Belt Tightening for 1971-72

What may happen nationally as a result of President Nixon's economic leadership in no way affects the harsh realities of the 1971-72 budget under which the University of Maine at Orono must operate. It is undoubtedly the most difficult financial situation with which the University has been confronted since the depression years of the '30s.

Certain specific decisions were made by the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor and campus administration to achieve the essential balanced budget under which the University must operate. Here is an abridged checklist of these decisions as related to the University of Maine at Orono:

1. Undergraduate enrollment at the Orono campus for the year starting in September, 1971, was frozen at the 1970-71 level. This means the entering class at Orono will be smaller in the fall of 1971 than a year ago. This is true in spite of a record number of applications for admission.
2. In-state tuition at Orono has been increased by \$100 per year—or an increase of 22 percent—to a new annual level of \$550. Out-of-state student tuition has been moved up \$200 annually from \$1,350 to \$1,550. This is an increase of 15 percent.
3. Recommended salary increases for faculty averaged 2.36 percent as compared to an increase in the cost of living of about six percent. Salary increases were concentrated on those professional staff members with salaries less than \$15,000 annually.
4. Classified employees were recommended for pay increases to move these employees into a more nearly equitable position with State employees doing the same or similar jobs within the State government.
5. Annual board and room charges in campus facilities were increased about seven percent.
6. A freeze was placed on all new programs unless such programs are replacements for less desirable, existing ones.
7. No new positions, either classified or professional, are being approved. In fact, staff has been reduced in several less critical areas.
8. The non-salary portion of the operational budget in every division has been sharply reduced. This was done on a priority basis with the smallest percentage being taken from the teaching programs and the largest from the building maintenance budgets.
9. To help offset the increased costs to individual students a modest increase in student aid funds has been made.
10. Unusual efforts are being made to qualify for and secure funds from private individuals, from foundations and from federal agencies to meet the very critical needs for such things as financial aid to deserving students, for research, and for supplies and equipment.

It is sincerely hoped that parents, citizens, legislators, alumni and students feel that the University has acted in a responsible and thoughtful manner. Many of these hard judgments were made reluctantly and with full recognition that the University of Maine at Orono cannot be allowed to stagnate or it will fail in its mission.

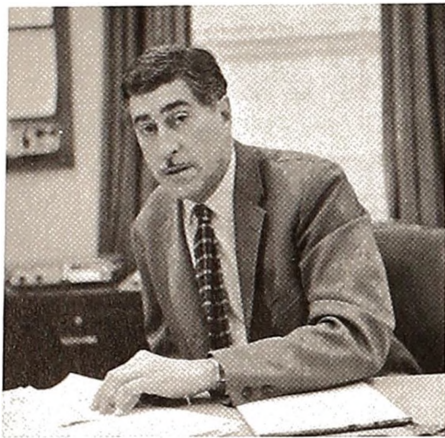

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

A CONVERSATION WITH NEW GAA PRESIDENT ALBERT M. PARKER '28

The goals for the alumni association under a new team of officers were discussed late this summer by Al Parker as he set the theme for his presidency in a conversation with Executive Director Donald M. Stewart '35.

DMS: *Well, Al, you've got the ball for the next couple of years as our new president. Where do we take it from here?*

AMP: Don, I think the most important direction for us now is towards YOUTH. I'd like to see the GAA point just about everything it does in that direction.

DMS: *I'm not surprised at your point of view. You had a lot to do with getting students invited to serve on the Alumni Council for the first time year before last. Where do you think we ought to begin?*

AMP: Well, we've begun, you know. The People to People program was a great success last year. Students helped us out at Homecoming and at Reunion. They really turned out to welcome alumni. You know, I was chairman of the Future Program Committee last year, and that was one of our big points—whatever program we initiate next should zero in on this whole youth emphasis.

DMS: *Are there any specific suggestions at this stage?*

AMP: Yes, there are. I think that in addition to developing our relationship with the young people right on campus—as we have been doing—and giving them the opportunity to be association speakers, for example—I think we need to go out to meet the younger alumni. With so many local association meetings around the country featuring campus speakers of every variety—students, faculty, and administrators—the younger alumni, who may have a more immediate concern about what's going on in Orono, would be interested.

DMS: *A surprising number of younger alumni couples have been at our meetings. I hope we find even more turning out this year. We are planning to give that all our effort this year, because as you say, that was very successful. Something else on your mind?*

AMP: Well, you know the thing works both ways. You and the staff and the faculty and student speakers from Orono are going out to the alumni all over the country. But I'd like to see the alumni get back on campus, too, back in the students' shoes, the way I did last winter in the "Back to School" program that the alumni association conducted. I think we ought to do that again this year and expand it, make it possible for more alumni to get on campus.

DMS: *Say, that gift you've just given to the library of a complete set of the Lawyers Edition of the U.S. Supreme Court Reports, did that have anything to do with your "Back to School" visit?*

AMP: It certainly did. I was much impressed with the Constitutional Law course you sent me to audit. I thought the Supreme Court Reports would be a good thing for the students to have access to where they could use more than one volume at a time.

DMS: *We certainly are indebted to you for such a useful gift. What's your hope for opening up the doors to more alumni in the coming year?*

AMP: Well, one of the things I want to get across to my classmates and all

other alumni is how much the university at Orono needs their help right now. Maine men and women have a great record of giving through the association to this school. I hope they keep it up, especially this year.

DMS: *How do you think alumni can make their interest felt?*

AMP: I know that real interest and concern are sometimes harder to get than money, but I would like to get some constructive ideas flowing in here from the school's friends. I just hope that you can tell alumni that if they bend my ear, I'll listen—I'll really listen and try to work up programs that meet their suggestions. Tell the folks to write. I'll be home waiting for the mail.

Phi Kappa Phi's Homecoming

One spring day more than 75 years ago a young University of Maine undergraduate stood musing over the fact that, even at an institution dedicated to the pursuit of learning, the scholarly student received less praise and attention than the carefree young fraternity man or the star athlete. Although himself the founder and captain of Maine's first football team, Marcus Urann '97 felt strongly that it was the scholar who should be most highly rewarded by his school. Accordingly, he drew up a plan for an academic honor society which would recognize no more than ten highest ranking seniors each year. With the help of President Harris and several interested faculty, the honor society elected its charter members that very June, and Marcus Urann was one of them.

From a small group of students and faculty at the University of Maine, that society has grown to international proportions, with 128 chapters and some 230,000 members, stretching as far away as the University of the Philippines. Through the Phi Kappa Phi Foundation the society each year awards a number of Spark's Fellowships worth \$3,000 and one Gibb's award in the amount of \$1,000. Unlike other honor societies, which recognize outstanding scholarship in particular fields, Phi Kappa Phi welcomes as members highly qualified undergraduates, graduate students and faculty members from all disciplines.

The society has a general convention every three years. This year, from August 15 to 18, some 200 delegates of more than 100 chapters, many accompanied by their families, came from as far away as Puerto Rico and Hawaii to participate in the convention held back home on the Orono campus. Participation of Phi Kappa Phi alumni and faculty at this convention proved that UMO has continued to maintain strong ties with Phi Kappa Phi through the years. Professor Claude Westfall, M.S. '54, organized the convention, working for nearly two years to insure that it would be the best yet, and judging from the comments of the delegates it was. Professor Westfall, who teaches engineering graphics at UMO, is the society's vice president. George Dow '27, M.S. '29, recently retired director of the Agricul-

tural Experiment Station, and a former president of the local Phi Kappa Phi chapter, cut an anniversary cake at the evening banquet. George, his wife, Myrtle (Walker '29), M.S. '31, their daughters Margaret ('55) Ricker and Barbara ('57) Turner and several relatives were all elected to the society while students at UMO.

Among the highlights of the meeting was the presentation of a book, "In Pursuit of Excellence, The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi, 1897-1971," authored by Edward Schriver, M.Ed. '61, assistant professor of history and UMO library archivist. An exhibit of chapter activities, programs, and books authored by Phi Kappa Phi members was featured, and approximately 150 of these books (valued at about \$1,200) were presented to the UMO library.



Bruce Poulton Becomes Vice President

A scientist who chose Maine as a place to live, and who enjoys the best of Maine's outdoors all seasons with his family, would, without even trying, be a natural salesman for the state of Maine. But when that scientist represents the University of Maine, and will be the liaison between the top intellectual resources and the still young development of one of the most promising states in the union, we can be sure that exciting days lie ahead for the university and for the state it serves.

Bruce R. Poulton, a seasoned administrator, became on July 15, 1971, vice president for research and public services at UMO, consolidating in one position the public service vice presidency, formerly held by President Winthrop C. Libby '32, and the research and federal relations directorship. How we bring our questions to the research laboratories of the university, and how we take our findings into the committees where decisions are made, will be his task. In Dr. Poulton's words, with this consolidation the question, "Do you have the data?" can now be addressed to the same person as the question, "Are the decision makers informed?"

The people of Maine are looking to the university in greater numbers for more knowledge and increasing public services. The coordination of the areas of research and public service has been chosen as the most reasonable way for the university to meet these expectations. Among the benefits this new office can provide are the elimination of overlapping in some research and public service activities, a balancing of basic and applied research, and more efficient cooperation with research and public service activities that are going on at other campuses of the University of Maine. Hopefully, a far-reaching benefit for the state as a whole will be a broader involvement of the whole university in public service programs.

According to the newly stated goals for each campus in the state-wide university system, prepared by the Higher Education Planning Commission, the University of Maine at Orono will become the upper division graduate school and research center for the whole university. With this emphasis will come an aggressive program of research development, which will be, as a direct result of the creation of this new office,

always in a coordinative relationship to the public services provided by the university.

Describing the scope of the task, Dr. Poulton said, "Fifteen years ago there were about 200 graduate students here, research was pretty much limited to the agricultural experiment station, and the university was mostly a collection of undergraduate colleges. Now we have a developing graduate school of about 700, with a projection of about twice that many over the next ten years, and a select faculty of 600. With our new orientation we are now asking, "Can UMO address itself to the pursuit of balanced development for the state of Maine?"

The two main raw materials produced in the state are wood fiber and food. Processing both of these can result in large amounts of effluence. We need to attract new industries not on a raw material base. The way for Maine to compete for these industries is to maintain a high priority on its environment and to have a strong research center that can provide new industries with the informational tools they need. UMO is attempting to come of age in this research function. With research becoming one of our primary responsibilities, we can find the information needed by industry to determine whether they can operate in Maine without harming the environment. Through research we can help the state find the kind of development it wants.

One of the long-term objectives of the new vice presidency will be to provide increased opportunity for faculty and staff members to participate in programs of research and public service. Multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches will be encouraged in solving identified problems. Dr. Poulton also hopes to develop, through greater faculty and staff participation, increased institutional support from federal grants for research and public service. This will enable the university to provide research opportunities at a level more comparable to other institutions of our size.

In his new post Dr. Poulton will have administrative responsibility for as widely divergent areas as the Environmental Study Center and the Bureau of Labor Education; the Faculty Summer Research Program and the Department of Industrial Cooperation; the Bureau of Public Administration and the Technology Experiment Station.

What sort of man is Bruce Poulton, who will hold this broad range of responsibility? Two qualities that stand out at first meeting may be more important than they first seem: he is a big

man, and, in students' language, "he hangs loose." His physical size is predictive of a mind that can stretch; and with his looseness he walks in and out of many disciplines and experiences, equally at ease in all. His genial, easy manner belies a sharp eye, that reads facial expressions along with scientific data. His response to a situation is characteristically both scientific and human.

Bruce Poulton, the scientist, has been since 1968 dean of the College of Life Sciences and Agriculture at UMO, having been recommended to that post by his colleagues after a scant year as director of the newly formed University of Maine at Bangor. The academic year 1966-1967 he was an American Council on Education Fellow in Academic Administration at Michigan State University. In 1956 he left Rutgers University, where he had received his B.S. with honors in 1950, his M.S. in 1952, his Ph.D. in 1956, and had risen through the ranks to assistant professor, to become associate professor of animal science at the University of Maine. In 1958 he became full professor and chairman of the department of animal and veterinary sciences. Listed in **Who's Who in America**, **American Men of Science**, and **Who's Who in Higher Education**, he is active in university, state, and regional committees.

Bruce Poulton, the man, walks to work from his home, about a mile from campus. He and his wife, Betty, and their children, Randy, 16, Jeff, 15, Cindy, 9, and Peter, 6, are outdoor enthusiasts. The Poultons used to summer at Sebago Lake and liked Maine so well they chose it as a place to live. When they moved here, they built a camp at Long Pond on Mt. Desert Island, doing all the work themselves. In the winter they ski, snowshoe, and play indoor tennis. In the summer they swim, sail, canoe, and water-ski.

The University of Maine at Orono has been engaged over the past fifteen years in the struggle to grow in size and still maintain the educational quality that the state of Maine needs. Bruce Poulton has lived with the university through this period of rapid growth to the present time, when Maine is asking some crucial questions. "Will new industry move in?" "Will environmental protection be guaranteed?" "Is the state of Maine intelligent enough to develop in a responsible way?"

The key to the answers may be the word "intelligent." For at the heart of the state in its thrust towards growth is its most vital resource, the university.

Albert D. Nutting '27

Forty-eight years of devotion to forestry in the state of Maine, at the University of Maine, and to many state and national organizations does not go unheralded by the alumni of Albert Deane Nutting's university. It all began in 1923 when the resident of Otisfield and graduate of Edward Little High School in Auburn entered the then University of Maine's college of agriculture. It ended officially with the university when he retired this June from the directorship of the School of Forest Resources in which he began. It will not end in practise as he will continue his duties on advisory committees, the management of his own woodlands, and his membership in the state and national forestry organizations.

Many alumni will remember him for different facets of his career. As a student he was interested in intramural sports and later became a member of the athletic board, receiving an honorary "M" in 1966. During his senior year he was the chairman of the interfraternity group, later becoming the president of the alumni advisors. He has been the advisor to Phi Mu Delta since 1931, where he is affectionately known as "Gramp," evidence of confidence in his judgment. Some alumni will recall the 17 years of service as the extension forester for the State, and others, the ten years' role as state forest commissioner. His administrative ability and leadership won

the esteem of his staff in Maine as well as the other 49 state forest commissioners over whom he served a term as president of the Association of State Foresters.

A university and a college bask in the reflected glory of an alumnus who is recognized beyond his own boundaries. Those alumni who live in New England will be proud that Al received the New England Council Award for Outstanding Forester of New England. Alumni beyond New England will be pleased to learn that he was voted a Fellow of the Society of American Foresters, an honor he shares with only four others living in New England. Perhaps his greatest service nationally has been as chairman of the McIntire-Stennis Cooperative Forestry Research Advisory Board. This national legislative program, which he assisted in drafting, provides critical research federal funding to many forest schools in the United States.

An alumnus has written of Al that he fails to become alarmed over trivial things, that he assesses any situation at its true value before he pronounces any opinions. These characteristics and his farsightedness led to his greatest contribution locally, the development of the School of Forest Resources. His talent for organization and his patience in dealing with student and staff have brought about an increase in the faculty and student body. A doctoral program was developed and a two-year technical program was initiated. The forestry camp at Princeton was relocated to a site on the south side of Long Lake. The culmination of his efforts is the forestry building on the Orono campus, appropriately and artistically made of wood, and voted by the trustees to be called Nutting Hall.

One hears behind every successful man is an understanding "helpmate." Leone Dakin Nutting '26, entertains visiting foresters and wives from far and near, at a moment's notice or carefully planned in advance, with products of Al's garden and her own good cooking. The "Forestry Wives Favorites" cookbook which Leone planned and executed because of her wide contacts has gone from coast to coast. The Nuttings have been among the State of Maine's greatest promoters. They are to be congratulated upon the completion of a successful career and extended the best wishes of alumni for an active and happy retirement.

Lyle C. Jenness

The year was 1923. It was a very good year for the University of Maine—for at least one reason. Lyle Clayton Jenness, recently graduated from the University of New Hampshire, arrived at Orono to study for an advanced degree. He received it and stayed on to teach for what was planned to be a few years. The few became many, covering the period 1925-1966.

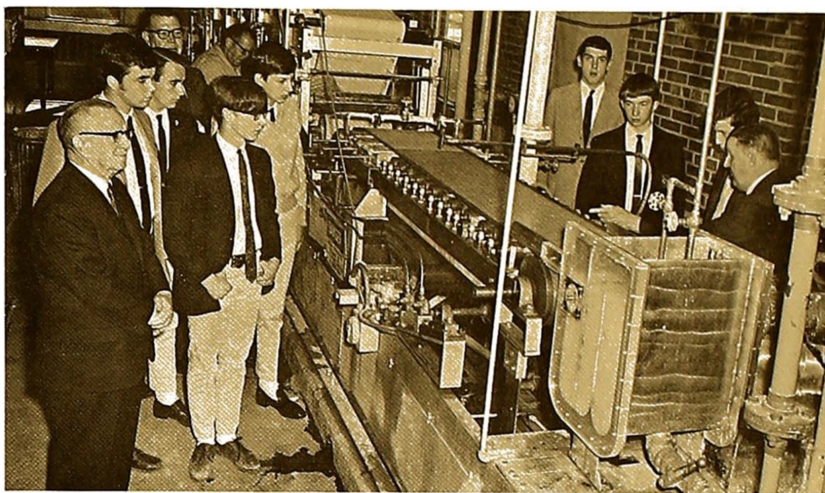
The record of his busy career is well documented. Its milestones in chronological order are master of science degree in 1925, instructor in mathematics 1923-26, instructor in chemistry 1926-29, associate professor of chemistry 1929-35, acting head of the department of chemistry and chemical engineering 1935-47, professor and head of the chemical engineering department 1947-66 and professor emeritus of chemical engineering 1966-.

During these years Professor Jenness somehow found time to do research in his field of chemical engineering, particularly in the problems of the paper industry. In addition to his teaching and department administrative duties, he contributed to scientific and technical knowledge through research, writing, and membership in several technical and honor societies.

As a result of his initiative and leadership the department improved in both quantity and quality. The undergraduate program acquired a dynamic posture in keeping with the changing demands of industry. This program was fully accredited for the first time in 1951 by the American Institute of Chemical Engineers and the Engineers Council for Professional Development.

The pulp and paper technology program, a unit of the chemical engineering department, was revitalized and restructured and attained a reputation for excellence in training students in the technology of a specific process industry.

The University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation consisting mainly of industrial concerns was founded in 1950. Professor Jenness was a charter member and director. Over the years this organization has been an important factor in the growth of the graduate program in chemical engineering and the expansion and improvement of the undergraduate program in both pulp and paper technology and chemical engineering. Also, as a result of the cooperative efforts of this organization and the university, a

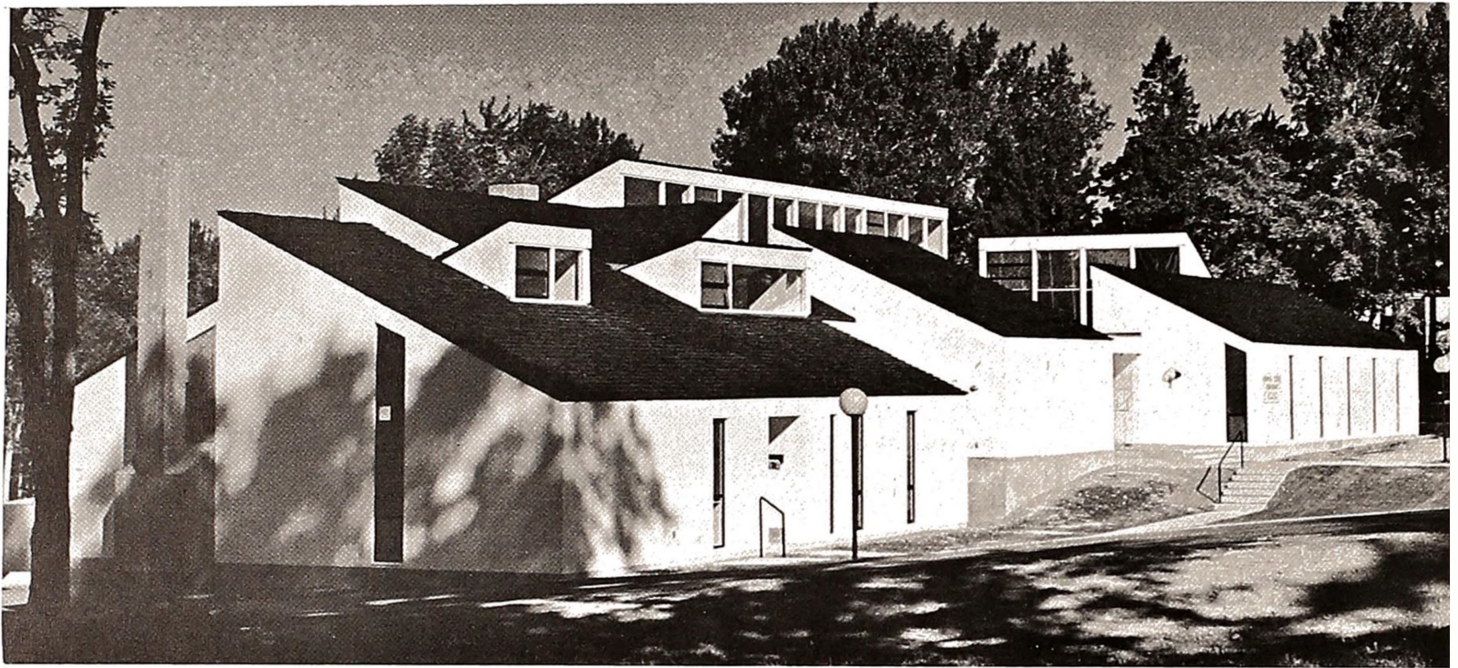
"fifth year" program in pulp and paper mill management was started. Approximately 300 students have graduated from this program. In these cooperative ventures of school and industry Professor Jenness occupied an interface or binding position, for which he was uniquely qualified because of his broad acquaintance with members of industry and his rapport with students.

During the last few years of his chairmanship of the department a doctoral program was established.

Professor Jenness has received many honors in recognition of his good works. From industry and his peers in technical societies he has received important assignments. He has served as a director and member of the executive committee of TAPPI and has been honored as a TAPPI Fellow. He was the first recipient of a named professorship, Louis Calder Professor, in the College of Technology, and one of the first so honored in the University of Maine. The University of New Hampshire has conferred on him an honorary doctor of science degree. Most recently, August 13, 1971, the new chemical engineering building was dedicated Lyle C. Jenness Hall in his honor.

If he were to name the most satisfying accomplishment of his working career, it probably would be the respect and friendship of the students that he has taught and advised and encouraged over the years.

This is in no respect a final report on his career. Since retirement he has continued to serve both industry and education as executive secretary of the University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation. His office is in Jenness Hall, and he can generally be found there, almost as busy as "before retirement."



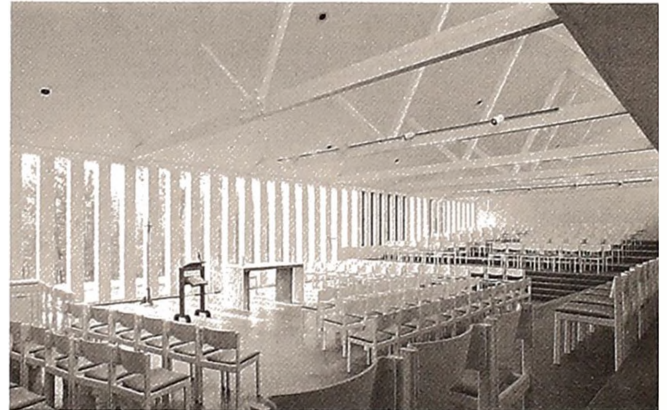
NEWMAN CENTER

"A religious center for the '70s" is an apt description of the recently completed Newman Center at the Orono campus, which will be dedicated on Sunday, October 3, 1971, at 4:00 P.M. Bishop Peter L. Gerety, D.D., Bishop of the Portland Diocese, will officiate. The new building, situated on College Avenue between Alpha Tau Omega and Phi Kappa Sigma fraternities, serves as the Catholic Center at the Orono campus.

An effort was made to erect a building that would expose college students to a different and contemporary type of architecture. The construction is of wood and glass. The extensive use of glass gives one the constant impres-

sion of being outdoors. Rooms in the new building are located around an atrium and include offices for administration, counseling, marriage preparation; a seminar room; library; lecture hall; lounge; and a chapel with a seating capacity of 400. Living quarters for the chaplain are also included in the complex. Color is used effectively in the center; walls, both inside and out, are all white. Roof shingles are black, to accentuate the many angles of the building. Furniture is bright blue, red and yellow. The chapel will be used by the 1,200 students and faculty who attend services every week. It is a multi-purpose room which will also be used for plays, meetings, concerts, and lectures.



The center was built through the generosity of Catholics throughout the state of Maine and the gifts of some alumni and parents. Its facilities will be available to all students. Many religious activities are held on an ecumenical basis and students, regardless of religious belief, will use it for study, informal get-togethers, and meetings.

The new building replaces the log-cabin structure which has served as Newman Center since 1948. Rev. Francis E. LeTourneau served as chaplain for 21 years and was replaced in 1967 by Rev. Robert G. Lavoie. Two Sisters of Notre Dame, Sister Marietta Mahoney and Sister Marie Murphy, are also full-time members of the staff.

EFFECT OF WAGE/PRICE FREEZE ON UMO

According to Vice President for Finance and Administration John Blake, as of September 7, 1971, this was the financial picture for UMO as affected by the Nixon wage/price freeze:

A pay adjustment was paid to many classified employees, effective August 1, 1971. This adjustment was related to jobs held on campus which were the same as or very similar to jobs held by State employees and where the University employee was at a disadvantage. It was the first step in bringing University employee wages in line with State employee wages.

Increases for professional personnel, that is, faculty and non-teaching staff members, have been held up pending clarification of policies which pertain to such categories. It is expected that a determination will be made during the month of September concerning possible increases for professionals.

Board and room charges were approved in December of 1970 and were announced during the spring of 1971 so that the wage/price freeze did not affect board and room charges. Similarly, the announced tuition increases preceded the wage/price freeze policy statement, and semester bills had been sent to incoming students at the announced tuition rates.

No decisions have yet been made concerning the October 1 pay increase

for classified personnel. A series of questions has been supplied to the State Attorney General's office concerning wages and various charges which might be influenced by the current wage/price freeze. When these answers are received, policies concerning future wage increases or possible tuition refunds will be decided by the Board of Trustees in concurrence with policy applications which have national applications.

VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

At their August meeting the Board of Trustees passed this resolution by a vote of 8-5:

"The Board of Trustees of the University of Maine has deemed this an appropriate time in the University's history to review with the Chancellor the performance of his administration during these past two and one-half years. The Board has met both collectively and individually with the Chancellor to discuss frankly and honestly the position of the University in its constant efforts to serve the people of Maine.

"At this time, the Board wishes to express its confidence in the leadership of Donald McNeil as Chancellor of the University and pledges to work with him and other members of the University community toward an educational institution of greater and greater service to the society which has created it."

ETV GOES PUBLIC

What began as ETV back in 1961 is now known as the Maine Public Broadcasting Network, in keeping with the legislation passed by the 105th legislature last spring.

The ETV network took the first major step in this direction last year when it introduced the radio station WMEH-FM. With more money now available from national programming, the network will be able to provide programs of more general appeal, though the emphasis is still educational. October 1 was the date of the name change, with a new look for radio, TV, and contract film.

AUGUST COMMENCEMENT

Dr. Carroll R. McGary '49, Maine Commissioner of Education, speaking at the 143rd commencement exercises of UMO on August 20, advocated "some agency to insure cooperative planning, to insure that the state's total educational needs are met by maintaining both a strong public and a strong private sector."

Dr. McGary also defended the current University of Maine system, saying the present system whereby the

trustees make a single budget presentation to the Legislature for all of the campuses is far superior to the days when "each campus of the university and each campus of the state colleges had to wheel and deal with the Legislature in order to obtain the necessary financial support, especially for capital improvements."

Presented honorary degrees at the commencement were Miss Berenice Abbott of Abbot Village, a renowned 20th Century photographer, Doctor of Fine Arts; and Dr. Harvey B. Scribner, M.A. UMO, a native of Albion, chancellor of New York City public schools, Doctor of Pedagogy.

More than 400 candidates received graduate and undergraduate degrees.

OUTSTANDING EDUCATORS

Twelve faculty members at UMO have been chosen Outstanding Educators of America for 1971: Dr. Howard Eves, professor of mathematics; Dr. Maryann Hartman, assistant professor of speech; Dr. David C. Smith, associate professor of history; Dr. Henry A. Pogorzelski, associate professor of mathematics; Dr. William H. Jeffrey, professor of history; Dr. Paul L. Goodfriend, professor of chemistry; Dr. Robert Tredwell, associate professor of philosophy; Dr. James J. Muro, associate professor of education; Dr. Edward G. Bobalek, Gottesman Professor and head of the chemical engineering department; Dr. Arthur M. Johnson, university professor of history; Dr. Robert D. Dunlap, professor of chemistry; and Dr. William Murray Bain, associate professor of microbiology.

JOSEPH FOX ACCEPTS NEW APPOINTMENT

Joseph M. Fox, M.Ed. '59, president of the University of Maine at Fort Kent for 16 years, became director of admissions and counseling at UMB on August 1. In his new post he is responsible for recruitment and the filling of two-year programs.

Fox was awarded an honorary doc-

tor of pedagogy degree from the University of Maine at Fort Kent last May. He is married and the father of five children.

SPEECH AND HEARING CENTER ACCREDITED

The University of Maine at Orono Speech and Hearing Center received accreditation this summer, as the result of a favorable evaluation of its staff, equipment, organization, record keeping, and physical facilities. The center was evaluated by the professional services board of the American Board of Examiners in Speech Pathology and Audiology.

The center, operating as a function of the UMO department of speech, has been providing full-year services for speech and hearing handicapped children and adults since 1963, and has recently completed the first year of operation in its new facilities in North Stevens Hall. The enlarged and improved facilities have permitted a substantial increase in the services provided to the state: during the first 12-month period the center provided diagnostic and therapeutic services in speech and hearing to 283 persons from ten of Maine's counties.

The center's services include hearing evaluations, consultations for the selection of hearing aids, and speech evaluations and therapy for children and adults.

NEW STUDENT AID DIRECTOR APPOINTED

John E. Madigan, 47, was appointed new director of student aid, effective August 15, filling the vacancy created by the death last spring of Robert Worrick '43.

Madigan received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Boston College and from 1943-46 served with the U. S. Army. He has been employed as a wage and salary administrator for Pitney-Bowes, Inc.; personnel development specialist and personnel relations specialist for General Electric Company; and as assistant director of

admissions at Boston College. He was president of the Massachusetts Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators and a member of the Eastern Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators. For eight years he was an instructor in the Boston College Graduate School of Management.

He is married and the father of seven children.

MAKING ROOM FOR MORE STUDENTS

Without adding a bed, more students can be accommodated. Without receiving a scholarship, some students can be educated for less money. How? CLEP (College Level Examination Program) is sorting out students who already know much or all of the material covered in the freshman year, gives these students the credits they can prove they deserve, and moves them ahead on their course.

More than 650 entering freshmen are beginning the year with this headstart on time and tuition fees, having earned from three to 27 semester credits towards their bachelor's degrees by taking the CLEP general examination during the summer.

Admissions Director James A. Harmon said, "The experiment could be one of the most significant actions of the year, or for the next few years," emphasizing that the testing program does not reduce the quality of the degree programs. Standards for graduation remain the same. However, the curriculum changes in secondary schools, the information explosion of the '50s and '60s, student requests for a more relevant education, society's demands for some financial relief, and recommendations of the Carnegie Report all pointed to a need for this opportunity to gain advanced standing.

Although the CLEP examinations have been used by the University of Maine and other institutions throughout the country for veterans and other adult students, UMO is one of the first to offer the tests to the majority of its freshman class.

Campus Capsules

CC Dr. Frederick Hutchinson '53, chairman of the plant and soil sciences department at UMO, was named the **OUTSTANDING TEACHER IN AGRONOMY** in the northeast region by the Northeastern Branch of the American Society of Agronomy.

CC **RETURNING VETERANS** seeking further education were offered remedial help this summer at UMB. No high school diploma was required, no academic credit was given, and no tuition was charged. The summer program was designed to help prepare veterans for college level work.

CC A series of small engines courses, all dealing with the two-cycle engine, is being offered this year on a no-credit basis at UMB. Begun in September, the courses will continue with instruction on the **SNOWMOBILE, SNOWBLOWER, LAWN MOWERS, ROTO-TILLERS, and OUTBOARD MOTORS.**

CC A meeting was held in September, sponsored by the UMO School of Forest Resources, to discuss what the new Occupational Safety and Health Act will mean to the small contractor and woodworker in the **MAINE FOREST INDUSTRY.**

CC The annual **NEW ENGLAND MANAGERS' INSTITUTE** was held at UMO in August, with Irvine W. Marsters, Jr., of the Bureau of Public Administration as conference leader.

CC **DR. HOMER METZGER**, professor and chairman of the department of agricultural and resource economics at UMO, will spend the year on leave as a consulting economist in Washington, D.C. He will be associated with the Social Science Division of the Cooperative State Research Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

CC The Pulp and Paper Foundation last year assisted **108 UMO STUDENTS THROUGH SCHOLARSHIPS**, fifth year grants and graduate fellowships of nearly \$85,000. In addition, several thousand dollars in loans were made to students.

CC A non-credit CED course is being offered at UMO on Friday mornings, October 1 to December 10, by Art Professor Vincent A. Hartgen. The course is entitled **ART MASTERPIECES IN EUROPE.**

CC A total of **41 RESEARCH PROJECTS** proposed by UMO faculty members received federal funding last year, with total funds for the projects amounting to **\$999,091.**

CC **UMB AND THE BANGOR COMMUNITY THEATRE** combined their resources this fall for the first time to produce as a joint effort Edward Albee's play, "Everything in the Garden."

CC Roger V. Snow, Jr., director of the UMO Bureau of Labor Education, has been elected **NATIONAL SECRETARY OF WORKERS EDUCATIONAL LOCAL 189, American Federation of Teachers.**

CC **DR. KENNETH I. MUMME**, associate professor of chemical engineering at UMO, is spending the 1971-72 academic year on sabbatical leave for study and research in Norway.

CC Research concerned with the influence of gamma radiation on the growth of **DUTCH ELM DISEASE** was the subject of one of the papers presented by Dr. Richard J. Campana, UMO professor of botany, at a meeting of the American Phytopathological Society in Philadelphia, Pa., in August. Dr. Campana's research findings indicate that radiation on elm stems delays the development of vessels and prevents the vertical passage of spores in the growth of elms.

CC **THE STRUCTURE OF ARITHMETIC**, a course designed to strengthen the mathematics background of the elementary school teacher, is being offered by CED on all educational television stations beginning in September. Three undergraduate credits will be granted by the university upon successful completion of the course. The credits may also apply to teacher certification requirements of the Maine Department of Education. The course is being taught by Professor Albert G. Wootton of the UMO Department of mathematics.

CC A study made by UMO researchers reveals that one out of every three sportsmen would favor a separate license for **BEAR HUNTING.**

CC **WINNING THIRD PLACE RIBBONS** in the nationwide publications contest at the annual conference of the American Association of Agricultural College Editors, were the bulletins "Meals for Thrifty Families," a cookbook by Miss Nellie Gushee '62 and Mrs. Lucy F. Sheive of the Extension Service, and "Some Common Edible Mushrooms Found in Maine," by Richard L. Homola, assistant professor of botany. The bulletins were designed and edited by the Department of Public Information and Central Services and printed by the University Press.

CC A grant of \$10,000 has been awarded to UMO by the National Marine Fisheries Service, U. S. Department of Commerce, to conduct continuing research on the socio-economic impact of changes in the harvesting labor force of the **MAINE LOBSTER INDUSTRY.** The study of the characteristics and economic status of lobster fishermen and the industry, which began in July, 1970, is being conducted under the direction of Dr. A. M. Huq, UMO professor of economics.

CC Some of Aroostook County's leading **POTATO GROWERS** met at the UMO Aroostook Farm in Presque Isle in July for a joint meeting of the Potato Council and the Maine Potato Commission. UMO researchers attended the meeting to explain some of their most recent work, including the plant breeding program, harvester development, alternate crops to potatoes, grain variety trials, and vine killing with the use of a lesser quantity of chemicals.

CC David L. Davis of Orland was named in the summer **CO-ORDINATOR OF THE UNIVERSITY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCES COUNCIL** at UMO. The council's objectives include using the resources of faculty, students and facilities at the Orono campus and the resources of the community agencies in a cooperative community-college program, and increasing the level of aspiration and achievement of individuals from the communities by coordination of programs of community services.

CC A **NATION-WIDE CHEERLEADERS ASSOCIATION** summer camp for girls in grades seven through twelve was conducted at UMO in August.

CC **DR. OTIS J. SPROUL '52**, professor of civil engineering, presented two invited papers during the summer. The first, entitled "The Contemporary Environmental Pollution Course at Maine," was presented before the Environmental Engineering Division of the American Society for Engineering Education at its annual meeting in Annapolis, Md., in June. The paper "Removal and Inactivation of Viruses by Chemical-Physical Methods and by Ozonation" was presented at the Second International Conference on Virology in Budapest, Hungary, in July.

CC The UMO Chapter of Young Americans for Freedom was named the **OUTSTANDING SMALL COLLEGE CHAPTER** in the United States for 1970-71.

CC A new housekeeping system at UMO which began the second week in September will bring added efficiency with more janitorial service at off-peak hours and a **SAVINGS OF SOME \$20,000** a year. The new system is the result of an evaluation of the university's housekeeping problems by a national consulting firm.

CC **ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF EDUCATION JAMES J. MURO** has just published his latest book, "Group Counseling: Theory and Practice," written in collaboration with Dr. Don C. Dinkmeyer of DePaul University. The book draws upon a wide range of theory and research, in areas of sociology, group dynamics, education, psychology, and counseling.

25 Years of Enthusiasm for Maine Rochester Area Alumni Association

"At a meeting held January 30, 1946, at the Town Tavern the tentative plans for the organization of a University of Maine alumni group were made 'official' by the acceptance of a formal Constitution and Bylaws." So wrote Dave Greenlaw '41 twenty-five years ago about the first "official" meeting of the Rochester, New York, alumni chapter. This meeting was the result of many months of preparation by several ambitious alumni who initiated the actions that resulted in the formation of the Rochester chapter.

The organizers and first leaders of the group were Ted Zak '28, George Hill '38, president, with Dave Greenlaw, secretary-treasurer, and Ernest Baker '03, Edith Brewer '36, and Bob Tackaberry '42 on the executive committee. Other alumni attending the meeting were Flora Howard '17, Everett Brewer '37, Stoddard Vaughn '38, William Parsons '41, Alexander Walker '42, John Watson '42, Germaine LeClerc '43, Silas Hulse '43, Mrs. Kirk Bethum '43, Malcolm Herrick '45, Clayton Holden '45, and Thomas Plaisted '45.

The meeting was conducted by President Hill, and discussion centered

around plans for the new association. George also pointed out the need for placement of alumni returning from the service. After the business meeting movies of the campus, supplied by Charles Crossland, alumni secretary, were enjoyed.

An earlier meeting in October, 1945, had been called through the efforts of Ted Zak and Charles Crossland to meet with Phillip Brockway, placement director and assistant alumni secretary, to determine if there existed enough interest to form a local group. There did! Mr. Brockway outlined the procedures of forming a local group. He also described the part the university played in the war as well as plans for the return to a peacetime program.

Through the years the group has grown from the initial 17 members to over 230 today with no loss of enthusiasm for the local social activities, the university, or the state of Maine. These "Mainers" pursue a great variety of professions, and many of them are outstanding in their field. This year, for example, Dr. Bob Webster '50 is president of the Monroe County (Rochester) Medical Society and Bob

Leavitt '44 is president of the Rochester Engineering Society. Bob Leavitt has a lot of company in Rochester from the alumni in the college of technology employed in most of Rochester's well-known businesses. But graduates of the other colleges are also numerous, each one a credit to the University of Maine and vice versa. All, it seems, long for the next opportunity to visit "God's country," and most are surprised to see all the changes on campus when they do.

The most popular local alumni event of the year is the annual lobster picnic, held in the middle of June. In recent years over 100 alumni and their mates have attended this event each year. Other than the friendly socializing, the "Maine" attraction of the picnic is the delicious crustaceans airfreighted live from Maine or Boston. Organizing the picnic is, of course, a big job, but one that is done with great enthusiasm and anticipation. When picnic time arrives, everyone pitches in to help with such chores as watching the lobster pot, bagging clams, cutting cakes and pies, and brewing coffee. The chairman of the picnic for this year was Wayne Cobb '64, with Bruce Wing assisting. If there is any one thing that the Rochester area Maine alumni are noted and envied for it is their annual lobster picnic.

Officers for 1971 are Dick McNeary '65, president; John Boomer '61, vice president; Bob Anderson '64, treasurer; and Bob Johnson '64, secretary; with Ray Feasey '52, Wayne Johnson '64, and Bert Bolduc '67 completing the executive committee. The officers have made tentative plans for observance of the 25th anniversary including a commemorative gift to the university in appreciation of the fine education, fond memories and support of the alumni over the years.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS ESTABLISHED

The University of Maine and the University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation received three new funds for scholarships during the summer.

Dr. Milton D. Proctor of Portland, former president of Westbrook College, made a bequest of \$5,000 to the University of Maine, by will now on file in Probate Court. He suggested that the money be held as a "Presidents's Loan Fund" to provide interest free loans to worthy students or faculty members in need of funds. He also gave permission for the money to be used for some other purpose if the Board of Trustees should determine such use to be more worthwhile.

A scholarship fund of \$10,000 was established with the University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation by Mrs. Hugh J. Chisholm and her son, William H. Chisholm, vice chairman of the Kennebec River Pulp and Paper Company and chairman of the board of the Pulp and Paper Foundation. The Chisholm name has long been

associated with pulp and paper instruction at the University of Maine. Hugh J. Chisholm, who was a U. of M. trustee for seven years, made a major gift which enabled the university to purchase an experimental fourdrinier paper machine for instruction and research. Shortly after his death friends contributed several thousand dollars to establish the Hugh J. Chisholm Pulp and Paper Library endowment fund. The Chisholm family also presented to the University of Maine at Orono Mr. Chisholm's valuable and extensive library of pulp and paper books and publications.

The income from this fund will be awarded annually to a student at the University of Maine at Orono who is preparing to enter the pulp and paper and allied industries.

The Everett Keith Mansfield Scholarship Fund of \$10,000 has been established with the University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation. Everett K. Mansfield '16 started the fund several years ago. After his death in May several friends contributed to it in his memory. Mrs. Mansfield added a substantial donation, which raised the total to \$10,000.

Mr. Mansfield was one of the first students to take pulp and paper courses at the university, which offered the program in 1913, the first such course in the United States. Associated with the pulp and paper industry during his entire business life, he was a charter member of the University of Maine Pulp and Paper Foundation, which he served as a director.

The income from the fund will be

awarded to students at UMO who are training to enter the pulp and paper and allied industries.

ED DECOURCY WINS UNUSUAL AWARD

The two editorials that won first place in the annual competition for the Golden Quill Award, presented by the International Conference of Weekly Newspaper Editors, were both written by J. Edward DeCourcy, '34, editor and publisher of the Argus-Champion, Newport, New Hampshire. The 1971 Golden Quill Award was announced July 22 at the annual meeting of the ICWNE held at Southern Illinois University.

This is the first time in the organization's history that two editorials by the same writer were chosen. Dr. Clifton O. Lawhorne, chairman of the department of journalism at Texas Christian University, who made the final selection, did not know who had written the editorials until after he had made his decision. When he discovered that his two top selections were by the same author, he decided he had chosen them on their merits and let his decision stand.

The winning editorial is selected each year from thousands of weekly newspaper pieces which are considered by the judges. The best twelve are published in a limited edition booklet, "The Golden Dozen." Introducing Mr. DeCourcy's editorials in this booklet, Mr. Lawhorne wrote, "The work of J. Edward DeCourcy has appeared among the finalists in many of the Golden Quill Contests, but never has the editor of the Argus Champion, Newport, New Hampshire, been adjudged the winner. Regular readers of his page know that more often than not Mr. DeCourcy's leaders and personal columns demand reprinting for wider audiences. And now history is made. This year there are two winners: both by the same author . . . J. Edward DeCourcy."

The prize-winning editorials were "None of Their Business," in which he condemned unwarranted government surveillance of private citizens, and "The Spectator," an allegory on the international arms race.

PAUL BEAN IS DEAD

Paul Webster Bean '35 of Auburn died August 30, 1971, as the result of a heart attack. He was born in Orono.

He worked actively for the alumni association of UMO, planning the annual Androscoggin Valley Football, Night, and was a class agent in the Annual Alumni Fund Drive. He began a three-year term as a member of the Alumni Council in 1967 but resigned in 1968 because of illness. In 1969 he was awarded the Block "M" Award.

After graduation Paul Bean joined his father as assistant engineer in the Union Water Power Company, Lewiston. In 1937 he married Barbara Boylston of Boston, Mass., and Leesburg, Fla. A World War II veteran, he was awarded many citations and medals for his meritorious service. Discharged in 1946 at the rank of lieutenant colonel, he resumed his career with Union Water Power Company as agent-engineer.

He was past trustee and vice president of Androscoggin County Savings Bank, Lewiston; past president of the Maine Association of Engineers; former chairman of the Auburn Planning Board; and former trustee, Auburn Public Library.

He is survived by his wife, Barbara, and a brother, Ralph.

WHY HE SAID YES

New Campaign Chairman talks with Alumni

When newly-elected GAA President Albert M. Parker '28 began looking for someone to head up the 1971-72 Annual Alumni Fund campaign, he realized that some pretty tough qualifications must be met. Someone with business acumen. Someone familiar with the program of the GAA. Someone with a deep concern for the needs of the people who make up the university—students, faculty, administra-

tion. Someone with the personal spirit to lead others to understanding and commitment.

Looking over the names of alumni who had worked on the fund recently, he stopped at one early in the alphabet that looked pretty good. A businessman, a finance man. Had been a class agent, and so had his wife. Had worked on the fund campaign with the Stein Club and the President's

Club. He was a member of the Alumni Council. With a son (Vietnam veteran) a UMO graduate who recently received his M.B.A. at UMO, a daughter recently graduated from UMO, and a younger son at Deerfield Academy, he was still in close touch with the university.

So Al Parker went after this man at the top of the list. "Gordon Erikson, we need you. What do you say?"

Well, Gordon Erikson '43, wasn't sure. He asked for some time to think it over. As with many alumni, he had taken the university pretty much for granted. But then he began to realize how great a part it had played in preparing him for life. He thought about his own qualifications. The technical money questions were in his line, that was true. Yes, he knew the core of hard-working alumni who could help. But there were two questions he felt he had to deal with. One for himself and one for the GAA.

The question for himself was, could he give the amount of time needed to do the job right? Half the job would be done already by the loyal alumni who had given to make past campaigns successful. He felt that was something he could depend on. But what about the other half? Could he handle it? Being director and treasurer of two public companies, and consultant to several small ones besides, gives him all the work he needs and then some.

But the importance of the request makes the difference when a man makes up his mind. And this is something Gordon Erikson was sure of. This university opened up many opportunities for him back in the forties. At Maine he got his start in business, majoring in economics. At Maine he met his wife, Dorothy (Brewer '42). He was a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity. A staff photographer for the **Bangor Daily News**, he handled all the photography for the Maine Masque and earned college expenses with his camera. After leaving college he started a career in photography but soon entered the family building business, when he became more interested in finance. He built a national sales finance company into a highly successful organization which was eventually merged with Delta Corporation and then with Avco Corporation.

A Massachusetts native, he got to love the state of Maine while he was in college, decided to put some roots down in Maine after he graduated,

and soon bought property in the state. Though he was born and raised in Worcester, Massachusetts, his home is in Maine, in Bar Harbor. Responding to this streak of loyalty in himself, he decided he really did want to do this job for his alma mater. He felt he owed a lot to UMO.

So he went up to the Alumni Center and talked for awhile with Executive Director Don Stewart '35 and assistant Paul Chretien '63 who works closely with the fund. And he asked them his last question, the one for the GAA. Where exactly do alumni contributions go? Do alumni understand the difference between "restricted" and "unrestricted" gifts? Where does giving by classes fit into the picture?

He didn't think he wanted to take on the job without some pretty clear answers to these elusive questions. He found out that the answers are clear, but probably not well known and understood by most alumni, like him. A major goal for the campaign could be to explain all these questions, and get the word out to all alumni just what people at UMO do need and how the GAA fund responds to these needs.

Another thing he could do would be to tell other alumni about his philosophy of investing, because that's what giving to the university really is, as far as he is concerned. When you invest in a product, you do it not only for financial gain but because you believe in the product. When you buy a share in your own university, you are backing up your belief in it with money, which in turn helps it continue to be the kind of university you believe in.

So Gordon Erikson said yes. And he went right to work. He marshalled some of the key people from last year's campaign to give needed experience and continuity—Harry Mayers '30 to be chairman of the President's Club, Russ Bodwell '44 chairman of the Stein Club, Ray Couture '51 chairman of the Pine Tree Club. He also moved ahead for new people and fresh ideas—Willard Farnham '60

to be vice chairman of the fund, John Dyer '41 to be chairman of the Century Club, and Roy Holmes '32 to be chairman of the Maine Stay Club. The voices of a woman and of a young alumnus have been added in Hilda Sterling '55 and Art Nicholson '67 as Honor Roll co-chairmen.

In the next few weeks Gordon and his co-workers will be getting in touch with all UMO alumni. And they are going to answer questions about where the money goes and how. Just in case they don't hit all the questions, they are inviting some. The new chairman is the kind of man who likes questions, and even more, likes to see them answered. He hopes to hear from you.

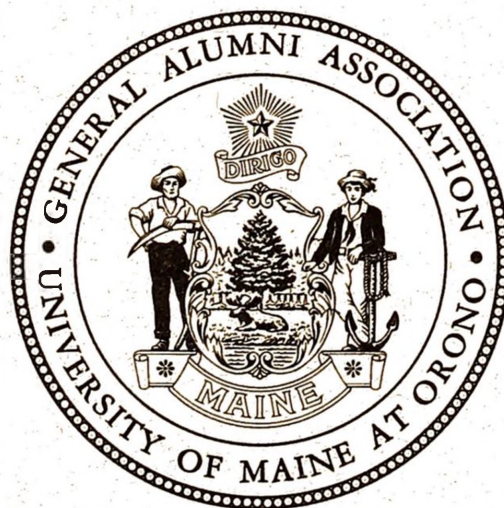

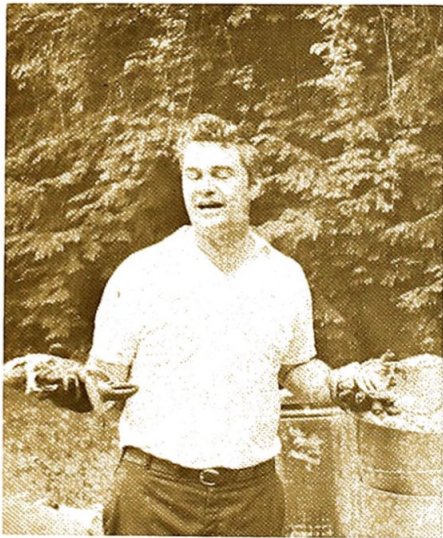

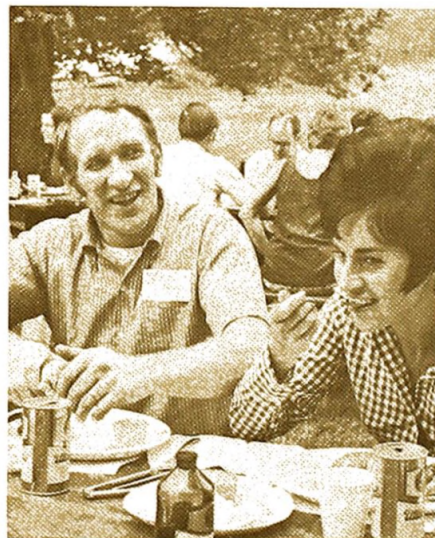

LOOKING AHEAD

Football

As we prepare the sports column for this issue of the ALUMNUS, our football squad is taking to the field for pre-season drills. Your reporter talked with Coach Walter Abbott about prospects for our Black Bear Club.

Some 70 candidates have turned out this year with about 25 having experienced action during past seasons. The number of returning veterans is significantly greater than last year. In areas where experience will be most helpful, the Bears will use seasoned talent at offensive and defensive end positions. Likewise veteran players will fill secondary and line-backer slots.

When asked about size and depth, Coach Abbott happily replies that the '71 edition of the Bears will field its heaviest team in several years. "We don't compare in size with some of our opponents but we will be heavier than past Maine clubs." On the other hand, Abbott is concerned with his club's depth. "Pre-season injuries are always a problem. Depth is bound to be a problem." At quarterback positions Coach Abbott will be looking at veteran prospects Junior Ron Cote of Biddeford, Junior Sandy Hastings of Ambler, Penn., both of whom saw action last year, and sophomore prospect Doug Lentz from Woburn, Mass.

Some position shifts are expected with Ron Puchalski and Dick Todd moving from offensive guard to defensive tackle. With these shifts and extra weight in the line, U-Maine could be a surprising contender for Yancon honors. Coach Abbott feels that if the heavier club can maintain its speed and quickness, the Bears will be a club to be reckoned with.

About our first game, as Abbott puts it, "we have a tough contender in U-Mass who over the past ten years in Yankee Conference play has earned

a 40 and 7 record but we're playing here at Orono and we will be ready." Coach Abbott points out that Mass will be under a new coaching staff, and there are a number of uncertainties with the huge Redmen Club which lead him to believe that Maine's chances look better than in recent years. Coach Abbott sees this year's team as the "strongest in the past six years" and adds "barring injuries".

For alumni interested in seeing the '71 edition of the Bears football squad you can join your friends at Hempstead, Long Island, for the Hofstra game on September 25; in Kingston, Rhode Island on October 2; in Brookville, New York, for the C. W. Post game on October 23; and for you hardy souls at Vermont on November 6. Tailgates are planned for each of these games and particulars will be mailed to area alumni.

You are reminded that games at Orono will be starting earlier this year. The new starting time is 1:00 p. m. Plans for Homecoming activities are now under way and our grid-iron opponent that day (October 16) will be the formidable Connecticut Huskies. You may purchase your tickets in advance for all home games by writing the Athletic Office, University of Maine at Orono, Orono, Maine 04473.

Soccer

Soccer promises MAINE fans something to shout about. Coach Paul Stoyell whose soccer squad recorded their best season ever last year looks forward to another good year with Mani Osode of Lagos, Nigeria, returning along with a number of veteran teammates. Mani who had played as defensive captain of the Nigerian Olympic team was named all Yankee Conference forward last year. The Bear squad will meet its first opponent, Jersey City State, at Orono September 18-10:00 a. m.

NEW SWIMMING COACH

Swimming

Completion of the swimming pool adds a new dimension to sports at MAINE. Programs in the new complex will be under the direction of Allan A. Switzer, aquatic coordinator and swimming coach.

Switzer who comes to MAINE from a post at the Hill School in Potsdam, Penn., has been instrumental in the development of 37 all-American swimmers. In coaching positions at Hebron Academy and the Hill School Switzer has a record of 120 wins and 55 losses.

A 1952 Harvard graduate, Switzer obtained his master's degree in education from Harvard in 1958. After serving in the Army he played semi-professional baseball and started his teaching-coaching career.

In addition to administering the new pool facility, Switzer will coordinate and supervise all intramural and recreational aquatic programs.



NEW PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES

Though there was still a little patch work to be done on the new physical education facilities, students returning to campus on September 20 found ready for use the long-awaited indoor swimming pool and the wrestling and gymnastic areas that were still under construction when they left campus in June. The placing of a synthetic surface (tartan) on the Memorial Field House floor is scheduled for completion in the fall.

The completion of the two new wings to the current Memorial Gymnasium and the renovation of the Field House will be completed at a cost of slightly in excess of \$2 million. Funds for the work were authorized by Maine citizens in a 1967 referendum. Additional funds for the work were also obtained from the federal government, and construction of the two wings was started in October of 1969.

The east wing, which contains the 75-foot by 25-meter pool, will be the site of dedication ceremonies this fall. The wing contains two one-meter diving boards and one three-meter board, eight swimming lanes, three underwater viewing areas, a gallery at one end seating 500 persons, a deck supervisory office, locker space and shower rooms adjacent to the pool for both men and women.

"We plan to utilize the pool upwards of 14 to 15 hours per day, six and one-half days a week by providing instructional swimming to allow freshmen to fulfill their physical education requirements; by offering swimming courses for physical education majors, both men and women; for intramural swimming, competition water polo and diving; and for recreational swimming for students, faculty and special groups," said UMO Director of Physical Education and Athletics Harold Westerman. He added that the school will have an informal swimming team at first and that this will be built into an intercollegiate swimming team in the near future.

The west wing contains the wrestling and gymnastics areas, locker facilities, two new handball courts and a squash court. The 34-foot square wrestling area is also suitable as an all-purpose room and can be used as an individual activity room, lecture hall, classroom, and team room. The gymnastics area measures 60 by 80 feet. Still to be completed in this area are the placing of fixtures and the moving in of equipment.

The resurfacing of the Field House will provide five additional basketball courts, four volleyball courts, 10 to 12 badminton courts, golf driving areas, an archery range, full track facilities and an area where baseball and football teams could work out in bad weather.

Alumni returning for Homecoming Weekend will have an opportunity to see students in action in the new wings and to try out the new pool.
