SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Chester:

I submit herewith for your approval my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

The school census taken April 1, 1930, showed a total of 78 persons between the ages of five and twenty-one. As perhaps you know, the state pays three dollars for each person between these ages.

I feel that the schools in your town have made very good progress during the past year. We have two very capable teachers who are sparing no efforts to give to your children a good start upon their educational career. The children have shown greater interest this past year and much has been accomplished. Both teachers are graduates from our state normal schools and have had training beyond that to fit them for the work in hand.

The school in South Chester has a very crowded condition, in some cases three have been compelled to sit in one seat. One can readily see that the problem of discipline is extremely difficult under these conditions. The school in this part of the town has been closed twice on account of scarlet fever during the past year. This has caused some extra expense, as many of the books were destroyed and new ones had to be purchased to take their place. I feel that parents should take it upon themselves to see that their

children are free from any contagious or infectious disease before allowing them to attend school, thereby exposing the other children. If there is any doubt in your mind, it would be better for the child to remain at home until a doctor can be consulted.

During the past year the interiors of both buildings have been varnished which has added much to the cheerfulness and sanitation of the rooms. New slate blackboards have been placed in the North Chester school building so that now we are able to feel that our buildings are as well equipped as any in the state and meet the requirements of standard buildings. The school grounds at South Chester had rocks and gravel hauled in where the wind had blown the sand away from the foundation.

The school committee would appreciate it if more interest was shown on the part of the parents in school matters. It is very seldom that parents visit the schools to see what the teachers are doing for their children. Much better results can be obtained in our schools if the parents would work with the teachers. During the past year there have been very few visitors, and the teachers are inclined to think that the parents have very little interest in the school work. Why not resolve that this coming year you will visit the schools oftener?

We have been informed by the State Commissioner of Education that due to circumstances over which he has no control, the state school fund will be less for the next two years than for the previous years. This is due to the heavy tax which the last Legislature placed upon this fund and made no provision for any increase in the fund. It is estimated that the decrease will amount to approximately 6% of the present amount apportioned this year.

In closing I wish to thank the school committee and parents for their support and coöperation this past year.
