Being that a 50th anniversary comes only once (usually at the end of the first fifty years) it is, of course, fitting that the biggest affair in Rho Rho's history should be planned for the celebration of this greatest event. There are over five hundred men who were involved in making Rho Rho what it is today. Although the charter members will be guests of honor, this is a celebration for all of us five hundred plus. The present actives feel honored that we have the privilege of making the elaborate plans; we realize that the privilege falls to us only because we happened to be here at Rho Rho when the first fifty years ended. We will wager that you would like to be right back here taking part in the planning; second best, of course, is your suggestions which we will gladly accept. As for attending the celebration itself, please make your plans early so that you can fit them into your busy schedule. (Everybody is busy nowadays.)

Brother Bill Feeney (see page 22) is chairman of the 50th anniversary committee which includes active and alumni elements (Bob Patten, '48, and Bernie Prescott, '47, for the alumni; Dick Dow, Bob Bruns, and Dick Schurman for the actives). The committee has been meeting every week since the first of the year and plans are shaping up rapidly.

The actual anniversary date,

April 19, fortunately falls on a week-end, thus the big banquet and dance will be held Saturday night, April 19.

The basic outline for the weekend has been arranged by the committee and goes like this: late Friday afternoon (April 18) registration will begin at the chapter house. A buffet supper for everyone will be available at the house and later Friday night there will be an informal smoker with all the trimmings. Late Saturday morning registration will continue at the house and Saturday afternoon the actives will present a pageant-extravaganza covering fifty years of highlights at Rho Rho beginning with a mock founding. At 5:30 Saturday evening transportation will be available (for those who need it) at the house and our attention will shift to Lucerne-in-Maine. a few miles out of Bangor on the Bar Harbor road. A banquet with lobster in the starring role will start the evening (with a top-notch bunch of speakers) and a dance will follow. We feel that a good omen blessed our plans when we were successful in reserving Lucerne-in-Maine for our banquet and dance. There lies the surroundings and elements ideally fitting for such an auspicious occasion.

Sam Bullock and John Neal Campbell are being contacted as are many, many other notables. From the university we hope to have President Arthur A. Hauck, Dean of Men John Stewart, Director of Publicity Howard Keyo, and Alumni Secretary Don Taverner.

We will keep you posted on the progress and additions to our plans. When six Sigma Chi's get together every week with a special objective in mind, the development is certain to be big (using BIG with its old-fashioned meaning, of course).

BACK IN '02

Once upon a time (1891 as a matter of fact) a small group of University of Maine students got together and formed a club, the Delta Rho by name. The fellows used to meet every week in a room (in a house) in Old Town, eight miles from the university. group was a popular one and soon expanded to a larger group and thus needed a larger room or rooms. As further expansion developed the need for a building became acute.

Within ten years of its founding the Delta Rho club had grown to such proportions and strength that its members entertained ideas of joining a larger group, perhaps even a national fraternity. months of discussion, the members of Delta Rho petitioned Sigma Chi fraternity and expressed an ardent desire to become a chapter of Sigma Chi. General Benjamin Piatt Runkle was at that time head of the military department here at the university. Being one of the seven original founders of Sigma Chi fraternity, General Runkle took great interest in the development and proceedings of the Delta Rho club when he found that they were interested in joining Sigma Chi.

Early in 1902 the club bought a house (top photo, next page) which was located across the road from the Elms (now a girls' dorm) near the Orono Bridge.

After much investigation and a sizeable assist from General Runkle the Delta Rho club was accepted by Sigma Chi fraternity on the 19th of April, 1902 and thus the Rho Rho chapter of Sigma Chi was born.

Our best source for what went on during these memorable days comes from 1902 edition of The Sigma Chi Quarterly. General Runkle wrote a complete, enthusi-

astic account of the installation of Rho Rho, and Thomas Leary as the first Associate Editor of Rho Rho covered it from the initiates' point of view. Both articles were in the Quarterly. In his article General Runkle gave the whole proceedings a complete coverage. He listed the twenty-nine charter members who were initiated. Included in this list were Percival Mosher (see page 18) and John Huddilston (see dedication). (There are eleven of our charter members still living.) General Runkle described the first initiation at Rho Rho to some length, and with tongue-in-cheek, we suspect, he quoted from a Bangor newspaper's account of the initiation. We requote it here.

large number of students came to Bangor during the afternoon and were registered at the Bangor House on Saturday night. The preliminaries of the initiation were conducted in the square and the initiates, entwined attired in wrappers and female paraphernalia of gorgeous design and pattern, executed walks and quadrilles to the delight of an army of small boys and a liberal contingent of Bangor people who assembled to watch the fun."

From Brother Leary's article to the Quarterly we learn that Rho Rho was the second fraternity at the University of Maine to own a house and that the new members just about dominated campus activities, everything from football to the student newspaper, The Camups (we suspect that this was a misprint in Brother Leary's article instead of a variation of the spelling of Campus, the name by which the present student newspaper is known).

Rho Rho's first meeting was held on April 21, 1902, with the chapter not yet moved into the house. The first meeting in the house was on

May 5 of that year.

AND INTO RHO RHO CAME TWENTY-EIGHT MO . . .

December 9, 1951, can be marked down on our Rho Rho calendar of all-time highlights in great, big letters. That was the Formal Initiation day for twenty-eight new Sigma Chis, probably the largest class of initiates that we have ever had here at Rho Rho. The customary banquet was held following the final ceremony and an impressive group it was. More than eighty Sigma Chis were there. A light snow drifting down outside seem to add to the already friendly, informal atmosphere inside.

After a tasty lobster dinner we were treated to a fine program of speakers including Paddy Huddilston, Bob Patton, Bernard Prescott, Bill Feeney, Parker Cushman, Dick Dolloff, Dick Dow, and Jim Horsfal, who had been the president of the pledges. Jim reviewed the pledges' progress from the day of their formal pledging right down to the banquet that night.

On March 8 the large group of prospective Sigma Chis were formally pledged, Jim reminded us. And then for the rest of the spring the pledges eased into their orientation period, getting to know the members better, attending weekly pledge meetings at the house, and, of course, attending an occasional party.

Last fall the pledges moved into the house and pledge training gained momentum rapidly. Magister Bob Bruns started putting them through the paces of the revised training program* which built continuously until Indoctrination Week.

Jim pointed out the three social highlights which impressed him most, (1) the Pledge Party where the pledges did everything, including the entertainment, (2) the big, happy Homecoming where the pledges had a chance to meet some of the Brothers they had met in the spring and a lot more whom they had never met before, (3) and Hell Week which perhaps is stretching the word, "social," to its very limits.

Jim concluded his banquet talk with a tribute to Brother Bruns for a good job done on a big job. All agreed that a large group of fine young men had been started on the right way.

. . . Rho Rho has two Senior Skulls (Carl Wight and Dick Dow) and three Sophomore Owls (Bob Wallace, Lew Clark, and Bob Erickson) . . . our parties are really 'live' affairs. At the Pledge Party the door-prizes were real white rabbits . . . when Bill Fogler and Earl Williams graduated last spring, we lost our two number one decorators for parties. The decorations for the first couple of parties this fall left, shall we say, something to be desired. But not for long were we in this fix. To our rescue came Shirley Clark, Brother Arthur's lovely wife. Shirley is a real 'sharpy' with the paint brush and is now doing the fancy work for party decorations and real fancy they are, as anyone who attended our Christmas Party will testify. The rest of the Sigma Chi Wives Club assist . . . and it was this same Wives Club which assisted Mrs. Pray in making a new Sigma Chi flag for out in front of the house. The officials of Bangor and Brewer have agreed on the site for the new Bangor-Brewer bridge. It will be about a quarter of a mile down the river from the present one.

REJUVENATION

I-lammers and saws and paint brushes and other kinds of constructive instruments have been worn right down to their handles here at Rho Rho in the last vear or two as a real effort has been made to give the house a "brand-new" look. If you have not been back for a few years. you would not recognize the old trunk room down stairs. After a series of progressive steps in the past few vears in which the room has survived such titles as The Passion Pit, The Rec. Room, The Study Room (a real misnomer), etc., it is now proudly referred to as our new Desert Room. A new knotty pine settee with a bright red upholstered seat has been created at the north end of the room by Brothers Duhamel, Shute, and Cobb. And the pledges last spring under the direction of Chet Duhamel built two knee-high tables to match the settee. Bill Fogler took over from there and painted a continuous desert scene around the walls. A lovely deer head (painted sky-blue pink) sets off the green floor. Our kitchen has been rejuvenated by the addition of a new stove. Al Ames, our cook, babied the other one along until it suffered the inevitable fate of Holmes' Old One Horse Shav. The kitchen is also due for a restocking of chinaware. The order is in . . . the living room has lost that tired look since Brother Dow got the upholstery re-done . . . and Dave Cunningham did a bang-up job on putting our radio combination back into operation . . . which all goes as further evidence that we have a house-full of mighty ingenious brothers.

And January brings more than snow; it also brings the indoor track season. Maine opened its season with an impressive win over Bates last week-end and many a Sigma Chi played an important part. Dick Dow and Carlton MacLean, tie-babies of the cross country team this fall (they finished in a hand-in-hand tie for first place in five consecutive meets), got off to a good start last week-end. They tied for first in the two-mile run. Dow is a Senior who holds the state outdoor two-mile record and the Maine state record in cross country. 

cept Dolan are Sophomores; Fred is a Junior.

On Maine's State and New England Championship golf team, we have the men who hold down number one and number two spots, namely, Connie Bosworth and George Shute. George has been elected captain of the golf team this year. . . . And we have a couple of other captains: Pres Johnson is captain of spring track and Carlton MacLean has been chosen to lead the cross country team next year.

Carl Wight is our big wheel on the baseball squad. An outfielder, Carl was shifted to first base and it did not seem to slow down his big stick at all. Two years ago Carl led the State and Yankee Conference in hitting. . . . Dick Smith is a comer on the varsity basketball team.

In a couple of weeks the highly competitive Intramural Track Meet will be held and Sigma Chi will be the team to watch. 

Our Rho Rho campaign to our Alumni of last summer and early fall (THIS IS THE YEAR OF YEARS TO COME HOME—IT'S OUR 50TH) reaped its first harvest on November 9 when the first few of what proved to be a tremendous gang showed up. Of course, the fact that this week-end was Homecoming might have had something to do with the good turnout. A bang-up week-end followed.

A tremendous football rally Friday night in the Memorial Gym was climaxed by a huge bonfire (outside the gym). Later that afternoon an alumni meeting was held at the house with Bob Patton, Orono Alumni Association president, in command. There was a good turnout.

Well, knowing what happens after an ordinary football victory, you can imagine what happened after this sweetest of sweet ones. It was Wednesday of the next week before some of our Alumni left. We hated to see them go. It was the first time back in as many as 20 years for some of the Sigs.



president.



His has been the first area to reach its quota in both campaigns. In his spare time he serves as vice-president in charge of operations of the Kleistone Rubber Company of Warren, Rhode Island. Brother Myron C. Peabody was recently elected president of the Federal Land Bank and the three other units which make up the Farm Credit Administration of Springfield, Mass. These four credit units serve agriculture throughout the Northeast.
