Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of
the Plantation of Caratunk:

I am herewith making the usual annual report on our schools.

This has been a year without marked changes; there have been no faculty changes; the enrollment in the grade school has materially increased despite the fact that some of the children attending school here have gone away. I feel that the work in the schools has progressed satisfactorily. The fact that there are so few students in the high school makes it possible for them to have almost individual attention throughout the day which is entirely to their advantage. The disadvantage of the situation is that the contacts made with other youths are necessarily limited. I do feel that scholastically our boys and girls are much better prepared than are the average high school students of today. Both Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds are interested in their students and do their very best to prepare them for further work.

Our repairs for year consisted mainly of the new water system which has worked out very satisfactorily. It was expensive but when the fact that we were paying \$36.00 a year to provide water for our schools with nothing of a solution of the problem in sight would appear to show that in the long view, we will be ahead of the game.

I am uncertain as to what course of procedure I should advise for the next year. I fear that if we should entirely eliminate the high school that we would not be able to have one again since the small school is looked upon with disfavor in educational circles and I question whether the state department would allow our re-establishing the school if it were thought desirable in future years by the plantation. I do feel that in justice to the children and parents who will either have students in the high school next year or in succeeding years that we should make provisions for schooling them and I mean by this, conveyance to another school or board. I feel that if this arrangement is not made that some children will be deprived of a high school course which is the least we can do for them in this day. If it should be decided to continue the two schools, I should favor a junior high school arrangement

for next year with the eighth and ninth grades upstairs and the lower grades down.

In closing this part of the school report, I want to take the opportunity to thank all who have helped to make the year successful, school board, teachers, children, parents and all town officials.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

MARCH 10, 1941

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Harold W. Martin, Constable of the Plantation of Caratunk
in the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Plantation of Caratunk, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Albert B. Clark's hall in the said plantation on the 10th day of March A. D. 1941 at one o'clock in the afternoon, there and then to act upon the following articles, namely:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a collector for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee.
- Art. 7. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose one or more fire wardens for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and designate his term of service, not exceeding three years.

Art. 10. To choose all other necessary plantation officers.

Art. 11. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229 of the Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 12. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the plantation for state aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet state apportionments.

Art. 13. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making of highways and culverts for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making of snow roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making and repairing of bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of state and state aid roads for the coming year, within the limits of the plantation, under the provisions of Sections 8 and 17 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 17. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for road patrol for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to pay the note issued by the assessors in accordance with the vote of the plantation at a special meeting held on August 26, 1940.

Art. 20. To see if the plantation will vote "Yes" or "No" on maintaining two schools in Caratunk the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the school library for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for graduation for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 26. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for public health nursing for the ensuing year. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 27. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Section 82, Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 28. To see what action the plantation will take regarding street lights for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Art. 29. To see what compensation the plantation will vote to pay the plantation officers for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 30. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to buy the bonds for the treasurer and tax collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 31. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the plantation for the ensuing year.

Art. 32. To see if the plantation will vote to allow a discount of 2% on taxes paid before June 1, and collect interest at the rate of 1% a month after September 1.

Art. 33. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to hire money needed to transact the plantation business for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 34. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the plantation for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 35. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon until the polls are closed.

Hereof fail not, and have with you there and then this warrant with your doings thereon.
