

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Plantation of Caswell:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools of Caswell.

I have endeavored to conserve space and save expense of printing by reducing the information as much as possible to outline and statistical form.

- 1. All schools will have a year of 36 weeks. It sometimes happens that during a fiscal year there may be some overlapping, so that the fiscal and school year may not coincide, but the apparent discrepancy adjusts itself in a short time, so that never does a school from the time it begins in August until it closes in June have (with harvesting and seed time out) more than 36 weeks, and it is on this basis that the teachers are paid.
- 2. We have four certified teachers this year, which entitles us under our present rate for school purposes to receive from the regular state subsidy and McKinnon unit the amount of \$850.00 for each teacher.
- 3. We were apportioned nothing from the equalization fund this year, but received a little over \$400 more from the regular state subsidy.
- 4. Pleasant Ridge School started earlier this year, but due to the illness of the teachers, the fall term was 12 instead of the intended 14 weeks. The extra two weeks

will be made up by the end of the spring term, so that all schools will have 36 weeks.

- 5. The plantation has acquired a new 49-passenger bus, which is working out most satisfactorily. Practically all the children are transported. A garage is now needed to house the bus.
- 6. We have 25 children attending high school, which necessitates an increased expenditure this year of \$1,000.-00 for tuition. The total cost for all secondary students is \$3,000.00. Of this amount the state reimburses two-thirds, but not to exceed \$1,000.00.
- 7. The exterior of the Pleasant Ridge schoolhouse has been given one coat of paint and the hall walls repaired.
- 8. The walls of the basement at St. Mary's have been renovated. A new bookcase and dictionary stand have been made for the grammar schoolroom.
- 9. As money permits, new books are gradually being supplied to all the schools. There apparently has been considerable need of the for some time.
- 10. We are listing our expenditures for all school purposes as of Feb. 25th, the date the selectmen closed the plantation's books. This now makes the school and the municipal fiscal year terminate at the same time, and to coincide, as they should.
- 11. One of the walls in the foundation of the Pleasant Ridge school building has been completely undermined and washed away by water entering the basement. The necessary repairs are so substantial that we are recom-

mending a special appropriation for the purpose.

12. A spelling contest was held in the schools to determine the best speller to represent Caswell in the countywide spelling bee at Caribou. Marilyn O'Neal, a pupil in the seventh grade, Pleasant Ridge School, received that honor, and remained in the county contest until 25 other children had been spelled down in an entry list of 33, a most excellent achievement.

In concluding this report, I wish to thank the members of the superintending school committee for their constant assistance and support, the selectmen and other town officials for their co-operation, the faithful teachers, and all others who have contributed in any way to our mutual enterprise—that of improving the schools in Caswell.

After having carefully prepared a budget containing the items of school expenditures and estimating the probable receipts, we would recommend the following amounts to be expended under the respective accounts for the ensuing year:

Schools	\$10,000.00
Repairs	200.00

In our recommendations last year we estimated we would need \$9,000.00. It developed that the estimate was correct. This year there is an increased expenditure of \$1,000.00 required for tuition of high school students.

We are recommending the small amount of \$200.00 for minor repairs on buildings. The appropriation for repairing the foundation of the Pleasant Ridge Schoolhouse is asked for under a special article in the warrant.

Public Health Nurse's

ANNUAL REPORT

TOWN OF CASWELL

The State Bureau of Health offers public health nursing to your community toward which your town makes an annual appropriation.

The nurse endeavors to promote health, prevent disease and deformity, and to teach members of the family how to give nursing care. This is accomplished through home and school visits, clinics, child health conferences and community organizations.

During the year 12 visits were made to prenatal and post-partum mothers in order to assist them in securing medical and dental examination early in pregnancy and to help the family carry out specific medical advice. Sixty-two visits were made to infants and preschool children to assist in securing complete birth registration, correction of physical defects, and immunization against communicable diseases, together with providing adequate opportunity for normal growth and development.

Under the auspices of the Bureau of Health, pediatric and crippled children's clinics are held every two months in Presque Isle. The nurse made 11 follow-up visits in the homes to assist in carrying out the clinic recommendations.

The nurse also assists in the school health program

through interviews with the teachers, suggesting sources of health material, demonstrating methods of inspection for communicable diseases and by obtaining correction of defects found in the schools by visits in the homes. Two hundred and forty children had their hearing tested with the audiometer, six showed signs of questionable defective hearing.

Through the efforts of the child health conference committee, it was possible to hold three conferences throughout the summer, whereby 21 infants and preschool children received a physical examination by a physician and were immunized against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus. Sixteen were also vaccinated.

The primary purpose of your public health nurse is education in healthful living. In this she stands ready to assist the community in the development of an effective health program.

- Art. 6 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for the payment of plantation officers and contingent charges.

- Art. 7 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for the support of poor, including A. D. C. and institutional service, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for all snow removal.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for repair of ways and bridges.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for state-aid road construction, under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 11 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for the Limestone Fire Department.
- Art. 12 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise to be expended for the care and prevention of tuberculosis, to be expended by our county nurse; also for public health nursing, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 13 To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise toward the maintenace of a veterans' service center in this area.
- Art. 14 To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to cover the overdraft on schools for the year 1948-49.
