A final audit will be reade as soon as the books are closed for the year.

COMMENTS

An examination has been made of the financial transactions recorded in the books and records of Cary Plantation for the fiscal year ended March 1, 1947. This consisted of checks of receipts and disbursements of the treasurer and tax collector, and such test checks of the assessors as seemed advisable for a proper audit. Exhibits and schedules are submitted which, in our opinion, properly reflect the financial status of the town.

TOWN CLERK:

The records of dog licenses issued indicated collections to be correct, and proper receipts from the State Treasurer were in evidence. The Town Clerk's records regarding the minutes of the annual meeting were examined and compared with the records of the Assessors' books, and found to be in agreement. All necessary bonds of town officials had been properly recorded. Fish and game licenses were settled monthly with the State Treasurer.

TREASURER:

It was verified that all cash recorded as received by the Treasurer had been deposited in the bank. Numbered receipts appeared to have been correctly recorded. All expenditures were made by check from warrants, and invoices were presented to support all items of the Selectmen's warrants. Payments received on tax liens were verified, and it appeared that all monies had been credited to the proper year. The cash balance reconciled with the balance shown by the bank statement at the close of the municipal year. Records were maintained for withholding tax reductions and the amounts withheld had been sent to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

Excise taxes were verified by examination of the collector's copies. The following was found:

1946 Excise Tax:

Receipts No. 76 to 92 \$164.57

Receipts No. 101 to 125

1947 Excise Tax:

Receipts No. 1 to 31 134.35

TAX COLLECTOR:

The 1946 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, discounts, abatements, or unpaid taxes. Payments received on prior year tax accounts were verified by examination, and appeared to have been properly recorded.

ASSESSORS:

A complete double entry system of accounting is used by the assessors and the accounts were found to be in good order. Payrolls and paid vouchers are on file to support all payments.

It has been noted that in past years the money received from Excise Tax has been distributed to several appropriation accounts to take care of overdrafts. This is not according to the procedure used in this Municipal booking. If this procedure is desired an article should be in the Annual Warrant giving authorization to the officials to transfer such money collected from Excise Tax.

The Selectmen's ledger has been ruled off and new accounts for the ensuing year have been set up.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Cary:

In accordance with the school laws of Maine, I hereby submit the annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Schools opened August 25th with only one change in the teaching personnel. Mrs. Phyllis Putnam is teaching at the Skedgell School. The enrollment in the various schools by grades is shown in the following table:

The average attendance has been fair considering the extreme cold weather and the general sickness due to colds and whooping cough.

There are 9 secondary students in school this year. Registered as follows: Ricker 3, Houlton High 1, Higgins 1, Hodgdon High 4. None of these students are in the graduating class this year. There are 5 pupils in the 8th grade who will be taking the entrance examinations for high school this June.

Only \$6.00 was expended for repairs this year. We have been neglecting the repairs on our schools for too long a time. New doors and door cases are needed at the Smith and Wilcox Schools. Electric lights should be installed as soon as possible. All the buildings need an outside paint job. We are in hopes that the emergencies can be taken care of this summer.

In closing I wish to express my thanks to the School Committee, the teachers, pupils and citizens for their cooperation.

WARRANT

State of Maine

County of Aroostook

To PHILLIP PUTNAM a constable of the Plantation of

Cary in the County of Aroostook:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation of Cary, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Smith school house in said Plantation of Cary on the twenty-ninth day of March A. D. 1948 at 1.30 o'clock P. M. to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said neeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, Treasurer, School Superintendent and Town Clerk March 10th, 1948.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary plantation officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, including books and supplies, equipment and fuel.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for common school repairs.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the town will vote to raise for High School tuition.
- Art. 8. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school superintendent for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars to wire the school houses.
- Art. 10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of town roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rebuild the State Aid road on Libby Hill so-called.
- Art. 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29 Chapter 20 Revised Statutes of 1944 as amended.
- Art. 13. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred sixty-one dollars and thirty cents (\$661.30) for the maintenance of Patrol of State Aid Highways.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise for snow removal.
- Art. 15. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will buy snow fencing and how much money they will vote to raise and appropriate for same.
- Art. 16. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying the Fire Department for services at the fire at Kenneth Anderson's buildings, and for future fires in the town.
- Art. 17. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to set the wages of all town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Plantation charges for the ensuing year.

- Art. 19. To see what sum the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Sec. 82 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 20. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to procure a temporary loan or loans to pay any indebtedness of the Town, such loans to be repaid when taxes are collected.
- Art. 21. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to make any discount on taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so what percent. Also a time and rate of interest to be added on unpaid taxes.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by the town on such terms as they deem advisable and give quitclaim deeds for such property.
- Art. 23. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for the prevention of tuberculosis.
- Art. 24. To see if the inhabitants of Cary Plantation will vote to raise fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for school nursing, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.
