# TOWN WARRANT

March 22, 1948

State of Maine

Penobscot,ss:

To Philip L. Bragg, a Constable of the Town of Clifton in the County of Penobscot, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Clifton, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs. to meet at Clifton Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1948, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner, Clerk and other Town officers.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what wages the town will vote to pay its officials, also for labor and equipment.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hold some portion of each

man's wages as received from the town to be applied on his taxes until said taxes are paid.

- Art. 7. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary and secondary schools including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor, service, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk or laboratory use.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate interest on school fund as required by law.
- Art. 9. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of the poor.
- Art. 10. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Board and Care of Neglected Children.
- Art. 11. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Cemeteries.
- Art. 12. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town roads and bridges.
- Art. 13. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of State Aid Highway.
- Art. 14. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal, and designate what roads shall be plowed.
- Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Section 25 and 29, Chap. 20 Revised Statutes of 1944, as amended.

- Art. 16. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Miscellaneous Town Charges.
- Art. 17. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Town Officers.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16.00 for Public Health Nursing. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 19. To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said Town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1948 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1948 will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time, during said municipal year, sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of three thousand dollars, and to make, execute and deliver the negotiable, note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of the money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.
- Art. 20. To see what abatement the town will agree shall be made to those who voluntarily pay their 1948 taxes to the Collector or Treasurer, and the time when such taxes must be paid to obtain the abatement.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

- Art. 22. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Dollars to be paid the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will accept from the Administrator of the John Sabine estate the sum of not over \$50.00 to be held in trust for the perpetual care of the John Sabine lot in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to sell the snow plow.
- Art. 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a sander.
- Art. 26. To act upon any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the above named Town hall the place of meeting on Monday the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters, from 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon until the polls are closed.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Clifton:

I am pleased to present herewith the annual report for the Clifton School Department.

During the year the following teachers were employed:

The town was fortunate this fall to find a teacher who has been very much interested in the welfare and success of children and who could qualify for a teaching certificate. Mr. Morse, in addition to carrying on his school work, has completed a correspondence course given by the University of Maine and finds that the extra work done has helped him considerably in his teaching. Indirectly, this work is a benefit to our boys and girls. The Roosevelt School which the Committee felt would take care of school needs for the

year has grown from a fall term enrollment of 19 pupils to a winter term enrollment of 26 pupils with all grades represented. If the present trend in school population continues, I would recommend that the Harold Allen School be ropened for the fall term.

Consideration should be given toward improving the interior of the Roosevelt School. Painting, window shades and storage cupboards are badly needed. Painting and proper window shades would do much toward improving the lighting conditions. No amount for this has been recommended in the common school budget because repairs and building improvement rest wholly with the town and I have the feeling that the citizens will make a fair appropriation for this work.

In the early part of September 1947, Merle S. Goodwin who was Superintendent of Schools for School Union No. 89, of which Clifton was a part, resigned to take a larger superintendency. On the recommendation of the Committee on Regrouping of Towns for School Unions, Union 89 was dissolved and school affairs in each of the towns were placed under the direction of an agent of the Commissioner of Education. The law provides that such an agent has the same duties and responsibilities as a superintendent of schools. There is no change in the duties and responsibilities of the town or of the superintending school committee. School administration and supervision handled just as though Clifton were a member of a school union employing its own superintendent.

I take this occasion to announce the appointment of Mr. C. Everett Page of Bangor, as local school agent. Mr. Page will take over on a part time basis much of the work which I have been attempting to do. In view of his training and experience in the field of elementary education and his record as superintendent of schools, I feel that the town of Clifton is fortunate in having his services.

In the financial report for the year just closed, I would point out that the year closed with a considerable balance because sufficient funds were raised in the 1947 meeting to provide for operation of two schools. In view of the large school enrollment of this spring, I would recommend that a like amount be raised for 1948-49 as suggested in the proposed school budget. It has been necessary to provide a larger amount for high school tuition because of the advance in charges and to provide for payment of several fall term bills which were not received in time to be included in the 1947-48 business. The amount budgeted for this purpose should be sufficient.

I would also point out that the amounts recommended in the 1948-49 budget are minimums which are based on present costs of operation. There is no guarantee, with the present changing price structure, that these minimums will be sufficient. The estimates of income are based on continued distribution of state funds at rates in use during the past year.

I wish to thank the school committee, town officers, teachers and all others who have helped to provide a school opportunity for the boys and girls of Clifton during the past year.

# **AUDITOR'S REPORT**

March 17, 1948

The Board of Selectmen Clifton Maine

#### Gentlemen:

In accordance with your request, we have audited the accounts of the town of Clifton, Maine, for the year ending March 8, 1948. As part of our audit, we examined and tested the accounts and records of the town and reviewed the accounting methods in operation; we did not perform a detailed audit of all transactions. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included all procedures which we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We herewith present our report, based upon our examination, together with the following exhibits:

- Exhibit A Comparative Balance Sheet as at March 8, 1948 and March 15, 1947
- Exhibit B Reconciliation of Treasurer's Cash Receipts and Disbursements in the General Fund For the Year Ended March 8, 1948
- Exhibit C Analysis of 1947 Tax Valuation, Assessment, Commitment and Collection
- Exhibit D Statement of Transactions in Departmental Accounts For the Year Ended March 8, 1948
- Exhibit E Analysis of Change in Surplus For the Year Ended March 8, 1948

#### BALANCE SHEET COMMENTS

#### GENERAL FUND

Cash on deposit, in the general fund, has been reconciled with certificate furnished by the Merchants National Bank of Bangor, Maine. Cash on hand, totaling \$1,663.05, has been confirmed as being deposited on March 13, 1948.

The assessment of 1947 taxes has been proved and compared to the list as committed to the collector. Partial verification, by correspondence, of the outstanding balances is in process.

Tax liens were not available for examination. We did, however, determine that a lien recorded at the Penobscot Registry of Deeds, and not discharged, corresponds to the outstanding balance; costs have been added to and become a part of this balance.

There were no recorded changes in tax acquired property accounts.

The accounts receivable constitutes the unrefunded expenditures for supplies furnished to an unsettled pauper case.

The status of town funds invested will remain unchanged as long as the present provision for electric service continues in effect.

In the absence of records made available for employee funds withheld, the outstanding balance was determined to be for State employees retirement withheld subequent to January 1, 1948 and was not due and payable at yearend closing. Receipts issued by the treasurer for amounts withheld were found to be in the correct amount.

The amount due to trust funds is the recorded amount of the ministerial and school fund used by the town.

The total surplus increased by \$575.72. The liabilities for unexpended departmental accounts decreased from \$1,182.33 at the beginning of the year to \$394.73 at year-end closing. The net deficit of \$13.87 as of March 15, 1947

has changed to a surplus of \$1,349.45 at March 8, 1948. Analysis of these changes is shown in detail on Exhibits D and E.

#### TRUST FUNDS

Trust fund resources, in the form of time deposits, have been confirmed by certificate furnished by the depository bank. As above stated the ministerial and school fund is due from the general funds of the town.

Trust fund balances, consisting of expendable income and principal have been reconciled with transactions in each individual trusteeship. There were no recorded expenditures by the town for the perpetual care of cemetery lots.

#### DEPARTMENTAL OPERATION COMMENTS

We did not make a detailed audit of all departmental transactions; we did, however, make a test comparison of treasurer's checks issued with supporting invoices and warrants issued for expenditures. All important items were carefully analyzed. We completely footed cash receipt records and reconciled the results, in detail, with the treasurer's account and verified the appropriation levies together with all other records of the town clerk pertaining to the annual town meeting.

Unexpended balances were greater than the overdrafts by \$862.05. The cost for snow removal was less than usual and the reimbursement from the State of Maine apparently larger. The snow removal season is computed by the State as of May 15th each year; the basis for reimbursement therefore, does not correspond to fiscal year expenditures by the town. Another substantial unexpended balance was for board and care; according to custom appropriations have been levied on the basis of two payments each year based on excluding charges incurred for the six months period ended on December 31. The relief, for the town's share of this cost, provided by the 1947 Laws of Maine, has caused the outstanding obligation to be the

accrued cost from July 1, 1947 to August 13, 1947. Due to anticipated appropriation at the next annual meeting, this accrued liability is not shown as a part of your balance sheet.

In addition to education, balances forward are for overdrafts in highway construction; recovery in full should be received from 1948 State allotment for special resolve construction and the State's portion of State aid construction will be available in future allotments upon request by the town.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

Excise tax receipts numbered 43 through 65 inclusive for 1947, and numbered 1 through 44 inclusive for 1948 have been added, and the total found to be in agreement with the receipts issued by the treasurer. Collections were credited to the surplus account.

General analysis of all accounts reveals careful control of expenditures.

Accounting methods and procedures were found to conform with generally accepted standards for municipal accounting and the records and accounts were well kept.

#### CERTIFICATE

Based upon our examination, and subject to the foregoing, we hereby certify that, in our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet, statement of surplus, and statement of departmental income and expenses properly present the financial condition of the town as of March 8, 1948, and the results of operations for the year ended that date, in conformity with the principals of municipal fund accounting.
