The Penobscot Valley AAUW Branch hosted its 65th Annual Book Sale on Saturday, April 9th from 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. in the basement of the Church of Universal Fellowship on Main Street in Orono, Maine. The day began at 7 a.m. when Book Sellers arrived, wanting to be first in line for the first hour of our sale. Each Book Seller paid an admission



price of \$10.00 for the opportunity to have the chance to buy the best books before we opened the sale to the general public at 9 a.m. We had eleven Book Sellers and many left the sale with several boxes filled with excellent books. The rest of the sale brought a steady flow of customers scouting for and buying used books. Our Snack Shack was open from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m., offering numerous delicious snacks from fruit kabobs to mini-sandwiches for a donation. This year a separate Children's Room was filled with children's books, in addition to a tent and beanbags, so the children could relax while perusing a potential book buy. We also had a table for books about Maine or written by Maine authors, in addition to a Special Book table that boasted more valuable old books and coffee table books.


