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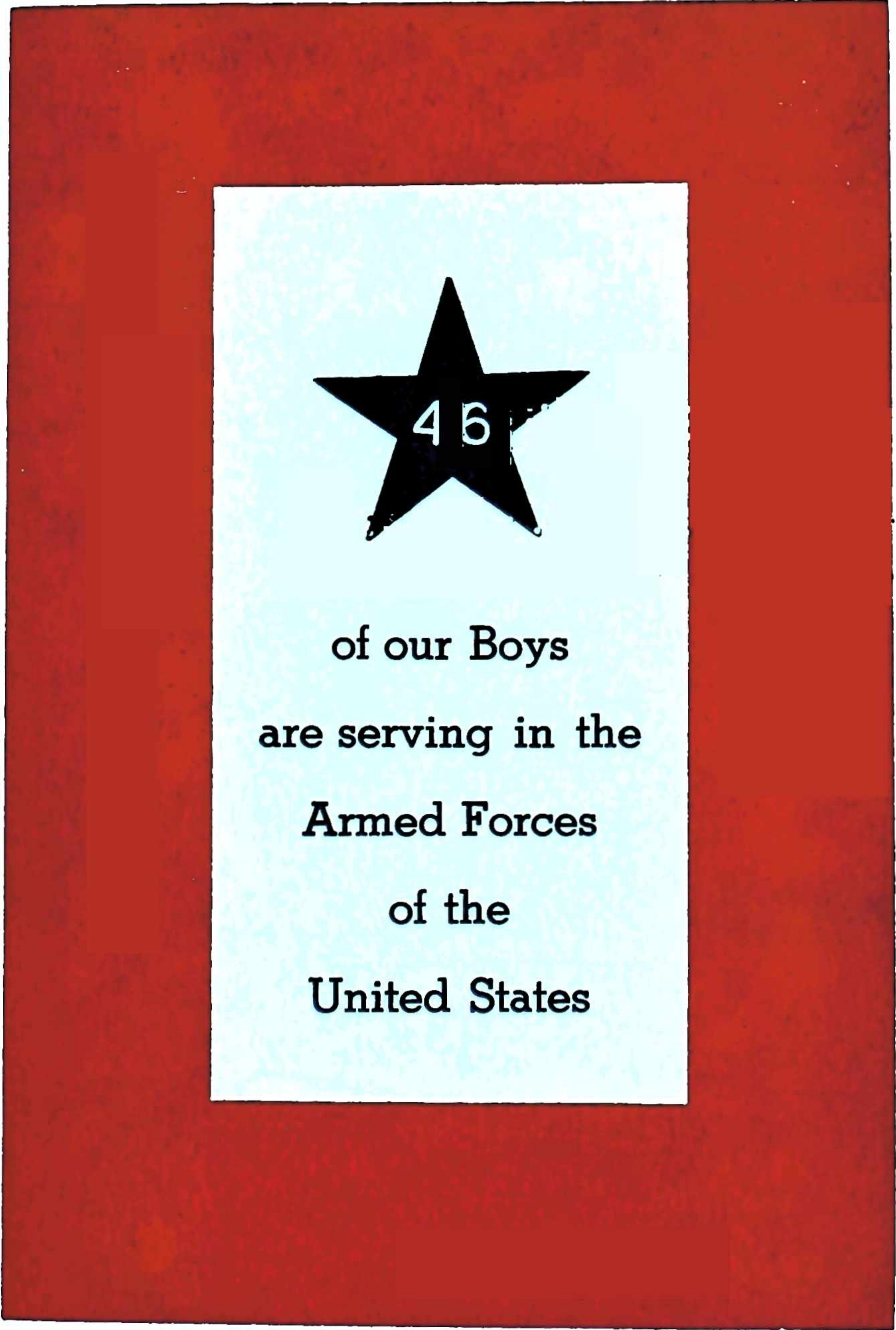

Each year the school problems vary slightly. This present year they have resolved into four headings: getting wood, conveyance, repairing buildings, and finding teachers.

Mr. Ellis has done very well toward keeping the schools supplied with wood. The problem of conveyance was easier to solve after several families moved away, making it possible to do the conveying with a car. As for repairs, only the necessary were done.

In last year's report on schools, deep concern was expressed in regard to obtaining teachers for this year. The year is here and we have been very fortunate. In addition to getting four good, regular teachers, we were able to get one Cadet teacher. Hence, the instructional part of the school program has been very successful.

Financially, there are changes ahead which will effect us. Tuition rates have gone up about 35%. In previous years it cost the town from \$65 to \$75 a year for high school tuition. Most towns are now charging \$90 to \$100. Castle Hill has 32 pupils going to high school. This year the town received \$2,679.00 equalization fund. Next year, due to various factors and unless there is some change made in the law, Castle Hill will receive less than \$300.00. Eventually this loss will have to be made up by cutting expenditures or increasing the appropriation. At the present time, in face of rising costs, there seems little likelihood of effecting the former. There is, happily, another side to the picture.

In looking toward post-war programs, the various government officials are working on a plan whereby municipalities will be financially aided up to 75% of the cost of constructing new buildings for consolidation purposes. To prepare to meet this program your treasurer and town agent have invested some school funds in a government bond, \$1,500-bond, maturity value. This is a wise move and should be followed through to a greater extent by an appropriation to buy another bond.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE—1943

Federal-state collaboration is bringing "basic public health service to more people in a wider area now than has been possible at any time previously." We are still struggling with only a ray of success in putting medical and nutritional science to work for all the people, but this is our ultimate goal.

The war's increasing demand for doctors and nurses is still far in excess of the supply in any community, this drain having reduced the personnel in our own district despite every effort of all concerned that dislocation in the essential field of public health nursing be kept to a minimum, and the scarcity of trained workers makes replacement unlikely.

These and many similar pressures and shortages force us, like workers in every other field, to a reevaluation of our community needs, our opportunities to serve, to an appraisal of our service capacities in terms of essentials, in terms of the greatest good to the greatest number, or to the most needy. We are forced to a sense of responsibility and planning so that quality of service is not lost in this unavoidable spreading too thin each worker.

The public health nurses in Aroostook County are continuing their varied interests and concerns in individual family and group education in all of the branches of service mentioned in the following figures, representing in so far as mere number can represent, the health work and achievements in your own community, Castle Hill, in the past calendar year 1943.

In each of the services our concern and chief effort is in education for prevention of ills, and secondly in cleaning the health slate in so far as is remedially possible for those who would travel along the positive health road with us if they were not already too heavily handicapped with tragedies or errors of the past to travel with ease. In other words, we want to help re-educate those in our communities who are "bailing out the boat instead of caulking up the seams."

No statistics have yet been found that could show what the mind and determination, the hand and foot work, or the

miles of travel a nurse has spent can actually accomplish. In Castle Hill in 1943 your nurse made:

51 home visits, most of these in the interest of more than one member of the family at a time.

13 more visits found no one at home, the house vacated or the family moved.

5 prenatal visits.

3 postpartum visits.

27 visits to infants between birth and one year of age.

37 visits to children in the preschool group.

7 visits to school children.

17 visits to crippled or handicapped children.

Several visits to persons either infected or thought to be contacted with a venereal disease.

4 classroom health talks with 125 in attendance.

17 interviews with doctors, dentists, social workers or other agencies in the interest of children of adults of Castle Hill.

1 current home nursing course holding 5 class meetings in November-December 1943 with 15 hours credit completed by January 1st.

Working as we do through the democratic process, the responsibility for results falls not only upon our professional army of healthmen and women, but also upon the civilian population, and heavily upon their leaders. Unless a community's public health program is, in a real sense its own, vital, wanted, parented, supported and enjoyed with pride of local ownership, it has little hope of real success. Each individual can, in his own way or as an organized committee, contribute to the improvement of problems in his own com-

munity and (quoting the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service) — “Neither our fighting forces nor our industrial army can function at the highest level of efficiency without the sustaining power of a civilian population possessed of physical strength and continuing morale.”

Greetings:

Art. 5. To choose two Selectmen for the term of three years.

Art. 6. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable the first day of May, 1944.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on taxes after a certain date, if so, how much, and what date.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid before a certain date, if so, how much and what date.

Art. 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for the State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161.00 for the Maintenance of improved sections of Third Class roads or to be used in conjunction with State apportionments for the construction of Third Class roads

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a truck, and raise and appropriate money necessary for the same.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for common schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for High School tuition for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for School House repairs and appliances for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for text books for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for incidental expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans when necessary in anticipation of collection of taxes.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid to dependent children for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much for the suppression and prevention of tuberculosis.

Art. 28. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highway patrol.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the Mapleton Fire Department.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the retirement of bonds when they come due.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$49.00 for public health nursing in Castle Hill. Said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote snow removal on Town Roads for the ensuing year, if so, what roads, and raise and appropriate money necessary for same.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow fence.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and dispose of tax titles held by the town on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Castle Hill Cemetery.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to apply the proceeds of stumpage as carried forward toward reimbursement of the Ministerial School Fund.

Art. 37. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 5% of the appropriations of the town for the purpose of setting up a Reserve Fund as defined in Chapter 262 of the Public Laws of Maine for 1943.

The Selectmen will be in session one hour before said meeting at the Grange Hall, to correct the list of voters.
