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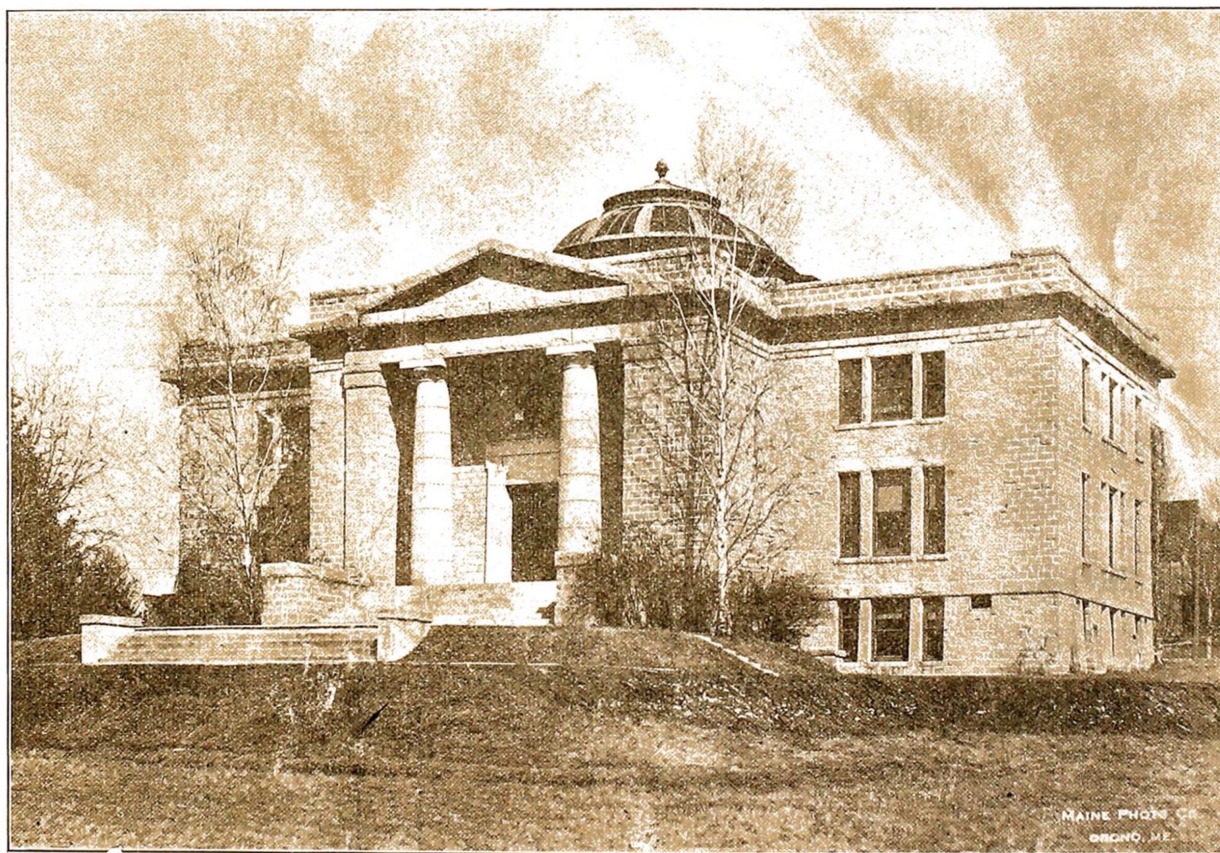

First New England Championship Won By Maine Track Team

Blue skies shone above Whittier Field, Brunswick, to see Coach Frank Kanaly's blue track team win the first New England Track and Field Championship for the University of Maine.

Like the State Meet of a week ago Saturday, the New England classic simmered down to a battle of pole vaulters, with its ultimate result to place either Maine or Bowdoin at the head of the parade of the 20 colleges and universities entered.

Going into this event the Orono athletes had made 17 points while Bowdoin which finished in second place had achieved 21 and M. I. T. 18.

Hobson nailing down a first eliminated M. I. T., while Stitham, Proctor and Guilfoyle of Maine sailed over the bar at 11 feet six inches to hold Kendall, of Bowdoin in a four cornered tie, for third and fourth positions really brought victory to the Maine team. By virtue of their accomplishment they brought 2½ points to the Pale Blue part of the column and gave the inners their margin of victory.

Played under ideal weather conditions the end of the meet saw two new records established and two equalled. Captain H. G. Steinbrenner of Massachusetts Institute of Technology tied the record of 15 1-5 seconds for the 120-yard high hurdles and then set a new mark for the 220-yard low barriers with a time of 24 2-5 seconds. Captain Otis Kendall of Bowdoin, with a jump of 6 feet 1 1-8 inches broke the record formerly held by R. H. Clark of Amherst, who cleared the bar at 6 feet 3-4 inches, during 1922. H. F. McCloskey of Boston College was clocked in one minute 55 seconds, in the 880-yard run in which he equalled the record set up by G. J. Leness of Massachusetts Institute of Tech. during 1925.

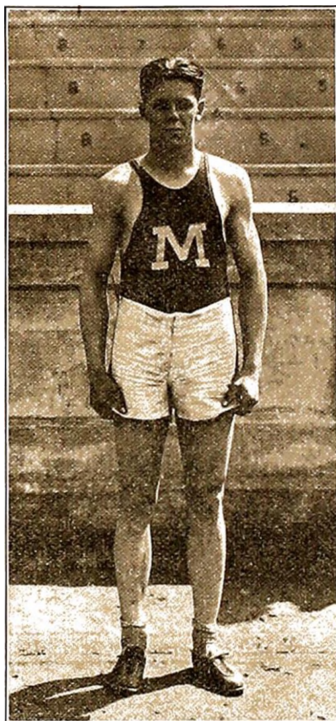
The victors of the meet won three first places, Lyden taking the javelin and Thompson the shot put to place themselves along with Hobson the pole vault winner. Rip Black failed to qualify in the discus throw at the state meet, took a third in this event and placed second in the hammer while Grunt Taylor placed third in the two-mile, and the three other pole vaulters picked up the other necessary points.

BOWDOIN WINS STATE MEET—MAINE SECOND

In a hard fought struggle, Johnny Magee's trackmen outshone the other Maine colleges in the thirty-first Annual Track and Field Meet held on Alumni Field last Saturday. Two records were broken and two others nearly broken. To Bowdoin goes first place honors by winning six firsts to Maine's and Bates' four each. But to Maine goes the honor of breaking two records, one held by a Maine man and the other held by Bates. To Captain Kendall goes the individual honors for he snatched the meet out of the hands of Maine and made it Bowdoin's ninth consecutive victory.

Mostrum was high point man taking firsts in both dashes. Niles, a dark horse in the furlong, placed second to Mostrum after a gruelling race. A few minutes previous Niles placed third in the 440.

The 440 was easily won by Baker and Wakely of Bates. Baker led most of the way but at the last corner Wakely came up strong and tied with Baker, saving himself for the half.

In the half a thrilling struggle ensued. Larsen led the field in a fast 600 but couldn't hold out and Wakely passed into the lead. Ham of Bowdoin was running second but Thompson in a last minute burst of speed overtook Ham and nearly caught Wakely at the finish.

Greene of Bowdoin upset the dope when he won the high hurdle event in which he competed against three Maine men. This race proved the heartbreaker to Maine followers. Torrey passed Farrington in the last few yards of the low hurdle race to win handily, altho the time was quite fast.

Lyden only heaved the javelin twice, one throw going 182 ft., the next for a new record at 191 ft. 5 inches. Black made a great throw to cop second, but this cost him the chance to win the hammer event in which he placed second, having thrown well beyond the winning mark.

Captain Hobson broke the vaulting record by about three inches. Captain Kendall placed second in the vault winning the meet for Bowdoin. Had he tied for third, Maine would have won by a fraction of a point. Hobson tried the record at 12 ft. 4 1-4 inches but failed in the three tries at a higher record.

The meet was a struggle from beginning to end and one of the most interesting ever held in the State.

Allie Wills came from behind in the mile and passed Charlie Sansone, Colby's star who led for three laps, and in a flying finish, tied the state record of 4:21. Had he been really pushed he might have broken the record.

The two mile was a thrilling race to

watch. Grunt Taylor surged into the lead and held it for five laps. Brudno of Colby then took the lead and opened up quite a distance. Taylor fell back to third position. In the last 200 yards, he put in all the reserve that was his and finished second. Brudno who ran the last two laps alone could have easily broken the record had he had competition to force him.

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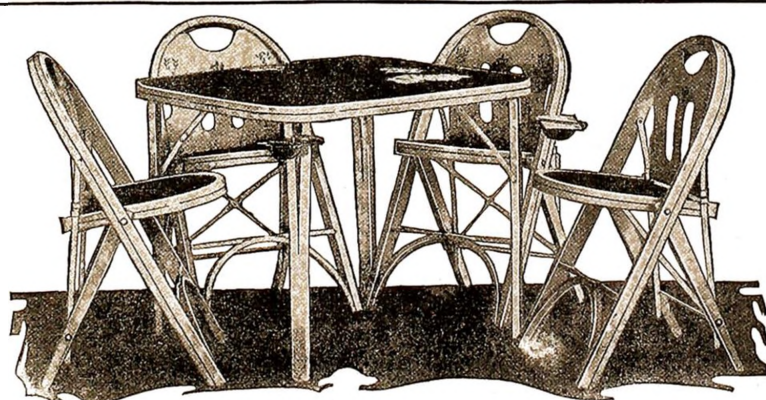
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
