Hello friends, and Happy Pride Month to our LGBTQIA2S+ friends and neighbors!

This Pride, we celebrate the beautifully diverse and resilient queer community, both here in Orono and around the world. We honor the black trans women who paved the way for us at the first Pride, and we center their experiences and needs now as we continue the fight for justice.

It can be easy to get swept up in the fanfare, bright colors, and loud statements of support many will issue this week, but I ask you to join me in demanding real action and a commitment to change at all levels of society. [The Equality Act](#), which would enshrine anti-discrimination protections for LGBTQIA2S+ folks into federal law, has yet to be passed in Washington. Trans folks, most of whom are Black trans women, continue to face disproportionate levels of harassment, discrimination, and violence, and their murders continue to go unreported, uninvestigated, or misrepresented. Queer youth continue to be at much higher risk of mental health struggles, substance abuse, and suicide. We continue to debate queer rights as a matter of religious freedom, as though one's beliefs or religion should exempt them from treating our queer neighbors with respect and dignity. There is much work to be done, and changing your profile picture or buying an Ally shirt at Target will do nothing to move us forward.

If you are LGBTQIA2S+, I ask that you please do what you can to celebrate this month in whatever way you feel most affirmed, safe, and supported. Existing as

queer and trans people can often feel like a full-time job of its own, and you deserve to enjoy a month where you may feel a greater sense of community and support. If you're not ready to come out, we hold space for you too, and know that you are just as much a treasured member of our community and JUST as valid in your identity.

For those of you who are not part of the community but want to be supportive this month, I ask you first and foremost to listen. The LGBTQIA2S+ leaders in your community are always sharing ways that folks can walk the walk and be an ally to us. Donate your time or money if you are able. I've listed some organizations doing this work below, and Twitter can be a great place to find queer and trans folks seeking financial support if you would prefer to give directly to somebody in need. Remember that while Pride month centers LGBTQIA2S+ folks, we are also a broadly diverse community that includes people of color, disabled folks, marginalized religious identities, and folks of many other minoritized experiences. Pride does not fulfill its mission if it is not inclusive and accessible to ALL queer folks, and your work should reflect that too. Support marginalized folks year-round and across the board, not just the communities that you are most familiar with and only during their respective heritage or celebratory months.

Happy Pride to all, near or far, out or closeted, and of all identities. You are valid, precious, and important members of this community, and we love you.



Trans Lifeline is a grassroots hotline and microgrants 501(c)(3) non-profit organization offering direct emotional and financial support to trans people in crisis – for the trans community, by the trans community.

[Rainbow Railroad](#) is a global not-for-profit organization that helps LGBTQI+ people facing persecution based on their sexual orientation, gender identity and sex characteristics. In a time when there are more displaced people than ever before, LGBTQI+ people are uniquely vulnerable due to systemic, state-enabled homophobia and transphobia. These factors either displace them in their own country or prevent them from escaping harm.

Stonewall Forever is a documentary from NYC's LGBT Community Center directed by Ro Haber. The film brings together voices from over 50 years of the LGBTQ rights movement to explore queer activism before, during and after the Stonewall Riots. The history of the Stonewall Riots is equally as cherished as it is charged. There are questions of who was there, who “threw the first brick” and who can claim Stonewall.

This film doesn't answer these questions but instead it aims to expand the story of Stonewall by including more voices in its telling. Stonewall Forever brings together queer activists, experienced and new, to look at the movement for LGBTQ equality before, during and after Stonewall. It highlights trans people, people of color and homeless people who were at the forefront of the movement, and who have often been erased from the narrative. It explores how the activism of today stands on the shoulders of the activists who have come before. And it asks us all to recognize the legacy of Stonewall that remains today, when the struggle for queer rights is far from over.

Stonewall Forever was directed by Ro Haber and created by a predominantly queer and trans cast and crew who are proud to be a part of preserving this legacy.
