Grant Proposal to support "War, the Economy, and the University"

This is the first application to the Cultural Affairs Committee from Marxist and Socialist Studies. The interdisciplinary minor has sponsored for many years a Luncheon Series of speakers and panels, and some of those speakers were on campus for other events sponsored by Cultural Affairs. The event to be supported is a half-day conference on February 21, 2004 on the theme of war, the economy and the University. It is partly intended to provide some alternative perspectives to those likely to be presented in the conference of the College of Business, Public Policy and Health on Doing Business in Iraq, tentatively rescheduled for March 2004. It will address the relationship between the war in Iraq and the U.S. and world economy, and the role of the University with respect to military intervention and the economy. Even if that conference is not rescheduled for the Spring, the issues addressed will continue to be of general public interest.

The conference will consist of a keynote speaker, Phyllis Bennis, from the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, D.C., a workshop on War and the Economy, conducted by Mike Prokosch, from United for a Fair Economy, Boston, Mass., and a panel discussion including Prokosch, Joe Gerson of New England American Friends Service Committee, and Chellie Pingree, Director of Maine Common Cause. More information on the speakers and the workshop is provided below.

The expected audience includes faculty, students, and Maine citizens interested in the issues. We expect participants to travel from as far away as Portland and Presque Isle for such a conference, based on interest in the issue of University involvement in doing business in Iraq in Fall 2003, and the quality of the program and presenters.

The conference will be co-sponsored by the Peace and Justice Center of Eastern Maine, which will provide refreshments and publicity, organizing help, and will collect donations at the door to cover some of the expenses. Because the precise attendance and the amount to be collected are somewhat uncertain, we are asking for a grant to cover a little over half the cost of the conference. However, if Cultural Affairs is unable to provide more than half the cost of the conference, we hope to make up the difference by seeking donations from other possible sponsors. Not included in either the conference costs, or in income, are the many hours of organizing time devoted to this by members of the co-sponsoring organization. If this were to be factored into the budget, the amount requested from Cultural Affairs would be less than half of the total budget.

Speakers

1. Phyllis Bennis

is a Fellow at the Institute for Policy Studies on the topic of New Internationalism: The Middle East & United Nations Affairs

CURRENT WORK: The Middle East project focuses on supporting a just and comprehensive peace based on an end to Israeli occupation and changing the U.S. role in the Middle East peace process. It is also involved in challenging U.S. policy towards the continuing humanitarian and disarmament crises in Iraq. The United Nations project analyzes U.S. domination of the UN and examines the potential role of the UN at the center of a new internationalism. Since September

11, 2001, the New Internationalism Project has also been involved in assessing the root causes of, and critiquing Bush administration responses to, that tragedy.

BACKGROUND: IPS fellow Phyllis Bennis is also a fellow of the Transnational Institute in Amsterdam. She has been a writer, analyst and activist on Middle East issues, especially Israel-Palestine, for 25 years. Based at the United Nations, she began working on U.S. domination of the UN at the time of the run-up to the Gulf War, and has stayed involved in work on Iraq sanctions, disarmament and U.S. policy towards Iraq. In 1999 Phyllis accompanied a group of congressional aides to Iraq to examine the impact of U.S.-led economic sanctions on the humanitarian conditions there, and joined former UN Assistant Secretary General Denis Halliday, who resigned his position as Humanitarian Coordinator in Iraq to protest the impact of sanctions, for a speaking tour. In 2001 she helped found and currently co-chairs the U.S. Campaign to End Israeli Occupation (www.endtheoccupation.org).

The goal of the AFSC New England Region's Peace and Economic Security Program is to contribute to the development of popular movements and political consciousness that can transform U.S. foreign, military and economic policies from maintaining the privilege of the U.S. and other elites to policies based on Common Security and respect for the dignity of each person. The program works to: demilitarize the diplomacy of the Asia-Pacific region; prevent nuclear war and achieve nuclear weapons abolition; create a more peaceful and just Middle East; create greater economic justice and security.

4. Chellie Pingree

is the President of Maine Common Cause, which includes among its issues the role of corporations after the invasion of Iraq. She has authored an article entitled, "Too Much at Stake for Lax Oversight," concerning the \$87 billion spending bill authorized by Congress for expenditures in Iraq, and has testified before Congress on the issue.
