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

### A Friend for Life

Classical music is one of the best things that has ever happened to mankind..... If you get introduced to it in the right way, it becomes your friend for life.

CLASSICAL MUSIC HAS A POWER that can't be explained. It's a power that sometimes catches us unaware and offguard. One winter morning in January, as



I was listening to Morning Edition, there was a report from Sarajevo about the Sarajevo Symphony. Throughout the past four disastrous years in that city, the Symphony continued to perform — despite gunfire, despite bombs, despite a tragic ethnic war. For Sarajevans, their Symphony Orchestra and the classical music it played represented the civilization they were struggling to preserve.

Morning Edition described the New Year's concert, performed as a benefit for the Sarajevo residents most affected by the terrible war — those whose homes had been destroyed, family members killed. Suddenly I heard the sounds of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony from that devastated city. The majesty of the music described far more powerfully than any words could do the triumph of civilization over warfare. I found tears welling up in my eyes.

Our civilization has kept, throughout the centuries, those things we value. Classical music is one of them. At Maine Public Radio, however, our classical music hosts don't start each day thinking "Today, I'm playing classical music because civilization values it!" They play classical music because they know that individual listeners and members, like you, value it — would find life diminished were the music not available. Maine Public Radio has long recognized that need. In fact, it has been "for 25 years your Maine source of great music."

Just one year ago, last February, we made a major change in our classical music programming. Dave Bunker and **Music du Jour** became our first "made-in-Maine" morning classical music program. One of Dave's innovations has been to invite you to share your favorite music with other listeners during "All-Request Monday." There is a wealth of great, classical music — unique, interesting, beautiful. I know each of us has favorite works but we also know we can discover new favorites on Maine Public Radio. The response to Dave's invitation has been great; you obviously like to recommend classical music to other listeners!

There's more good news. We're greatly pleased and very proud that the most recent Arbitron Ratings have shown that audiences for **Music du Jour** and **Studio B** with Vic Hathaway have increased significantly in the past 12 months. It's obvious that classical music has a lot of "friends for life" in Maine!



For Valentine's Day we invite you to listen in on an interesting program sched-



HE RADIO STAGE, a series of original plays written for the medium by contemporary playwrights, creates and inhabits that space, and continues to evolve the concept of modern radio drama as a vi-

tal component of contemporary culture. Compassionate and bold, diverse and unique, the world created by the series' radio theatre artists reflects the challenging landscapes of our time.

Often called the "Theatre of the Imagination," radio induces the mind of the listener to stretch to new limits of invention. When listening to works performed on radio, the imagination acts as costume and set designer, director, and effects technician. Radio has been called "that space of the invisible, which must be filled in by the imagination of the listener" - a dynamic environment that draws listeners to new worlds, peoples, and ideas.

Beginning Thursday evenings in February, The Radio Stage, a seven-part drama series comes to Maine Public Radio. Part of the NPR Playhouse series, The Radio Stage uses the works of contemporary playwrights, and the talents of members of established regional theater companies.

The Radio Stage is co-produced by Sarah Montague, and by WNYC-FM, New York.

OT, YOUNG TRUMPETER Nicholas Payton and the Jim Cullum Jazz Band perform the greats of "Satchmo" himself, Louis Armstrong, in this special tribute. Included are stellar renditions of Armstrong classics such as "If We Never Meet Again," "Stardust," and "Swing That Music." Still the reigning world champion of the jazz trumpet in the 1990s, Armstrong's performing career spanned six decades. In the 1920s Armstrong emerged as the most inventive jazz soloist in the world. By the 1930s, however, he developed a sparser, leaner style and became famous for his incredible high note playing. In the process, Armstrong moved away from a straight diet of jazz and blues and took popular songs of the day and made them swing.

EDWARD KENNEDY ELLINGTON, the jazz legend, was also an accomplished classical musician. This program examines the Duke's classical music career from scholarly, and personal perspectives. Using musical segments from "The Nutcracker," "The River," "Sacred Service," "Suite in Black and Tan," and a small amount of jazz to compare styles, University of Illinois musicologist Dr. Lawrence Gushee comments on the impact of the Duke's jazz and classical works on music today.



Why are so many musical terms of Italian origin?

Forte, Piano, Largo, Allegro, Andante, Adagio, Staccato, Crescendo, Opera, Soprano, Libretto, Concerto

Italy is the cradle of western music: most of the modern forms and practices with which we're familiar got their start in Italy and then spread throughout the other European countries. Through the prestige and success of Italian music and Italian musicians, musicians of all countries became familiar with Italian terms and what they represented. These terms became part of a common language, and with universal usage came fewer possibilities for misunderstanding. The continued use of Italian terms was thus very practical, and it became a matter of tradition, which is important in itself, since musicians have always tended to have great respect and affection for tradition. Musicians have always had a great appreciation for the sheer beauty of the Italian language, as well, and this last factor should not be underestimated. If something sounds beautiful in Italian, why change it?

Last year, the Jazz Ensemble, along with the Concert and Marching Bands of OTHS were selected to represent Maine in the parade marking the 50th year of the end of World War II in Washington D.C. Priest states that the Jazz Ensemble has never performed on live radio, and they are looking forward to the experience. "I'm very excited about it. It's going to be great!"

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
