## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Blanchard:

Annually, at this season of the year, we concern ourselves with appraising the work of the past year, stocktaking to determine our present position, and finally planning the work of the new year. We are entering a period in which, on local, state, and federal levels, the term "planning" is rapidly becoming a watchword of sound administration. We are all stockholders and directors in the largest business in the world, namely, that of public education. Planning has always been fundamental to business success, and our particular business can claim no exception.

The additional subsidy which was allocated to towns in December under the provisions of the new MacKinnon bill has accomplished untold good in the personnel crisis which the state faced a year ago. Without supplementary aid enabling communities to improve salary schedules, the impact of conditions on educational opportunities for children and on the financial status of teachers would have been serious beyond measure.

The events of the past year, together with national trends which daily become more significant, indicate that our gains were in part temporary and that they are rapidly being nullified. Living costs are constantly mounting, price controls and wages are being revised upward.

We had anticipated that the end of the war would bring about some improvement in the availability of trained teachers. This has not developed. Instead, the shortage is becoming more critical as teachers leave their positions to marry or resume life as homemakers. An overall view of the situation leads to the inevitable conclusion that most communities must give serious consideration to a 1946 school budget which will include substantial salary increases to teachers. In this way only can citizens be assured of a reasonable educational opportunity for their children.

The school enrollment is such that your town has to plan to maintain only one school. So far your school officials have been successful in finding a trained teacher for the school. This is due largely to the fact that such a teacher is a resident of the town. Reports seem to show that it is the small rural schools that are first affected by any shortage of teachers. Therefore, it may be a question as to what success your school officials would have, if they had to try to find a trained teacher elsewhere. One thing is most certain. The salary they would have to pay in such a case would be much more than is being paid the present teacher. It would seem almost reasonable for them to ask that funds be provided with which to make the salary more nearly equal to what trained teachers are getting in other schools.

We read much these days about the need for changing the present school program to meet rapidly changing world conditions. Educators agree that the curricula should be changed to meet existing needs. With such an end in view and in cooperation with the state department two committees, consisting of primary and elementary teachers, are now working on two bulletins designed to outline new educational practice for teachers.

Because of the new law relating to school age it has seemed best to do away with any so called sub-primary grade work in the town school and instead have all beginning pupils enter the first grade. The law now states that only those pupils who will become at least 6 years of age on or before December 31 of the school year may enter grade 1.

#### School Funds and Needs

In planning the school budget for the coming year it now seems advisable to increase the amounts recommended for some purposes over the amounts raised for these purposes for the current year Additional funds should be made available to increase teachers' salary for another school year. During the current year only a small sum has been expended for school fuel. So during the coming year bills may be paid to cover the cost of fuel for two years. However, the cost of the fuel for one of these years may be paid from the amount now available for school purposes.

There are now three pupils from the town who are doing high school work and for whom high school tuition is being paid. There may be the same number to attend high school this coming school year. At the present time these tuition charges are on the basis of \$300.00 per year. Upon the payment of that sum the state will allocate to the town in the State School Fund next December \$200.00 Only a small sum needs to be raised at this time, if any at all.

It is about time we planned to make some changes in textbook. Some of the books now being used are much the worse from wear and tear. That such changes as may seem advisable may be made a small appropriation is being recommended for school textbooks. From the amount raised for school supplies we are paying the cost for lights. Hence we must consider the need for both supplies and lights.

The work we have been planning to do for two years on the school building still remains to be done. I refer to the plan for painting on and about the building. Some repair work should be done in the toilet parts of the building. Perhaps you should plan to make about \$200.00 available for school repairs for next year. No additional money will be needed for insurance for next year.

## Town Warrant

## To C. M. Mitchell, a constable of the Town of Blanchard, in the County of Piscataquis, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Blanchard, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday the 25th day of March, A D. 1946, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year and to determine his compensation.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To receive and act on all bills against the town.
- Art. 5. To choose three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year and to determine their compensation.
- Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year and to determine his compensation.
- Art. 7. To choose one member of the school committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 8. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year and to determine his compensation.
- Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.

- Art. 10. To choose all other officers required by law to be chosen at the town meeting, or to authorize the selectmen to appoint such officers.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of elementary schools.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for secondary school purposes.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for free text books.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school supplies.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of the superintendent of schools.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the service of a public health nurse.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town charges.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of poor.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for ways and bridges.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Maintenance.

- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of highways and bridges) under the provision of section 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944 as, amended.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of not less than \$105.00 for the maintenance of improved section of third class roads or to be used in conjunction with state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money under Chap. 28, R. S. 1930, as amended by Chap. 162 and 231, of P. L. of 1937, for the removal of snow from improved highways and town ways provided said roads or a portion of the same are accepted as winter routes by the state highway commission.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of buying snow fence.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the purpose of purchasing snow-plowing equipment.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41.16 for the interest on school fund.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for the purpose of paying dues to the Maine Municipal Association.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the

selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and execute quit-claim deeds for such property or other property that the town may acquire.

- Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in regards to paying for bond for town officers.
- Art. 31. To see what discount the town will allow on taxes paid on or before a specified date, and to see what time the collector will be required to settle in full with the town.
- Art. 32. To see what the town will do in regards to the present status of accounts receivable and now on town accounts.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of purchasing a typewriter for town use.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to hire money for town purposes in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of both cemeteries.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the town park.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to extend the present electric power lines, and to raise and appropriate fund for same.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to widen the Fred Orth road, and to raise and appropriate funds for same.
