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## COMMENTS

### CASH

All cash recorded as received appeared to be properly accounted for and deposited in the bank. Expenditures were made by check from properly drawn warrants. The cash on hand reconciles with the Bank Statement.

### TAX LIENS:

All collections on tax liens appeared to be properly credited to the several lien accounts. The interest collected, credited to Interest. The expired liens are shown in this report as Tax Liens, thru expiration of tax liens. Lists of all liens are shown in Schedules 9 to 15, inclusive.

## TAXES:

The 1941 Commitment was added and found to agree with the detail items in the Valuation but, the Certificate and the Collector's Warrant in the back of the Valuation Book are not correct. Lists of all unpaid taxes are shown in Schedules 2 to 8, inclusive.

## GENERAL:

It was unfortunate that the untimely death of the Treasurer occurred during the year but, the person who succeeded her has done exceedingly well with the records. The School accounts were checked with the Superintendent and brought into agreement with his balances. It should not be difficult to keep them in accordance hereafter.

We wish to thank the Officers and all others who helped us with the credit for their assistance and courtesy.

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## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Cary:

In accordance with the public school laws of Maine I submit to you the report of the superintendent of schools.

### Statistics for the Fall Term

The Skedgell school shows excellent attendance for the Fall Term. The other two schools show attendance somewhat below that of last year, but under the circumstances it is entirely satisfactory.

There will be one eighth grade pupil to take examinations this year. Five students are now attending high school, none of them graduating this year. For the next fiscal year it appears advisable to appropriate no less than \$400 for tuition

New desks were purchased for the Smith School. We were fortunate to be able to secure these desks. They were badly needed and will last for many years. We would not be able to buy them today, due to war priorities. The supplies and equipment account for next year must not be less than \$170 in order to apply on payment of the seats. The same appropriation of \$50. has been recommended for repairs next year.



## State Funds

Cary will receive approximately \$785 of Equalization money in December 1942. This is a little less than the amount received last year but is still a generous share.

**WE MUST INCREASE SCHOOL APPROPRIATIONS FOR NEXT YEAR** in order to meet the increased cost which always occurs in wartime periods. Every town in the State is increasing appropriations, therefore we must do the same if we are to continue to share from Equalization.

In conclusion I wish to thank the school committee, the teachers, the town officers, and the citizens who have cooperated to make the school year successful. Cary has been fortunate this year in having the schools continue without interruption. In this respect I wish to give full credit to the school committee and teachers for their splendid cooperation.

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## WARRANT

To Clyde Oliver, a Constable in the Plantation of Cary in  
the County of Aroostook, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation of Cary, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Smith School in said Plantation of Cary on the thirtieth day of March A. D. 1942 at 1.30 o'clock P. M., to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary Plantation officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, including tuition, repairs and such as is necessary for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see what sum the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of Town Roads and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see what sum the Plantation will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, revised Statutes of 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229 Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 6. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate Four Hundred Ninty dollars (\$490.00) for maintenance of Patrol of State Aid Highways.

Art. 7. To see if the inhabitants of said Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred and Forty-one dollars (\$141.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class roads, or to be used in connection with the Third Class apportionment made by the State for the improvement of Third Class Roads.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Plantation charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.

Art. 10. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable, will vote to make any discount on taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent, also a time and rate of interest to be added upon unpaid taxes.

Art. 11. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to authorize the Assessors to sell and convey real estate the Plantation holds tax liens and deeds on, and give quit-claim deeds to the same.

Art. 12. To see if the inhabitants of said Plantation will buy snow fencing and how much money they will raise and appropriate for the same.

Art. 13. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to authorize the Assessors to hire money to pay up outstanding orders.

Art. 14. To see what sum, if any, the inhabitants of Cary Plantation would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, Public Laws of 1935.

Art. 15. To see if the Plantation will raise and appropriate eighteen dollars (\$18.00) for Public Health work in Cary Plantation.

Art. 16. To see what sum the Plantation will raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, ad-

vantages and attractions under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, Revised Statutes.

Art. 17. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate Five dollars (\$5.00) for school nursing, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
