The total recommended appropriations are \$300.00 higher than for last year.

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of
Burlington:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report of the pro-

gress, condition, and needs of the schools of the Town of Burlington.

All schools in town opened on September 5 and have continued to operate without any changes in the teacher personnel since that date. Three of the teachers taught in Burlington last year and Mrs. Tena Gordon resumed her duties as teacher of the Corner School in September after having served a period of enlistment in the United States Women's Army Corps.

The educational progress in all schools has been very satisfactory. While the average attendance in two schools has been kept down because of two or three chronic cases where parents have not insisted upon regular attendance. Irregular attendance causes pupils to become discouraged and it is very annoying to teachers who are trying to do all they can for their pupils.

MAINTENANCE

Last year it was recommended that a new shed be attached to the rear of the Corner school. When construction was about to begin, it was discovered that it would be necessary to install new chemical toilets or rebuild the toilet rooms to comply with state requirements. With this in mind, it was decided to build the shed as a separate unit so that it would not interfere with alterations to the toilets. The shed has been completed with the exception of covering part of the walls with asphalt siding as soon as the weather permits. Thanks to the cooperation of the Selectmen, who supplied the lumber for \$76.50, the total cost of the shed was only \$222.30 compared with an estimated cost of \$250.

Unless the state insists that the toilets at the Corner school be rebuilt, it would not seem advisable to attempt the work now with the present scarcity of materials and labor.

When the State Insurance Inspector condemned the stove at the Hill school and it was impossible to get the repair parts, it became necessary to purchase a new stove. The old stove can be repaired and fire extinguishers have been installed in all buildings upon the recommendation of the Insurance Department.

FINANCE

A study of the financial report shows that the equalization fund was used to balance the Secondary School Tuition and the Text Book and Supplies accounts. The balance, \$650.30, was added to the Common School Account which shows a balance of \$602.19. When the Department of Education made a survey of the probable enrollment in the different schools of Burlington, they approved all four units as being essential. As a result, the town should receive \$964. from the equalization fund next December.

With thirteen pupils completing the work of the Burlington schools this year as compared with only four last year, we should expect a considerable increase in the number of students attending high school next year. An appropriation of \$850.00 should be made for secondary school tuition.

SCHOOL LEGISLATION

Important legislative proposals affecting public education are before the present legislature. Every citizen should keep informed as to the progress of the various bills now under consideration and your representative, Mr. Elmore C. House, should know which bills you favor.

Passage of the following bills would help the town of Burlington by offering more state aid for the support of schools:

1. The MacKinnon Bill, Legislative Document No. 901, provides that an additional \$110.00 would be paid by the state for each teaching position which pays a minimum salary of \$1000. per year. In addition to the \$110.00 for each teaching position, towns with school rates between 12 and 26 mills would receive additional subsidy based upon the effort made by the town to support its school program.

2. "An Act Relating to Reimbursement to Towns for Tuition," Legislative Document No. 499, would increase the maximum reimbursement from the present \$700.00 to \$875.00. A committee on legislation from School Union 90 has recommended that the amount be increased to \$1000. to partially compensate for an increase of over 70% in tuition costs.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To Perle Turner, Constable of the Town of Burlington, in
 the County of Penobscot, and State of Maine

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Burlington qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall in said Town on the 26th day of March, 1945 at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To see what action the Town will take in regard to accepting the Town Report.

Art. 3. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, and all other officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will

vote to raise for Support of Poor, Aid to Dependent Children, Support of Schools, High School Tuition, Text Books and Supplies, Repair of School Buildings, Road Patrol, General Government and Town Cemetery.

Art. 5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for Town Roads and Bridges.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for Snow Removal.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$198.00 for the improved section of Third Class Road.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for Health Nursing in Burlington—said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local services.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with the Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Secs. 62-63-64.

Art. 10. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to erect an Honor Roll for our Boys in Service and appoint a committee for same.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money for necessary expenses of the Town for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of

any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 14. To choose a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To choose a School Committee for a term of three years.

Art. 16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the collection of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at 12 o'clock noon on the day of said meeting.
