Mrs. Smith has been to the Great-

Rained part of last night;
raining and wet all of today.

Charles and Jim worked on the
shop; put in an annill-block,
slacked line etc.

SAT. NOV. 23, 1889

Cleared up quite pleasant
this forenoon.

I had a school today in-
stead of next Friday.

Charles went to Meddybemps.
This morning.

Roads very muddy. Hard traveling.

Charles came up to the school
house and when school was out
we went up on his upper
lot and got a few butte of
ash.

SUN. Nov. 24, 1889

Wea.

Cooper.

Very pleasant and moderate. Looks some like a storm to-night.

"Home" all day.
Jim went up the road.

Ther.

MON. Nov. 25, 1889

Wea.

Cooper.

Overcast about all day. Cleared up this evening.

Charles and I came up to the school house this morning early. I swept the floor and he put some glass in the windows and plained off some disks.

He went home (after going up the road to get a trowel) made a trowel and commenced his chimney in the shop.

TUES. NOV. 26, 1889

Wea.

Cooper.

Quite pleasant and cool.
The ground is frozen for the
first time for about a week.

Mr. Platten of Muddy Camp
came over and helped Charles finish
his chimney. He had a fire
in the forge tonight.

WED. NOV. 27, 1889

Wea.

Cooper.

Pleasant and quite cool.
My 21st term of school closed
today.

Mr. Hayward, supervisor,
visited the school this afternoon.
Charles and I went "up town"
after school and I got my
pays - 2 1/4 hrs. @ \$26.00, \$62.50.
He got home about 8:15 o'clock.

Charles fixed up and set the
shoes on Tip, etc.

I paid Charles \$1.00 tonight
which with 25¢ paid sometime
ago, is in full for all dues and
demands to date, viz: for setting
shoes on Tip, meal and hay for Tip,
making iron for firing, etc.

Thanksgiving.

Snowed part of last night, hailed and snowed this fore-noon, turned to rain and rained all the afternoon. About 6 or 7 inches of snow fell. Very rough and cold storm.

John Store shot a fine (buck) deer this fore-noon. He got his dinner with us.

Charles worked in the shop most all day.

Cooper - Home

Cloudy part of the fore-noon, cleared off pleasant and moderate. Pleasant and mild this evening.

I started from Cooper at 8:40 and got home at 1:30 this afternoon.

The snow was hard this morning, and it was hard wheeling. Snow melted quite fast.

I payed Sarah for staying here with Clara 9 weeks, \$4.00. She went home this after-noon.

Elias came over this evening. I payed him \$1.75 for work done while I have been away.

SAT. NOV. 30, 1889

Wea.

Pleasant and quite moderate. Thawed some. I went to the Corner this fore-noon. I carried Sarah over to Mrs. Ramsdell's.

I got four bags of meal for myself and one for Mr. Smith. Mr. Smith and Elias came out on 6th Avenue with the steers and sled and brought the meal; it being too rough to bring it in in the riding-wagon.

Elias helped me bank the house this after-noon.

Corroll and I went out to father's this evening.

SUN. DEC. 1, 1889

Wea.

Quite pleasant and cool. Home all day.

Clara Owen, Alden and Isabel came over this after-noon and stayed to supper.

Mrs. Smith went out to her mother's this after-noon. She came over here a little while this evening.

Mr. Smith went up to Hard-
sorable to meeting this evening.

Elias went to the District tonight.

(Nov. 30, Yesterday.)

Cold and windy all day. Very cold to night. 7° above zero this evening.

I hauled a load of banking for the house, fixed round the barn and hauled a load of wood.

Mr. Smith went to the Corner this fore-noon.

Elias worked in the sardine factory this fore-noon. He came over a little while this evening.

WED. DEC. 4, 1889

Wea. 2°

Pleasant and cold but not so windy and disagreeable as yesterday. 2° below zero this morning.

I thrashed some oats, and cut some bushes in the pasture.

Mrs. Basworth came out this morning, and she and Mrs. Smith went to the Corner.

Elias went to the Corner this fore-noon and bought an ax.

Father got supper here to-night on his way home, from the Corner.

THURS. DEC. 5, 1889

Wea. 2°

Cold this morning; clouded up, moderated and rained this evening.

I cleared the road out some this fore-noon so we may have a winter road out to Fifth Avenue.

Elias and I went out to fath-ers and ground over axes, and stayed to dinner. I helped father put on the outside shutter and load a load of Ulysses' hay for his cow, down to Arthur's. I cut some bushes in the pasture this after-noon.

Elias went on the pond this evening, skating, with a number of others.

FRI. DEC. 6, 1889

Wea.

Rained last night and part of this forenoon. Cleared up quite pleasant and moderate. Snow squally and cooler to night.

I partly made a crib for the churned, hauled two loads of wood.

Elias went over to Mrs. Kinnell to get his dog, Max, but Herb. Sprague had him first.

Clara went over to the other house a little while.

SAT. DEC. 7, 1889

Wea.

Cloudy and quite cold this forenoon, cleared off pleasant and moderate.

Clara and I went down to Josiah Curtis' to see Mrs. Eliza Dunn who is there very sick. We got dinner to Mrs. Hanson's. Got home about 2 o'clock. I cut some bushes this afternoon and finished the colts' crib.

Mrs. Smith went over to Mrs. Magd. Owen's this afternoon. Mr. Smith went to Jenningsville this morning. He came down with us.

SUN. DEC. 8, 1889

Wea.

Cloudy. Looks much like a rain storm.

I went over to the other house a little while this afternoon.

Charles Owen, Inabel and Alden called here this forenoon and again this afternoon on their way to and from father's. Father came out with them to night.

MON. DEC. 9, 1889

Wea.

Commenced to rain quite early this morning and rained and blowed hard almost all day. Very moderate to night.

I banked up under the barn with manure, and put a shelf up, in the dairy.

Mr. Smith started to go in the woods, for Mr. Will Allen got part way in and had to come back. They (crew) could not get over the "sunken stream". Mr. Smith came over a little while this evening.

TUES. DEC. 10, 1889

Wea.

Pleasant and very moderate. Warm all day.

I went to the Corner this fore-noon. Went out and helped father shingle on James' hen-pen this after-noon.

Carroll went out with me.

Father went over to the Corner this fore-noon.

Mr. Warren Smith, came in to Mr. Smith's this morning.

Mrs. Smith came over this evening.

WED. DEC. 11, 1889

Wea.

Cloudy. Rained some before noon. Rained hard from about 3 o'clock all the after-noon and evening.

I went out to father's and shingled a little while, this fore-noon. Fixed my pig-pen up some.

Father hauled a load of meal (20 bush) from the brick-yard for Arthur.

Mrs. Smith went to the Corner this fore-noon.

Wea.

Pleasant cool, and very windy. Wind blew almost a gale all day.

Mr. Smith, father, and I, went over to Josiah Curtis's to attend the funeral of Mrs. Eliza Dunn. Rev. D. Smith, Edmunds, preached the sermon.

Father came out, and Mr. Smith came over, a little while this morning.

Elias went to the Corner this fore-noon.

Ther. FRI. DEC. 13, 1889

Wea.

Cloudy, moderate; snowed very little. Cleared off, colder to-night.

I changed the pig from underneath the barn, to the hog-pen. I pampered (partly) the hog-pen, etc. Churned this afternoon.

Mr. Warren Smith brought Mr. Smith a quarter of beef, this fore-noon.

Mrs. Smith went to the Corner this fore-noon. She came over here a little while to-night.

SUN. DEC. 15, 1889

Overcast and cold.

We all went over to the other house to dinner. (invitation)

I cut some bushes in the pasture this forenoon, piled some wood up, out on the road at noon, hauled a load of wood from the pasture, and a load of horse manure up to the pig-pen, etc.

Mr. Smith cut bushes in his fields. Helen and Lizzie called here en route for the Corner.

I wrote to John C. Winston & Co. to night.

Mr. John E. Holland
and
Miss Julia E. Dudley
were married at the home
of Mr. Albert Holland, by Rev.
W. E. Brown.

Pleasant and cold.

I went down to Arthur's a little while this forenoon, but he did not come out of the woods last night.

Father and Mother came out and stayed to dinner.

Mr. Smith went to Denmyerville, Mr. Hanson's, to stay all night — to go in the woods to-morrow morning, early.

Elias went to the Beechey this evening.

MON. DEC. 16, 1889

Wea.

Clouded up last night and
snowed very little - just e-
nough to cover the ground.
Pleasant and quite moderate
to-day.

I cut alders and cleared
up in the pasture, etc.
Clara washed, etc.

Elias went down to the su-
anade a little while this ev-
ening, and Mrs. Smith and
Edna called over here a little while.

Pleasant and moderate.
Clara and I went to the
Corner. Stopped to Charles', where
we came back, to dinner and
Clara shingled my hair. I
payed them \$1.50 for bedstead,
and chairs. I cut some bush-
es in the pasture this after-
noon. Mrs. Smith, Elias and I
went down to meeting to night.
Elias worked for Geo. C. C.

Anthony's this evening.

Cloudy. Sprinkled some this
fore-noon, rained hard all
the after-noon.

The children were very much pleased with their presents; — book, plate, etc. for Coroll, — book, dishes, etc. for Estella, — pen, etc. for Thomas, and china cup & saucer for Clara.

Father came out this forenoon and we all, except Bertha, who went over to Grandma Smith's, went out to Father's to a Christmas dinner and stayed till after supper.

Went over to Mr. Smith's and spent the evening. — Chas. Owen and family and Arthur & family were to Father's too.
