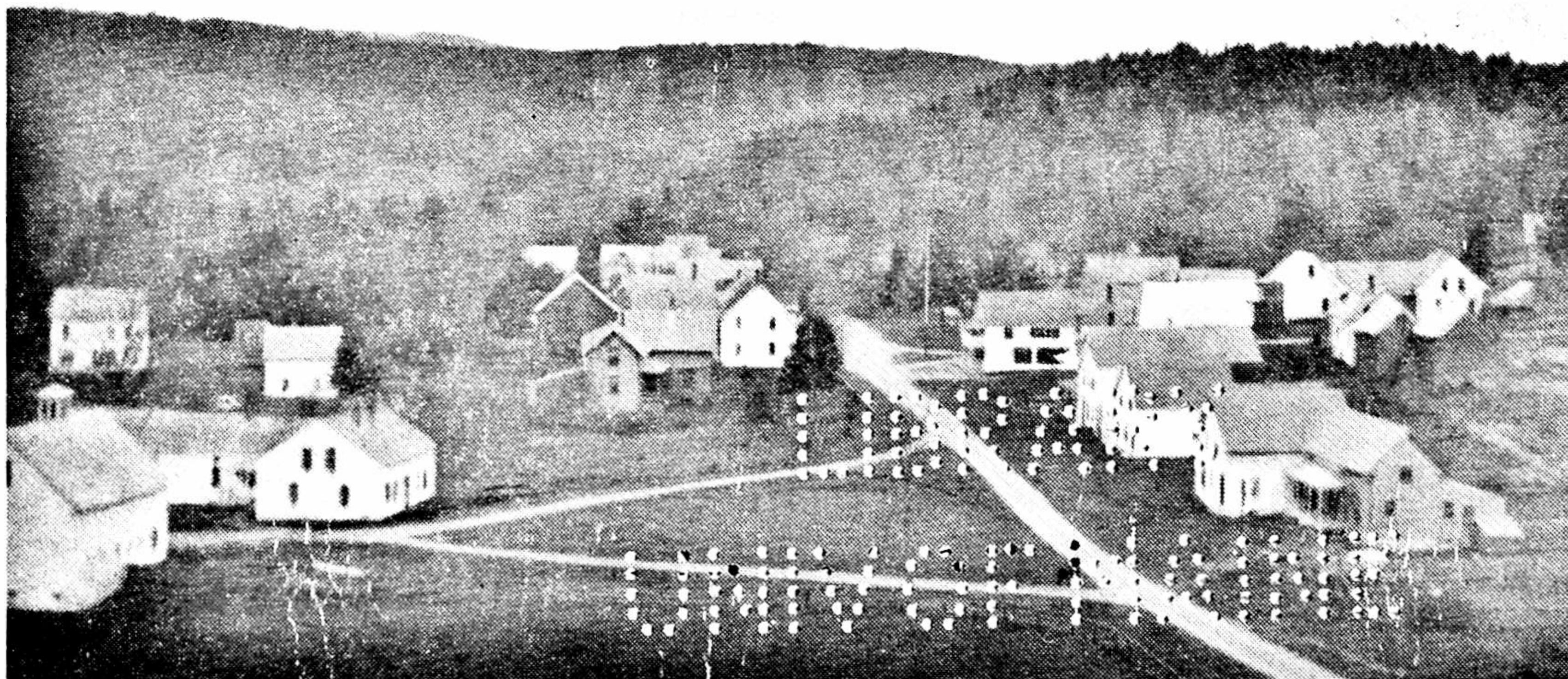

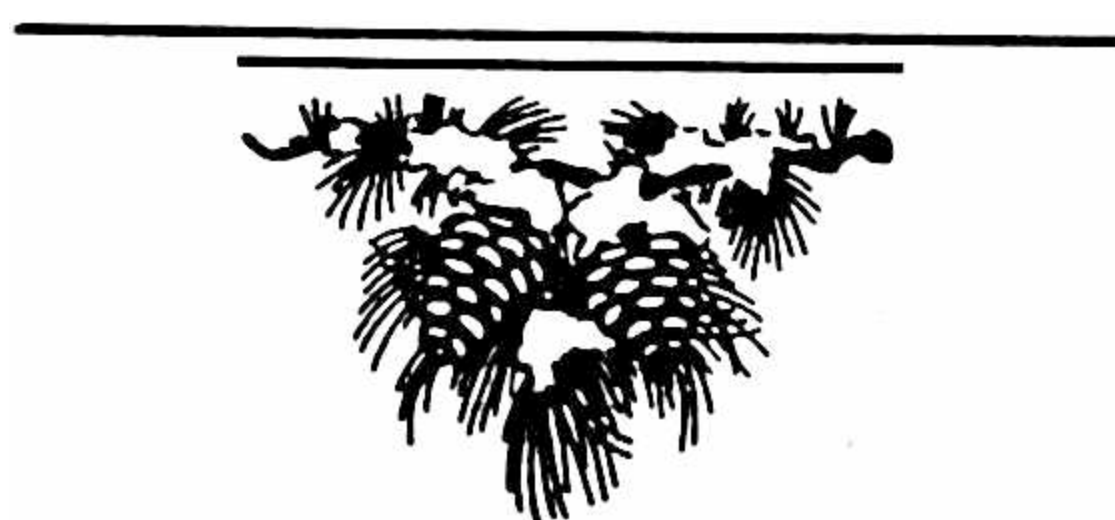

## Report of the Public Health Nurse—1943

---

### CARATUNK

We, as individuals and family units, must rely on our own resources more and more. It is within our line of duty to avail ourselves of the help made possible through our Bureau of Health, public health education, clinics and child health conferences. Our sons on the fighting front are often stripped of every weapon except their own bodies. Each soldier realizes the importance of keeping this, his most valuable weapon, in perfect condition. We on the home front must realize the health and endurance of the nation is only as strong as the health of each individual in it.

Scarcity of doctors, nurses, wartime restrictions on travel and rationing of foods means that maintenance of good health standards on the home front is becoming increasingly more difficult but not impossible if our communities use the health resources at their command.

Your public health nurse carries an ever increasing load as she continues to cope with the health problems in your community. She has been rewarded every time a new mother visits the Child Health Conference, or a father has seen to it that he and his family have taken advantage of the immunization clinics. Whenever a school teacher asks for help in the health program and the school children show evidence of working for better health there is progress on the home front.

During the past year the public health nurse has visited your town, making home visits and stressing the importance and general principles of prenatal and postpartum care for the mothers and the need of health supervision for the infant and preschool child, including medical and dental care, immunization and guidance in nutrition and mental hygiene.

The schools have been visited. Through nurse-teacher conferences, the nurse is able to inform the teacher of the home conditions and the family problems involving health and the teacher in turn, through her close relationship with the children, is able to bring to the nurse's attention any defects or disabilities that they may have. Home visits were made to discuss problems of this nature with the parents.

It has been a pleasure working in the Caratunk school. The pupils, parents, teachers and cadet supervisor have always responded wholeheartedly to any health program introduced in the school. During the year the hearing and vision tests were given. Special emphasis on weight was made with some pupils found having no gain over last year. Since the pupils have been bringing fruit and milk to eat at recess, gain in weight has been shown.

This year let us put more emphasis on the prevention and care of the common cold. Children who have signs or symptoms of a cold should be kept at home and isolated from members of the household by remaining in bed. Colds are often the forerunners and cause of many forms of illness in childhood and have been responsible for keeping adults from their work. A cold is a contagious disease and should be treated as such.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

---

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens  
of the Plantation of Caratunk:

I am pleased to make my first annual report on our school.

We have been most fortunate this year in securing two exceptionally fine teachers through the Cadet System at Farmington State Normal School. The children in the school have shown a steady improvement and the results of the Testing program are very good.

In this period of a World War, it is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain school teachers. Thus the present outlook for next year is not very encouraging for the following reasons: First, the present enrolment at Farmington Normal School is far below the normal enrolment, which decreases the number of Cadets available for next year. Out of necessity the Normal School must place teachers in the larger schools to serve the greatest number of children. Second, the State Department of Education urges the closing of all schools in the State, which has an enrolment of less than 15 pupils, where the pupils might be transported to another school, due to the acute shortage of teachers.

The present building, which has been used for our school, has been painted on the inside, by Miss Kimball, the pupils, and members of the School Committee, and now looks very good.

The children in the school have done a splendid job buying War Stamps and Bonds, and also with the help of the town's people had an excellent Scrap Drive, thereby aiding the war effort and earning money for the school.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation for the splendid cooperation given me by the members of the Superintending School Committee, town officials, students and other citizens of Caratunk.

## Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

MARCH 13, 1944

SOMERSET, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Andrew M. Comber, Constable of the Plantation of Caratunk  
in the County of Someset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Plantation of Caratunk, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Albert B. Clark's hall in the said plantation on the 13th day of March, A. D. 1944 at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern War Time, there and then to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose three assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose one or more fire wardens for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a road commissioner, fix his compensation and designate his term of service, not exceeding three years.

Art. 10. To choose all other necessary plantation officers.

Art. 11. To see if the plantation will vote to accept the reports of the plantation officers as printed and distributed.

Art. 12. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making of highways and culverts for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making of snow roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State and State Aid Roads for the ensuing year, within the limits of the plantation, under the provisions of Sections 8 and 17 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 15. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for road patrol for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what action the plantation will take regarding the temporary closing of our common school and the transporting of the pupils to another town.

Art. 20. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for public health nurse for the ensuing year, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 22. To see if the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82 of the Revised Statutes. Said money to be expended through the Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 23. To see what action the plantation will take regarding street lights for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary regarding the same.

Art. 24. To see if the plantation will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 to be held in trust, the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Edward L. Webster lot.

Art. 25. To see if the plantation will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 to be held in trust, the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Cyrus Bean lot.

Art. 26. To see what compensation the plantation will vote to pay its officers for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 27. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to buy the bonds for the treasurer and tax collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see what sum the plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the plantation for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see if the plantation will vote to allow a discount of 2% on taxes paid before June 1, and collect interest at the rate of 1% a month after September 1, the ensuing year.

Art. 30. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to hire money needed to transact the plantation business for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 31. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the plantation for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 32. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 1 o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern War Time, until the polls are closed.

Hereof fail not, and have with you there and then this warrant with your doings thereon.
