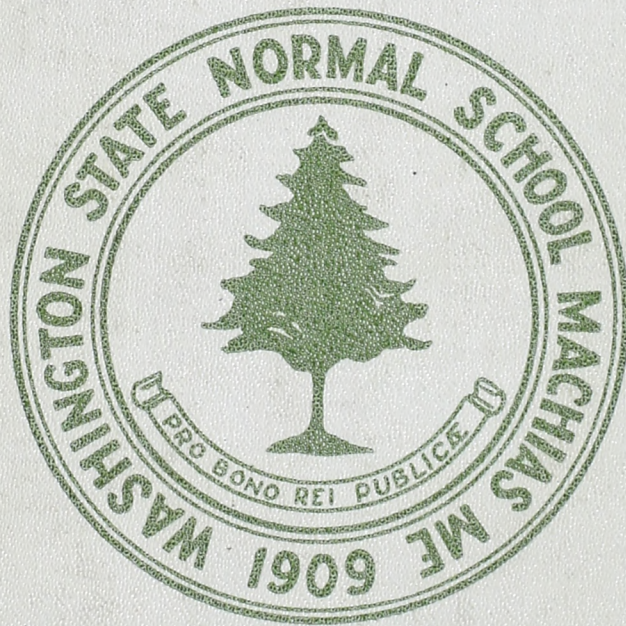

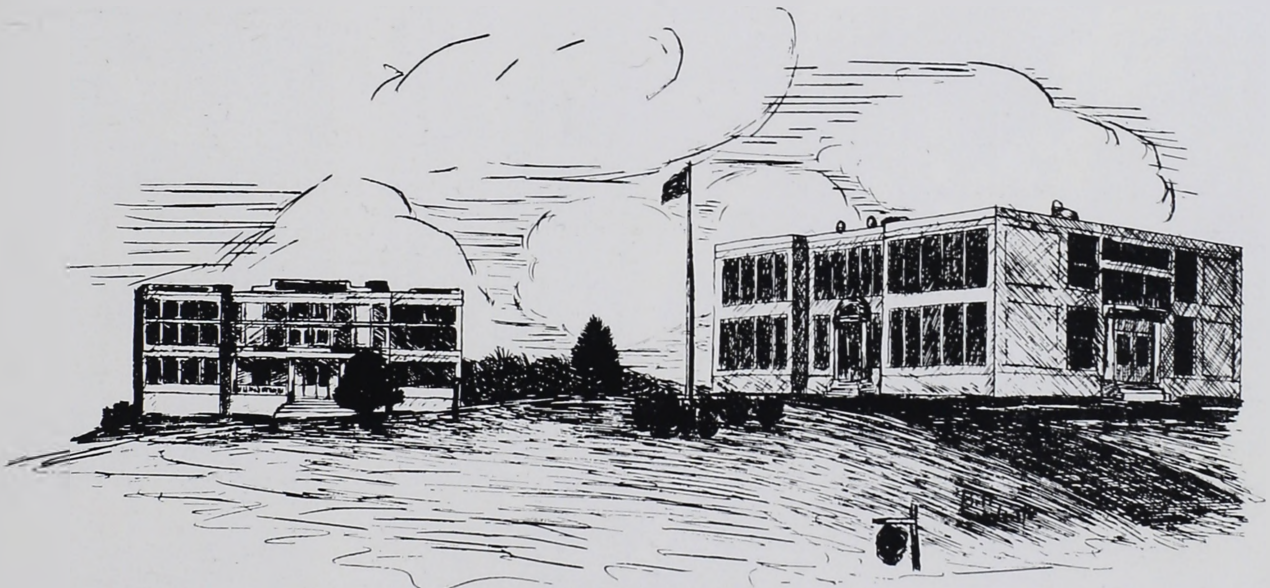

Mr. Kilburn, who has been with the school since 1918, will complete a memorable career in June as friend and teacher of students and alumni at W. S. N. S.

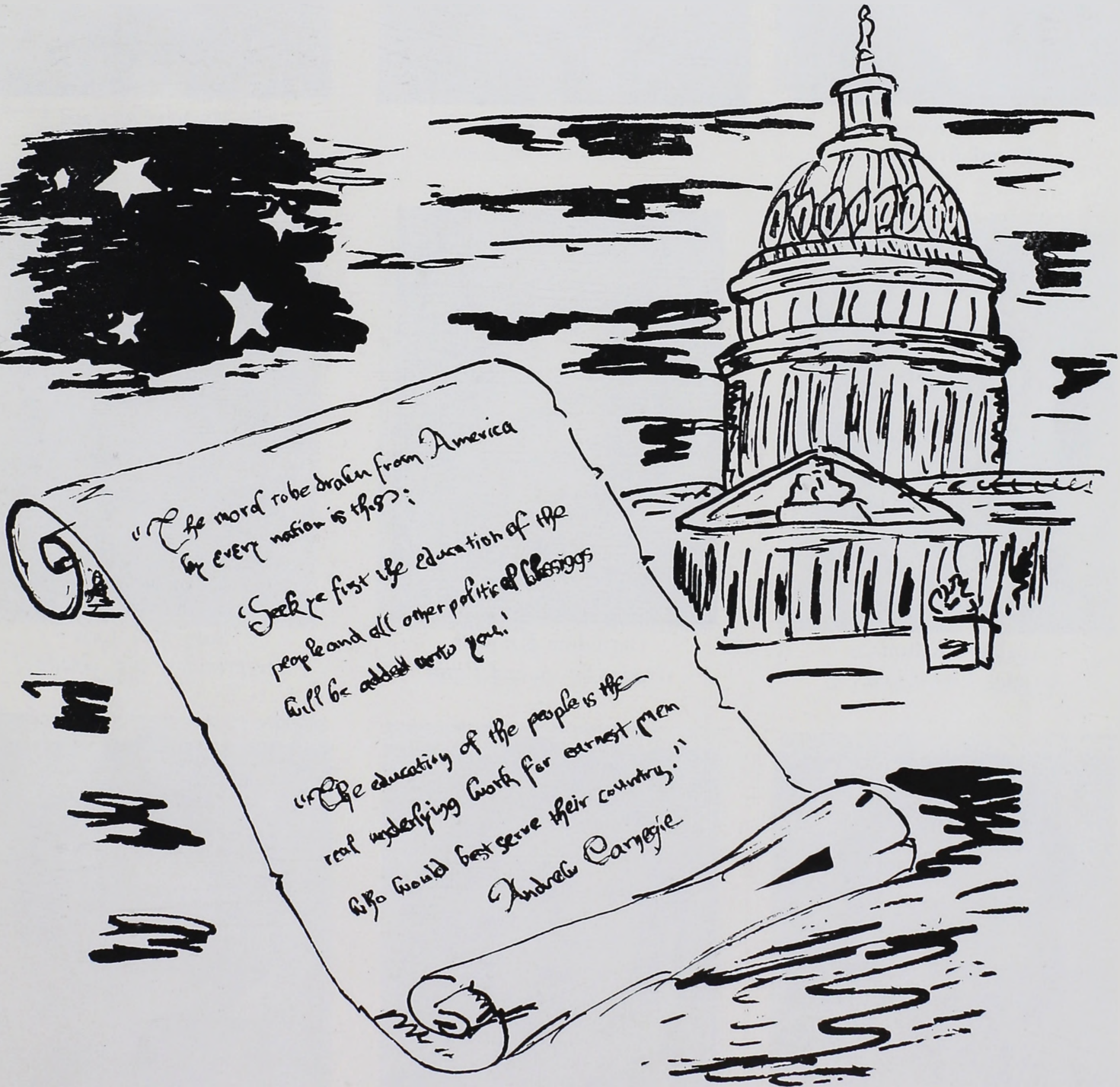

Editorial

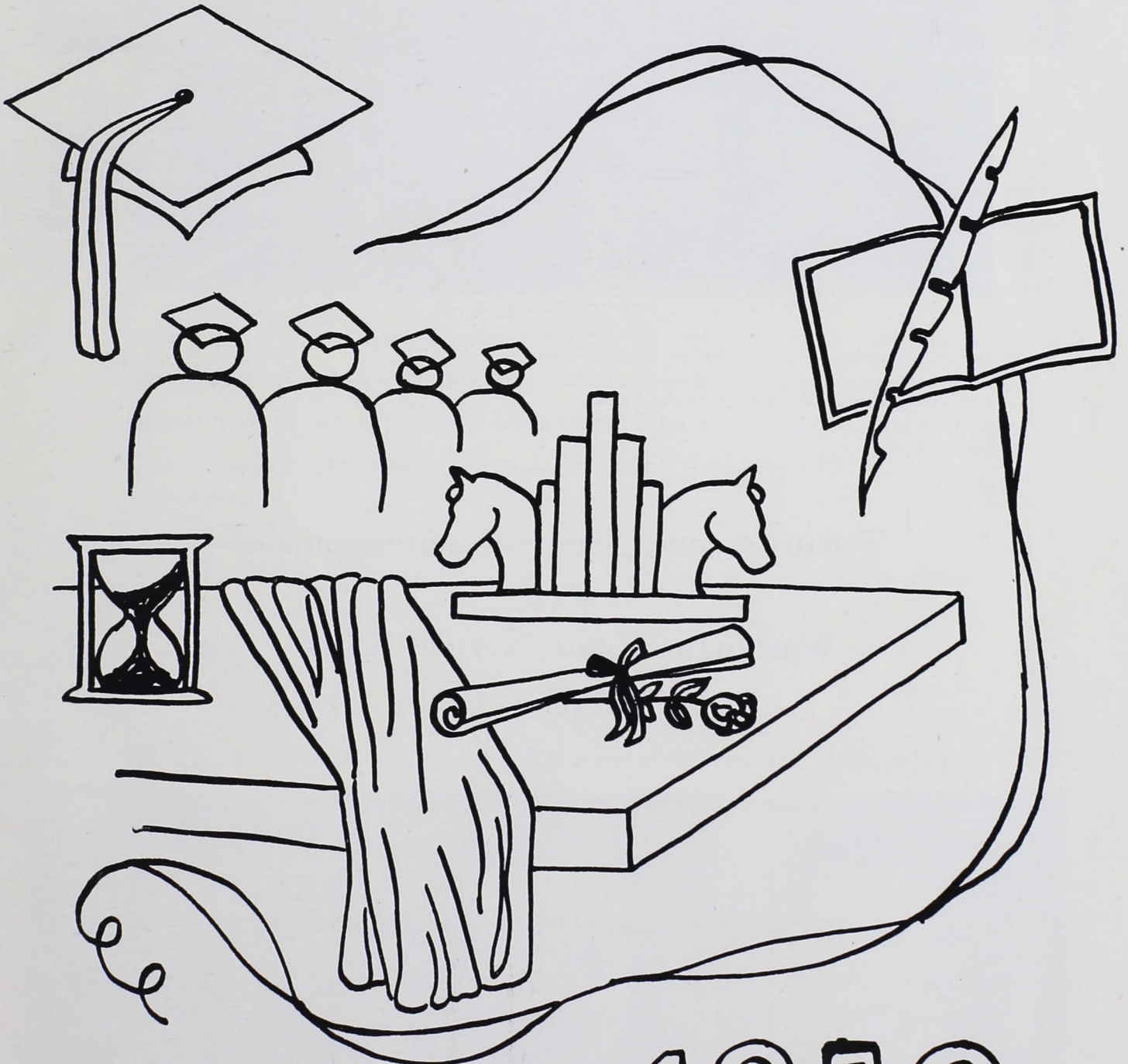

The Freshmen were well represented in the various clubs and activities. Sorority and fraternity bids were made and in the majority of cases accepted.

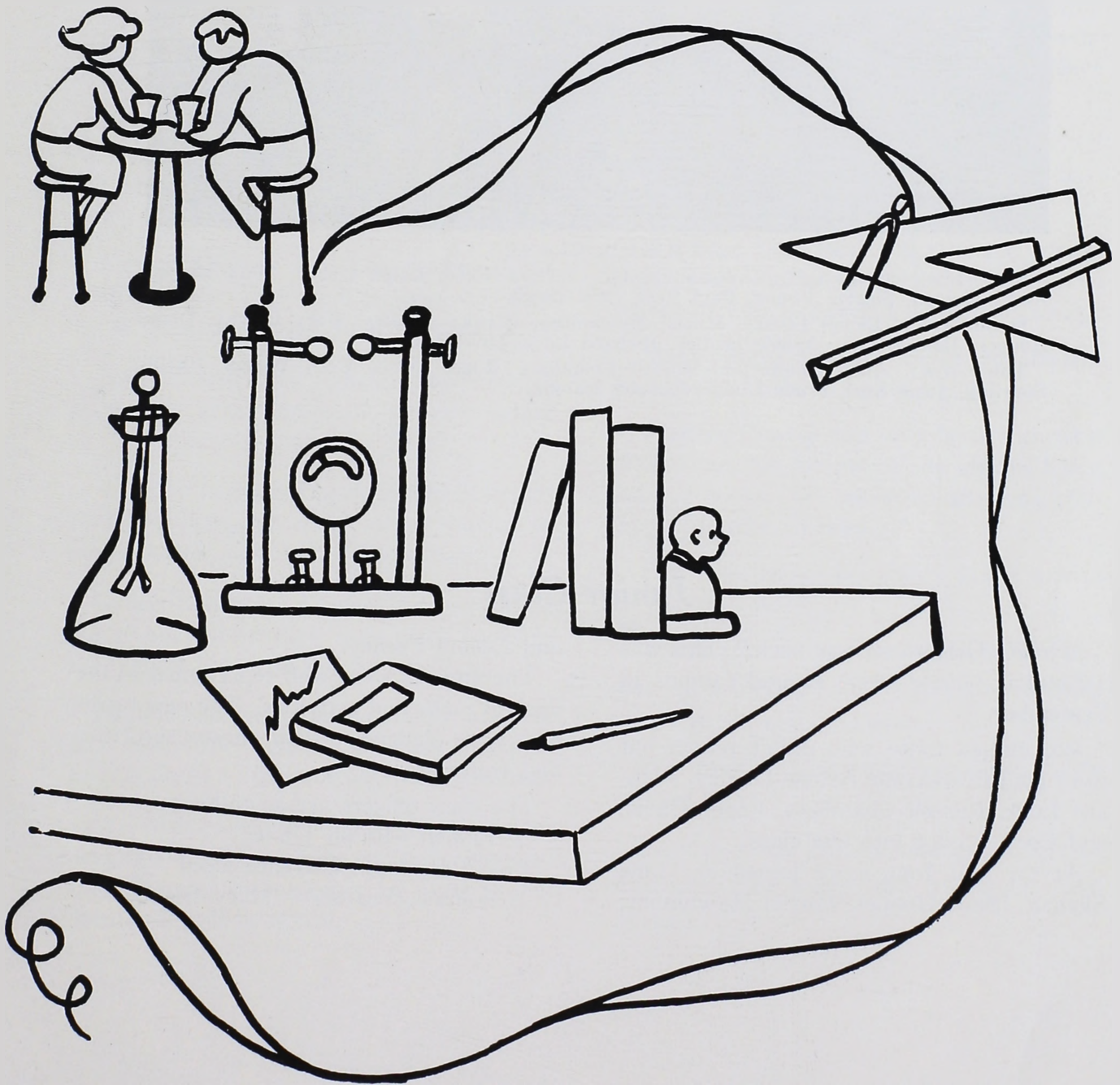
