

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of Brighton Plantation:

I wish to give the annual report on your school.

We are again closing a successful and happy year in our school. Mrs. Whitman's work has been most satisfactory and she has recently completed a professional Extension Course, given by the University of Maine. This Course has been of much help to all the teachers of the School Union, who have put much effort into it. The children have shown a steady progress in their work and the school room has a very pleasant and busy atmosphere, which is a good indication of a well conducted school.

Many new books and supplies have been added this year and will help to make our school more efficient.

We had a fine paint job done on the outside of the building last Fall, which adds much to its appearance, and also tends to keep the building in a good condition. The installation of electric lights, while not yet completed, will give the adults of the town, as well as the children, a chance to use the building for social functions. An oil heater has been purchased which will add to the comfort of the building.

The Health program planned for the next school year will be of great benefit to all the children. We plan to give physical examinations early next Fall if possible.

In closing I wish to thank the members of the Superintending School Committee, town officials, teacher, parents and other citizens for the fine support of your school.

### State Auditor's Report

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of Brighton Plantation have been audited by Auditor M. E. Libby for the period February 21, 1946 to February 20, 1947 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Plantation appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the Plantation and the result of its operations for the period designated.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted,

#### Re: Audit of Accounts — Brighton Plantation February 21, 1946 to February 20, 1947

#### CASH

Cash on deposit at the Skowhegan Branch of the Depositors Trust Company was reconciled with the balance as reflected by the records of the Treasurer as follows:

The amount of \$37.19 was set up as an account receivable and was paid on August 8, 1947.

It was ascertained that all payments had been made by check and were supported by warrants. A comparison of the checks drawn with the individual items on the warrants indicated several small errors which resulted in a net underpayment of 94c. However, for the purpose of this report, this underpayment has not been considered as an account payable.

#### TAXES RECEIVABLE

An examination made of the records of the Collector indicated that the 1946 tax commitment was in agreement with the records of the Assessors. This commitment was accounted for as follows:

\$7,170.23

According to the records, there were no uncollected prior years' taxes.

#### INVESTMENTS

The U. S. Treasury  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  1965/70 Bond of \$1,000 was verified by physical examination. The interest of \$25 was credited to the General Government account.

#### SURPLUS

At the close of the municipal year, there was a total Surplus of \$3,612.57. Of this amount, \$1,262.87 had been appropriated and was carried forward to the 1947 year as unexpended. The balance of \$2,349.70 represented Unappropriated Surplus.

#### TRUST FUNDS

The savings bank books representing the investments of the Cemetery Perpetual Care Funds were examined.

Interest on the School Fund was appropriated and credited to the General School Fund.

No record could be found of the amount of the principal of the Ministerial and School Fund.

#### GENERAL

It was ascertained that all collections from excise taxes had been accounted for.

It was noted that many of the warrants had been signed by only one of the Assessors. Chapter 80, Section 31 of the Revised Statutes of 1944 and related law court decisions require that all warrants be signed by a majority of the Board of Assessors.

Although the Treasurer and Tax Collector furnished local bonds, these bonds were not accompanied by statements of financial ability as required by Chapter 80, Section 28, and Chapter 81, Section 81 of the Revised Statutes of 1944.

### Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

To Lea E. Smith, constable of the Plantation of Brighton, in the County of Somerset, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation of Brighton, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to meet at S. D. Warren Company's hall in said plantation on Monday, the fifteenth day of March A. D. 1948 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1-To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2-To choose a plantation clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3-To receive and act upon the several reports of the officers.

Art. 4—To choose a board of assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 5—To choose the following plantation officers: one or more members of the school committee, constable, fire inspector, land agent, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 6--To see if the plantation will vote to choose a road commissioner, and if so, elect same.

Art. 7-To receive bids for collecting taxes, and choose a collector.

Art. 8-To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 9-To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for support of schools.

Art. 10—To see if the plantation will vote to raise \$50.00 to pay on school land funds.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the insurance of the school buildings.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for repair of roads and bridges.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the plantation will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, Revised Statutes 1944, as amended. Art. 15—To see what action the plantation will take relative to plowing roads and to see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for that purpose.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay incidental expenses.

Art. 18—To see if the sum of \$12.00 or more will be raised for public health nursing in Brighton Plantation, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 19—To see whether or not the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Sectoin 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 20—To see if the plantation will vote to raise \$456.00 for the patrol maintenance.

Art. 21—To see what action the plantation will take about the Corson Brook bridge.

Art. 22—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay for mowing grass in the Village Cemetery and in the West Brighton Cemetery.

Art. 23—To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to deduct from any creditor of the plantation an amount not exceeding 50% of the amount due said creditor to apply on any unpaid bill of the creditor unless said creditor is willing to allow more than 50%.

Art. 24—To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to hire temporarily such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the plantation.

Art. 25—To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the plantation for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 26—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors will be in session at 9 o'clock in the forenoon at S. D. Warren Company's Hall for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on the day of said meeting.
