The Department of Philosophy is seeking the Committee's support for the first speaker in its 2003-2004 Colloquium Series. We will make application for the remainder of the series in Fall 2003. This series of talks is designed both to support the curricular and scholarly interests of students and faculty in Philosophy and to reach out to interested faculty and students in other disciplines at the University of Maine.

Our first speaker, Tim Crane, has been in the Philosophy Department of University College of London since 1990. He is currently Tutor to MA students and Director of the Philosophy Programme in the School of Advanced Study, University of London. Professor Crane has worked mostly in the broad area of Philosophy of Mind, with a focus on physicalism and mental causation, intentionality and the philosophy of perception. He is currently working on the relationship between intentionality and consciousness. Re: Report on 2001-2002 Philosophy Colloquium Series

The 2001-2002 Philosophy Colloquium Series included the following five outside speakers:

Oct. 18: Professor Kevin Brien of Washington College in Maryland spoke on "Logos and Mythos: Marx and Buddhism." He gave a second presentation on "Marx After Marxism: The Humanistic Marx."

Nov. 1: Professor Edwin Martin, former chair of Philosophy at Indiana University, spoke on "The Mechanisms of Pictorial Representation: Is Pictorial Representation Conventional or Natural?"

Nov. 29-30: Professor Margaret Walker of Fordham University spoke on "What is Moral Repair? The Moral Meanings and Limits of Responses to Wrongdoing." She gave a second presentation on "Truth and Voice in Women's Rights."

April 4: Professor Wendy Doniger of the University of Chicago spoke on "The Kamasutra: It Isn't All About Sex." She gave a second presentation on "The Debated Role of Humor in the Response to Terrorism and to the Holocaust."

April 22-23: Professor Fred Dallmayr of the University of Notre Dame spoke on "Dialogue Among Civilizations: A Hermeneutical Perspective." He gave two other presentations on "Globalization and Inequality: A Plea for Global Justice," and on "The Philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi."

Results: The Philosophy Colloquium Series was well publicized through series posters, individual flyers, press releases, calendar listings, and e-mail promotions. Cultural Affairs was given credit through the publicity and in the introduction of all speakers. The events were well attended, and all of the gatherings involved many questions and lively discussion. Attendance for the above speakers was the following: Brien: 90; Martin: 40-50; Walker: 90-100; Doniger: 125; Dallmayr: 150. In addition to those in attendance, the series reached many more members of the University community. Lectures by Brien, Doniger, and Dallmayr were recorded and then broadcast on the campus radio station. In addition, there was newspaper coverage of several of the events. Some of the publicity and coverage is included.

Budget: In October 2001, our proposal was funded for \$1,250.00 for the fall events, with the request to resubmit for the spring events. In December, we received an additional \$1,949.00 for a total funding of \$3,199.00 for 2001-2002. We spent the following funds from Cultural Affairs funding: Brien: \$1,140.61; Martin: \$150.00; Doniger: \$541.64; Dallmayr: \$1,385.14. Total spent from Cultural Affairs Grant: \$3,217.39. (This amount is \$18.39 over the grant. There was a slight confusion about remaining funds.) Funding for the Philosophy Colloquium speakers that did not come from the Cultural Affairs Grant is the following: Philosophy Visiting Scholar Fund: \$1800.00; Rezendes Ethics Lecture Fund: \$2,500.00; Marshall Dodge Foundation Grant: \$3,000.00. Total from other funds: \$7,300.00. Total budget for the series: Cultural Affairs and other sources of funds: $\$3,217.39 + \$7,300.00 = \$10,517.39$.

This was a very successful Colloquium Series, and the Philosophy faculty thank the Cultural Affairs/DLS Committee for making the series possible.
