WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING OF CLIFTON

MARCH 26, 1945

State of Maine

Penobscot, ss.

To Philip L. Bragg, a Constable of the Town of Clifton, in the County of Penobscot, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Clifton, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Clifton Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the twenty-sixth day of March, A. D. 1945 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, treasurer, colletcor, superintendent of schools, road commissioner, clerk and other town officers.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art 5. To see what wages the town will vote to pay its officials, also for labor and equipment.

- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to hold some portion of each man's wages as received from the town to be applied on his taxes until said taxes are paid.
- Art. 7. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk or laboratory use.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate interest on school fund as required by law.
- Art. 9. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of the poor.
- Art. 10. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for board and care of neglected children.
- Art. 11. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.
- Art. 12. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town roads and bridges.
- Art. 13. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting bushes.
- Art. 14. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of state aid highway.

- Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of third class highway.
- Art. 16. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal, and designate what roads shall be plowed.
- Art. 17. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways, and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.
- Art. 18. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for miscellaneous town charges.
- Art. 19. To see what sum, it any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town officers.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16.00 for public health nursing, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 21. To see if the town for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1945 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1945 will authorize and direct the town treasurer, subject to the approval of the selectmen, to borrow from time to time, during said municipal year, a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate, the sum of three thousand dollars. and

to make, execute and deliver the negotiable note or notes of the town therefore, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said town treasurer and selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.

- Art. 22. To see what abatement the town will agree shall be made to those who voluntarily pay their 1945 taxes to the collector or treasurer, and the time when such taxes must be paid to obtain the abatement.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 24. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair of schoolhouses.
- Art. 26. To act upon any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named hall and place of meeting on

Monday, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon until the polls are closed.

March 21, 1945.
