TOWN WARRANT

To Chester A. Wing, a Constable of the Town of Avon, County of Franklin, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Avon, in said county, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Avon Town House, in said town, on Monday the twenty-first day of March A. D. 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following Articles namely:

- Art. 1 To choose a Mcderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town efficers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Select-men, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, and Clerk, and the other town officers.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00, more or less, for making and repairing roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930; or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200.00 more or less, for Winter and Spring roads for the past year, and also for Winter and Spring roads for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$457.00 for Third Class Maintenance for the ensuing year.

- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for school expenses, both high and common, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1250.00, more or less, for the relief of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, more or less, for miscellaneous Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, more or less, for Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for cutting bushes along the highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To raise the sum of \$340.80 for State Patrol for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for State Aid Road repairs and maintenance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Health Officer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for dependent children for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey property.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to issue town notes not exceeding one year, to an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00, the avails to be used in payment of current expenses of the town; provided the same becomes necessary during the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the Road Commissioner and laborers on town roads for the ensuing year.

- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to pay to residents of the town, for compensation due them by the town, one half in cash the other half to pay on taxes due until said taxes are paid.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the buildings now owned by Benj. Mitchell to the Valley road, so called.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named Town House on Monday the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon until the close of said meeting.

Report of Union Health Officer

To the Selectmen of Avon:

During 1937 there were reported in Avon 48 cases of mumps, 6 of whooping cough and 1 of pneumonia, the cases of mumps and whooping cough were visited.

Toxoid was given to 11 and 7 were vaccinated. Tuber-culin tests were given to 30, a Dick test to one and a Schick to one.

With Miss Barry two infant and preschool conferences were held, one at Mile Square school house and the other at the Valley school, Dr. Ourrier examining the children at Mile Square and Dr. Thompson at the Valley, a total of 26 being examined by them.

Two Avon citizens were taken to the chest clinic, one of them also being taken for an X-ray.

15 pupils were inspected at the request of the teachers.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Avon.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

This is my sixth annual report as to the condition of the schools that are under my supervision.

FINANCIAL. In the last report it was pointed out that with an appropriation of \$3,900.00, it would be possible to pay all of our bills up to date. We have done this and had it not been for an increase in the amount spent for conveyance, which was unforeseen, we would not have had an overdraft. However, now with our tuition bills paid up to date, that is, to the beginning of the winter term, we are in a position to ask for a smaller appropriation. An estimate of next year's budget follows:

Historical Records Survey

To the Citizens of Avon:

Having learned through your town officials that a fire proof vault is being built in which to preserve your town records, we take this opportunity to relate to you something of what the work being done by the Historical Records Survey has accomplished, which must be of especial interest to the town.

In the first place officials and custodians of records have been aroused to a larger realization of the importance of preserving these records all over the United States and the significance of this work caused the interest and cooperation of nearly all librarians, historians, and officials in high authority. A survey of the records of the town of Avon has recently been completed by workers on the Historical Records Survey.

This is a nation wide federal project concerned with the discovery, making accessible and preservation of historical records. As all written history must or should be taken from authentic sources, the records of a town whether in volumes or loose papers constitute the only original material. The Survey is interested in this material. It is not uncommon for us to find a towns most valuable records scattered around in chambers and garrets, old barns, garages, hen houses etc., and in the near by town of Madrid we found nine volumes of clerk's records in a deserted house, a part of which were early birth records. In Farmington and Carthage we found one volume each of clerks early minutes of town meetings, which many supposed to be destroyed and as will be realized, records in such conditions are very likely to be over-looked and finally lost. All of these records have of course been returned to the respective town clerks.

In Penobscott County a town clerk kept his records in a store. When the workers came to the town, after completing their check, the records were not returned to the store as it was near town meeting time and the clerk expected to turn his records over to his successor in office. During the night a fire destroyed the building and contents. The records of the town were saved due solely to the workers on the Survey.

The Survey has the very active backing of the American Historical Association.

In one nearby town early records were quite recently being used to kindle fires while in your own town rumor has it that in 1861 nearly all of Avon's records except the vital statistics and current ones were sold for rag paper at 5c per pound.

Legislation provides that completed volumes shall be placed in fireproof safes for protection from fire but your town has advanced even farther and provided a vault which may easily protect your records for a long time. We judge that you are fortunate to have officials who are zealous for the preservation of these records and we feel thankful that our work among you has been the cause for the construction of this vault which should be the pride of every citizen in Avon. We thank you for your kindly assistance and courtesy which has made our labor a pleasure and the inventory thus completed, and we should make mention of a former town official, Mr. Henry Hamlin whose efforts and painstaking care has contributed so much to the welfare of your records.
