This certifies that I have examined the accounts of the town and believe them to be correct. CHAS. E. SHERMAN, Auditor. TO THE CITIZENS OF BURNHAM :

By law, I respectfully submit the following report of the schools for the year ending Feb. 28, 1893. The object of a report is for information, but how can the people be instructed without language spoken or written? Many things ought to be said but I will touch only upon a few points which I think are important to the town.

SCHOOLS.

The schools in this town for the past year have been good, and some of them excellent. With one exception, every school has been visited as the law requires, and all the time needed given to each school.

TEACHERS.

There have been employed in town the past year, fourteen different teachers, besides the High School teachers; six of them being residents of this town, and all, but one, having previous experience. Twenty-four terms have been taught with an average of eight and one-half weeks in each term. I would be glad to make special mention of several who have done honor to themselves in teaching, but it does not seem advisable. Many of our teachers have such a well established reputation for being good instructors, that no words of mine would add any laurels to their already well earned name. My words of commendation or reproof have already been said in the school room. As a whole, our schools have been very profitable for the past year.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

These schools belong to the town, but we fear the town does not appreciate this privilege as it should. The school in Dist. No. 10, under the instruction of Mr. George C. Hight, of Athens, was not what it might have been nor even what we expected it would be. The school started in with a good attendance and a good interest, and those who attended regularly and with the object of learning, made good improvement; but to others, who did not attend regularly nor with the object of learning, the school was not as profitable as it otherwise might have been.

The school in Dist. No. 7, under the instruction of **M**iss Alida Heald, was a success in every particular. I

was fortunate enough to secure a teacher whose deportment in the school merited the approval of all. The school continued ten weeks, and was very instructive and highly satisfactory. Miss Heald worked hard for her scholars and we feel safe in recommending her as a faithful and efficient teacher. These schools are the cheapest educational privilege that can be given a scholar, as the State pays one-half of the expense.

A WORD TO PARENTS.

Much depends upon the parent's co-operation with the teacher, for a good school. I have found in some instances, if scholars are displeased with a teacher—it may be for some triffing matter, that the scholars will be allowed to stay out of school, to their great injury. This is all wrong. If a teacher is over-exacting with your child there is a proper way for a redress without punishing your child for life, by depriving him of his school, just to gratify his likes or dislikes.

BOOKS.

According to law, the town shall furnish free text books; and upon examination I found there were a few new books needed, hence I have been obliged to purchase. When the book law took effect and the town purchased the new books, they were put into the schools without number or mark of any kind to show that they were the town's property. I would suggest that the town furnish labels to be pasted upon the inside of the cover of every book now in use or to be put into the schools. Said label should give the number, with rules and regulations in reference to the care of the book and the responsibility of the scholar using it.
