

To Merton M. Day, a Constable in the town of Clifton, County of Penobscot, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Clifton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Town Hall in said town on Monday, the 19th day of March, A. D. 1917, at 9 o'clock in the A. M. to act on the following articles. to wit:

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To act on the report of the selectmen.

Art. 4. To choose a board of selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a constable for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To choose a member of superintending school committee.

Art. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the tax collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 12. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for the improvement of the section of State aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways and bridges. the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 13. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the Provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs on school buildings.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on school fund.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemetery purposes.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for incidental purposes. Art. 22. To see if the citizens of the town of Clifton will vote to assume all liability for the keeping of screen located at the outlet of Park's Pond in the town of Clifton, free from sticks, leaves and all debris, so that same will not become clogged and prevent the free running of the water through the same.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to change the location of the State road as laid out by the selectmen, in 1916, to be built in 1917.

The signers of the petition wish for the road to be laid out in the easterly part of the town, commencing at the foot of Bragg Hill, so called, and continue in a westerly direction and connect with State road built by L. J. Penney in the year 1913.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise a certain sum of money to be set aside from the amount raised for roads and bridges to be used for breaking roads and shoveling snow.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct the treasurer to refuse payment of town orders to persons who are indebted to the town.

The selectmen will be in session at said place of meeting at 8 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
