### TEACHERS.

During the past year we have employed fifteen different teachers. Our teachers as a whole have performed their work faithfully and in the best interest of the pupils and school.

### COMMON SCHOOLS.

We have maintained seven schools during the year of twenty-nine weeks each with the exception of the Mount School which was suspended at the fifth week of the winter term on account of the large number of cases of measles in the school. The school at Reynolds' Corner has been somewhat broken. In the fall term the Board of Health closed the school at the ninth week, caused by a case of scarlet fever in the district. The winter term opened favorably with Miss Mary E. Morang, a student at Castine Normal School as teacher. She taught one week and was prevented from finishing the term by a severe illness. Miss Angie F. Garcelon was hired to finish the term which will close March 5. The Dodge school was somewhat broken in the fall term. The teacher, Miss Bessie Maloon was ill and the services of Miss Addie M. Stone, a student at Farmington Normal school, were secured to finish the term with no loss in time. The attendance at our schools has been good and the pupils have shown an interest in their work.

### COURSE OF STUDY.

The town has a prescribed course of study which was made and put into use in the schools about two years ago. It is made to cover eight years' work and at the end of that time the pupil is supposed to have completed the studies in our common schools. It has been somewhat difficult to follow the course of study exactly in some of our schools as some pupils are farther advanced in some study in the same grade than other pupils and it will require time to have our schools better graded than at present.

The following is the course of study as it is in effect.

## COURSE OF STUDY.

## First Year. Grade I.

Reading. From the blackboard by word, sentence and phonetic methods combined. Use Primer and First Reader last two terms of year.

Number. Combinations to 10, using objects in development. Counting to 100. Teach the fraction  $\frac{1}{2}$ .

Language. Familiar conversation about daily lessons. Copying sentences from the reading lesson. Memorizing and reciting short poems. Oral correction of errors in speaking in grades one, two and three.

Writing. Copying sentences from the blackboard and writing their own names by pupils from copies prepared by the teacher.

## Second Year. Grade II.

Reading. First Reader completed and Second Reader began. Supplementary reading of proper grades.

Spelling. Words selected from the reading lesson.

Number. Combinations to 20. Arabic numerals. Teach the fraction  $\frac{1}{4}$ . Multiplication table begun.

Language. Oral reproduction of stories and memorizing and reciting short poems. Copying sentences from the reading lessons. Writing short sentences containing words specified by the teacher. Capitalization and punctuation taught as needed in the written work.

Writing. Copy book No. 1. Looking carefully after neatness and order.

## Third Year. Grade III.

Reading. Second Reader completed with supplementary reading matter of similar grade. Third Reader last term of year.

Spelling. Words selected from reading or other lessons.

Number. The four fundamental rules. Multiplica-

tion tables completed. Multiplication and division as far as multipliers and divisors of two figures. Teach the fractions 1-8, 1-3 and 1-6.

Language. Oral reproduction of stories and memorizing and reciting short poems. Copying from reading lessons and from dictation. Letter writing, based upon some subject studied. Insist upon accuracy in all written work.

Geography. The points of the compass. Oral lessons on local geography and land and water forms.

Writing. Copy book No. 2.

Teach pupils to study nature.

#### Fourth Year. Grade IV.

Reading. Third Reader and supplementary reading of the same grade.

Spelling. Words selected from reading lessons. Much revised both oral and written.

Arithmetic. Much drill on the four fundamental processes; in the use of the dollar mark and the decimal point. Teach notation and numeration to millions and to two decimal places. Also the tables for dry and liquid measure, weight, time and counting. Give simple problems in analysis.

Geography. Review of town, county and state. Study surface and people of different continents. Map studies of each continent.

Writing. Copy book No. 3.

Language. Copying reading lessons giving especial attention to punctuation, capitalization and indentation for new paragraphs. Writing sentences, statements and questions containing words of spelling lesson, also letter writing. Drill on such words as to, two, too. Teach common abbreviations and contractions.



## Fifth Year. Grade V.

Reading. Fourth Reader with supplementary reading of the same grade.

Spelling. Words selected from spelling book or any other desired source.

Arithmetic. Review fundamental process; take simple problems in analysis. Teach accounts, bills, and common fractions.

Writing. Copy-book No. 3.

Geography. Finish the elementary Geography.

Language. Learn to recognize parts of speech. Composition themes; letter writing. Study some good author. Celia Thaxter is good.

## Sixth Year. Grade VI.

Reading. Fourth Reader and other matter of that grade once a day.

Spelling. Words selected from any suitable source. Frequent oral and written reviews.

Arithmetic. Review common fractions, take decimals, simple exercises in measurements, percentage and interest. Teach use of notes and receipts.

Geography. Begin intensive study. Embrace the complete study of North and South America.

History. Begin the study.

Language. Study parts of speech, phrases and clauses, letter writing and composition themes.

Study some good author, say Longfellow.

Physiology. How to keep well. Teach effects of stimulants on the human body. Take 1-3 of book.

Writing. Copy book No. 4.

## Seventh Year. Grade VII.

Reading. Fourth Reading, with supplementary reading.

Spelling. Words selected.

Arithmetic. To Bank Discount. Divide the work so as to complete a fair amount each term.

Geography. Intensive study of all the continents except North and South America these having been memorized in the sixth grade.

Writing. Copy book No. 4.

Language. Continued work of last year and analyzing. Study some good author.

History. Take 2-3 of book. Having taken it as a reading study in the sixth grade pupils should be able to do this.

Physiology. Take 2-3 of book, 1-3 being review.

#### Eighth Year. Grade VIII.

Reading. Fifth Reader with supplementary reading.

Arithmetic. Interest to end of book. Review some principles each week.

Geography. Review entire book.

History. Complete the book and review.

Physiology. Complete the book, 2-3 of it being review.

Language. Finish language book.

Writing. Copy book No. 5.

Algebra. From beginning to fractions.
