Mrs. Mary Etta Carter came up to Mrs. Smith's this afternoon. She will stay all night.

Cloudy. Looked much like a storm all day. James came out and helped me plow. The plow ed about an acre down by the muck-hole.

Mrs. Mary Etta Carter stayed over to Mrs. Smith's last night. She came over here visiting to-day. Nellie Davis was with her.

We went out to Ford Carter's this evening. Mr. and Mrs. Bucknam were there.

Mr. Smith went to the Corner this evening.

Commenced to snow this morning, and snowed hard about all the fore-noon. Rained and hailed most of the after-noon.

I worked on my hog-pen part of the time. Clara and I went out to Father's with the team and got  $\frac{1}{2}$  bbl of apples, 1 pk onions, 3 cabbages, 2 hens and a rooster.

Austin Carter came up this morning to plow for Mr. Smith but it snowed so hard that he went right back.

I went to Dennyville this fore-noon and got a load of boards and plank.

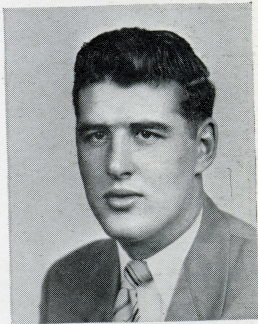

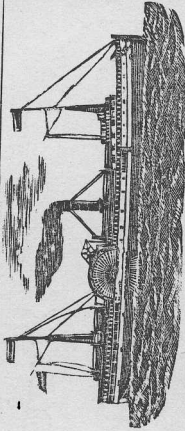

## DR. BYRON'S SACRIFICE.

New York, Sept. 5. —A well-known physician of this city went into voluntary exile yesterday to remain for no one knows how long in the pest hospitals at Swinburne Island. He is Dr. Byron, the scientist and bacteriological expert, and lecturer at the Loomis Laboratory. He has given up his large practice for the time being, and will remain on Swinburne Island to fight the cholera. He will be forced to quarantine himself as strictly as any of his patients are quarantined, and he does not expect to set foot on shore again till the danger is over. He made light of the risk which he was running, and was not desirous of saying much about his action, but he acknowledged that it would involve a financial sacrifice, as the salary paid him by the state would not nearly equal the income which he derives from his regular practice. Dr. Byron went to quarantine at first only as a bacteriological expert, and he did not expect to do anything except make examinations and microscopical analyses. But he was requested to remain and take charge of the pest station at Swinburne Island, and he decided that it was his duty as a physician to accept the call. He, however, is inclined to take a favorable view of the situation, and thinks the trouble at quarantine will be over in probably five or six weeks.
