





Warrant for Town Meeting

To I. G. Kemp, Constable of Aurora, in the County of Hancock, State of Maine, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Aurora, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in said Town on Monday, the 26th. day of March A. D. 1935, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- At. 3. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To choose a chairman of the board of Selectmen.
- Art. 5. To choose a second Selectman.
- Art. 6. To choose a third Selectman.

Art. 7. To choose a Board of Assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose a board of children's guardians for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a Board of Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see what per cent the Town will pay for collecting taxes for the year 1935.

Art. 11. To choose a collector of taxes for the year 1935.

Art. 12. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To choose a member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.

Art. 14. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To choose a chimney inspector for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To choose a surveyor of Wood, Bark and Lumber for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for ways, highways and bridges.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Town charges.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the Contingent Fund.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for support of schools.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for maintenance of cemetery.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for public health nurse.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Superintendence Account.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for repair account of school.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for poor department.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$48.00 for maintenance of the third class highway.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to procure a loan of \$753.09 for the payment of the Town's apportionment for the construction of the Bog Bridge in Aurora as provided by Chapter 319 Public Laws of 1915 as amended to apply to State and County Aid in the construction of Bridges.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$290.74 for construction of "Bog Bridge." This being approximately one third of the cost plus interest charges. The remaining two assessments to be made in the years 1936 and 1937.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 20, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as

outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay men, horses and trucks per hour on the Town roads and State Aid roads.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$2,000 and to issue the Town's negotiable notes therefor.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue the Town's negotiable notes or bonds for the purpose of renewing, refunding or paying certain notes of the Town due now or to become due during the municipal year 1935.

Art. 35. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for signs, guide board and advertising.

Art. 36. To act on any other article or articles that may come before said meeting.

Following is my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

Forrest Smallidge taught the Spring term. Nellie Leeman and Dorothea Dwyer taught the remainder of the year. The children are making good progress. The new stove and the sheathing of the schoolroom add to the comfort of the children and are certainly a great improvement. If we could have a supply of seasoned wood, properly housed and an adequate supply of kindling with a janitor employed to keep the fire, the intellectual needs of the children

could more efficiently be met. As it is, so much time and energy has to be given to looking after the physical needs, that there is not nearly enough left for all that we would like to accomplish.

I appeal to you as parents and citizens to raise enough money this year to employ a janitor and furnish proper fuel.

REPORT HANCOCK COUNTY HEALTH SERVICE FOR THE TOWN OF AURORA, YEAR 1934

To the Citizens of the Town of Aurora, Maine:

I herein submit the report for the work of the Hancock County Health Service for the year, February 1, 1934—February 1, 1935.

Full individual inspection has been given the Caruso School pupils, much the same as other years, the routine weighing and measuring, and inspections for physical defects and infectious diseases.

Following are the defects found:

Pupils who were found with slight eye strain	1
Pupils who were found with defective vision	0
Pupils who were found with defective hearing	0
Pupils who were found with carious or defective teeth	13
Pupils who were found with abnormal throats	3
Pupils who were found with obstruction, nasal	3
Pupils who were found with postural defects	2

Of the (13) pupils with defective teeth (9) had temporary teeth decays, while only (3) had permanent teeth decay, (7) were in need of prophylactic cleaning, due to the tartar forming on the teeth, which in time eat into the enamel of the teeth. (1) pupil found eligible to qualify for the 6 and 7 point child, for the pin and certificate.

Notification slips were sent to the homes stating the defect found. Health talks given in the class room. There is a slight increase this year in dental corrections, there having been (5) during the year.

Interviewed Mrs. Kennister, Red Cross Chairman for Aurora, regarding fund for corrections in the school, as there is usually 50 cents on the membership kept in each town for corrections.

We are earnestly hopng some time in the future to give our pupils the benefit of a Dental Clinic where it is much needed, and the town so unaccessible to the dentist. Other towns have had this service, why not Aurora?

The work of the Hancock County Health Service, is financed by the sale of the Christmas Seals, and by the Town appropriation, for which, we wish to extend our grateful appreciation to all the kind citizens who have made this work possible.
