The holidays were dampened this season with the tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut. Our prayers continue to be with the residents of Newtown, and all the members of the community who lost a loved one.

I know as you receive this newsletter, you will have completed your annual club reports and submitted them to Mary Libby and me, and will have made a copy for your own records. As I write this article, I can tell you I am very excited to read what wonderful and creative things you have done in your communities! It will be a pleasure to submit GFWC Maine's report to our Headquarters in Washington,

D.C., and let them know what this great group of women in the northeast are doing for our citizens! I am so hopeful I will see many narratives with your reports. While narratives are not imperative, they do greatly improve our chances of winning an award in our category when we are in Hollywood, Florida attending the GFWC Annual Convention in late June and early July 2013.

Through the end of December, I can say it has been an honor to visit eight clubs throughout Maine. I am scheduled to visit the GFWC Outlook Club in Hartland on January 3rd, the Livermore Falls Women's Club on January 24th, the Waldoboro Woman's Club on March 12th and the GFWC Gorham Woman's Club on March 14th. Thank you to all the clubs who have issued an invitation to me. What a joy to meet the women of the clubs I don't generally see at our Conferences or Conventions. It is always a pleasure to see the many friends in those Clubs I have had the opportunity to bond with at our GFWC events over our many years together!

It was an honor to attend the GFWC Board of Director's Meeting in Alexandria, Virginia in late November and early December. It is always wonderful to renew old friendships and make new ones from across the country. November 29th was a day for Board members to participate in a volunteer service activity. I chose to attend a lovely older home in Alexandria called, "The Friends of Guest House". This is a 501(c 3) organization that offers structure, supervision, support, and assistance to non-violent female ex-offenders seeking to improve their lives and break the cycle of incarceration. A typical Guest House resident is a young adult who has been convicted of a non-violent crime and has suffered physical, emotional, and/or sexual abuse. There were approximately forty of us who volunteered our services to work on multiple activities with the residents, including decorating the Christmas tree inside the home, hanging wreaths and garlands on the outside, cooking and decorating holiday cookies, and writing letters of hope and caring to more than 100 young women who are still incarcerated with

little or no family contact. It was truly an inspirational experience spending time with these young women at “The Friends of Guest House”.

While attending the GFWC Board Meeting, many members went to GFWC Headquarters in Washington, D.C. on Saturday, December 1st, and enjoyed a wonderful buffet breakfast while touring our historic building including the “GFWC Marketplace”, and the archival area of the Women’s History and Resource Center. Our GFWC Headquarters was beautifully decorated for the holidays in Victorian motif with our Maine ornament hanging from the tree. Minnie McCormick of the GFWC Miosac Club designed this lovely piece for the tree.

As difficult as this is to believe, the next edition of the Pine Tree Notes will contain the “Call to Spring Convention”! As a “heads up”, the GFWC Maine Spring Convention will be held at the Merry Manor Inn in South Portland on May 9th and 10th with the Executive Committee meeting on Wednesday, May 8th prior to the start of Convention. It will be an exciting time ladies, one you won’t want to miss! Mark the dates on your calendar to attend!!

Thank you to all of those who have embraced and supported the President’s Special Project, “Newborns in Need”. The donated items of baby clothing, fabrics and materials, essential care products, handmade afghans and blankets that have been received, is fantastic! The need is

great, and your continued support will be very much appreciated by the families who receive these beautiful items for their precious little babies! As in all things, “Together We Can Make a Difference”! A new chapter of “Newborns in Need” has been chartered in the Dover-Foxcroft area called, “Newborns in Need, Piscataquis County, Maine Chapter”. Congratulations to the area GFWC clubwomen and surrounding community citizens for getting this chapter up and running!

I recently saw a bumper sticker.
