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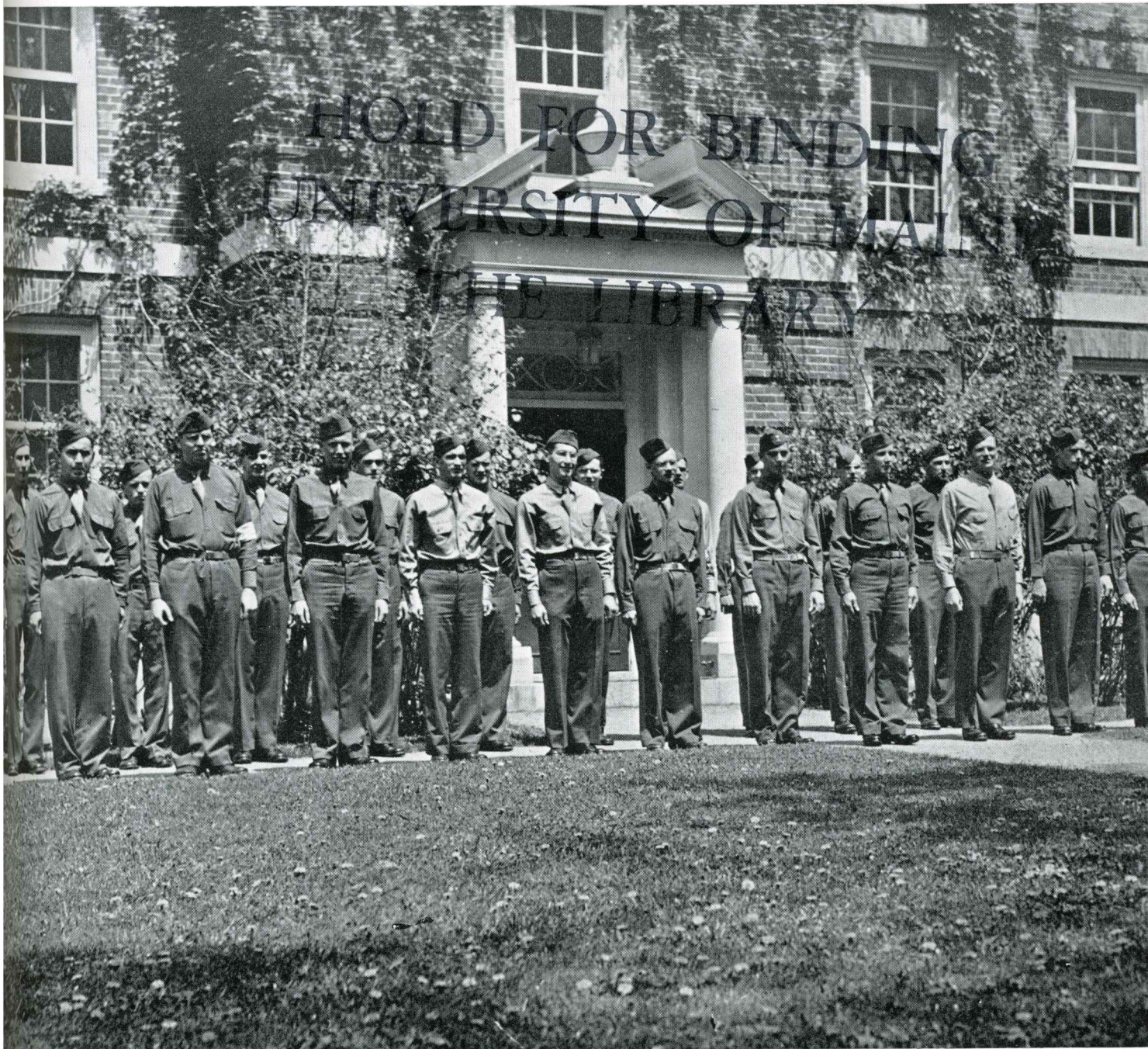

Army Specialized Training Program



UNIFORMED students march to classes in Stevens, Aubert, and Rogers Halls and the Alumni Memorial Gymnasium. Martial feet tread the campus roads. Military drill and intensive physical education condition the soldiers for their future tasks. Students of the A.S.T.P. have arrived at the University. For the University this new student body brings a responsibility and an opportunity.

OUR responsibility is that of helping to perfect these soldiers for the great task of victory. The lecture periods and laboratory hours they will attend here will help to supply the nation's Army with men trained for leadership. And leadership remains always the one greatest need of the fighting forces.

A.S.T.P. also brings to the University the opportunity to make available to the Government its buildings and equipment and to make use of the skills of faculty members. The presence of the A.S.T.P. soldiers gives to everyone on the campus the privilege of serving the Nation directly through contact with these members of the Army of the United States.

THIS responsibility and this opportunity the University gladly accepts. To accomplish the purpose of the Army program without diminishing the educational program for our regular students will require the utmost effort and cooperation of all. To this task, as our contribution to victory, the University of Maine pledges itself.

On Sunday, May 23, at the 73rd Commencement of the University, 319 degrees were awarded to graduating men and women of the Class of 1943, six Master's Degrees were presented, and honorary degrees were given to six leaders in military science, industry, agriculture, education, and literature, two of them alumni. Recipients of the honorary degrees were: Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair, commanding all Army ground forces; Dr. Stephen Duggan, Director of the Institute of International Education, who gave the Commencement Address; Esther Forbes, author and historian, whose recent volume *Paul Revere and the World He Lived In* was awarded a Pulitzer prize; William S. Newell, president of the Bath Iron Works; Raymond D. Douglass '15, professor of Mathematics, and director of war training at Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Harold Shaw '14, owner and manager of Shaw's Ridge Farm, Sanford, a leading dairy farmer and outstanding agriculturist in the state.

The Program

The traditional Commencement program was this year telescoped into a two-day program. On Saturday Class Day and Alumni Day programs were presented. With official reunion gatherings suspended by vote of the reunion classes until after the war, no attempt was made to arrange formal class activities except for the fifty-year group of 1893. Details of the business and events of Alumni Day are given on a following page.

DEGREES to 319 At COMMENCEMENT

The Class Day program, given in Alumni Hall on Saturday afternoon, featured Richard Pierce of Gardiner as valedictorian for the seniors. Other speakers for the program were John Cullman of Norway, Oration, Bertis Pratt of Caribou, History, Frances Nelson of Portland, Ode, Robert Worrick of Wellesley, Mass., Poem. For the Class Prophecy Frances Donovan of Houlton and Donald Taverner of Augusta joined forces. The Class Gifts were presented by Dorothy Ouellette of Madison and Carleton Goodchild of Saco. Wendell Stickney of Brownville led the class in prayer.

The Rev. G. Ernest Lynch of Portland gave the Baccalaureate sermon on Sunday morning. Speaking on "Your Heritage of Faith" he urged the seniors to appreciate their heritage of freedom from earlier generations of Maine men. "It is a gift," he said, "that can only be partially willed

you from the past for by its very nature it must be won and re-won by each generation."

He described the benefits handed on to present generations from the early settlers of the state, men of "honest simplicity, respecting the powers of truth, appreciating the companionship and community of like minded fellow men. They saw the truth that an individual life can never reach its highest meaning alone. As they came together in common cause they found the mysterious added strength of unity which is more than the sum total of all its parts."

Dr. Stephen Duggan of New York addressed the seniors and their guests at the Commencement Exercises, speaking on the making of the post war world. Advocating an armistice "of four or five years," he urged at once an educational campaign for the solution of post war problems. He

SUMMER on the CAMPUS

THE first unit of Army Specialized Training soldiers for study in Basic work at the University arrived on May 25. This original group of about 20 men was subsequently supplemented by other units arriving periodically until the total reached the figure of 345 when instruction first began on June 14. To date all soldiers assigned to Maine have been those for Basic work, corresponding to the freshman work in college, and will study to prepare themselves for further advanced training in engineering and other technical fields. The University has also been approved for advanced classes in engineering and premedical work, but to date no men have been assigned in these fields.

Command

The regular ROTC officers of the University are acting as the command unit of the new-comers with Colonel Ben Stafford, Infantry, Professor of Military Science and Tactics as Commandant. Assisting him are officers in the headquarters unit: Major Herbert S. Ingraham, C.A.C., Executive Officer, First Lieutenant Carlton Payson '41 Infantry, Adjutant, in the Rifle Company unit, Captain Pierre Purcelle, Signal Corps, Commanding, First Lieutenant Samuel Tracy '41 Infantry, Executive and Instructor, Second Lieutenant Lawrence H. Connevey, Signal Corps, Mess and Supply Officer.

The soldier-scholars are being housed in Oak and Hannibal Hamlin halls which by judicious doubling up of accommodations provides sufficient room for the present.

Courses for the Army men will be on the college level and will make use of college texts. All of the men assigned are certified by Army selection as qualified for college instruction, many indeed have attended college or even been graduated in other than technical fields. Because of

this disparity in background the men divide into two groups for curricula purposes, those taking BE I, the first phase of the work, and others in the somewhat more advanced program of BE II. In addition there will be a number of men selected to study in the communications field for later specialization in wire and wireless communication.

Courses in BE I include algebra and trigonometry for mathematics, college chemistry, mechanics in physics, English, geography, and American history. Similar courses, but on a more advanced level will be taken by the men in BE II with the substitution of analytical geometry in mathematics and sound, heat, and light in physics. The communications men will specialize in electricity in physics.

Regular faculty members in each department involved will give the instruction to the new men. Academic requirements will be equal to the regular University standard. Men will have a full schedule of studies and classes with a minimum of time for social affairs and sports, but a regular physical conditioning program is being planned by Stan Wallace and social events will be arranged for and with the Army men to the limit of their time.

Until the beginning of regular University classes on June 14 the men were kept busy with marches, fatigue work, and getting acquainted with their new environment. On Monday morning, however, the lusty voices of non-coms sounded across the campus and the tramp of ordered, marching feet disturbed the historic echoes of the past as the khaki-clad students of a new page in history filed into the class rooms to sit before the dispensers of knowledge and wisdom. In this unspectacular way history was made at the University.

The Summer Term

On June 4 the University opened the first summer Freshman Week in its history with the registration of 77 newly arrived men and women, signing up for the 1943 summer term of fifteen weeks, the second official summer term under the wartime accelerated program. With the arrival of upperclassmen on June 7, and some late-registering freshmen, the total figure for the term stood at 353. Regis-

tration by classes was: Seniors 112, Juniors 67, Sophomores 65, Freshmen 95, there were 240 men and 113 women.

Following the trend of the times, with uniformed Army students housed in Oak and Hannibal Hamlin, freshman men were housed in Balentine Hall, traditional stronghold of coeducation. Women students for the summer term occupy Estabrooke, and Colvin is being reserved for the opening of the regular Summer Session in July. Upperclass men are living in several of the fraternity houses. In some cases members of two or more fraternities have joined forces to create a single unit large enough to make possible the operation of one house. Other houses, at least for the summer, look out upon the campus with blank windows and locked doors.

Freshmen

The entering men and women are members, officially, of the Class of 1947, though few if any expect under present conditions to graduate in that year. Among them are 84 men and 11 women, 7 of the latter registered in the College of Technology, starting out confidently on a career in engineering.

Among the group are 16 sons and daughters of Maine alumni. The complete list of the sons and daughters accompanies their picture on another page.

In regard to Freshman Rules, the Senior Skulls have announced that because of the unusual circumstances of the day special arrangements will be made. To date the only rules to be enforced are those preserving the Maine "Hello" and not walking on the campus lawns.

In this way the University opened its doors to the students on June 7 for the second annual summer term. It could be said that this summer, for administration, faculty, and students alike, the one certainty ahead is uncertainty. What the months will bring in the way of opportunities for service and problems for solution, no one dared to prophesy. The summer season of 1943 gives ample promise, however, of being not only as busy a summer as the University has known for many a year, but likewise an interesting and historic period.

ALUMNI DAY

WAR conditions restricted alumni registration for the 1943 Alumni Day to 141 alumni and alumnae, and by vote of reunion classes regular class reunions were postponed for the duration. Nevertheless for those who were able to return for the program the day offered a chance for relaxation and enjoyment heightened by the renewal of old friendships.

The one exception to the postponement of reunions was that of the Fifty-year Class, 1893, who counted five members for their Golden Reunion, including the surprise visit of Walter W. Crosby from Coronado, California, who easily took the title this year as farthest traveller for the program. Other members of '93 who were able to be present as the guests of the Association and the University were: Charles F. French of Bangor, Charles C. Murphy of Rangley, George F. Rowe of Bangor, and Harry M. Smith of Bangor.

Luncheon

At the Alumni Luncheon, held this year in Estabrooke Hall at noon, 157 alumni, faculty, and friends were present to see the official honoring of the members of 1893. President George D. Bearce presented each with a certificate of "graduation" on the Fiftieth Anniversary and welcomed them into the ranks of the Senior Alumni. Also honored at the Alumni Luncheon were five faculty members who this year completed twenty-five years of service at the University. The five honor guests were: Dean Roy M. Peterson, Dean of Graduate Study and Head of Romance Languages; Prof. Benjamin Kent '12, Head of Mechanical Drawing; Prof. Herbert S. Hill, Head of Agricultural Education; Prof. Albert A. Whitmore '06, Professor of History and Government; and Prof. Arthur S. Hill, Professor of Electrical Engineering. To them also Alumni President Bearce paid tribute in recognition of their long services to Maine.

Business of the Day

The annual meeting of the Alumni Council on Friday evening, May 21, was followed Saturday morning by the annual meeting of the Alumni Association. Highlighting the meeting was election of Walter H. Burke '06 of New York City as new President of the Alumni Association, succeeding George D. Bearce who this year completes three years as president.

To serve with Mr. Burke as officers of the Association the following were re-

elected: vice president Robert Thurrell '15, clerk George Lord '24, treasurer Winthrop Libby '32. Also re-elected were three Alumni Council Members-at-Large to serve until 1946: Fred D. Knight '09, Alton Littlefield '21, Clifton Chandler '13. As provided by amendments to the Association By-Laws, also passed at the meeting, three new members-at-large were elected to the Council for three-year terms. New members are George D. Bearce '11, retiring president, Dean Gertrude Peabody '20 of Philadelphia, and Miss Jessie Fraser '31 of Bangor. Clifford Patch '11 of Bangor was re-elected alumni member to the Athletic Board and Thomas Weeks '16 to succeed himself as Law-School Alumnus on the Council.

The matter of Association elections was closed by a unanimous vote of appreciation for the services of Mr. Bearce during his three years of leadership as President.

Other Association business matters taken up at the Council meeting and the General Alumni Association annual meeting were as below:

Amendments: Proposed amendments to the By-Laws, tabled at last year's meeting as provided by law, were passed. They provided (1) for appointment of a nominating committee not later than March 15, instead of at the annual meeting of the Council as previously provided for, thus giving more time for nomination of officers and Council members; (2) enlargement of the Council from thirteen to sixteen members at large and provision to give a more balanced representation to alumnae by making the number of women in the Council bear the same ratio to the membership of the Council as that of alumnae to the entire alumni body; (3) election by each class prior to graduation of a secretary and such other officers as the class may desire, instead of just a secretary as in the past; (4) amendment of the By-Laws providing that notice of amendment shall have been submitted to a previous meeting of the Association or have been printed in the official alumni publication at least a month prior to the date of the annual meeting, the latter clause replacing the former requirement that notice must have been sent to all alumni at least one month prior to the annual meeting.

Library Fund: 92% of \$251,891.36 subscribed has already been paid, with many pledges yet to come due, it was reported by Chairman Fogler, an outstanding record of payments. Expenditures for campaign and collections have been \$17,982, unusually small for a campaign of such size. Already \$125,000 has been paid to the University and over \$90,000 is on de-

posit in Maine banks. A resolution in memory of and tribute to Norman H. Mayo '09 was read and unanimously approved, commemorating his work in the campaign and his general leadership in alumni and University activities.

Commemorative Plates: F. Drummond Freese reported nearly all blue and green plates sold, for a total to date of over 3,300 plates. The Council authorized the Committee to purchase 50 dozen more plates.

Memorial Fund: Chairman Arthur Deering reported payments of \$3,671.21 in the past year, more than in any previous year in a decade. A continued campaign to secure payments aims to retire the obligation to the University. During the year \$3,500 was paid on the notes, reducing the balance to \$8,500 from the original amount, in 1933, of \$23,000. Cost of collections during the year was \$499.21.

Appointments: Donald F. McGary '27 of Bangor will succeed himself for a four-year term as alumni stockholder in University Store Corporation. John H. Mahoney '27 of Worcester, formerly with *Worcester Telegram*, now executive secretary of Worcester Taxpayers' Association, was named for a five-year term on the Alumnus Advisory Board. For terms on the Endowment and Donations committee, Marcus L. Urann '97, President of Cranberry Canners, Inc., and Treasurer of United Cape Cod Cranberry Co.,

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U. of M. Foundation Holds Annual Meeting

Stephen Wheatland of Bangor and Brookline, Mass., was re-elected president of the University of Maine Foundation at the annual meeting of the corporation which was held during Commencement. Treasurer Ralph Whittier '02 reported total assets of \$39,091, an increase of over \$3,000 during the last year.

Hazen H. Ayer of Boston, F. Drummond Freese of Bangor, and Thomas N. Weeks of Waterville were elected active members for a five-year term.

The directors for the ensuing year are Mr. Wheatland, Curtis M. Hutchins, Otto Nelson, Harold M. Pierce, and Harold P. Marsh, all of Bangor.

There are a total of fifteen active members. Others in addition to those already named above are: Dr. Arthur A. Hauck, Orono; Raymond H. Fogler, New York; Marcus L. Urann, South Hanson, Mass.; Harry E. Sutton, Boston; George T. Carlisle, Bangor; George S. Williams, Augusta; and Frank W. Hussey, Presque Isle.

The Foundation was organized in 1934 through the activity of the Endowment and Donations Committee.

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and Raymond H. Fogler '15, President of W. T. Grant Company, were named.

Alumni Activities Fund: Eight classes gave \$995.75 this year to the Fund, the largest amount contributed in any one year; the gift of 1898, \$430.00, surpassed all previous gifts made by any class at a reunion; 1915 added this year \$264.50 to previous gifts to the Fund to lead in total contributions with a figure of \$600.00. These gifts bring the total of the Fund to \$7,688.44. The response this year was especially gratifying since most classes postponed formal reunion activities.

Alumni Banquet

Climax of the day's events was the annual Alumni Banquet at Memorial Gymnasium. Alumni, faculty, guests, and members of the senior class made an enthusiastic and colorful audience of more than 600 for the Banquet program which featured guest speakers and musical numbers. Chief speaker for the Banquet was Naval Captain Herbert K. Fenn '11, Chief U. S. Cable Censor, Office of Censorship, Washington. Captain Fenn, one of the highest ranking Maine men in the naval service, paid tribute to the spirit of

Maine men in the war and praised the war effort and the fighting effectiveness of the services. With him on the Banquet program were President Hauck, who spoke in welcome to the alumni and guests, and Alumni President George Bearce, presiding at his last Alumni Banquet as president of the Association. Senior J. Carleton Goodchild, acting class president in the absence of Class President Talbot Crane of Orono, on active duty with the armed services, responded for the Class of 1943 and presented a gift of \$1,000 to the University. Toastmaster was Albert W. Wunderly '18 of Arlington, Mass., assistant district attorney for Middlesex County. Second Officer Cora Sharon '38 of the WAAC had expected to represent the women on the program but last minute military duties compelled her to telegraph regrets.

Service Emblem

The presentation of this year's Alumni Service Emblem was made by President Bearce. In an announcement which came as a pleasant surprise to the audience which responded enthusiastically, the recipient for this year was named as Alumni Secretary Charles E. Crossland '17. In selecting Secretary Crossland for the honor the committee paid due recognition to his successful leadership of the alumni association since 1928, and President Bearce in presenting the Emblem certificate cited him for "services beyond the call of duty."

In a surprise announcement Class President R. H. Fogler presented \$564 for 1915 to the University as a supplementary gift to the fund established by the class in 1940, raising the total to \$3,200.

Toastmaster Wunderly paid tribute in an effective ceremony to the Maine men and women in the armed forces. During the program a musical interlude was furnished by accordion duets played by Wendell Stickney and Waldo Bunham, members of the senior class. The Class of 1908 Attendance Cup, only one to be awarded this year because of reunion postponement, was won by the Class of 1885 with two out of three living members present, for a percentage of 66 2/3%.

PRESIDENT

Newly elected General Alumni President Walter H. Burke '06 is known by engineers and public utilities men for his leadership in Ebasco Services, subsidiary of Electric Bond and Share of New York, and to alumni for his long interest in alumni affairs.

He is a native of Lyman and a graduate of Thornton Academy. As a student at the University he received letters in football and basketball and was active in musical work. He was graduated with the Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering.

Since undergraduate days he has worked for General Electric Company, Stone & Webster, and Electric Bond and Share. While with Stone & Webster he held responsible positions in the Middle West and South West and earned a name and

reputation in the utilities management field with them and later with Electric Bond and Share. He has served as president of Minnesota Power and Light Company, vice president and general manager of Superior Water, Light, and Power, vice president and director of Topeka Land Company, Great Northern Power Company, and Pike Rapids Power Company.

He has been associated with Electric Bond and Share since 1929, especially through the Ebasco Services organization of which he is vice president.

He has served as a member of the alumni council representing the College of Technology and has been an active member of local alumni associations. As president he takes over the leadership of the alumni organization from retiring president George D. Bearce '11 who has completed three terms.



FOREMOST in all of our thinking, planning, and work during the past year has been our effort to maintain a continuous contact with alumni and undergraduates who are in the Services. As described later in the report, many means have been used to let the men in the camps and battlefields know that our thoughts are constantly with them.

Second to the service program has been the continuation of the Library Fund, Memorial Fund, and membership activities. The gratifying payments on Library Fund subscriptions make it not only the most successful of all of our campaigns, but also indicate that it may become one of the most successful of such campaigns conducted on a pledge basis. The paid membership of the Association is the greatest in the history of the organization which, in the light of the fact that so many of our men are in the Services, may well give us some satisfaction.

Local Associations

The increasing difficulty of transportation, the greater amount of overtime work which so many persons must perform, together with the continuation of Civilian Defense responsibility, have made the work of local associations extremely difficult, if not quite ineffective in some areas.

The reports which have come to the office indicate that about 45 meetings were held with an approximate attendance of 1,100 alumni and friends during the past year. This is the smallest number reported in recent years.

After the war it is going to be necessary to put a considerable amount of time into reorganization and direction of local associations.

The Alumnus

More pages of feature story material in this year's issue of *The Alumnus* were devoted to military material than to any other subject. This fact points out the inevitable trend of the magazine this year. Stories of the University, of alumni, and of the individual colleges were usually devoted to some phase of the war effort. Exceptions to this subject field were stories on University registration, Mid-year Commencement, three alumni foresters, 1892 football, alumni in the State legislature, and other miscellaneous items. It is a reasonable question whether or not too much emphasis on war materials may have been included this year.

Not too much difficulty has been encountered in maintaining publication in spite of war problems. A decrease in advertising from 30.08 pages last year to 26.52 pages this year reveals, of course, a slight falling off of income and has again necessitated careful husbanding of resources in such expenditures as half-tone cuts and special make-up work. This situation is likely to continue if not

to grow more severe for the duration of the war. It is to be hoped that your editors have been able to maintain an interesting and attractive magazine in spite of these handicaps.

Worthy of note is the fact that seven of our feature stories this year have been written in whole or in part by other than your editors which adds to the variety of the material. Two stories based on material supplied by Army fliers and one written by an Army chaplain have been used this year and have helped us to tell the story of what Maine men are doing in the war.

A regular feature has, of course, been the military list which each month has carried the names of alumni newly added to the list of men and women in Service. A sadder task, related to this, has been the recording in the necrology of men lost in Service. Pictures, as well as biographical material, have been used on these men whenever possible.

Alumni Directory

The summer of 1942 was devoted largely to the typing of new master cards for the Directory. This involved the making of some 12,000 cards and transferring a large amount of data or records from one card to another. The making of the cards and recording of address information was completed but the posting of the data could not be finished during the

summer. It is hoped to finish this phase of the work this year. These cards are now kept in the fire-proof container, so that we are protected against loss of our basic file in case of fire. In addition to the regular alphabetical, geographical, and class directory, we have also maintained a separate Service Directory this year that is discussed under another heading.

Alumni Homecoming

The twelfth annual alumni homecoming was held October 31. The two features of this homecoming were the unfurling of a Service Flag in honor of the Maine men in this world war; and, second, the entertaining of the members of the first varsity football team of 1892 as guests of honor.

Contacting Maine Men in the Service

The number of men in Service has grown rapidly during the past twelve months, the recent official total being 1,832. Eighteen of our men have given their lives. Presumably, at the proper time we shall wish to have some memorial to these men.

The number of men and particularly the rapidity with which they have been moving around has required an extra

Alumni Trustee Report

The developments and activities summarized in this annual report for the year ending in May, 1943, will direct attention to the many obstacles which the Administrative Departments of your University have been forced to encounter.

There have been, however, encouraging factors during the year's operation. For instance, our 1942-1943 freshman class was the largest in the history of the University with an enrollment of 653. This freshman registration was approximately 35% of the total University registration of 1870. Of this total enrollment figure at the beginning of the Fall semester about five hundred were girls. At present the enrollment for the University is approximately thirteen hundred. In spite of the fact that we have lost about 600 boys during the present year to our armed forces and to war work, the University has been able to function quite normally.

Along with a declining student body throughout the year, the Faculty membership has been reduced by approximately twenty-five members. Our Faculty members who have left the University are enlisted in the armed forces or are connected with war work. Such a depletion in the teaching force has brought about many problems for the academic administrative heads. Yet with a reduced faculty the University has carried on full courses in the curriculum and in addition has inaugurated special war training courses in Ordnance, U. S. Army Signal Corps instruction and courses in welding. It would be most fitting at this time to express an appreciation to Dean Cloke and his associates in the College of Technology for the fine work accomplished in cooperation in this war effort. The University has trained over 200 students for the Signal Corps and over 300 men and women in Ordnance work. We are happy to report splendid results from the efforts put into their war training.

President Hauck and the Board of Trustees wish to mention with high praise the spirit of cooperation demonstrated by Faculty members in aiding to maintain our academic standards during such abnormal conditions. May I add that we are happy to mention the deserved credit which is due to Dr. Roy M. Peterson, Prof. Albert A. Whitmore, Prof. Herbert S. Hill, Prof. A. S. Hill, and Prof. Benjamin C. Kent for their twenty-five years of faithful service to their University.

We, as Trustees, and you, as Alumni, were greatly pleased to learn of the honors bestowed upon our President when Rhode Island State College and the University of New Brunswick conferred honorary degrees upon him and made mention of him as a great educator.

After thirty years of distinguished service to his Alma Mater, Dean Arthur Deering of the College of Agriculture has been made the Directing Co-ordinator of the University's program in agriculture. This new position, along with Dean Deering's other capacities will empower him with supervision over extension research and resident teaching in the field of agriculture at the University. Dean Deering and his associates are deserving of much credit for the splendid program presented at "Farm and Home Week" which was a marked success.

During the year the Trustees approved the inauguration of a Department of Nursing and it is gratifying to relate that the course has been a popular and constructive addition to our curriculum.

Under the able direction of Dr. Roy M. Peterson the regular summer session again offered educators, graduate students and others varied courses to choose from and the session carried a registration of 435. It has been recently announced that the registration day for our regular summer session for this coming summer will be on July 6th and the course will come to a close on August 13th.

The present and future building programs have had to be postponed for the duration. President Hauck and the Trustees are endeavoring, however, to

maintain our physical plant in a satisfactory state of repair and when the War comes to a close it is our pledge to finish the construction of the library, and it is our desire to build a new engineering building to replace the loss by fire of Wingate Hall, and also to erect a new plant science building.

The University has been the fortunate recipient of many small gifts and a few large bequests during the present year. Of the large bequests it might be well to mention the \$50,000.00 outright gift by Mrs. Anne E. Stodder, with an additional \$200,000.00 which will become available upon the termination of a trust fund, the \$50,000.00 from the Estate of Dr. Thomas U. Coe, an additional \$15,000.00 from Judge Dantorth's estate, \$5,000.00 from Calvin H. Nealley and \$1,000.00 from the late George P. Gould.

The financial condition of the University to date is most satisfactory. During the year many adjustments in salaries and wages were made and changes in financial policies had to be executed, yet the University has kept well within its proposed budget for the year 1942-43 notwithstanding a reduced enrollment in our student body.

It is rather unusual to have the terms of three Trustees, who are Alumni of the University, expire in the same year. This happened in the year 1942 and the Trustees mentioned were Raymond W. Davis '11, Edward E. Chase '13, President of the Board, and your Alumni representative Harold M. Pierce '19. The three trustees were re-elected to office, and may I express at this time my appreciation to the Alumni Association for their vote of confidence expressed by their re-electing me to the office of Trustee as their representative.

President Hauck and his Board of Trustees are most anxious to have it known that it is their utmost desire to extend every possible aid to the war effort. It is exceedingly gratifying to announce that nearly 400 young men, enlisted in the Army specialized training unit, are coming to the campus and on June 14th will commence their academic training.

Our University, its President and Board of Trustees are most fortunate in having such a loyal and cooperative Alumni body and it can well be said that this fine Alumni spirit was exemplified by Norman H. Mayo '09 whose great loss we felt by his sudden death on February 6th.

We have 1832 Alumni and former students in the war, and of this number, 18 have died in the service of their country. May we ever be mindful of their sacrifice.

likened the present war and its outcome to other historical attempts by mankind to rise from small social and governmental units to larger ones and stressed the point that race superiority, intolerance, and oppression are characteristics of the totalitarian states while democracy must represent a different conception of life.

Outstanding in general interest among the recipients of honorary degrees this year was Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair, in command of all ground forces of the army. Recently wounded while inspecting troops in North Africa, he had been temporarily incapacitated but recovered in time to attend the Commencement exercises.

General McNair, winner of the D.S.M. in the First World War, has been credited with much of the training and development of the modern army of the United States now proving its worth as a fighting unit on the world's battlefields. Following a period as military professor at Purdue and service in Hawaii, after World War I, General McNair was in 1939 named Commandant of the Command and General Staff School, in 1940 Chief of Staff of General Headquarters, and on March 9, 1942, Commanding General of Army Ground Forces.

Dr. Stephen Duggan of New York is a noted internationalist and teacher. A graduate of New York City College and Columbia, he has been since 1919 director of the Institute of International Education. Previously he taught political science at City College. He has also served, among other positions, as member of the Advisory Board, Division of Cultural Relations of the State Department.

Miss Esther Forbes of Worcester, Mass., is most widely known to the reading public for her recent historical biography on Paul Revere. She is also the author of five other historical works, most of them in the field of fiction but based upon an unrivalled knowledge of Colonial and Revolutionary New England. She attended the University of Wisconsin and for a time worked for Houghton Mifflin Co. in the publishing business. Her first work, *Oh, Genteel Lady* in 1926, was the third selection of the Book of the Month.

President of the Bath Iron Works since 1929, William S. Newell has been associated with the shipbuilding industry since shortly after his graduation from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1899. He began as a ship draftsman at Bath, subsequently working as assistant superintendent, engineer, and engineering works manager. In addition to his position at Bath he is president of the Todd-Bath Iron Shipbuilding Corporation at South Portland.

Dr. Raymond Douglass '15, professor of Mathematics at MIT, has been associated with the Institute since 1919. A native of Gorham, he holds the M.A. from Maine and Ph.D. from MIT. Besides his teaching duties he directs all MIT war training.

Harold Shaw of Sanford is known throughout the state of Maine as a dairy and general farmer. He is a leader in agricultural activities and owns a Holstein dairy herd which this year was rated the best producing herd of its size in the country. After his graduation from the agricultural course in 1914 he served as county agent until 1920, then returned to the home farm at Sanford.

LESLEY JAMES McNAIR, Lieutenant General in the United States Army, native son of Minnesota, distinguished graduate of the U. S. Military Academy whose brilliant achievements in the first world war earned for him the Distinguished Service Medal and the medal of the French Legion of Honor, serving with increasing distinction in the present war, now Commanding General of the Army Ground Forces.

In recognition of your inspiring military leadership and devoted and effective services to your country the Trustees of the University of Maine take pride in conferring upon you the degree of DOCTOR OF LAWS.

STEPHEN DUGGAN, Native of New York, a graduate of the College of the City of New York and Doctor of Philosophy from Columbia University, distinguished teacher, author, and educational administrator, whose influence extends throughout the world, one time professor of political science at his alma mater, since 1919 Director of the Institute of International Education, honored at home and abroad for his constructive undertakings in promoting cultural and

intellectual bonds among the nations of the world, trusted friend and counselor to students and scholars in many lands.

ESTHER FORBES, Born in Westborough, Mass., student at the University of Wisconsin, distinguished writer and biographer, whose skillful interpretation of New England colonial life has preserved for us a wealth of historical material, author of five historical novels and an outstanding biographical history, *Paul Revere and the World He Lived In*, recently awarded the Pulitzer Prize in history.

WILLIAM STARK NEWELL, Born in Albany, N. Y., graduate of MIT, skilled engineer and able executive, whose successful career in the shipbuilding industry began with a position as draftsman at the Bath Iron Works in 1900, rising steadily until he became its president in 1928, and in 1940 president also of the Todd-Bath Iron Shipbuilding Corp., associated with other important industrial undertakings.

In recognition of public-spirited service to state and nation of proved technical ability, and able leadership in an industry which has long been associated with Maine history, the Trustees of the University of Maine are happy to confer upon you the degree of DOCTOR OF ENGINEERING.

RAYMOND DONALD DOUGLASS, Born in Gorham, Maine, a graduate of this University, Doctor of Philosophy from MIT, where for twenty-four years he has been a successful and admired teacher of mathematics and a competent and trusted adviser of students, able educational administrator, whose services as head of war-training programs for MIT and for the Boston area, and as state coordinator of Radio Training Programs for Massachusetts are contributing significantly to our country's war effort.

HAROLD JOSEPH SHAW, Born and reared in Sanford, Maine, loyal alumnus of this University, outstanding citizen and farmer, whose industry and vision have brought him unusual success in an exacting vocation, owner of the Holstein Dairy Herd, rated this year as the highest producing herd of its size in the United States, public-spirited leader who is contributing greatly to the advancement of Agriculture in Maine through service as chairman of the State Milk Control Board and as member of the State Agricultural Conservation Committee, the Farm Bureau and the Maine Development Commission.

The MILITARY LIST

AFTER eighteen months of America's participation in the global conflicts of World War II, University of Maine alumni and alumnae in the fighting services number 2,193. At home and in nearly every foreign land where flags of the United Nations fly, these men and women of Maine are helping to write a new, tremendous chapter of world history. As officers or soldiers or seamen they take their places in the team, working together. In the air, on land, on the surface of the sea and beneath it, each one does his part in the great drive toward victory. The honors and decorations accorded individually to twenty-two of them symbolize the full share each is contributing to the work of the whole. Already the grim costs of war are taking their toll among them: eight alumni walk behind the barbed wires of German or Japanese prison camps, six are listed as missing in action; nearly a score have paid the ultimate, last price for their ideals of freedom and liberty.

Maries from Maine helped to take and hold the Island of Guadalcanal. Alumni in the Navy were among those who fought the ships and flew the planes during the battles of the Coral Sea, Midway Island, and the Bismarck Archipelago. Maine men in the deserts of North Africa fought to victory over the veteran troops of General Rommel. Air crews, taking off in the cold, grey dawns of Britain for battle over the clouds of Europe, sometimes think of the green lawns of the campus in the spring.

Men from the University of Maine fly transports over the terrible mountains of India. They fight the cold and the snow of Alaska and Iceland. In ships at sea they brave the grey, pounding waves of the North Atlantic and the lurking death beneath to carry the goods of war to foreign shores. They lie down to sleep in hundreds of distant, strange places where the very name of Maine is more outlandish than that of Timbuctoo.

Of these men and women, of their individual, heroic deeds and their daily quiet courage, of their work, their fighting, and their sacrifices, we who are associated with the University of Maine are proud.

lark in the office. It has been our policy keep up to date on all addresses so far as it is possible to do so. A special rectory has been maintained by classes list of those who have been recipients of citations and a biographical file for every man in Service are chief phases of our important branch of this work.

The *Alumnus* has been sent to all alumni and undergraduates in Service with the exception of those who are in the Army overseas since Army regulations no longer permit the sending of magazines unless upon instruction of the individual.

We have sent news letters to overseas alumni in place of the *Alumnus*. The *campus* has been sent to members of the classes of 1942 and through to 1946 inclusive who are in Service. The number in recent weeks has been 735. The part which the Association plays is mainly that of doing the addressing and mailing. The *Campus* has given the extra copies and the University Emergency War Chest Fund has paid the postage charges. The Association presented the University with a Service Flag, which was dedicated at Homecoming. President Hauck sent a Christmas letter to all men in Service. The Association also sent a Christmas greeting, including the names of all who then were known to be in the service. Professor Stanley Wallace wrote a two-page letter at our request that was sent to our boys in February.

This year has been one of pleasure vercast with uncertainty and proud sadness. It has been gratifying to see that alumni desire, so far as conditions will possibly permit, to carry on, to "hold the line" until warless days return. It has been more difficult to plan most all phases of our work because of the uncertainties which everyone faces. Great pride has been ours in the glory, heroism, and honors won by our boys. Deep sorrow has come to us in greater measure than usual. To one who has become attached to our fine alumni, their passing, especially the young alumni in war, seems personal, and these losses have taken a heavy toll on the spirit of the day.

To all those who have shared in carrying the load, we of the executive staff are extremely grateful. To President George Bearce and President Arthur Hauck we are particularly indebted for their wise counsel and generous use of their time, and to our genial and very cooperative treasurer we owe an extra large thank you.

In concluding this, my fifteenth year as your Executive Secretary, may I in one sweeping gesture say it has been a joy to serve Maine alumni, the Association, and the University.

Preliminary Report Of the Treasurer

The annual report for the treasurer of the General Alumni Association, estimated for the year ending June 30, 1943, follows. Certain points are especially noteworthy.

First, under items of income, it is very gratifying to note that the response to the Service Fund appeal returned \$1,221.50. This fund is for the purpose of keeping men and women in the armed forces in contact with their University.

The Dues Committee succeeded very well in collecting dues. Total dues of all kinds amounted to \$7,677. Especially interesting is the increase in sustaining dues over the budgeted amount.

The cost for the *Alumnus* of \$2,422 appears low but \$900 from the Service Fund has been allocated to the magazine to defray costs of sending it to the alumni in service.

It is expected that there will be an operating surplus for the year over \$600.

VARSITY BASEBALL

In the last state series game Colby broke the tie in the last of the tenth with a double to the left field for victory at Waterville, on May 5. The starting Maine pitcher was Dick Palmer of Lisbon Falls who was replaced in the 4th inning by senior Gordon Tooley of Orono. Contributing to the Colby victory was a big 6th inning of five runs including a three-run homer by the Colby catcher. Chief hitters for Maine in the close game were Windy Work, a sophomore of Bangor, and John Whitten of Fort Kent who took two singles and a homer with two on in the seventh.

In a double-header at Orono on May 7 the visitors from Rhode Island took both games by good playing combined with some weak fielding by Maine. In the first game Maine out-hit the visitors, getting ten hits but made a number of errors in fielding to give the game away. Alvin McNeilly, a junior from Brookline, Mass., pitched the first game, holding the opponents down to six hits but losing.

In the second game the losing pitcher was Dick Palmer, a junior from Lisbon Falls who also pitched a six-hit game. This time the Maine team was held to four hits.

Gordon Tooley pitched Maine to a victory in the first of a double-header game against Connecticut at Orono on May 8. 4-2, striking out seven men in the seven innings. He held the visitors to four hits and completely dominated the play. The Maine team bunched hits in the fifth inning to score three runs. Hitters were: Presnell, White, Work, Whitten (2), and Donovan.

The second game of the day, the fourth played by the team in two days, saw Palmer starting on the mound with McNeilly relieving him in the fourth inning. The Connecticut pitcher set the remarkable record of fourteen strike-outs in the seven innings. Meanwhile the Maine pitcher allowed only four hits but Maine was unable to tally more than one score while Connecticut was pushing across three.

VARSITY TRACK

New England Meet

Competing with 15 other schools in the annual New England Track Meet at Boston on May 8, Maine took third place. First place winners for Maine were: Senior Bob Dodge of Bangor, Hammer; Phil Hamm of Charleston, Two-mile Run; Red Leclair, High Hurdles. Ahead of Maine in the total were Rhode Island with 34 and New Hampshire with 26½; Maine scored 18½.

National Meet

Three trackmen from Maine qualified by outstanding performances during the season, for participation in the national meet in New York City on May 15. Bob Dodge, Phil Hamm, and Red Leclair each took a second place in his specialty—Hammer, Two-mile Run, and High Hurdles respectively. Their efforts enabled the Maine team to tie for fifth place in the country-wide competition, the best team standing in several years.

ATHLETIC BOARD REPORT

The Annual Report of your Alumni Representatives on the Athletic Board is herewith submitted, in accordance with the usual custom, by the member whose term is expiring with the current year. Alumni members on the Athletic Board at present are Samuel H. Calderwood '33, Thomas M. Hersey '34, Clifford Patch '11.

During the past year war conditions have brought many problems to college athletic programs. Travel restrictions have curtailed team travel and decreased gate receipts. There has been a steady departure of athletes and coaches to the armed services. Student enrollment has fallen off. Equipment has been difficult to obtain. Abandonment of various sports by some of our usual opponents has necessitated schedule rearrangements. Shortened terms and accelerated scholastic programs have curtailed the time available for practice and for contests.

In spite of all difficulties, the Athletic Staff at the University has been able to carry through a remarkably successful program during the past year, and thereby has met the expressed wishes of the Army and Navy that opportunity for physical training and conditioning and for competitive sports, be extended to the greatest possible number of young men.

Maine has been one of the few colleges in the country and the only one in New

England that has maintained through the past year a first-year ineligible policy for varsity teams and has scheduled full programs in all sports for both freshman and varsity squads. This policy has maintained student interest and has resulted in unusually large turnouts for various sports. Awards of numerals at letters during the year totalled 327.

Further decreases in enrollment, the lack of suitable opponents, and the necessity of further budget curtailment, will require the consolidation of the varsity and freshman programs for the coming year. It is planned to carry on all sports as long as possible, but conditions will without doubt, cause further readjustment.

Bill Kenyon served as acting head coach of football during the past season, taking the place of "Eck" Allen now in Navy service. Sam Sezak coached basketball and assisted in football. Phil Jones handled freshman football. Chester Jenkins continued as coach of track. Kenyon and Sezak handled baseball. Ted Curt continued his efficient work as Faculty Manager.

Our Football, Cross Country, Winter Sports, and Basketball teams, all attained second positions in the four corner state championship races. Our Track and Relay teams made excellent records during both the indoor and outdoor seasons, winning the State Championship, third place in the New England Meet, and a tie for fifth place in the Nationals at New York with three individual second place winners. Golf and tennis teams were successful although competition was somewhat curtailed. Freshman teams had 37 contests, winning 27.

Alumni interest and support has been very helpful to our athletic program. The continuance of this program, with necessary modifications as conditions change should definitely help student morale and physical fitness, and hence be a valuable contribution to the all out war effort at the University of Maine.

Captains—

At the close of spring sports four varsity teams elected outstanding players as honorary captains for the sport. In varsity baseball Gordon Tooley '43 of Orono, hard working and successful pitcher, received the distinction.

Outdoor track captain was Phil Hamm '43 of Charleston, veteran two-miler, who was one of three Maine men to place in the national meet at New York.

In Tennis Bert Pratt '43 of Caribou was named honorary captain. Pratt has been a consistent singles winner in his collegiate matches during his entire college career and a natural leader of the tennis squad. Walter Reed of Fort Fairfield, state intercollegiate golf champion, was named captain of the golf squad.

Dues Committee Reports Year's Work

This year the total number of dues payments is the largest in the history of the Alumni Association in spite of the fact that alumni in the armed services were not solicited for dues. Of the budget of 7,995 for dues income, \$7,602 or 94.9% had been raised on the date of the committee report, May 22.

The classification of sustaining dues surpassed the budgeted amount to give the best results for the year. The budget for this item was 130 payments, actually 149 have been received, ten more than were recorded last year.

For alumni in service, a friendly letter was prepared and mailed early in the year explaining the policy of the Association not to solicit dues from them and to make every effort to keep them in contact with the University in spite of this. Actually many have elected to pay dues, 201 of them so far, and this fact reveals a splendid sense of loyalty among these alumni.

During the year 26,656 mailing pieces were sent out as compared to 26,048 mailed last year; these were sent in nine mailings at a cost of 2.4¢ per piece or a collection cost of 29¢ per dues paid.

Returns have been especially heartening from the Service Fund suggestions. In the first six notices of the year the suggestion was added that a small extra amount added to dues would help in sending *The Alumnus* to men in service. From just this small reminder 714 persons have contributed \$1,221.50 for the Fund.

The Dues Honor Roll will be published this year separate from *The Alumnus* because of the decision to include a complete Service Directory in the June issue. It will be compiled and mailed to all dues payers during the summer. In the Honor Roll as it stands at present the leading classes are: 1940-73; 1917-47; 1910-44; 1938-44; 1911-43.

Memorial—

President Hauck on behalf of the University honored eighteen Maine men who have given their lives for their country during a Memorial Service on Sunday, May 16. The service was sponsored by the M.C.A. and the University.

Portland Alumnae have reported a successful year in spite of wartime difficulties, including a successful dance on May 1 at the Portland Country Club. Meetings since the first of the year have included a book-review program, lecture on "Women and the News," and a picnic meeting in May.

President for the year has been Mrs. Freida Weaver Prouty '29 assisted by Miss Kathleen Wormwood '36, Vice President. In charge of the programs was Barbara Johnson '29.

Local Associations

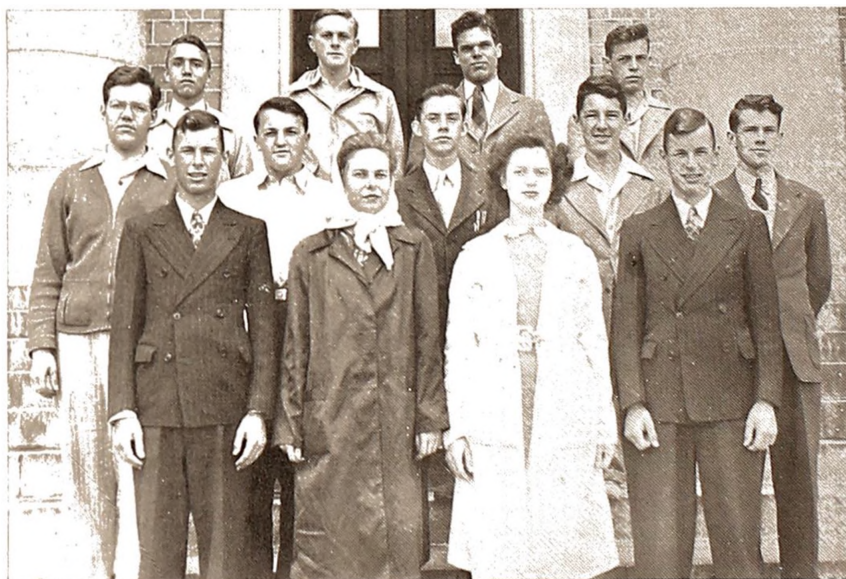

CHARLES BENJAMIN GOULD On April 25 in a Bangor hospital, Charles B. Gould of Orono died following a surgical operation, after a period of impaired health. 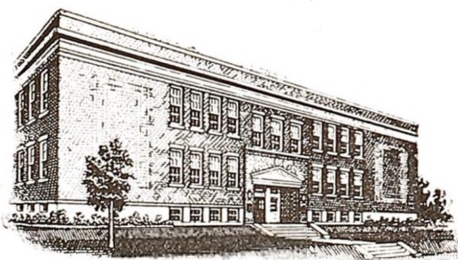
