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
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

# WARRANT

To Fred Tolman, a Constable of the Plantation of Carroll,

#### **GREETING:**

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation of Carroll, qualified by law to vote in Plantation attairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said Plantation on the 26th day of March, A. D. 1945, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Plantation clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of Plantation officers.
- Art. 4. To choose three assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the Plantation will accept the lowest bid for the collection of taxes and have the collector give bonds to settle in full with the Plantation one year from date of commitment.

Art. 6. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

#### Art. 7. To choose a Plantation treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose one or more constables for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose a member of the school committee for three years.

Art. 10. To choose one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To choose all other necessary Plantation officers.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote

and raise for the secondary school tuition for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for the patrol of roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for officers' salaries for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the Plantation will vote and raise twenty dollars for public health nurse for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for incidental expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for third class roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for maintenance of special resolve road for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for the bush law, so-called.

Art. 22. To see if the Plantation will vote and raise the sum of seventy-two dollars to pay interest on the Carroll school fund for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for snowplowing the roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for the care of ways, highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for State aid road construction in addition to amounts regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges under provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for snow fence for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see what action the Plantation will take relative to authorizing the Plantation treasurer to borrow money for the present municipal year in anticipation of and to be paid out of taxes of the current municipal year 1945-6 not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000) and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory notes of the Plantation therefor.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise for the 50-50 road, so-called.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote and raise to pay taxes on Plantation-owned property.

Art. 31. To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the Plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Plantation for non-payment of taxes thereon by such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 32. To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the Plantation to sell any or all school buildings not now in use by such terms as they deem advisable.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise to add to its capital reserve fund.

Art. 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The assessors will be at the Grange Hall at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on said day of meeting.

# **REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE**

The ultimate objective of Public Health is to make a better place in which everyone may live and contribute the most to the com-

munity. Public Health Nursing is concerned with healthful living for every member of the community. It is only by the united effort of each individual that a coordinated health program for the community may be attained.

During the past year your Public Health Nurse has made home visits to all expectant mothers and also made visits after the birth of the infant. Regular home visits have been made to all infants and preschool children giving help and guidance to the mother. A Child Health Conference was held in the Grange Hall in July. Only six children attended. Five were vaccinated against smallpox and inoculated against diphtheria, four were given the tuberculin test. Two were positive reactors and were later X-rayed at their family physician's advice.

The nurse in the school acts as an advisor in a health program. She holds conferences with the superintendent and teacher and gives whatever assistance is necessary. During this year as a part of the communicable disease program diphtheria inoculations were offered to all the school children. A tuberculin testing program was conducted by the town. Fifty-six school children were tested. There were no positive reactors. Nine people from Carroll were X-rayed in November at the X-ray Clinic in Lincoln.

The service of the State Pediatric Clinic has been available for all children. Besides a physical examination and recommendations on condition for which the child is referred, the advantage of a dental examination and the assistance of a medical social worker is also available.

A need exists in Carroll for an organized group to form a health council in order to establish a better health program for the town.
