For the past four or five years we have experienced great difficulty in obtaining teachers. This would be bad enough if the situation would end with this year. But, every indication is that we will have a hard time to engage a good group of teachers for the next four or five years; not until such time as a sufficient number of high school students enter Normal School and become teachers. We have been quite fortunate this year and we trust that our good fortune will continue.

From time to time I have suggested that we close some of our schools, bringing the pupils together in a larger unit, thus making it possible to have more money available with which to hire our teachers. Next year it is quite imperative that either the Powers or the Hodgdon School be closed. Since the Hodgdon School is a much better building and large enough to accommodate all the pupils on the East road, it would appear that that would be the best building to maintain.

In regard to the pupils from the other four schools, i. e., the Grendell, Washington, Pendexter, and the Hillside, it would appear the wisest move to make some arrangement with Mapleton whereby the pupils could be conveyed and educated in the Mapleton schools. It would not only be cheaper but the facts indicate that the type of training received would be much better. Should Mapleton not have room to accommodate additional pupils, I have suggested that Chapman and Castle Hill go in with Mapleton on the construction of a suitable grade building. During the last few years we have had rather a hit-and-miss policy in regard to just what schools to keep open. This may satisfy some people, but it is not an efficient policy. It would appear to be a wise move for the citizens of Chapman to decide on which schools to keep open or what policy they wish to adopt, and carry it through. In deciding upon how to operate our schools, the State Department of Education must be taken into consideration. If we will but note the finances for the present year, it will be observed that the Town of Chapman appropriated \$3,600.00 for our schools while the State's contribution was \$4,003.52. Since the Department is putting in such a large amount for educational purposes, a larger amount than Chapman, the Department

is quite concerned that the money be spent wisely. If it is not, the amount of State money may be withheld or materially reduced.

#### WARRANT

To G. L. Hodgdon, a Constable of the Town of Chapman in the County of Aroostook and State of Maine.

#### GREETINGS:-

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Chapman, qualified by law to vote on Town affairs, to assemble at the Grendell Schoolhouse in said Town on Monday, the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report as printed.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action taken at the Special Town Meeting held Jan. 28th, 1946.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a Town Manager as outlined under the provisions of Chapter 80, Sections 16-17-18 and 19 of the Revised Statutes of 1944.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote the salaries or wages to be paid Municipal Officers, Town Clerk, Treasurer and other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 7. To see what percentage the Town will vote to pay for collecting taxes.
- Art. 8. To elect three Selectmen, Assessors and Over-seers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To elect all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on Real Estate and Personal Taxes paid in eash before certain dates, and if so, how much, and on what dates.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to fix a date when taxes will be due and payable and charge interest on taxes after certain dates; if so, how much, and what dates.
- Art. 12 To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen and Treasurer of the Town to obtain temporary loans from time to time for the Town during the coming Municipal year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation and make, execute, and negotiate in the name of the Town, a note, or notes thereof, at such time and terms as to them seems advisable and also to renew from time to time as to them seems necessary, for the whole or any part of such notes given.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Superintending School Committee for services rendered during the Municipal year.

- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote Yes or No on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 30, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930 as amended by Chapter 169, Public Laws of 1937, or under Chapter 20, Section 26, of the Revised Statutes of 1944.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for winter breaking and equipment for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$56.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Road, and also the sum of \$42.00 for the maintenance of Special Resolve Road for the ensuing year.

- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools, High School Tuition, Textbooks and Supplies for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for insurance on schoolhouses.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs and appliances for schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for interest.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay incidental expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Support of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the local Board of Health or Public Health Officer for the suppression and prevention of Tuberculosis.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for Public Health Nursing in Chap-

man, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Presque Isle and Mapleton Fire Departments.
- Art. 31. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, Public Laws of 1939.
- Art. 32. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Third Class Apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.
- Art. 33. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to have a Budget Committee for the ensuing year and elect the same.

- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to apply on loan at the Northern National Bank of Presque Isle.
- Art. 36. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to letting snow fence during the summer months.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads already constructed.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to operate the Hodg-don School for the coming year.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to close the Powers School.
- Art. 40. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to operating the Grendell, Pendexter and Hillside Schools.
- Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to unite with Castle Hill and Mapleton in a program to provide facilities for the improvement of educational opportunities.
- Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and if so, how much, to provide facilities as outlined under the preceding Article.
- Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise lines around property owned by them where necessary.
- Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply on Bank Loan any part of

monies received for stumpage during the Municipal year, as to them seems advisable.

- Art. 45. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of any or all tax titles held by the Town, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property; also to lease land, sell stumpage and hire a man to look after the same.
- Art. 48. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## **AUDITOR'S REPORT**

October 8, 1945

Board of Selectmen Chapman, Maine Gentlemen:

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the Town of Chapman have been audited for the period February 25, 1944 to February 26, 1945 inclusive.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which we considered necessary. Insofar as we can ascertain within the scope of our examination, the result discloses that the financial transactions of this town have been satisfactorily handled.

Comments and schedules prepared by Auditor Libbv are incorporated in this report. These should prove of interest to you.

#### **COMMENTS**

An examination has been completed of the books of account and records of the Town of Chapman for the municipal year ended February 26, 1945.

Exhibits and schedules are submitted which, in our opinion, properly reflect the financial status of the town.

#### Treasurer

It was ascertained that all cash recorded as received had been deposited in the bank.

Expenditures were made by check from authorized warrants, supported by invoices on file.

The cash balance reconciled with the bank statement at the close of the year.

Payments received on tax liens appeared to have been applied to the proper accounts.

Reports were maintained for Withholding Tax and checks issued for these deductions on each warrant.

#### Tax Collector

The commitment of taxes to the Collector was compared with the Assessors' records and found in agreement. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, abatements, discounts, or unpaid taxes as reflected by the records of the Collector.

Payments on prior years' taxes were verified by examination of the cash records. With the exception of 1927, all taxes prior to 1936 were written off by the Selectmen.

Minor variations were noted in the tax accounts resulting in a net amount due from the Collector of \$1.67.

Excise tax collections were verified with the copies of the receipts issued by the Collectors.

#### Selectmen

Double entry recording is used in keeping the ledger; although not perfectly complete, it presents a good record.

Interest on the trust funds used by the town was trans-

ferred from the interest account. The Cemetery Fund was at no time in cash; it consisted of town orders for which the town agreed to pay 4% interest annually. The original orders were destroyed by fire. The outstanding orders were written off after advertising failed to locate the creditors and as no detail was available supporting this liability figure.

Mortgages and notes receivable were given originally for tax payments. As such procedure is illegal, a reserve has been set up at 100% against this account.

A payment was made during the year on the outstanding county tax reducing the amount due to \$2,286.99.

Examination of the paid vouchers indicated they were proper charges and correctly recorded.

#### Town Clerk

The records of the Town Clerk disclosed the sum of \$54.70 collected for dog licenses. This amount was forwarded to the State Treasurer as required.
