To P. A. Libby, constable of the Town of Chester, in the County of Penobscot,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Chester, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the school house in District No. 2 on Monday the 17th day of March, A. D. 1919, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

- ART. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at this meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To listen to the report of the town officers for the past year.
  - ART. 4. To choose three selectmen for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 5. To choose three assessors for the ensuing year.
  - ART. 6. To choose three overseers of poor for the ensuing year.
  - ART. 7. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year and vote his compensation or commission for collecting.
- ART. 9. To choose a member of the superintending school committee for a term of three years.
  - ART. 10. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay town charges and incidental expenses.

- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of schools.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs on roads and bridges.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school books.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cemeteries.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school house repairs.
- ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to build an outbuilding for the school in Dist. No. 6 and how much money they will raise for the same, also buy an addition to the school lot.
- ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to change and straighten the road across the Keene Place, so called, now owned by Carp Bros. & Clark, and how much money they will raise for same.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$300. for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for ways, highways and bridges; the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will appropriate and raise an additional sum of money for State Aid Road under Section 21 of Chapter 25, Revised Statutes.

- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for aid for dependent mothers.
- ART. 24. To see if the town will grant and raise a special sum of money for the North Lincoln Ferry Road and how much.
- ART. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for High School tuition.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to buy an addition to the cemetery lot in No. 1 and what sum of money they will vote for the same.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to give a discount, and charge interest on taxes paid before, or after a date to be fixed by the town.
- ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for outstanding orders.
- ART. 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the school house in District No. 2 on Monday the 17th day of March at 9 o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

# Superintendent of Schools' Report

#### OF THE TOWN OF CHESTER

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Chester:

I have the honor of submitting herewith the annual school report.

I assumed charge of your schools at the beginning of this present municipal year. I found your schools in a prosperous condition and a loyal school committee and loyal teachers too as co-workers. The evidence of the good work of my predecessor, Supt. Vinal H. Tibbetts was apparent.

During the spring term we maintained schools at No. 4, No. 6, and No. 5 with the following teachers: Miss Katherine Madden, Mrs. Georgia Fleming, Miss June Lobley. Mrs. Fleming and Miss Lobley subsequently taught a summer term at No. 5 and No. 6 respectively. We opened the fall term with Mrs. Fleming at No. 6 and Miss Madden at No. 4. This term of school as was the case nearly everywhere else was very much broken up because of the prevailing epidemic. No. 4 was re-opened Feb. 24th and we plan to begin the school on the Ridge on the 7th of April.

I should like to have seen Supt. Tibbetts' suggestion of a centralized school at the corner of the road at Libby's carried out. I think the idea deserves your consideration. But I am not so sure that to move the school house at No. 1 to that location would be the thing to do. The three members of the Superintending School Committee went over the matter carefully and examined the old school house and came to the conclusion that the old building would not be what the people would be satisfied with, and that, even though modernized, it

would still be a patchwork affair when completed, and that it would be far the wiser plan, if the towns people want a school at that particular place, to build anew. I am not urging the idea this year as I understand that the proposition failed to get the needed support last year.

Now there was given to the town by the State from the Equalization Fund for the purpose of moving the old school house \$275.00 in 1917. This still remains but we have permission from the State Department to use the amount for sanitary outbuildings, and improved heating arrangements, for which the \$230.00 from the same fund was received last year. That leaves \$505.00 for that special purpose. I would therefore recommend that we make the improvements as required by the State Department. I would ask the town to add to this \$200.00 to take care of the woodshed called for in a special article and other general repairs. These repairs to be made at school houses Nos. 4 and 6. Surely if the State gives over five hundred we can afford to raise two hundred more.

As it is impossible any longer to hire teachers for nine and ten dollars per week (that being almost the price asked for board in some communities) we shall need to make a substantial increase in the common school appropriation. I would recommend nine hundred dollars. It is imperative as we can not afford to get along with poor instruction.

For books and supplies we recommend thirty dollars, and for High School tuition seventy-five dollars.

For financial statement see the report of the selectmen.
