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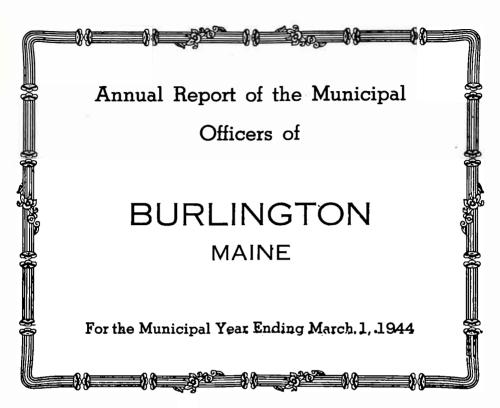

The total of the recommended appropriations is \$55.00 less than the amount raised last year. While the costs of all services and materials have increased, the increased amount received from the State and the use of unexpended balances will reduce the necessary amount to be raised by the town.

Last year no provision was made for transporting or boaading pupils living over two miles from the school. The recommended appropriations for next year have provided for this necessary expenditure.

The repairs account should have an appropriation of \$300.00 to provide for building a wood shed at the Corner school and for minor repairs on that building.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Burlington:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report of the progress, condition, and needs of the schools of the Town of Burlington.

The opening of the schools in Burlington village was delayed one week because of the difficulty in securing teachers. An effort was made to secure the services of cadet teachers but there weren't enough to go around and the towns paying higher salaries secured the few that were available. When the teacher who was hired for the Corner school resigned at the last minute, it was necessary to hire Miss Katherine Turner until a certified teacher could be secured. Miss Madeline Thurlow accepted the position at the Hill school after Mrs. Alice Rouse resigned. Many delays and changes at these two schools have interrupted the school programs but are the natural results when salaries are low and at a time when there are not enough teachers in Maine to fill all positions. The Long Ridge and Bradbury schools have been more fortunate in having had the services of the same teachers since the opening of the schools.

The Elson-Gray reading series has been completed in all schools through the first four grades and should be con tinued through grades five and six. Now all schools are using the same series of reading books, arithmetics, spellers, science readers, and health books. This plan wil make possible the transfer of books within the town which was not possible when some schools were using different textbooks. It also provides more uniformity in the curriculum and makes it easier for pupils who transfer from one school to another in the town.

Maintenance

Very little has been done in recent years to repair the schoolhouse at the Corner. A new wood shed must be provided, the toilets need repairing, and some of the doors should be repaired or replaced. It is recommended that the shed be built on the rear of the schoolhouse with a door entering directly into the school building.

Finance

The favorable balance in the Common School Account was made possible when the State increased its subsidy for each teaching position from \$100.00 to \$190.00 and also increased the census subsidy. Burlington received \$560.00 from the equalization fund last year and will receive \$842.00 from the fund next December. Future allocations from the equalization fund will depend upon whether the State considers it necessary for Burlington to maintain four schools.

When a survey conducted by the Department of Education disclosed that at least 100 and possibly 160 unnecessary units were being maintained in the state, they asked the school committees in those towns to consider the possibility of closing the unessential schools. They asked the school committee of Burlington to consider the possibility of maintaining two instead of three units in the village. Your committee studied the problem but, with the present difficulty in securing transportation facilities, cannot see how a plan could be worked out that would not impose undue hardship upon some pupils.

The reason for asking towns to maintain only necessary schools is to release as many teachers as possible for employment in essential schools that have been forced to close because of the teacher shortage. If the Department of Education decides that Burlington could close one unit

and the town does not comply with their request, they will not allocate any equalization money to the town in 1945 and they will encourage the teacher of the unnecessary unit to accept a position in an essential school.

It should be clearly understood that no action will be taken by the State Department without further investigation and consultation with the school committee. The above information is given so that every citizen will be informed regarding the critical conditions being faced by our schools and the possible measures that may have to be taken in order to keep our schools open during these very trying war years.

At this time I wish to express my thanks to the teachers, pupils, parents, school officials and citizens for the consideration and support given during a period when it has been extremely difficult to keep schools in operation.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To Leroy Bowers, Constable of the Town of Burlington in the County of Penobscot, and State of Maine

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Burlington qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs to assemble at the Town Hall in said Town on the 27th day of March, 1944, at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To see what action the Town will take in regard to accepting the Town Report.
- Art. 3. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, and all other officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of Poor, Aid to Dependent Children, Support of Schools, High School Tuition, Text Books and Supplies, Repair of School Buildings, Road Patrol, General Government, and Town Cemetery.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Town Roads and Bridges.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$198.00 for the improved section of Third Class Road.

- Art. 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$25.00 for Public Health Nursing in Burlington, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the Control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with the Revised Statutes, Chapter II, Secs. 62-63-64.
- Art. 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money for necessary expenses of the Town for the ensuing year in anticipation of Taxes.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.
- Art. 12. To choose a Road Commission for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To choose a School Committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to collecting Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of Revising and Correcting the list of Voters at 12 o'clock noon on the day of said meeting.
