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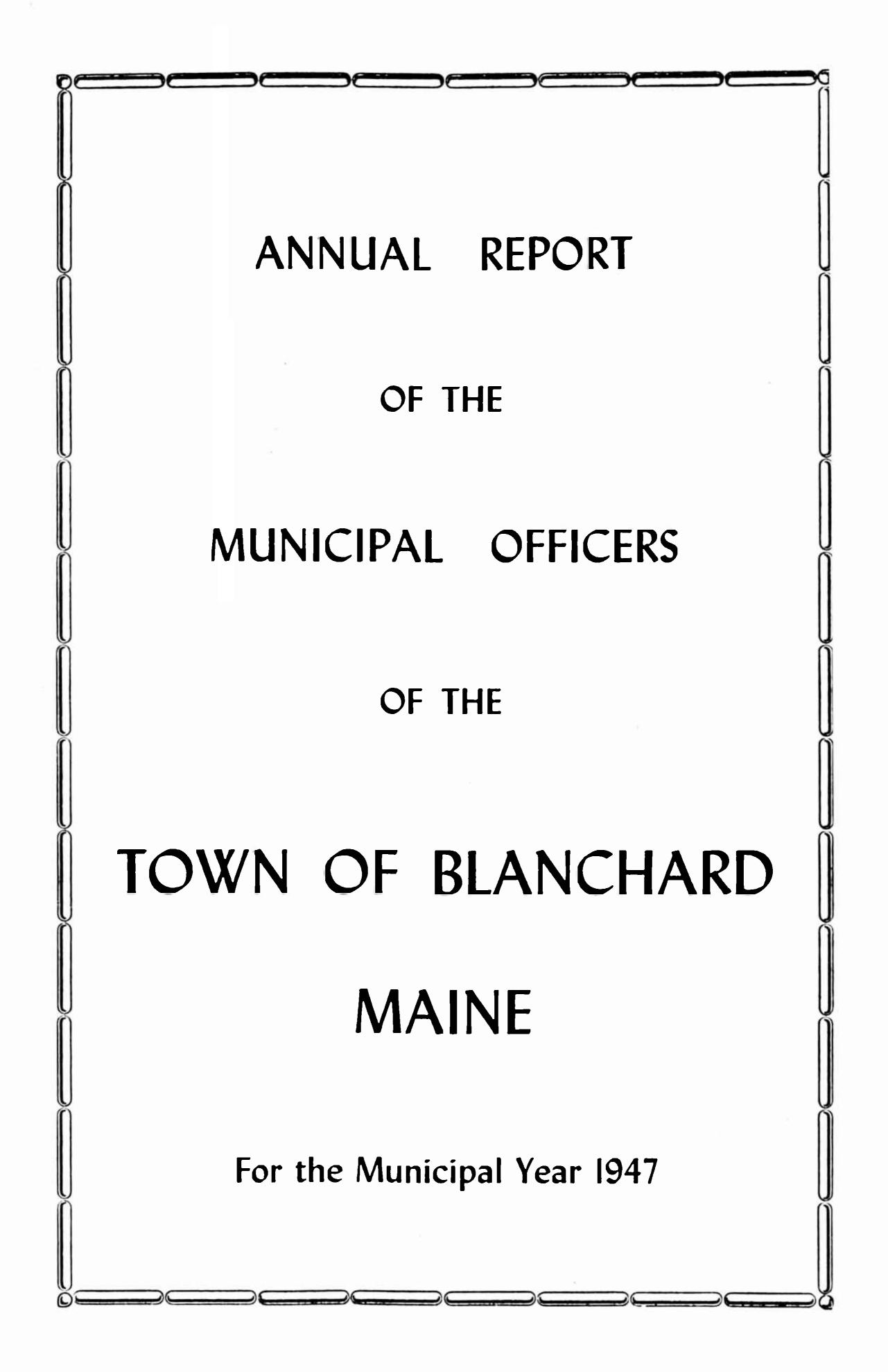

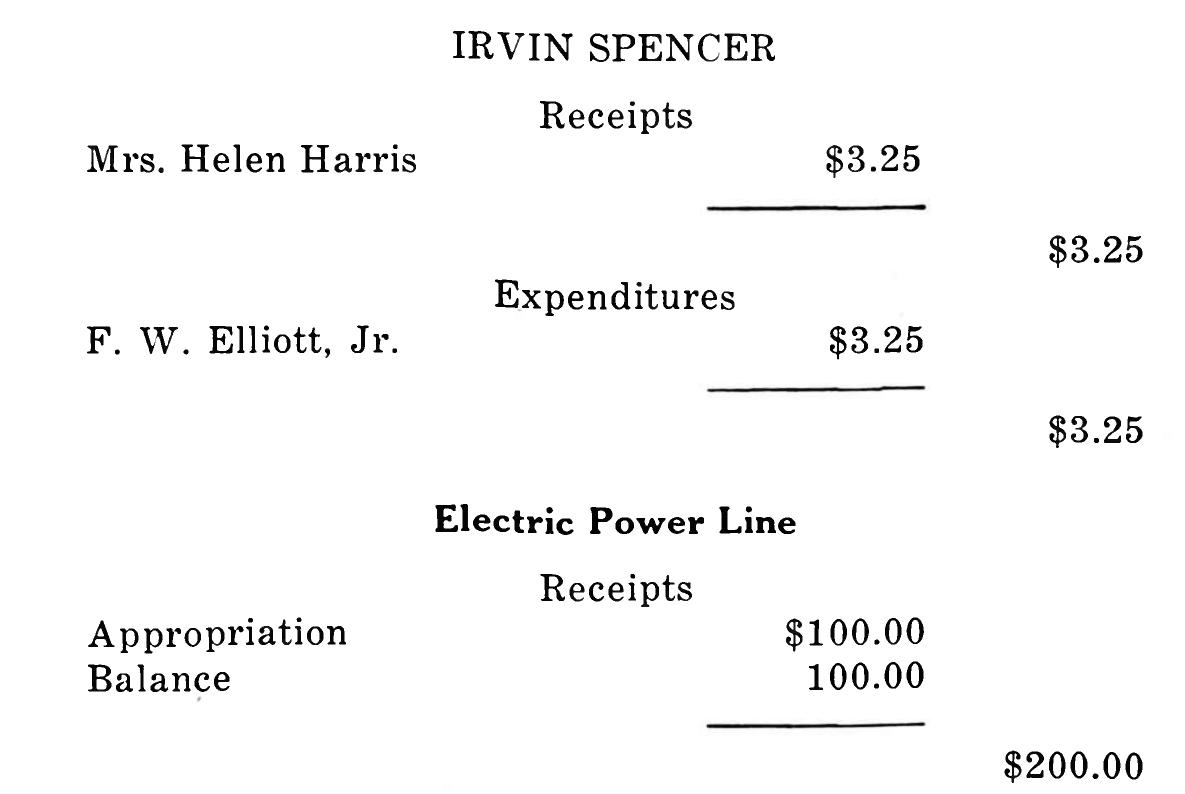

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

To the citizens of the Town of Blanchard, I submit a brief report of the Service rendered the town by the Piscataquis County Health and Tuberculosis Association for a period from January 1, 1947 to December 31, 1947.

The Service covers the health problem of all age groups, above school age follow-up of crippled children and the prevention and control of Tuberculosis. School Health Service:

Number of pupils weighed and measured 14. Phillip B. Thomás, M. D., of Monson, has been appointed school physician. The individual examinations will be completed before this report reaches you.

In planning a program this year we must promote immunization and emphasis should be placed on controlling tuberculosis through provision of testing for reactors and x-raying of family groups. One was x-rayed at the Dover-Foxcroft Clinic.

I urge the cooperation of all citizens in their community program.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Blanchard.

I am submitting herewith my annual report as superintendent of schools for the Town of Blanchard. At this time I am reporting briefly on the aims, needs and achievements of the new school program set up by the state this year.

During the past year Maine has made progress in the adjustment of teacher salaries. Under the new law passed by the 93rd Legislature, teachers in Maine this year are receiving better minimum pay than ever before. Where previously the state minimum had been set at \$1,000.00, the new law provides for graduated minima from \$1,500.00 to \$1,800.00 on the basis of professional preparation. However, we cannot be too complacent about these improvements, since economic changes serve to decrease the real wages which are, after all, the true measure of earnings. While many communities feel they have sufficient increases in salaries of teachers, figures prove that this is far from true. Salaries may have become larger this year, but food costs rose higher in August and September than ever before. The figures following are given to show what the increased cost of living has done to teachers' salaries. From reliable sources we find that a salary of \$2,550.00 today is worth about \$1,594.00 in prewar dollars. In 1939-40 a salary of \$1,441.00 had a purchasing power of \$1,440.00 in 1935-39 dollars. Nationally, the average salary of all instructional staffs, including classroom teach-

ers, principals and supervisors, will be about \$2,550.00 for 1947-48. Apparently then, on the average, the typical member of instructional staffs is about \$154 ahead of where he was in 1939-40. However, teachers as local and state employees were not included under the federal income tax regulations prior to 1939.

There is a tendency in some circles to feel that sufficient attention has been given to teachers' salaries, and that increases made have been just and generous. There is no question of the decided improvement in the face of teachers' contracts, but the foregoing figures prove clearly the fallacy of using this factor alone as the basis on which salary increases should be determined.

The Town of Blanchard has been maintaining only one school. As you know the attendance at this school has been getting smaller year by year. It is not possible to say what will happen to this school during the next few years. So far there has been no trouble in securing

a certified teacher for the school.

The present state law provides for a minimum salary of \$1,500.00 for any certified teacher. This usually means a teacher who has had two years of professional study beyond the high school. The law further provides for a minimum salary of \$1,600.00 for a teacher who has completed three years of professional study beyond the high school and a minimum salary of \$1,700.00 for a teacher who has had four years of professional study beyond the high school.

With a school program that is costing approximately \$1,600.00 or \$1,700.00 anually and with an enrollment of only eight or ten pupils, the per pupil cost will become exceedingly high. This new minimum salary law meant an increase in the salary of teachers without providing for a corresponding additional financial aid to towns. This additional aid to the town under the new law is only \$100.00. The increase in salary will be \$300.00 or \$400.00.

School Funds and Needs

The school budget for this annual report is planned on the basis of paying, at least, the minimum teacher-salary of \$1,500.00. However, it should be clear that this is not the maximum salary that may be paid. While minimum salaries are fixed on professional preparation very few teachers can be secured at the minimum teachersalary fixed by law. It is reported that a family has moved to North Blanchard and that there will be children of school age there. If that is the case, funds must be made available for conveyance. Then it seems advisable to raise an additional sum to supplement the amount now unexpended in case such funds may be needed.

High school tuition charges have been increased by all high schools and academies. Where the tuition charges have been \$90.00 or \$100.00 per pupil these charges have been increased to \$125.00. The amount now on hand may not be all which may be needed for the coming year. The cost for textbooks has increased more than one fourth, while the cost for supplies has more than doubled for many items. The appropriation for insurance must include funds for the amount expended during the present year and the amount needed for the coming year. For some reason no money was raised for insurance last March. The needs for repairs remain the same as stated in the last report. One need is painting the school building, or fixing the outside with some type of siding. The cost for a siding job will be more than the cost for painting, but it would mean a more permanent job. However one of the first needs may be a new stove. I feel that we have repaired the present stove with a new front for the last time. The sides of the stove are so much out of shape that it is hard to get the parts back together again when repairs have to be made..

AUDITOR'S REPORT

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts - Town of Blanchard March 1, 1946 to February 28, 1947

CASH

The examination of cash receipts and bank deposits indicated that the cash had been properly recorded and deposited at the Guilford Trust Company.

The balance reported by the bank at February 28, 1947, plus a later deposit, reconciled with the cash balance as reflected by the records of the Treasurer.

Expenditures were made by check and agreed with the warrants issued by the Selectmen. ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

27

Items due from the State and other municipalities were collected during the year, leaving two old accounts due from individuals for assistance unpaid and a current account due from the Town of Monticello.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

Examination of the records of the Collector indicated that the warrant for commitment of 1946 taxes agreed with the records of the Assessors. The total commitment was accounted for by cash collections, discounts and abatements.

According to the records there were no outstanding tax accounts at the close of the municipal year.

DUE OTHER AGENCIES

This account is represented by deductions from the wages of employees of the Town and teachers for Withholding Taxes and Teachers' Pensions, which has not been remitted to the proper agencies at the close of the municipal year.

SURPLUS

The Unappropriated Surplus of \$501.99 at the start of the year was changed to a Net Deficit of \$4.55 at the close of the year as a result of current operations. Highway and Poor account overdrafts were the principal factors contributing to this change. The analysis of the change in this account is shown on Exhibit E of this report. TRUST FUNDS

The United States Government Bonds covering the investment of the Blanchard Memorial Park Fund and the Cemetery Perpetual Care Funds were examined. The income received was found applied to the proper accounts.

The principal of the Ministerial and School Fund has previously been used by the town. Interest on this Fund was appropriated and applied to the School account.

A new Cemetery Perpetual Care Fund received during the current year remains uninvested pending accept-

ance of same by the Town at its annual meeting.

The record of the individual Perpetual Care lots does not appear to be complete.

GENERAL

The examination of paid bills and payrolls indicated that with a few exceptions all were on file and appeared to be proper charges.

The excise tax collections were verified by examination of the copies of receipts issued by the Collector.

The corporate surety bonds furnished by the Tax Collector and the Treasurer were examined and appeared to be adequate.

With the exception of a minor error in posting, the records of the Town officials were found in a satisfactory condition.

To C. M. Mitchell, a constable of the Town of Blanchard, in the County of Piscataquis, **GREETINGS**:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Blanchard, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said town on Monday the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1948, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.

- To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year Art. 2. and to determine his compensation.
- To hear all reports to be made at said meeting. 3. Art.
- To receive and act on all bills against the town. Art. 4.
- To choose three selectmen, assessors ond over-5. Art. seers of the poor for the ensuing year and to determine their compensation.
- To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing Art. 6. year and to determine his compensation.
- To choose one member of the school committee 7. Art. for a term of three years and one member for a term of two years.
- To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing 8. Art. year and to determine his compensation.

- Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To choose all other officers required by law to be chosen at the town meeting or to authorize the selectmen to appoint such officers.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the elementary school.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for secondary school purposes.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for free text books.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of the superintendent of schools.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school supplies.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on the schoolhouse.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school repairs.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41.16 for interest on school fund.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the service of a public health nurse.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for the service of a school physician, for the ensuing year.

- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 21. to raise and appropriate for the purpose of purchasing a stove for the schoolhouse.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 22. to raise and appropriate for school conveyance.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 23. to raise and appropriate for support of poor.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 24. to raise and appropriate for town charges.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 25. to raise and appropriate for ways and bridges.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 26. to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Maintenance.
- To see what sum of money the town will vote Art. 27. to raise and appropriate (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 29, R. S., 1944, as amended.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-Art. 28. priate a sum of not less than \$105.00 for the maintenance of improved section of third class roads or to be used in conjunction with state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-Art. 29. priate money under Chap. 28, R. S., 1930, as amended by Chap. 162 and 231, of P. L. of

highways and town ways provided said roads or a portion of same are accepted as winter routes by state highway commission.

- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of buying snow fence.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for the purpose of paying dues to the Maine Municipal Association.

- Art. 38. To see what the town will vote to do in regards to purchasing fire fighting equipment and raise and appropriate money for same; also

in regards to hiring or leasing fire fighting equipment.

- To see what the town will vote to do about Art. 39. keeping the road open during the winter months from the Amelia Blanchard place to the Ames place.
- To transact any other business that may come Art. 40. before said meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at the said town hall at 12:30 o'clock P. M., of the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not, and have there this warrant with your doings thereon.
