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REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

In presenting the annual report of the public schools of Burnham, I desire to be brief in its delivery as I entertain the opinion that my townsmen will be willing to reciprocate in the same; but as regards schools, scholars, scholarship and intelligence, may I not speak? That the diligent and ambitious student would receive encouragement and support, and that the victor would gain all and the vanquished would have nothing to excite energy; that pride, the essential quality in youth, should be encouraged to the extent to be justly charged with audacity in the pursuance of fame, position and wealth, is the sentiment which my language would seem to indicate; a sentiment which should swell every bosom with joy and fill every heart with inspiration. To no other quality, not backed up with perseverance, energy, tact and ability, and reverence for the benign influences of the gospel dispensation, would I doff my hat in courtesy and submission. During the contest of study which we have just passed, in order that we might learn to read and write correctly, we submitted to moral influence, professed, indeed, and practiced in every form, yet all of them inculcated honesty, truth, temperance, gratitude and the love of man; all arranged themselves under the will of the law in common effort for the common good; to the end that they become the reciprocal duties of parent and child, united with one moral; a resort to social intercourse; united to make this the strongest government on earth, by educating the masses. In the one case it is called voluntary, because of its own necessity, and in the other involuntary, because enforced by the will of another. A scholar must be interested to make study voluntary, he must be subservient to the teacher; like a parent toward his child; a guardian to his ward, or master to his apprentice. Can you forget so important an injunction by which a man may become an ornament to his country? Is there not scholarly wisdom in the demand? A person may travel in most any part of this domain and scarcely discover a place but what is rendered memorable as the birthplace of some eminent scholar or statesman whose early trainings were received in the little rural districts of the country.

Now as regards government, I have performed the work intrusted to me to the best of my ability; have instructed the teachers in the several districts to be animated in pouring in and drawing out knowledge; to be interested in the work laid
