COMMENTS

Re: Audit of the Town of Belmont

Year ended February 1, 1945

The 1944 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records, and all abatements were legal.

The total commitment was accounted for by cash to the treasurer, discounts, abatements and tax liens The excise tax collections were verified with the copies of the receipts issued.

As far as could be ascertained all receipts were recorded and the cash was deposited in the bank. Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, supported by invoices and payrolls on file. The cash balance was reconciled with the bank. Payments recorded as received on tax liens and tax acquired property were found to have been applied against the proper items.

The trust fund investments were examined and all interest was left on deposit.

The town clerk's records were examined and appeared to be in proper order.

Our test check of paid invoices and payrolls indicated they were proper charges and correctly recorded.

Verifications to the extent deemed necessary were made of the asset accounts.

The complete report of the audit, as required by Chapter 80, Section 119, Revised Statutes of 1944, and amended by Chapter 84, Public Laws of 1945, is on file in the office of the Selectmen.

A brief summary of the financial and other affairs of your town.

Conditions are improving in regard to road construction and maintenance, as the State is again in position to aid in this matter. In 1945 the State appropriated \$314.00 to be used for reconstructing our Third Class Roads so they might be taken over by the State and relieve the town of their maintenance. It was decided by our supervisor that we start on the eight tenths of a mile of Third Class Road at Hall's Corner, so called. We spent \$265.72 of which \$40.70 was for material. This bill has to be paid by the town. The State has accepted the road and will reimburse the town for the balance which is \$225.02. That leaves an unexpended balance of \$89.07 to be used with our 1946 appropriation. In accepting the Third Class Road at Hall's Corner the State did not accept the wooden bridge near E. J. Hill's place as they claim it must be maintained by the town until a new one is built.

The construction of a cement bridge would be taken care of by the State, County and Town. I think the Town's share would be about 20 per cent of cost. In 1945 the State also appropriated \$176.00 to be used on some dirt road. This money was not used and is available in 1946 along with another appropriation.

The State also matched our State Aid money, the Town raised \$300.00, the State gave us \$1,050.00. If the Town at their next annual meeting raises another \$300.00 for State Aid that will make a total of \$2,700.00 available in 1946. There is also available in 1946 \$1,100 Third Class money to be used on the road from the William Shevis place toward the Lincolnville town line. The amount of road money due from the state plus the amount usually raised by the town should amount to around \$5,000.00 if properly handled should make some improvement in our highways.

The total amount of cash taken in in the past year was \$8,801.76. The total amount spent was \$8,438.76 leaving a cash balance of \$363.00 plus the cash balance from last year \$6,499.54 leaves a balance in hands of the treasurer Feb. 1, 1946 of \$6,862.54. There is still \$225.02 due the town form the state on the Hall's Corner roadwork.

The plowing and sanding is being done this winter (1945-1946) by contract at eighty-five dollars per mile on 17.29 miles at a cost of \$1,469.65, plus housing the snow sand - \$49.46, makes a total cost for snow removal and sanding \$1,519.11

The cost of our schools the past year was \$3,378.16, the town received \$1,129.06 school money from the State Department of Education, that is more than we have been receiving. The Selectmen's report does not compare with the Superintendent's due to the fact that we pay the federal taxes by the quarter and his report shows them paid by the month.

It has been the custom of the town in the past years to pay discounts on taxes paid before July 1 of each year, and to charge interest on unpaid taxes ofter Nov. 1. We find that we are losing money. In 1945 it cost the town \$51.40 for discounts. The town collected only \$13.04 interest after Nov. 1. There will be an article in the warrant to see if the town will vote to discontinue the paying of discounts. The law says each town must print the auditor's report, as our audit was taken care of late in the fall we have not received it as yet.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Belmont:

School opened with an enrollment of 32 pupils, the enrollment gradually increasing to 40. There have been some leave with a resulting present enrollment of 36. Mr. Bailey from the State Department, who examined the school last fall stated: "The classroom is of sufficient size, allowing 18 square feet of floor space per child, to house a maximum of 28 pupils." The crowded condition is the main problem at the present time. The School Committee has considered several possible solutions, and is recommending that the town raise the necessary funds to pay the tuition of grades VII and VIII, and transport them to Belfast. This would reduce the size of the school by 8 pupils next year. It would give the teacher six grades and the sub-primary to teach. Now she has eight grades and the sub-primary. This would increase the efficiency of the school.

The schoolhouse has been painted on the outside. We have put a new jacket around the stove. This causes the air to circulate, giving a better distribution of heat. We plan during the coming year to repair the inside of the building and build a gravel walk from the road to the building.

The students cooperate well with Mrs. Lloyd and together they are doing a good piece of work under difficult circumstances. We cannot expect an efficient school, however, as long as we expect one teacher to teach nine grades and up to 40 pupils.

I want to thank the School Committe and the Officers of the town for their cooperation. May we all work together to give the children in Belmont the best education we can.
