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

Statement of Audit

Board of Selectmen Avon, Maine

Gentlemen:

In accordance with Chapter 80, Section 116, Revised Statutes of 1944, and at your request, the records of the Town of Avon have been audited by Auditor R. M. Stetson for the period February 28, 1947 to February 25, 1948, inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been appropriately handled.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the town and the result of its operations for the period designated.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted,

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts — Town of Avon March 1, 1947 to February 25, 1948

CASH

All cash receipts were checked in detail and found to have been properly recorded.

All expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The Treasurer's checkbook balance was reconciled with the bank statement and this balance plus cash on hand amounting to \$70.43 agreed with the cash balance at the end of the year.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

This account included reimbursements due from the State and from the Town of Wilton on Charities. It also included money due from the Excise Tax Collector, consisting of \$25.57 due on Receipt No. 8 of the 1948 receipts and of \$2.50 on Receipt No. 112 of the 1947 receipts.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1947 Tax Commitment Book was added and found to check with the Valuation Book and the Warrant of Commitment. Approximately 87% for the current commitment was collected and one abatement of \$3.00 was made. Detail of taxes remaining unpaid at the close of the books appears in Schedule A-10.

Payment of prior years' taxes left an unpaid balance of \$58.34. Detail of this amount is shown in Schedule A-11.

TAX LIENS

All transactions affecting tax liens were checked and the unpaid liens were listed. Detail appears in Schedule A-12.

TAX LIEN COSTS

This account amounting to \$20.50 was carried forward from the previous year and remains unchanged.

TAX DEEDS

Tax Deeds amounting to \$49.73 were carried forward from the previous year and remain the same.

TAX ACQUIRED PROPERTY

Tax acquired property of \$35.00 was sold during the fiscal year. There remains no tax acquired property on February 25, 1948.

RESERVE FOR LOSSES

Tax Liens of prior years were written off in the amount of \$47.96, leaving a balance of \$247.01 in this reserve.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

This account consists of \$6.69 due Howard Pinkham; \$2.37 over-payment on excise taxes and \$4.32 overpayment on 1946 commitment.

NOTES PAYABLE

This consists of a note amounting to \$1,600.00 with the National Bank of Commerce, Portland, Maine. In a special town meeting, authority was given the Selectmen to hire this money for the purchase of a truck.

SURPLUS

Operations during the fiscal year caused a decrease in the Unappropriated Surplus, leaving a balance of \$1,902.03. Analysis of change appears in Exhibit E.

TRUST FUNDS

Cemetery perpetual care fund investments were checked and details of same appear on Schedules A-8 and A-9.

GENERAL

Corporate surety bonds were furnished by the tax collector and treasurer.

Report of Health Officer

To the Citizens of the Town of Avon:

I hereby submit my report as School Physician and Health Officer for the term April 1, 1947 to March 1, 1948.

Last spring smallpox vaccination and diphtheria inoculations were done on all those wishing to take advantage of this service. As usual there were many who were desirous of this valuable protection.

Routine physical examination of all pupils in the Valley school was done and results were recorded. Those having defects of any nature received notices so that the parents could attend to the necessary corrections. During the course of my recent examination of the pupils I found that many previously noted defects had been corrected. The principal defects are teeth, tonsils, and eyes. These conditions if not properly attended to can cause serious results and it is the wise parent who seeks the advice of their Physician and follows it thereby safeguarding the future health of their children.

The health of the Townspeople as a general rule was good. The reportable diseases were pneumonia, measles, and whooping cough. This year whooping cough appeared to be the leading disease but there were no serious results.

During my several visits to the school this year I noticed the great interest the children took in the preparation of the hot lunches and how they thoroughly enjoyed them. This is a step forward in building better and healthier bodies and I earnestly hope that the parents will continue to give their sanction and support to such worthy program.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Avon:

We are gradually awakening, as a nation, to the complexities of living in this atomic era. Daily we discover that a return to the old ways of doing things is not always the proper or successful method of attacking our new problems. The boys and girls now in school must be prepared to live in a far more complex civilization than was ever dreamed of ten or more years ago. Hence, school administrators and school officials must investigate and re-examine the aims and purposes of public elementary and secondary education. Unquestionably, the citizens of Avon want their children to be better prepared to meet the demands that successful democratic society is going to demand of them. Your schools have always considered enlightened citizenship as one of its primary aims. That your schools have not always been successful should not be surprising. There are two chief reasons why. In the first place, schools have been concerned only with academic ability and academic achievement. Many lawyers, doctors and other professional men would be failures today had their education been concerned only with mechanical ability and mechanical achievement. They would have left school at an early age because they did not possess the type of ability the school demanded of them. So too, many of our boys and girls dropped out of school this past year because they did not possess the academic ability or the academic interests that were demanded. Secondly, schools have always measured citizenship in terms of what a person knows. We have the human failing of confusing that which we wish for and that which really is. There are but few who act in accordance with the best that they know. Reciting the creed for a good citizen does not insure that a person will perform as a good citizen. Behavior is governed by factors other than just knowing. Attitudes, understandings and ideals more often determine our decisions. These we must actually teach for, rather than to assume that they will accompany knowing. No town or city can properly fulfill its obligations and responsibilities to the boys and girls that does not come to grips with these problems.

The Hot Lunch program at the Valley School is in need of your financial assistance. Perhaps the educational advantages of the program should be brought to your attention. The school lunch provides an opportunity for the children to learn nutrition, proper food habits and good social behavior. It should also be considered a part of the school health program. I have previously explained the methods of raising funds to carry on this program. They are totally inadequate due to rising food costs. Since last September, expenditures have exceeded income by approximately ten dollars each month. If the town were to weigh the advantages of the program against an appropriation of one hundred dollars, they would consider their money well spent. The alternative of not appropriating funds can only result in a discontinuance of the program and loss of equipment given to the school by the Federal government. I hope you will give this matter serious consideration before town meeting time.

In closing, I should like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude for the splendid co-operation extended me by School Committee members, citizens of Avon, your sincere and conscientious teacher, Mrs. Cousineau, and the boys and girls.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting of Avon, Maine, March 15, 1948

To Charlie Pinkham, a Constable of the Town of Avon, in the County of Franklin,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Avon, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Avon Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 15th day of March, A. D. 1948, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Officers.
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the various Town Officers for the ensuing year, what compensation for labor on public roads.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00, more or less, for repairing Roads and Bridges, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, more or less, for Third Class Maintenance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, more or less, for Winter and Spring Snow Removal for the ensuing year.

- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for all School Expenses, both High and Common, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for the relief of Poor, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money for Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00, more or less, for Miscellaneous Town Charges, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cutting Bushes, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$695.60 for State Patrol, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Health Officer, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of property acquired by the town by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute municipal quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan, or loans, in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current year by taxes.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to pay note of the Town in the sum of \$800.00 maturing November 12, 1948.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on notes issued by the Selectmen.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 to pay the School Board for their services for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for Abatements, for the ensuing year.

- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to bond the necessary Town Officers, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum necessary to pay for Collection of Taxes, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for School Lunches in Avon for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$300.00, more or less, for School Lunches of Avon children in Phillips.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to install one or more fire Hydrants between Phillips-Avon town line and Valley road and vote to raise money for same.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Fire Fighting Equipment.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00, more or less, for Maine Publicity.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the Bailey place to the Town line.
- Art. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the above named Town House on Monday, March 15th, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters: from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until the close of said meeting.
