## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To I. G. Kemp, Constable of Aurora, in the County of Hancock, State of Maine, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Aurora, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in Said Town on Monday, the 31st day of March, A. D., 1947 at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will accept the report as printed.
  - Art. 3. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To choose a chairman of the board of Selectmen.
  - Art. 5. To choose a second selectman.
  - Art. 6. To choose a third selectman.
- Art. 7. To choose a Board of Assessors for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose a board of children's guardians for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To choose a Board of Overseers of the Poor for the coming year.

- Art. 10. To see what per cent the Town will pay for collecting taxes for the year 1947.
  - Art. 11. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the year 1947.
- Art. 13. To choose a member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 14. To choose a surveyor of wood, bark, and lumber for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 16. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To choose a chimney inspector for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for ways, highways and bridges.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Town charges.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the Contingent Fund.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for support of schools.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for maintenance of cemetery.

- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for public health nurse.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for superintendence account.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will appropriate and raise \$37.00 for maintenance of third class highway.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loans not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the municipal year 1947 and to issue the towns negotiable notes therefor.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the Towns negotiable notes or bonds for the purpose of renewing, refunding, or paying certain notes of the town during the year 1947.
- Art. 28. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for State Aid road construction in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of section 19 chap. 28 Revised statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of section 5 chapter 229 Public laws of 1937.
- Art. 29. To see what action the town will take in regard to our public school. A petition from the school committee to have the school remain open has been received in accordance with the laws regulating school under eight (8) pupils.
  - Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote

to pay men, horses and trucks per hour on the town roads, and on the state aid road.

Art. 31. To act on any other article or articles that may come before said meeting.

#### HEALTH

To the Selectmen of the Town of Aurora, I hereby submit a brief report of services rendered the Town for the period from January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946.

Five visits have been made to the Caruso School during the School year at which time class room inspections were made and a check-up of the Seven Point pupils. Individual inspection given pupils who were absent when the annual inspection was given.

The annual physical inspection was given the pupils October 17th. and consisted of the routine weighing and measuring, vision and hearing, inspection of the teeth, throat and for postural defects, the skin for rashes, sores and personal cleanliness as well as for infectious disease resulting as follows:

All pupils apparently have normal vision and hearing 4 have decayed teeth, one of which had a permanent tooth which needed filling

1 with abnormal throat and possibly pediculosis

1-20% or more overweight

Of the eight pupils inspected, 6 were found to have remedial defects and two eligible to qualify for the Seven Point Pin and Certificate.

Since previous inspections, three pupils have had corrections.

We wish to express thanks and appreciation to all who have shown their interest in the work of the Service.

## REPORT OF HEALTH NURSE

The fight against the enemies of health is never ended. Communities need to find better ways and more effective weapons. Leaders in programs to promote and safeguard health have proven that more attention and time should be given to prospective mothers and fathers, infants, and preschool children. By focusing attention on the children before they enter school much harm can be prevented.

Because Aurora has a nurse employed by another agency to do the school and tuberculosis work, your Bureau of Health nurse has spent her time with the younger age group. Child health supervision calls have been made. Mothers have been encouraged to take children to their family physician for medical supervision. The importance of early immunization has been stressed.

To carry on any public health nursing program it is necessary to have community backing and understanding. I wish to thank the public in general for their splendid cooperation. With cooperative efforts we can look forward to a healthier happier future.
