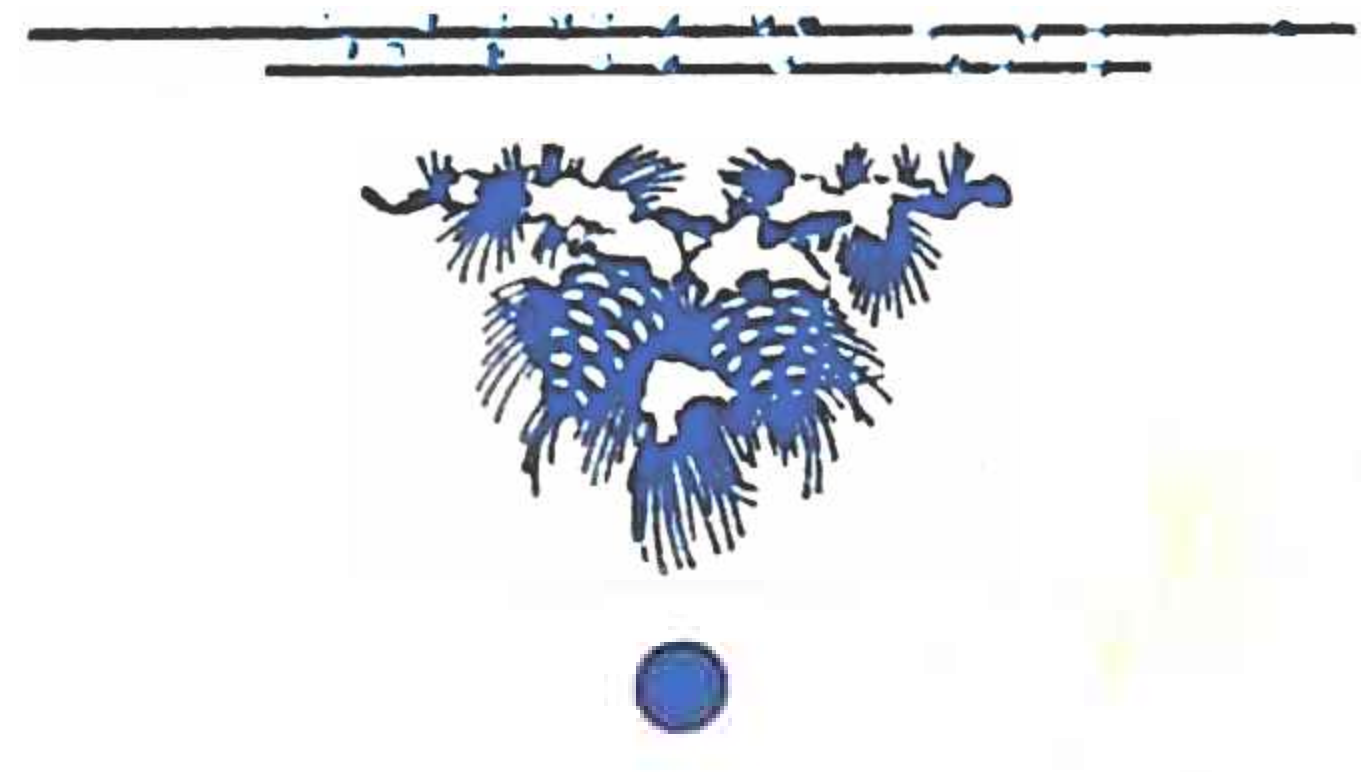

To the Inhabitants of Caratunk Plantation:

In accordance with your request this department, represented by F. A. Doble and M. E. Libby, has completed an examination of the accounts of your plantation officials for the municipal year ending February 20, 1941.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your plantation records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of that date.

COMMENTS

Cash

All cash recorded as received was properly accounted for. Payments were made by check from properly authorized warrants. The cash balance was reconciled with the bank. All warrants and receipts were checked to the ledger and all checks written were compared to the warrants authorizing the same.

Taxes

The 1940 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, abatements and discounts, or was uncollected as shown on schedule 2.

The unpaid taxes for prior years were checked to the records and are also shown on schedule 2.

The excise tax collections as shown by the receipts, were checked and are shown on schedule 5.

Trust Funds

Trust fund investments were examined and are shown in detail on schedule 3. It appeared that the income from these funds had been properly accounted for.

General

Paid bills and payrolls were examined and all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset or liability accounts.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of the Plantation of Caratunk:

This has been a school year of considerable change. There have been three changes in the high school teaching staff and four in the grammar grades since my last annual report. Such changes do no make for the best interests of our schools but in every case the teachers who have resigned have bettered themselves financially as well as advancing in their profssion. Mr. Bickford who now is in the high school has had experience in elementary work before coming to us. He is a graduate of Colby. Miss Fox is a teacher of several years' experience and a graduate of Farmington state normal school.

The schools are very small; in fact, I was informed just last week that the State Department of Education would not approve Caratunk high school for next year and thus passes an old landmark which makes me, personally, very sad since it was in this school that I did my first high school teaching. To those of you who have had sons and daughters in this school and to those of you who are graduates I will say that it has admirably served its purpose and numbers among its graduates people who have made a success of living. I feel that few schools so small have had such a large percentage going on to further training—college, normal school, nursing schools, business collegds and other higher institutions of learning.

I feel that some provision should be made for furnishing high school privileges to those boys and girls who in the future will graduate from the grammar school as well as for those who are now attending the school. I ask your full consideration of the article I have asked to be inserted in the warrant.

Our repairs have been mainly the installation of electric lights in both rooms. These are proving a great improvement and are of considerable help during the dark, stormy days.

A change was made in the English texts in the grades this year. This fills a long felt want but this particular text is one which seems to meet our needs and one that has been a long time in coming out.

I feel the work of our schools has progressed during the year and that we have been so fortunate in securing teachers

who are well prepared and qualified to have charge of our children.

As you will see, we are closing the year with a sizable balance. New expected revenue and the discontinuance of one school should make the appropriation correspondingly less.

In closing the report, I want to thank all officials, teachers, parents, children, and friends of our schools for their co-operation during the year.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

MARCH 9, 1942

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Andrew M. Comber, Constable of the Plantation of Caratunk
in the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said plantation of Caratunk, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Albert B. Clark's hall in the said plantation on the 9th day of March, A. D. 1942 at one o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern War Time, there and then to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose three assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee.

Art. 7. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose one or more fire wardens for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and designate his term of service, not exceeding three years.

Art. 10. To choose all other necessary plantation officers.

Art. 11. In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said plantation of Caratunk, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Albert B. Clark's hall in the said plantation on the 9th day of March, A. D. 1942 at one o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern War Time, there and then to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a collector for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee.
- Art. 7. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To choose one or more fire wardens for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and designate his term of service, not exceeding three years.

Art. 10. To choose all other necessary plantation officers.

Art. 11. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, revised statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 229 of the public laws of 1937.

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Art. 15. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of state and state aid roads for the ensuing year, within the limits of the plantation, under the provisions of sections 8 and 17 of chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for road patrol for the ensuing year

Art. 17. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to procure transportation or board for its high school students.

Art .21. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for public health nurse for the ensuing year, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 23. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of chapter 5, section 82 of the revised statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 24. To see if the plantation will accept the sum of \$100.00 to be held in trust, revenue from the same to be used to pay for the care of the Annie Martin lot in Caratunk cemetery.

Art. 25. To see what action the plantation will take regarding street lights for the ensuing year, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Art. 26. To see what compensation the plantation will vote to pay its officers the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 27. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to buy the bonds for the treasurer and tax collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the plantation for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see if the plantation will vote to allow a discount of 2% on taxes paid before June 1, and collect interest at the rate of 1% a month after September 1, the ensuing year.

Art. 30. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to hire money needed to transact the plantation business for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 31. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the plantation for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 32. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.
