Reunion of First Maine Cavalry, Thomaston, Maine, Wednesday, September 14, 1910

This is the 50th year of the existence of that organization.

Thomaston was its birth place, the first enlistment being September 3, 1861. Two of its regimental commanders were Thomaston men. The president of the association who celebrated his 39th birthday at Apponattox Court House April 9, 1865, will greet you with his four score years and four. He is a Thomaston man. Thomaston will provide a good dinner Wednesday for the sum of fifty cents and a supper which will cost nothing to the members. In the afternoon there will be an automobile ride covering quite a portion of Thomaston, Rockland and Camden. If the day is unfavorable, the electric cars of Rockland and Camden may furnish an equivalent. In the evening music, songs and brief remarks or acknowledgements of good comradeship from 100 members and their wives at Watts Hall. The usual reduction of fares by the Maine Central and Aroostook R. R. One-half or one and one-third rates. Time of arrival at Thomaston—4.45 and 10.35 A. M.—3.50 and 8.35 P. M. Leave Thomaston—7.50 and 10.20 A. M.—1.40 and 9.10 P. M. Boats to and from Boston daily to Rockland. Members from Bangor and vicinity may come by rail to Bucksport. Boats to Camden and electric to Thomaston. Consult your time tables and arrange your trip exact in hours. West End Hotel, Thomaston—\$2 a day, or \$1 for night and breakfast. Lindsey Hotel, Rockland—\$1.50 a day and eighty-five cents a night and breakfast. Thorncliffe Hotel, \$2.50 a day, or \$1.50 a night and breakfast. Extra for room with bath. Please engage personally by letter or otherwise in advance. Good restaurants in Rockland.

Fred T. Widmer, successor to Henry Guild & Son of 31 West Street, Boston, holds the stamp for our regimental badge and will supply members with the same for \$2.50. Members can remit direct to him or to the corresponding secretary, who will deliver them at the reunion. These orders must be given a week or two in advance to give time to manufacture the badges. Now, comrades, write me fully in regard to yourselves, give names and dates of members who have died in your town and to your knowledge, and finally give me a full genealogical account of your family. Names of children and dates of birth and marriage and grandchildren. For use in the final roll call to issue some time in the future, and which will be his last work for the preservation of individual history.
