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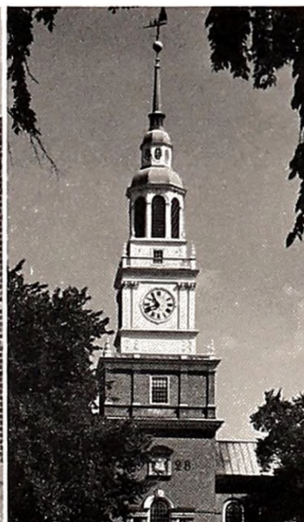
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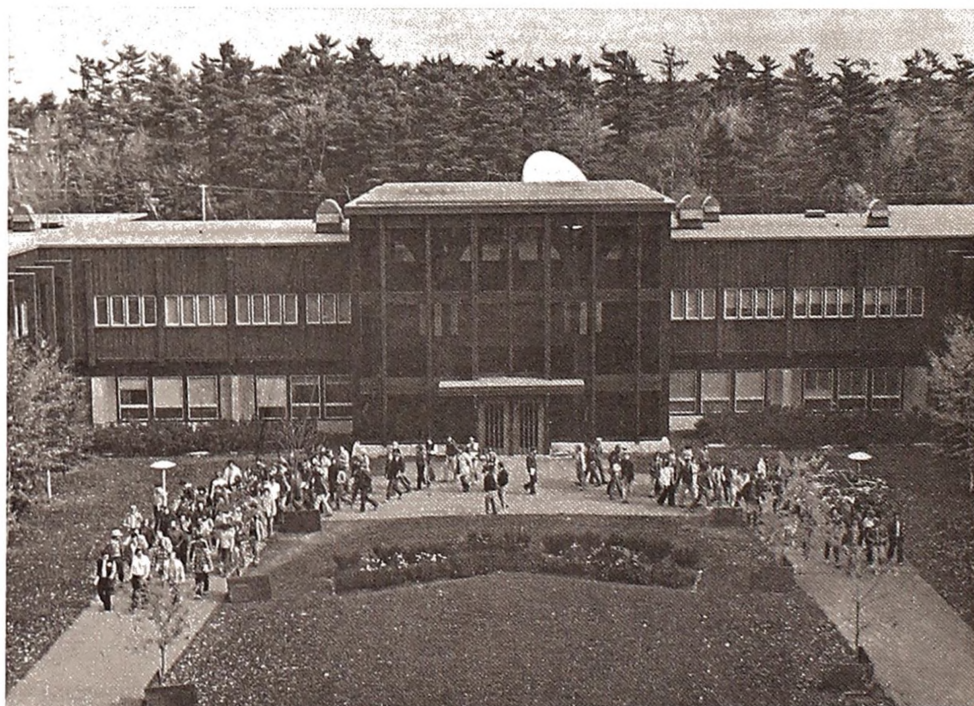

Civil Engineer Heads College of Engineering and Sciences

Dr. James L. Clapp, the new dean of the College of Engineering and Science, comes to the Orono campus from the University of Wisconsin's Madison campus where he was a professor of civil and environmental engineering and director of the environmental monitoring and data acquisition group in the Institute for Environmental Studies.

Clapp earned his undergraduate, master's and doctoral degrees at the University of Wisconsin where he began his academic career as an instructor in the civil engineering department in 1962. During the 1960s Clapp went twice to the Antarctic for the University of Wisconsin's Geophysical and Polar Research Center.

In 1967-68 he was principal investigator in the Antarctic for ice flow studies on Roosevelt Island. Clapp has been awarded the Congressional Medal for Antarctic Service.

Among other honors he has three times been named outstanding teacher in Wisconsin's College of Engineering and in 1967 was given the Steiger Award as the University of Wisconsin's outstanding teacher.



Space Age Comes to Orono

A huge white dish, 39 3/4 feet in diameter, mounted on a galvanized steel frame behind Nutting Hall is the Orono base for a new satellite transmission system for listeners and viewers of the Maine Public Broadcasting Network. The structure is worth over \$100,000, but grants from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and the Kresge Foundation have reduced MPBN's contribution to \$10,000. For that amount, it's an outstanding investment which will benefit people for years to come.

The project signals an enormous technological advance for MPBN and PBS, and ultimately for all the television networks. PBS is the first network to transmit programs regularly via satellite, although all of the other networks occasionally use them.

For MPBN viewers, the new Westar satellite system means video and audio quality will improve substantially because there are fewer "hops" (in essence, relay stations) in the transmission of programs to their destination.



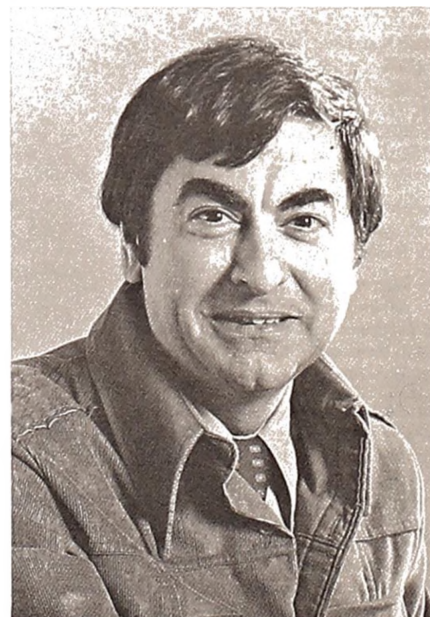
New Head for Student Affairs

Dr. Thomas D. Aceto, vice president for student affairs at Plattsburgh State University, NY since 1975 has been appointed Vice President for Student Affairs at Orono.

Dr. Aceto replaces Dr. Arthur Kaplan who served in the position for seven years before leaving to become dean of human development and service programs at Northern Kentucky University.

A graduate of State University College, Potsdam, NY, Dr. Aceto earned a master's degree from Southern Illinois University and a doctorate in education from Indiana University.

He will be responsible for a number of student-associated areas including residential life, office of the dean of student affairs, admissions, health center, student aid, career planning and placement, women's programs and services, veterans affairs, counseling center, Memorial Union and Onwards Program.

A Boon for Maine Historians

Fogler Library's Special Collections is 3000 books richer thanks to James Vickery's recent donation of a variety of Maine books, pamphlets, and imprints. Vickery catalogued one-third of the collection, which includes numerous first editions and rare books, this past summer. The remaining two-thirds will be added to the library's holdings over the next two summers.

The donation was a significant one, because storing the books in the library guards the documents, collected over a 30 year time span, from damage or loss by fire, theft, or improper care.

Noteworthy entries in the collection include the two volume *History of Maine* by Williamson, for which Vickery paid \$35, a sum that, he says, at the time seemed

enormous to him, *Political Devltry in Maine*, of which less than ten copies still exist, a first edition of Longfellow's "Hiawatha," illustrated by Frederic Remington; as well as the history of virtually all Maine towns, including that of Unity, which Vickery wrote himself.

Vickery is an avid collector not only of historical documents but also of bird books, daguerrotypes, and *cartes de visites* (early photographs exchanged like calling cards). He claims he will continue to collect Maine books but admits that with the increasing number of collectors it would be impossible to amass such a collection as his again.

The donor, a Brewer historian and high school English teacher, was educated at Bates College and UMO, where he worked on a master's degree in history. He is a member of the board of directors of the Bangor Historical Society, the standing committee of the Maine Historical Society, and formerly served as advisory chairman to the Penobscot Heritage Museum.



Bud Humphrey '32 Gives Black Bear Statue to Orono

The University of Maine at Orono will have a new Black Bear statue exemplifying the University's spirit thanks to the generosity of an alumnus who died tragically in a boating mishap on October 14 off the coast of Georgia.

Wallace H. Humphrey, 69, of Bristol, RI, and Old Port Cove, North Palm Beach, FL had awarded the funds necessary for construction of a new statue in front of Memorial Gymnasium prior to his death while attempting to anchor his yacht in a squall at Big Tom Creek off the coast of Bryan County, GA.

Humphrey donated the funds necessary for the construction of an eight-foot tall bronze statue of a bear to be placed in front of Memorial Gymnasium on the pedestal that once held a large wooden Black Bear statue which had become one of the landmarks of the Orono campus. Cost of the new statue has been estimated at \$18,000.

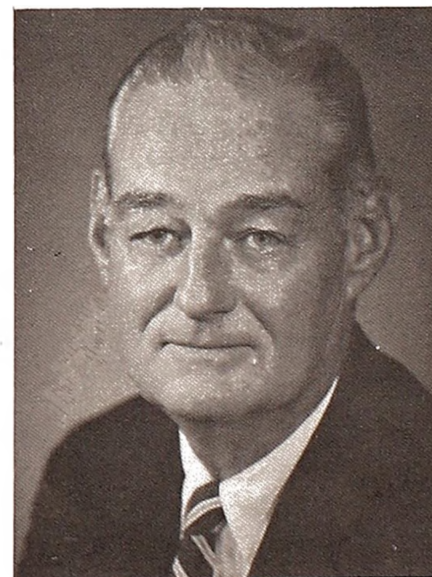
The wooden statue it replaces was erected at UMO in 1962 but was dismantled in 1975.

Prof. David Trafford, chairman of the committee to replace the old wooden statue, said that it was hoped the new statue would be completed and erected early in 1979.

Active in alumni affairs over the years, Humphrey was chairman of the board of Red Farm Studio Company, greeting card publishers located in Pawtucket, RI. He had served as regional chairman in Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont and New York for the Second Century Fund, had been active as a volunteer in the Annual Alumni Fund campaigns, and was a member of the Alumni Council, the Development Council, President's Club and had been chairman of the Alumni Career Award selection committee.

He had been a contributor to various scholarship funds at UMO. His widow, Mrs. Virginia Berry Humphrey, is a member of the UMO Class of 1933.

The Wallace "Bud" Humphrey Fund has been established in his honor. Uses for the Fund at Orono will be determined at a later date by the family and the University. Donations by alumni, friends and business associates may be sent to the Office of the President or to the General Alumni Association.

Diamond Jubilee of UMO's School of Forest Resources

"The University of Maine has had an excellent record in forestry training, and has been a most creditable Maine institution"

so said Prof. John W. Ker, Dean of Forestry at the University of New Brunswick, quoting from the noted forest historian Philip J. Coolidge at the School of Forest Resources awards banquet held on the UMO campus in September, as the culmination of a year-long series of events during the School's Diamond Jubilee.

Dean Ker was the keynote speaker for the evening program in which a Distinguished Service Award was presented in recognition of significant support to the University and School, and three Distinguished Alumnus Awards were given to alumni who have achieved professional prominence. Also presented at the banquet were the Robert I. Ashman and Dwight B. Demeritt Awards to senior students noted for outstanding character and academic abilities.

The awards ceremony was the highlight of activities held September 15 and 16. School alumni meetings, a student activities fair, career discussions between students and representative potential employers, and an outdoor beef-seafood buf-

fet attended by more than three hundred alumni and friends were among the other events in this the last of the 1978 convocations commemorating the School of Forest Resources seventy-fifth anniversary. Speakers of national prominence in the forestry and wildlife professions have participated over the past year in other convocations in recognition of this Diamond Jubilee.

A long, proud record

Our school of Forest Resources is among the oldest in this country. No other four-year undergraduate teaching program has been in longer continuous operation. The first funding for the instructional program was given by the Maine legislature in 1902. The \$2,500 appropriation supported our first professor of forestry, Samuel N. Spring (M.F., Yale, 1903). This

early program had only four courses and was a part of the College of Engineering. Since the first class of four students began studies in 1903, the School and its programs have expanded steadily. In 1936 a wildlife program was initiated. Class and faculty size increased gradually until the impact was felt from the tremendous interest in environmental management which occurred in the late 60's and early 70's. For example, there were only sixteen teaching and research staff and forty-two graduates in my class of 1965. Today, there are more than twice this number of total staff and yearly graduates, and the present teaching staff of twenty-one faculty offers more than fifty courses to the more than 800 students registered in the School and to others outside the School who wish some introduction to forestry, wildlife or recreation.

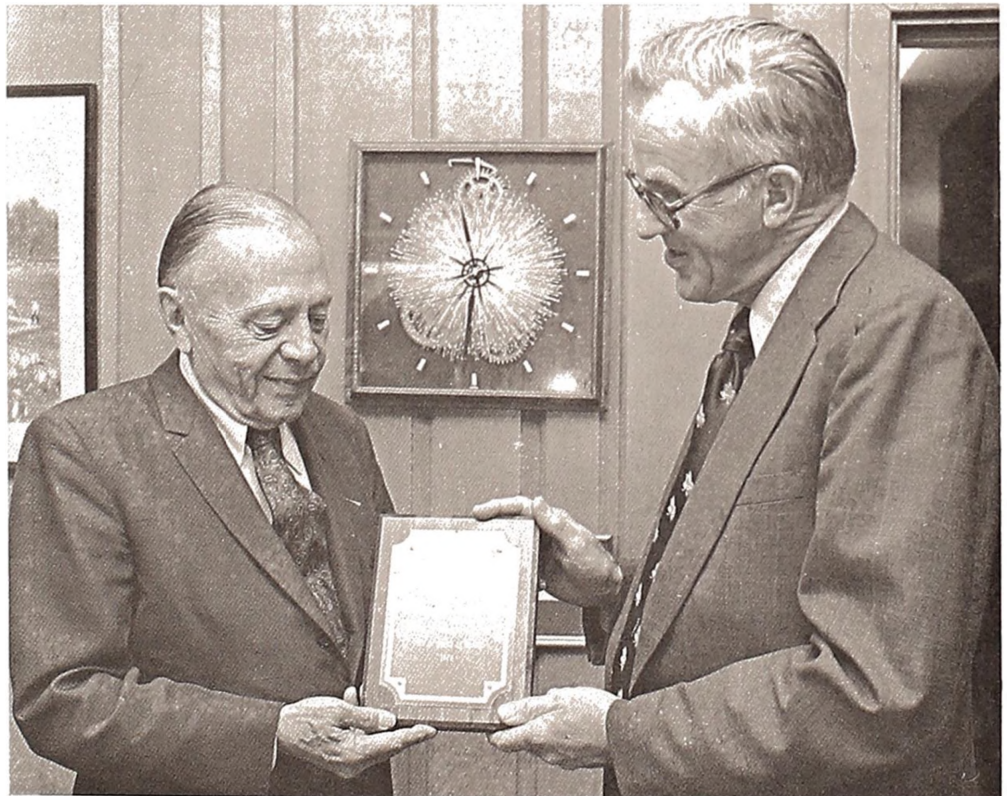

International reputation

There are several sequences of courses in which the School's majors can receive degrees. These include forest management, wildlife management, and parks and recreation. The forestry program has for several years been accredited nationally by the Society of American Foresters and the forest engineering program jointly administered with the Department of Agricultural Engineering became last year the first such program to be credited jointly by the S.A.F. and the Engineering Council for Professional Development.

With this evolution in programs, several other prominent changes have occurred. The Forestry Department became the School of Forest Resources in 1967. Increasing teaching and research commitments led to the construction of Nutting Hall in 1968. This building was named for former Forest Commissioner and Director Emeritus, Al Nutting '27.

The School's research program has an international reputation. Almost all of the staff have some research commitment and their studies have been on such diverse problems as the habitat requirements of the bald eagle, the improvement of genetic planting stock for increasing forest yields, and the development of processes to make particle board from what are presently considered forest residues. Until recently, much of the forestry research was supported by federal McIntire-Stennis funding. Al Nutting '27



When the Forestry program was launched in 1903 Samuel N. Spring was the first professor and the first director of the new Department of Forestry, at that time an adjunct of the College of Technology

was prominent amongst those who worked on the conception of the McIntire-Stennis legislation which became law in 1962. This legislation is given credit for providing the first national forestry research effort by our universities.

Service to the state

The School has concerned itself continually with research on problems of importance to Maine. This was highlighted by the formation of the Cooperative Forestry Research Unit in 1975. This unit is funded from a self-imposed tax by several Maine landowners and grants from state and federal agencies. The CFRU has three full time scientists, three technicians and a secretary. There is a steering committee consisting of representatives of the landowners supporting the unit which approves the direction and emphasis of the work done by the Unit's research scientists. Projects such as the effect of using herbicides, an analysis of public benefits from pri-

vately owned lands, and finding ways to lessen the damage from insect infestations, such as that by spruce budworm, are typical of their current work.

Of course, much of the proof of the School's success lies with you, the Alumni. You have held high level professional positions ranging from regional administrators in the U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to woodlands managers for industry-landowners. These positions have been of prime importance in the maintenance of our forest resources in Maine and the nation. Several state legislators and five Maine Forest Commissioners have been graduates.

The School, like most of us, has changed with the times. However, its national recognition and potential for meeting state forest resources educational and research needs has been undiminished, and if anything, has increased. If you're on campus, stop by, say hello and see what's happening today at the School of Forest Resources.

HOMECOMING HONORS ALUMNI

This is probably a "first" (until some other alumnus or alumna can muster a greater record – which isn't likely soon), for here are the Foglers, thirty-seven of them, plus "Bub" himself. All seven of his children attended the University and 19 grandchildren have either graduated or are currently students at Orono.

In recognition of his professional career achievements, his civic accomplishments, and the great loyalty displayed in his service to the University at Orono, Raymond H. "Bub" Fogler, '15, was presented with a long-lifetime continuous-run imported clock which is emblematic of the Alumni Association's Alumni Career Award.

The presentation was made at the Alumni Career Award Dinner in Wells Commons on the first night of Homecoming '78, Friday, October 6.

A long and continuing association with UMO has included such responsibilities as president of the Class of 1915, past president of the General Alumni Association, past president of the University Board of Trustees, past president of the University of Maine Foundation and an honorary member of the Development Council. He was national chairman of the Second Century Fund Campaign. He served as general campaign chairman for the Memorial Union Building Fund and chairman of the Friends of the Hauck Building Fund.

In 1962 the Fogler Library was named in his honor. It is easily recognized that he has, as he puts it, made the University at Orono his "hobby."

The eminence of the positions he has held in business, civic, and governmental agencies are testimony to the reasons for giving this alumnus a "career" award testifying to the quality of the education offered by his alma mater.

A former Assistant Secretary of the Navy, Fogler was a native of West Rockport. Fogler holds the Distinguished Public Service Award of the U.S. Navy. He received his bachelor of science degree from UMO in 1915 and a master's degree from Princeton in 1917. From 1917 to 1919 he was executive secretary of the Maine Agricultural Extension Service and then started as stockman for W.T. Grant Co., eventually working his way up to president.

Annual Alumni Career Award, A Salute to Canada Black Bear Awards, Student Service Award Homecoming Queen, Veteran Athlete Honored Bears meet Rhode Island, Post Game Parties and a celebration under the Alumni Tent

Homecoming 1978 became a week-long event in early October beginning with a Canadian-American educational conference, the first such meeting held at Orono in 40 years, and winding up with a gala two day program in which alumni, friends and students who have given outstanding service to the University at Orono were honored in a variety of award-giving programs.

Leading the events was the annual Alumni Career Award Dinner at which Maine stalwart Raymond "Bub" Fogler was given the prized award for 1978. Black Bear service awards were shared by two alumni and an alumna. Paul D. Andrews of Poland, a senior majoring in political science was recognized with the annual Student Alumni Award for service to the University and the Association. As president of the Student Alumni Association, he spearheaded an innovative program of delivering on behalf of the association "good-stuff" packets to the dorms, represented the school at the National Student Alumni convention and is sponsoring endeavors to raise funds for use at Orono.

Rounding out the gala events were torchlight parades, pep talks by football coaches, a sky-diving exhibition at the Homecoming game between Maine and Rhode Island, presentation of certificates to 50 and 25 year athletic letterwinners.

Other events highlighting the "Salute to Canada" were a reception honoring Canadian faculty members and art exhibits of West Coast Canadian scenes, sketches of the Maritime Provinces and a photo display "Entre Amis — Between Friends."

Another \$50,000 from Alumni

The Alumni Association made it a total of \$150,000 when G.A.A. President, John F. Wilson '33 handed President Howard R.

Neville a check for \$50,000 toward the pledge for the Performing Arts Center at Homecoming

Two years ago the Association made a commitment of \$400,000 to President Neville to help make the Performing Arts Center become a reality. Since that time, the Association has brought in \$150,000 from alumni gifts to the Annual Fund, with a balance remaining of \$250,000. Some of the gifts were earmarked specifically for the \$400,000 pledge for the new Center; the remainder of the dollars came from unrestricted gifts to the Annual Fund.



The tradition of naming a Homecoming Queen was kept bright with the selection of Kathryn Marie Hurn of Limestone, a freshman, the 1978 Maine Junior Miss and finalist in the Kodak Junior Miss National Photo contest. She will represent UMO in the Associated Collegiate Press competition at the Orange Bowl in Miami.

Questions, Anyone?

Along with the nuts and bolts and announcements of campus interest that are carried in the Weekly Calendar, there appears on the final page every two weeks a feature titled "Dialogue," written by Stephen Weber, Assistant to the President. From his aerie in Alumni Hall he helps tend the store by writing the bi-weekly question/answer column in a deft style proving that not all academic voices speak in "professional" jargon. Enjoy.

Steve Weber came to UMO in 1969. He is an Associate Professor of Philosophy and, since 1976, has served as Assistant to President Neville. He was named "Outstanding Humanities Teacher" in 1975. His primary philosophic interests lie in the areas of Existentialism and the Philosophy of Religion.

When *Alumnus* Editor Don Stewart first approached me asking that I write a short essay about *Dialogue*, I hesitated. Would it be proper to throw open the *Dialogue* file? To breach the confidential relation I have established with over 100 "pen pals" on campus? Was our community ready to learn the true story of *Dialogue*? I balanced these, and other questions. (Is it required by the right-to-know law? Or it prohibited by the Buckley Amendment?), on what is supposed to be the finely-honed edge of a philosophic mind. Conclusion: "Why not?"

The University is nothing if it is not a free market place of ideas, an open forum for the exchange of information, a crucible of creativity. We all accept and cherish these values in our individual disciplines. But the University itself, as an institution, must also strive for the maximum degree of openness and accessibility. As you might expect, in a community of this size and complexity problems do occasionally arise. *Dialogue* is intended to be an open invitation for members of the UMO community to both identify problems and to offer suggestions.

The issues raised in letters to *Dialogue* range from the sublime ("Just exactly what are the standards for hiring faculty at this University?") to the less-than-sublime

("Why won't the campus trashmen pick up all the trash left in utility rooms?"), from the simple ("Why doesn't the Bear's Den serve their ice cream in sugar cones?") to the complex ("Why doesn't the Motor Pool have any small, compact cars?"), from the gratifying ("I really enjoy your column. . .") to the embarrassing ("How did you get to be the institutional Ann Landers, anyway?").

As editor of *Dialogue* my sympathies are divided. Awaiting the morning mail, I find myself rooting for readers to submit interesting questions or suggestions; in the afternoon mail, I find myself rooting for those administrators to whom I have "farmed out" what often seems to be impossible questions. Don Stewart's invitation provides an excellent excuse to look back over some old issues of *Dialogue* and recall a few favorite questions.

Dialogue was born in September 1976 with an invitation to submit comments and questions. The weeks that followed found me scurrying around campus tracking down questions having to do with SAT scores, parking stickers, enrollments, the Distinguished Professor Award, parking fees. Suggestions were received about more efficient use of paper, energy conservation, changes in campus lighting, rubber markers for parking lots, etc.

Everything was going swimmingly until December 10 when I published the seemingly innocent question, "If this institution is really committed to overcoming sex discrimination, why are there hair dryers in the women's locker rooms, but not in the men's?" Drawing on some "hot air" of my own, I sought to dodge the question, responding, "I will answer that when you tell me how you discovered hair dryers in the women's locker room." But, alas, the secret of preferential treatment for women was out. In the weeks that followed I was bombarded by a series of letters advocating hair dryers for the men, the removal of hair dryers for the women, and one letter (which I have long suspected came from the Pulp and Paper Institute) suggesting that both sexes use paper towels. In the process, I learned far more than I wanted to know about changing hair styles and the cost of hair dryers.

Things also looked bleak in May of 1977 when we took on the following question, "Maybe the University would like to tell us how much money they wasted by printing 'Property of the University of Maine' on the clear, plastic garbage bags." You might well imagine my concern as I forwarded the question to Alan Lewis, Director of Physical Plant. What, after all, could they

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\$12 Million Dollars A Great Beginning for Founders Endowment Fund

"Excellence" dollars . . . the dollars that "make a difference". . . Call them what you will, these are the funds that will finance merit scholarships, chaired professorships, the most modern laboratory and research equipment. And \$25 million dollars in excellence money for the University of Maine at Orono is the goal of the 10-year Founders Endowment Fund project, launched one year ago.

"The response has been phenomenal," said President Howard Neville, in announcing that more than \$12 million has already been pledged to the fund. "The favorable reception on the part of UMO's alumni and friends makes it almost a certainty that the goal of \$25 million will be met well ahead of schedule."

The President singled out Dr. Alan Stone, Director of Development, for particular praise. Stone's leadership and hard work have been essential, he said, in encouraging the good will and generosity of friends and alumni. Stone has left to assume the presidency of Aurora College in Illinois, but he is leaving his successor with a task already well-begun.

To date, seventy-six individuals have contributed to the fund by means of bequests in wills, life insurance policies, irrevocable trusts, and direct gifts. Memberships are invited at the \$15,000 - \$25,000 Associate Founders level and at the \$25,000-or-above Founder's level. Donors are recognized with membership in the President's Club and a place of honor in

the Founders Hall of Honor in Alumni Hall.

With a sweeping nationwide trend toward tax reduction and a projected national decline in enrollments, many colleges and universities will be forced to draw increasingly on endowment resources. "We are looking for a solid base of unrestricted cash reserves from the Founders Endowment Fund to supply our "excellence" dollars for the future," said the President. "A gift of unrestricted monies can meet any need that arises for the University and is probably the best way to help UMO toward a strong future."

Although the majority of the \$12 million dollars has been designated as unrestricted, some donors have chosen to endow new professorships, notably in the fields of mechanical engineering, chemical engineering, entomology, and electrical engineering. Others have elected to establish new merit or "non-need" scholarship funds for deserving students. The money received is managed by the University of Maine Foundation and is invested in order to maximize useable income, while the principal remains intact.

Although the response has been gratifying, President Neville has been quick to point out that there remains a very large sum of money still to be raised. "We hope alumni and other friends of UMO will continue their support and join us in this crucial effort to keep the University a leader in quality among educational institutions," he said.

I have always been proud of my alma mater, as I know you have. There is something uniquely satisfying about being able to say, "I'm a Maine man," but I would be embarrassed to say "I'm a UMO man." This is not simply because the Stein Song says, "Let every loyal Maine man sing," but because of that vast company of Maine alumni who have risen to the top in their professions and have left the world a little better because of what they received at the University of Maine.

We are now well into our second century, and I have a strong conviction that those who guided the university, taught there and studied there during the first century established a distinguished record that entitles our alma mater to be known to the world as the University of Maine.

Let's restore its rightful name to our alma mater.

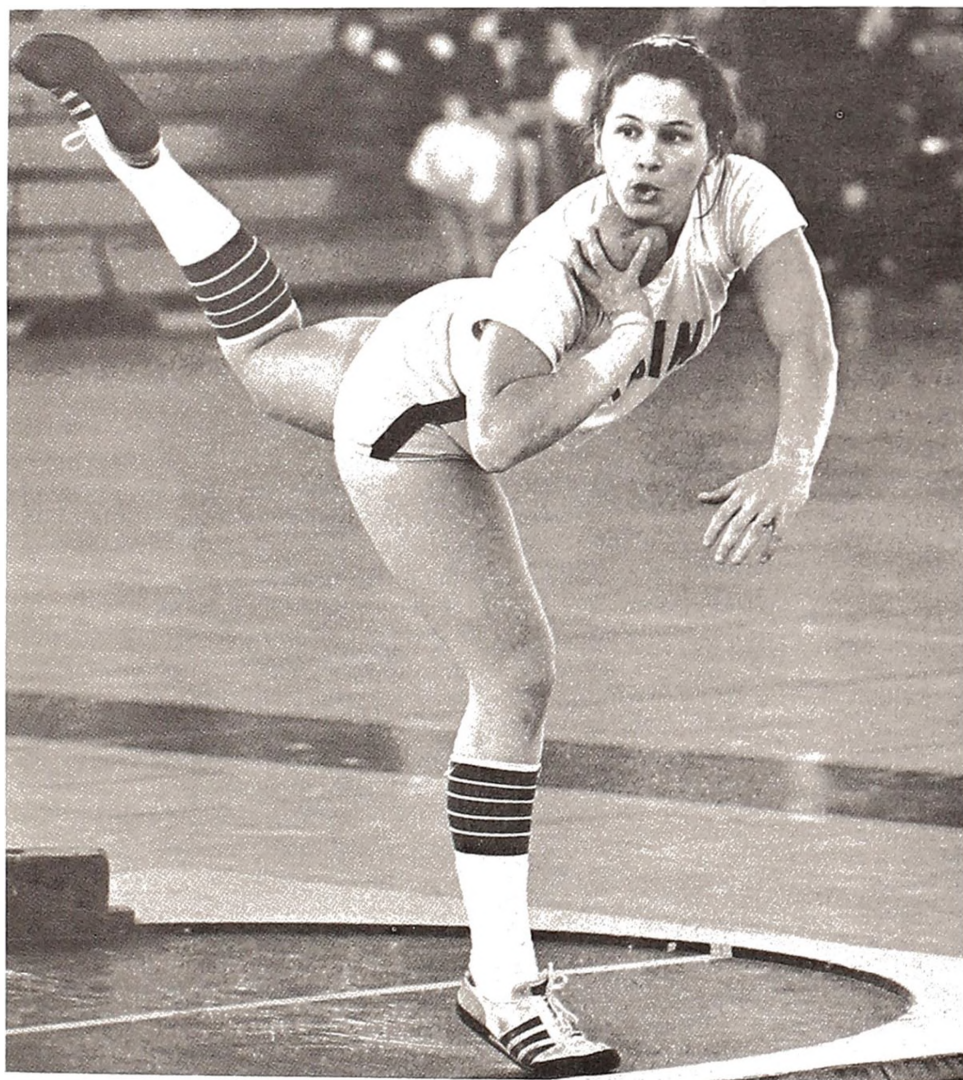
Sports Slants on UMO Campus

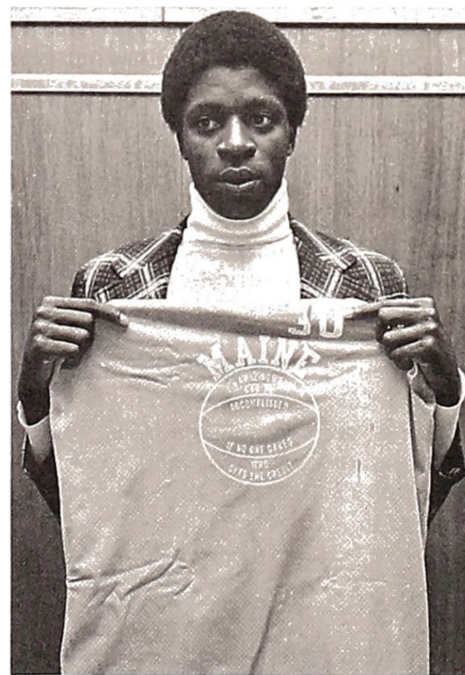
Searching for Snow?

Turbyne, an Education major, ranks behind 6-2, 210-pound Maren Seidler and looks forward to making a bid for a berth on the U.S. Olympic team. Ann and her teammates open the winter campaign at home December 2 against New Hampshire.

Why do we admit foreign students to this university? Certainly for the personal growth and education of the foreign student.

But the benefits are broader than the personal gains of the students.

How would you react if an international student dealt with you on the basis of information that was acquired through U.S. films about gangsters in the U.S. city, violence on the 6 o'clock news, or on the basis of a film about the Wild West?

From the opposite point of view — how would a student from Saudi Arabia react if you dealt with him on the basis of information you might have received portraying the Middle East as a land of deserts, camels, and nomads; or how would an African student react if you dealt with him on information you received portraying Africans as wearing loincloths and coming from the bush?

The point is, we receive information about people from other countries, and they about us, primarily through mass media. The media often focus on a very small aspect of life in another land and by so doing distort or misrepresent the realities of the people from that country, including the United States.

Informational understanding does not develop in a vacuum. The extent to which people know and understand one another is directly related to their interaction with one another.

The focus of the International Office at UMO is to enhance the international dimension of education in Maine by making possible opportunities for interaction between and among various cultures. Programs that lend themselves to this goal are the Host Family Program; programs for grade and secondary schools, clubs, churches and other organizations; programs for UMO classes; social events that include not only American students but faculty and families from the surrounding communities; and Cross-Cultural Communication Workshops.



The foreign student population number is small (110 from 30 different countries), but our population is lively and active!

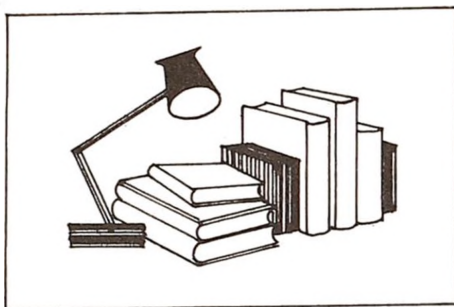

***History of Current Maine Newspapers* by Alan R. Miller: Eastland Press, Inc., Lisbon Falls, ME. 1978, 627 pages, Soft cover \$14.95, Hard cover \$17.95.**

Back in 1903 a Boston, Massachusetts, itinerant peddler, who spoke uncertain English, came to Aroostook County and, being left-handed, took all the wrong turns on various roads as he sought to find Fort Fairfield.

Some youngsters showed him a shortcut to the town across a field and the peddler set out on foot only to have his pack become entangled in a barbed wire fence. A snowshoe party finally came to his rescue and when he was located, was making a noise somewhat akin to two dogs fighting and his rescuers couldn't make out if he was praying or swearing

The front page story of the event carried in the *Caribou Aroostook Republican* ended rather cryptically. It reported the peddler's accomplishments with this line: "He sold one undershirt in two days"

The story is one of the many glimpses of life in Maine from the early 19th century to the present included in a 627-page book entitled "The History of Current Maine Newspapers" written by University of Maine at Orono journalism professor Alan R. Miller and published by the Eastland Press, Inc. of Lisbon Falls.

Miller, who took a sabbatical from UMO in 1975 to accumulate material for the book, reviews and chronicles the trials and tribulations of some 50 Maine newspapers, thereby mirroring the history of the state from as early as 1817 to 1976. He illustrates it with early and late samples of typical front pages of the various publications.

Although Miller draws upon his expertise to accurately describe in newspaper or print terms the operations and changes over the years of the various papers, his liberal use of such terms as letterpress, cold type, long primer type, sans serif typeface, column rules, picas, fonts and ECRM front-end systems should not detract from the layman's enjoyment of the book.

For throughout the publication are revealed many of the fascinating and often forgotten mini-episodes that can particularly excite the history buff.

For instance, there was the story in the *Piscataquis Observer*, Dover-Foxcroft, of an 1876 July 4 celebration when a raft-load of fireworks went up in a blaze of multi-colored explosions when the super patriot

handling the display, who was also somewhat inebriated, inadvertently dropped a match. The patriot escaped by diving into the river, but one of the rockets went through the window of a nearby home.

In an effort at consideration and adhering to the Victorian modesty of the day, the writer of the story wound up the account by writing, "The rocket badly frightened Mrs. Rogers and her child." The story was accurate up to a point but the writer neglected to explain that the child was still in the embryonic stage. In those days the source of babies was still supposed to be a mystery, comments Miller in his book. Needless to say, Mrs. Rogers was not happy to have her maternal status publicized and told the editor so in no uncertain terms. The matter was apparently settled peacefully, however.

The *Bethel News* back in 1896 published a centennial edition and in it provided a thumbnail sketch of the community. Among its resources were listed 20 widows, 79 pretty girls, 47 girl bachelors, dogs worth about a dime each, one law student and a telegraph operator who sings "They're After Me." The same edition listed the needs of the community as electric lights, a shoe factory, more sidewalks, a caterpillar exterminator and a railroad to Rumford Falls.

And if you feel the *Bangor Daily News* of today is aggressive, consider its earliest ancestor which, after a year of operation, boasted editorially in 1890 that among other things it had brought about cleaner streets, improved the orchestra of the Opera House, its advice had settled mill strikes, it showed up the rottenness of the

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"Suthin": An Oral History of Grover Morrison's Wood Operation at Little Musquash Lake, 1945-1947. by Stephen Bal-
lew, Joan Brooks, Doba Brotz and Ed-
ward Ives. Orono: University of Maine
Printing Office, 1978. \$4.00.

"Suthin'," which means the opposite of "nothing," is the title of the latest publica-
tion by Dr. Edward Ives and his class. It is
the eighteenth volume published by the
Northeast Archives of Folklore and Oral
History.

The book chronicles a lumber cutting
operation in Washinton County during
1945-1947. Based on a poem written by
James McKinnon, who was Diamond
Match Company's inspector of the woods
operation, the volume explains from soup
to nuts, or in this case from contracting the
operation to milling the lumber, the ex-
tent of the administration and work that
such an operation required.

With its wealth of details, which are
primarily expressed as direct quotations
from the men actually involved in the op-
eration, this book excels as a documenta-
tion of a woodcutting operation at that
time in history. The details include such
tidbits as the companies in Bangor where
supplies for the camp were purchased, a
description of the different characteristics
of good wood and the diseases that de-
tracted from wood quality, and a menu of
the woodsmen's meals, including a recipe
for molasses filled cookies. The amount of
work and time spent on the publication is
evident, given the multitude of specifics
that make up the text.

The pictorial contribution to the text —
primarily photographs and maps inter-
persed with a few diagrams — represents
a story within a story. Many of the pho-
tographs were gifts from Grover Morrison's,
head of the operation, personal collection.
Since most were taken during the actual
operation when the photographic
methods were not as advanced as they are
currently, the prints provide a certain au-
thenticity to the story of the work done
near Little Musquash Lake. Many of the
diagrams are informative about the actual
procedures followed by the men, and, as
such, also create a feeling about the type of
life endured by the men during the stint.
Altogether, the figures tell the story nearly
as well as the text itself.

Morrison, the boss of the operation,
emerges from the pages as a strong ad-
ministrator and a decent man. When
asked to oversee the operation in his post
retirement years, he is quoted as having
said "I figured I might as well wear out as

rust out." His astuteness in choosing his
crew is evident in his statement that he'd
look around at the condition of a man's
home and farming equipment when seek-
ing men for the operation. From such
seemingly irrelevant details, he judged —
generally correctly — the fitness of the
particular man for his operation. Com-
ments by the crew show that he was well-
liked and able as crew chief. That he was
able to assert himself is shown in an inci-
dent in which he fired a complaining cook
who had thought he was a law unto him-
self. "Well," I says, "when you get your
clothes packed and evrything ready for
Bangor, your check will be ready in the
office. . . . That will be the day when I take
someone else's orders how to run my busi-
ness." Morrison then is more than a name
on the page throughout the entire vol-
ume.

This book provides an evidently much
needed history. Judged by this criteria, its
worth cannot be denied. As a history and
as an explanation of the wood cutting pro-
cess, the book is a significant contribution.

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say? There we were, UMO, the land-grant institution of Maine, caught with monogrammed garbage bags. But Alan, bless his heart, "disposed" of the question, reporting that the cost of the paper garbage bags we had been using had risen to \$.26 each and the Physical Plant had discovered a company which would provide plastic bags for \$.12 each and, moreover, in order to discourage pilferage, they volunteered to print "Property of the University of Maine", on each bag at no extra cost. In one year there was a savings of \$2,000. Alumni Hall breathed a collective sigh of relief.

Another "close call" came in August of 1977 with receipt of the following letter: "I humbly point out that this learned institution is inviting embarrassment by using the word 'except' in place of 'accept' on the attached notice." The notice, incidently, was the "Return to Sender" stamp with which postage-due mail was refused. No question about it, the stamp read, "The University of Maine refuses to except any mail that is short paid." I forwarded the letter to our mail department fully prepared to accept defeat and salvage what institutional respect I could by making up some story about an alternate Olde Englyshe spelling. But once again, our citadel of learning emerged unscathed. Upon investigation we learned that the villain was, believe it or not, the U.S. Post Office — even then they were not having a good year.

Sometimes, of course, letters to *Dialogue* summon us to address life's great mysteries. I recall, for instance, one letter in March of 1978 asking, "Why does the water in the toilets go up and down on windy days?" With the help of the plumbing department, and the Physics Department we "flushed out" an answer. They both agreed that "when the wind blows across the top of the vent pipes, the air pressure in the pipe drops below the pressure inside . . . causing the level of water in the toilet to drop." The physics department went on to identify the phenomenon as the Bernoulli Effect. (And my friends thought that I had left the great metaphysical issues behind when I moved from the Philosophy Department to Alumni Hall!)

Of course, the items I've just mentioned are hardly a representative sample. In the two years since its inception, *Dialogue* has provided an opportunity to share information, gather suggestions, and respond to questions. I think, if asked to state my overriding impressions after two years as

Editor of *Dialogue*, I would have to say, first, that we have many people here who care deeply about this University. They offer suggestions to make it a better place; they criticize what they see to be its weaknesses; they take pride in its strength. By the same token, time and time again the faculty and staff responding to these inquiries have demonstrated that there are usually good reasons for practices and procedures on campus and that when there are not, they are open to change and modification. As for me, I sit (as is, perhaps, appropriate for a philosopher), above the fray and marvel at the concern and good will of the questioners and at the competence and good humor of the respondents.

"four years to harden" bridge road job and it reorganized the police department.

That ancient crusader was George Miner who came to Bangor from New York City and "immediately stirred up the town." Although his impact on the area was evident, it is safe to say that he was no more visible than his modern day counterpart, James Russell Wiggins, editor and publisher of the *Ellsworth American* and a former editor of the *Washington Post*.

Since purchasing the *American* Wiggins has taken on, among others, the U.S. Postal Service and the Teamsters Union. In his book, Miller recounts how Wiggins, hired a drover and team of oxen to carry his mail to Surry seven miles away and then sent a duplicate letter through the U.S. mail. . The ox cart letter reached its destination the same day but the letter sent via the post office arrived 19 hours, 52 minutes and 30 seconds later, thereby enabling Wiggins to make his point about what he felt was the folly of government bureaucracy.

Miller's book contains many such gems from the past. It also provides some opinions about the future of Maine newspapers. But more than that, it shows the resilience of those people known by many different names but who pick up the pen, survive fire and financial distress and doggedly chronicle the history of their individual communities, thereby giving the reader a grass roots view of how it was — and is — to live in the State of Maine.

Students Operate Their Own Credit Union

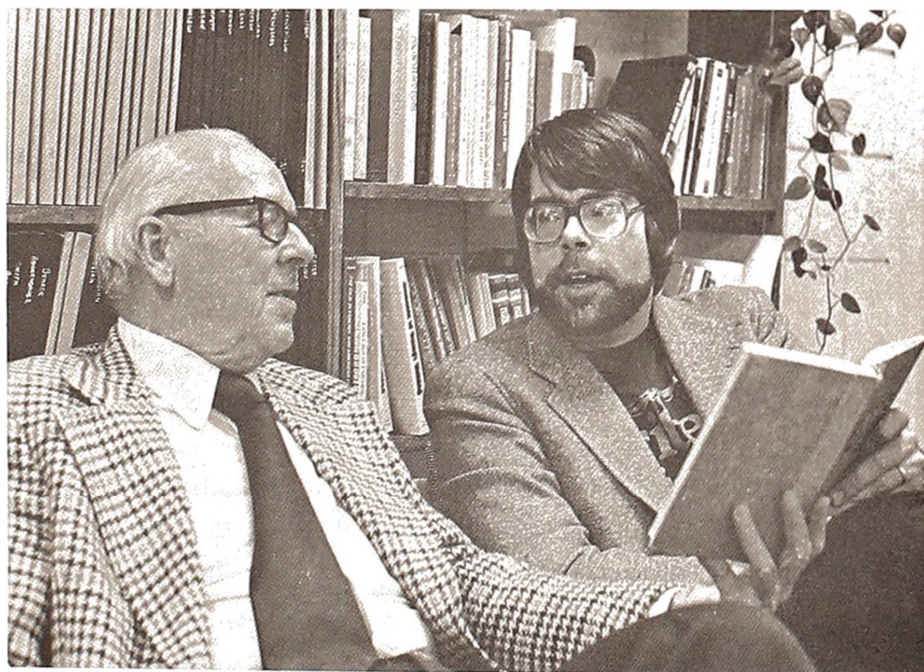
The new Student Credit Union at UMO has experienced phenomenal growth since its inception in July when it was issued its charter by the National Credit Administration as one of only three college student credit unions in the nation.

With a \$2,500 investment from the Student Government at UMO along with advice from many area bankers as well as office materials, and surplus bank equipment, the credit union had accumulated more than \$135,000 worth of assets by mid-October with 620 members. It is run completely by student volunteers, about 55 of them, with approximately a quarter from non-business areas.

The credit union will be offering UMO students savings accounts, low-interest loans, travelers checks, money orders, check cashing, and financial counseling. Its officers feel it will take a year or two before significant numbers of loans are made, but the potential exists for a half-million dollar credit union working for students, by students.



Senior Linda M. Carroll is the reigning Miss Maine 1978. She is pursuing a double degree in music and plans to attend graduate school in the West next fall. Along with the many appearances as Miss Maine, she has been active in the Opera Theater program at the University. In September, she participated in the Miss America Pageant in Atlantic City. UMO Chosen in Kodak Program to Support Excellence

The University of Maine at Orono is one of only four colleges or universities in New England selected to participate in a new Eastman Kodak program designed to support and encourage academic excellence at 58 public and private colleges and universities throughout the United States.

The scholarships are provided for the recipients starting in their sophomore years and continuing for two more years or until the completion of a bachelor's degree, contingent on the student's ability to maintain standards established by the University. In addition, unrestricted supplemental grants of \$300 will be made annually by Kodak to the departments in which the scholars are enrolled. Receiving the scholarships, which provide 75 per cent of the yearly tuition costs, are Jeffrey S. Cross of Augusta, Jeffrey N. Johnson of Presque Isle, Geoffrey Eggert of Stillwater and James Paul Tardiff of Sanford.



LOW TUITION RATES AT UMO

The University of Maine at Orono has the second lowest in-state tuition and fee schedule (\$920) of any New England land grant university, while its out-of-state figure exactly meets the average for New England land grant schools. The average in-state tuition and fees for New England land grant and state universities is \$1,019. UMO's non-resident tuition and fees of \$2,501 is the average for all New England state universities and is less than those at Vermont and New Hampshire.

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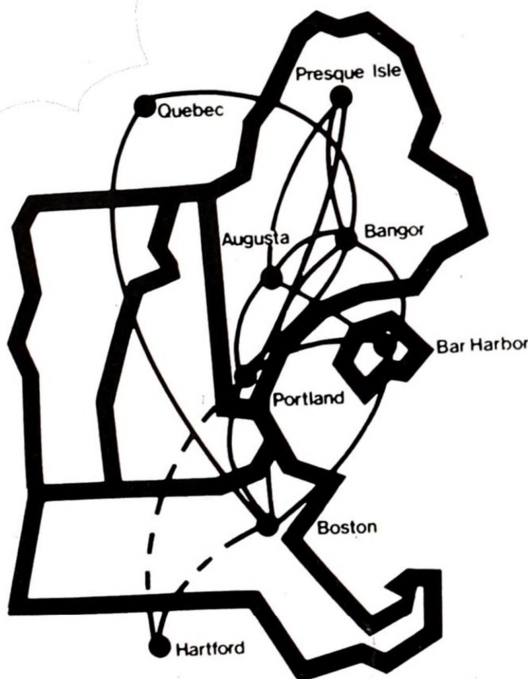
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
