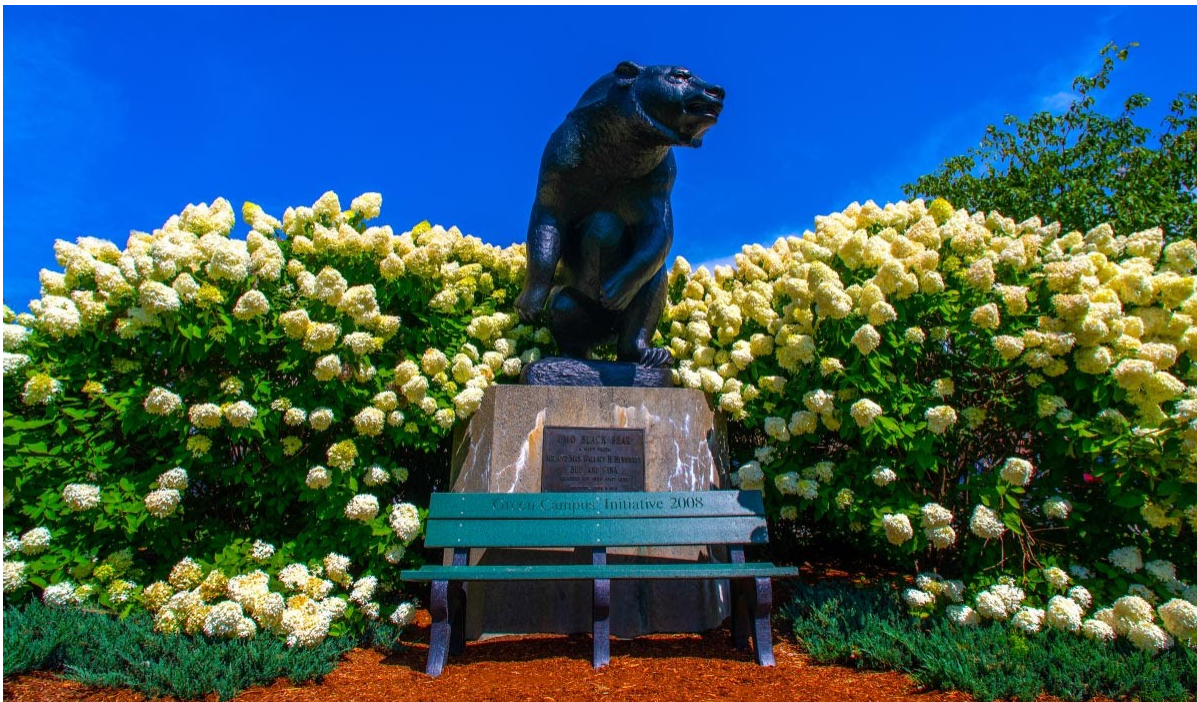

Health and safety update for university community members

Welcome to this week's Friday Futurecast

Message from President Joan Ferrini-Mundy:

Dear members of the UMaine and UMaine Machias communities,

We continue to see upward of 150 community members taking advantage of COVID-19 asymptomatic testing on our campuses, and symptomatic testing at UMaine, all by appointment via [PointnClick](#). Thankfully, symptomatic testing

both at Estabrooke and at Cutler Health Center has resulted in a low percentage (.01%) of positive COVID results; most symptoms are due to colds and respiratory infections typical at this time of year.

This testing is important, not only because of the incidence of positive cases in Maine and beyond, but also because of the travel expected during the upcoming semester break. We are hoping that community members, regardless of vaccination status, take advantage of our campus-based asymptomatic COVID-19 testing before they leave for break. At both UMaine and UMaine Machias, that testing occurs through Tuesday, Nov. 23.

Before closing, I want to give a huge shout-out to our field hockey team. We are proud of you and all that you've accomplished. Thank you for a great season.

Partnering to address health

- In partnership with Penobscot Community Health Center and the School of Nursing, UMaine will offer a public COVID-19 vaccination clinic from noon–5 p.m. on Nov. 17 in the Coe Room, Memorial Union, providing the two-shot Pfizer and Moderna, and one-dose J&J vaccines for people ages 5 and older. [Schedule your appointment at this link](#). It's recommended that parents with children schedule appointments during after-school hours, from 3–5 p.m. Vaccination cards are required if receiving second doses or boosters. Booster shots for Pfizer and Moderna are being provided for those who qualify:
 - Students who are six months out from their second Pfizer or Moderna shots, and live in a residence hall or apartment with others
 - Individuals 65 years of age and older
 - Individuals 18 through 64 years of age with medical conditions at high risk of severe COVID-19
- Northern Light Cutler Health Center is offering additional UMaine employee flu clinics for the 2021 season from 3–6 p.m. on Nov. 15 and Nov. 18. Clinics will be held in the Woolley Room at the Doris Twitchell Allen Village, [138 Rangeley Road](#). Schedule your appointment on this website: [umaine.edu/flushot](#). Fill out the [consent form](#) and bring it and your Cigna insurance card to your appointment. Those ages 65 and older seeking the high-dose flu vaccine are encouraged to contact their PCP or a local pharmacy. Students should call 207.581.4000 to schedule their flu shot. Dependent children covered under the Cigna insurance plan, retirees and employees who do not participate with the Cigna insurance plan should contact their PCP for flu shot availability.

Transparent and continuing communication

- The requirement to be vaccinated against COVID-19 will remain in place for the spring semester. Some changes are occurring for both [students](#) and [employees](#) (including student employees), and you should review the detailed information at those web links as it applies to you. In brief, anyone involved in in-person classes or activities will need to [submit their vaccination information](#) or obtain an [allowable exemption](#). Currently, more than 99% of our in-person community has met this requirement for fall. Importantly for spring, new students who will be in person on campus and those who have been fully online this fall but will be taking on-site classes in the spring will need to upload their vaccination cards or obtain an exemption via [PointnClick](#) prior to the start of classes on Jan. 18. Students who already have a [maine.edu](#) email and account are urged to take action now. Don't wait. Students who do not act may find holds placed on their accounts, limiting their ability to register or make changes in their schedules until they meet the COVID-19 requirements.
- The Center for Community Inclusion and Disability Studies at the University of Maine and partners in the Maine Developmental Disabilities Network collaborated with Gray Media Group (WAGM-TV) to design, produce and broadcast seven video public service announcements to help increase COVID-19 vaccinations among people with disabilities and direct support professionals — the individuals who support people with disabilities where they live and work.
