On various occasions during the last few years, it has been predicted that the supply of adequate teachers would soon become exhausted. For Castle Hill, that point has been reached. Hence, it is not possible to fill all positions with qualified and acceptable teachers. This fact would not be so serious if the situation would end with this school year. But, from all appearances, it rather looks as though the situation would not be relieved for the next 4 or 5 years; not until a sufficient number of high school students enter Normal School and become teachers. Therefore, we have the choice of continuing to operate our schools along the present lines for the next few years or completely organizing our schools along new lines.

From time to time a desire has been expressed that Castle Hill go in for a consolidated school program. I have suggested that the most economical and efficient program would be to go in with Mapleton and Chapman on the building of a new grade building. If the terms could be arranged to the satisfaction of the school committees representing the various towns, it is strongly recommended that the proposition be accepted by the vot-

ers of Castle Hill and the building made available for the fall of 1946. Castle Hill's share of the program would be about as follows:

- 1. Castle Hill loan to the Town of Mapleton approximately \$10,000 towards the erecting of a suitable grade building: interest on loan to be \$1.00 a year. (It would be necessary for the Town of Castle Hill to finance by appropriation the money for this part of the program).
- 2. Castle Hill to furnish two suitable school buses. (It would be necessary for Castle Hill to make financial arrangements for the buying of these buses but they would be paid for over a period of years out of conveyance account).
- 3. The amount of money that would be paid to Mapleton could be based on one of two methods: (a) Castle Hill contract to pay Mapleton a definite sum each year for common school tuition, (b) Castle Hill could pay to Mapleton the actual cost of the tuition, the amount to be determined at the end of each school year. Naturally, the details of the contract would have to be worked out by the school committees representing each town.

#### REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE — 1945

Public health nursing is primarily to help keep the well person well. This can best function through helping to make known facts about health, creating positive attitudes toward obtaining and maintaining health, en-

couraging and teaching the use of health and medical resources, emphasizing the prevention and protection against communicable diseases, and contributing toward the adjustment of social conditions to the end that the individual and family will become resourceful in meeting their own health needs.

The infant and preschool periods are recognized as the time when lasting health habits are being formed. From the public health viewpoint, this makes these two periods very important. It is a time to stress the prevention of disease, rather than the curative measures, and to prevent the hazards peculiar to the first year of life. During the past year, three visits were made to preschool children.

The nurse, in her services to a community, is interested at all times in the growth and development of children. The school nursing program offers great opportunity along this line. She is a part of the teaching staff in the capacity of a liaison between home and school and as a health advisor to teachers, parents, and school children. Through home visits and individual conferences in the school, the nurse helps the parents recognize the importance of the early establishments of habits which contribute to health. Where corrections are indicated, she helps the parents plan to get the medical work done. The nurse uses every contact with the child to teach health and help him understand the value of the school health program. Through the year seven home visits were made to school children and three schools were visited.

The control of communicable diseases, including the venereal diseases, is an important part of the public health program. One visit was made to a scarlet fever patient.

Our service to crippled children is one noteworthy of mention. The best in medical, nursing, and hospital care is made readily available to every crippled child found in our contacts with families or to any child referred to us. Since early diagnosis is very essential, clinics are held in Fort Kent, Presque Isle and Houlton the year around. Here, expert diagnosis and recommendations are made. Some children are referred to the hospital for surgery, others are referred to the nurse to assist the family to carry out the treatment ordered, while others are referred to medical social workers for social or educational adjustments. During the past year seven visits were made in behalf of these patients.

The shadow of war lies behind us. A year of peace and normal living lies ahead. Let us all use our community resources in a combined effort to continue our care of the handicapped, to keep the well from becoming sick, and to teach healthful living to the men, women and children of our town.

- Art. 8 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable the first day of May, 1946.
- Art. 9 To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on taxes after a certain date, if so, how much, and what date.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid before a certain date, if so, how much, and what date.
- Art. 11 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 12 To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 13 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to recind any amounts appropriated by the Town for the State Aid Highway Construction in Excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
- Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161.00 for the Maintenance of improved sections of Third Class roads or to be used in conjunction with State Apportionments for the construction of Third Class roads.

- Art. 15 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for High School tuition for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for School House repairs and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for text books for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for incidental expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans when necessary in anticipation of collection of taxes.

- Art. 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for aid to dependent children for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for mothers aid for the ensuing year.
- Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the suppression and prevention of tuberculosis.
- Art. 27 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highway patrol.
- Art. 28 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the Mapleton Fire Department.
- Art. 29 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the retirement of bonds when they come due.
- Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49.00 for Public Health Nursing in Castle Hill. Said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health for local service.
- Art. 31 To see if the town will vote snow removal on Town Roads for the ensuing year, if so, what roads, and raise and appropriate money necessary for the same.
- Art. 32 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of snow fence, if so, how much.

- Art. 33 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and dispose of tax titles held by the town on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 34 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Castle Hill Cemetery.
- Art. 35 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the purchasing of Highway Equipment.
- Art. 36 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$507.82 to replace abatement of taxes.
- Art. 37 To see if the town will vote to unite with Chapman and Mapleton in a program to provide facilities for the improvement of Educational Opportunities.
- Art. 38 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, and/or allocate the Post War Reserve and/or use a portion of the net stumpage receipts to provide facilities for the improvement of Education Opportunities as outlined under Article 37.
- Art. 39 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 40 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 5% of the appropriations of the

town for the purpose of increasing the Reserve Fund (as defined in Chapter 262 of the Public Laws of Maine for 1943).

- Art. 41 To see what salary the town will vote to pay the town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 42 To see what salary the town will vote to pay the town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 43 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase Property or Equipment to benefit or for the best interest of the town.

The Selectmen will be in session one hour before said meeting at the Grange Hall, to correct the list of voters.

Chapter 84, R. S.

Section 77, Drainage of public way not to be obstructed. No person by himself, his agents, or servants, other than a person having legal supervision of a public way, shall cultivate, in connection with the improvement of lands adjacent thereto, any portion of the wrought part of any public way, in such manner as to change the

drainage thereof or obstruct said way; nor shall any person, by himself, his agents, or servants, other than a person having legal supervision of a public way, deposit within or along any ditch or drain in a public way any material that shall obstruct the flow of water in such ditch or drain or otherwise obstruct said way; provided, however, that with the written consent and in accordance with specifications of the legal authorities having supervision of such ditch or drain, any person may, to provide egress and regress to and from lands occupied by him, lawfully construct and maintain a bridge across such ditch or drain.

Section 78. Penalty; jurisdiction of proceedings. Whoever willfully violates any provision of the preceeding section shall be punished, for the first offense, by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars and costs, and for each subsequent offense, by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars and costs, and shall be further liable for double the amount of the actual damage, to be recovered in an action on the case by the city, town, or plantation, or in behalf of any unorganized place, by the county, where the offense is committed. All fines recovered under the provisions of this section shall be paid to the treasurer of the city, town, or plantation, or, for an unorganized place, to the treasurer of the county where such offense is committed and shall thereafter be expended in the construction and maintainence of public ways or drains therein. In all prosecutions under this section, muncipal and police courts and trial justices within their respective counties, shall have, upon complaint, original and concurrent jurisdiction with the superior court.

Plowing up to and into the ditches and turning teams and tractors with equipment attached in the road, is the greatest cause of filling ditches and tearing up roads.

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
