Chairman Evans convened the meeting. On motion made and seconded, the minutes of the meetings held on September 24, 1981 were approved as circulated.

1. Chairman's Remarks. Dr. Evans reported briefly on a recent conference sponsored by the Association of Governing Boards in which he and Chancellor McCarthy had participated. Dr. Evans said he had led a workshop dealing with multi-campus governing boards. He noted that the other participants were particularly interested in the University of Maine in view of its development as a multi-campus system in an area where financial resources have always been very limited. He indicated that the AGB will be sponsoring other workshops dealing with issues in higher education and he encouraged other Trustees to attend if possible.

2. Chancellor's Report. Chancellor McCarthy took note of the annual report on enrollment which had been distributed to Trustees as the meeting began. He reported that overall figures for Fall, 1981 (306,171 credit hours) compared closely with last year's totals (306,200 credit hours), although there are some variations among individual Campus enrollments.

Chancellor McCarthy also commented on an issue which had been publicized in the weekend press concerning the question of continued participation by the State and the University in the New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE). He observed that the six-state compact was created originally during a period of increasing enrollments, to promote and coordinate a regional student exchange program as an alternative to costly expansion of educational facilities in the New England states. The Chancellor indicated that given the prospect for declining enrollments, the University must consider how best to maintain equity for its students and create quality education at all levels. He said that the concept of regional cooperation is still essential, but pointed out that reduced tuitions for incoming NEBHE students constitute no-need scholarships and that foregone tuition in Maine last

year amounted to approximately \$750,000. Mr. Reynolds noted that students coming to Maine from the other New England states outnumber Maine students enrolled in NEBHE programs elsewhere by a factor of 2 to 1. He reported that the cost to the State for participation in NEBHE has been increasing at the rate of about \$5,000 per year and that membership for next year will cost \$75,000. Since withdrawal from the NEBHE compact must be announced two years in advance and acted on by the Legislature, notice of the State's intent to withdraw has been given at the request of the Governor. The Governor has asked the State Department of Education to study the issue carefully during the two-year waiting period before the withdrawal action takes effect. During discussion, the Chancellor responded to questions on specific NEBHE program offerings, cost implications for the University, and benefits to Maine students. He reiterated that he was not recommending that there be no cooperative exchange of students from other states. He suggested that such cooperation might be better achieved at the campus and system levels, and he reported that an effort is underway to determine whether appropriate arrangements could be provided outside the Compact. Mr. Beliveau said the Trustees would need to explore a number of issues including the impact of participation in NEBHE on the State's budget and on the University's budget, and whether separate agreements could accomplish the desired objectives at less cost to the University and the State. Mr. Reynolds suggested that the benefits of the regional program to Maine students should also be considered and he announced that the State Department of Educational and Cultural Services, of which he is the Commissioner, would be interested in cooperating with the University in its review of the NEBHE program. After further discussion, it was agreed that the Chancellor would prepare the necessary background information to support the Trustee's study of the issues involved.

At the request of the Chancellor, the Presidents briefed the Trustees on Campus activities.

President Richard Spath, UMFK:

- Discussion between the French faculties at the Fort Kent and Orono Campuses, which were initiated two years ago, have culminated in a federal grant for \$150,000, which will be used for bilingual education with a strong focus on language training. A large portion of this money will be allocated for student assistance.
- A new course, "Writing Across the Curriculum," is operating at full capacity with 22 faculty from School Administrative District No. 27 enrolled on a voluntary basis. Course objectives are to raise standards and improve writing competence and on completion of the program, the District faculty will develop the Northern Maine Writing Institute. There are no federal funds in this program which was developed at the initiative of the Superintendent of SAD #27 and the Fort Kent Campus.

- Following his report, President Spath responded to questions concerning a drop in Fall enrollment at Fort Kent. He indicated that insufficient financial aid was the primary factor, noting that enrollment at Fort Kent often increases in the Spring term since some area students tend to drop out for a semester to earn money for college expenses, rather than borrow to continue their studies.

Acting President Hilton Power, UMA:

- A series of training activities included a workshop for part-time faculty, jointly sponsored by UMA and USM, which was held in Portland on October 24th, with more than 200 faculty in attendance.
- The Campus had received a \$35,000 grant which will improve the quality and availability of equipment for the nursing program.
- As a group, UMA nursing program graduates scored in the top ten in the State licensing examinations.

President Paul Silverman, UMO:

- In the last fiscal year, external funding from federal agencies and private foundations increased 21%, which reflects the competency and competitiveness of UMO faculty in the national arena. Twenty-five percent of the faculty obtain some kind of external funding; 30-40% of the faculty are involved in generating proposals.
- Recent statistics indicate that UMO has attracted more National Merit Scholars than many other institutions with substantially larger student populations: Ohio University, University of Arizona and Rutgers, among others.
- In national exams, Orono engineering students continue to rank among the top contenders. In the dental hygiene exam, the BCC program ranked 3rd, nationally, in a field of 195 schools, and first, nationally, when compared with programs where the majority of students are in the second year of college.
- Following his report President Silverman responded to questions of interest. Dr. Russell suggested that in a future report, the President discuss some of the particular types of research being conducted at UMO.

Acting President Harlan Philippi, UMF:

- The planning program begun under President Olsen is continuing and the next major decision point will be reached about December

- The Teacher Education program has received accreditation from the State for a five-year period, except for Secondary Education which was scheduled for a return visit in one year, prior to approval. The National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education accredited the program, including Secondary Education, for the full seven year period. In response to a question about the State's concerns, Dr. Philippi indicated that the number of full time faculty involved in the program at the secondary level was the major issue. He said that representatives from the State Department and from the Campus will attempt to resolve the problems. Trustee Reynolds, who is the Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services, reported that some progress has already been made by the Committee.

President Robert Woodbury, USM:

- The conference sponsored jointly by UMA and USM, and referred to earlier by President Power, was considered immensely successful in beginning to address the critical issue of part-time faculty throughout the system.
- Enrollment levels at USM remain quite good but inadequate funding for financial aid is a serious problem. Unmet need increased 118% this year at USM.
- Some years ago the New Enterprise Institute was established by the Center for Research and Advanced Study, to offer sustained and direct consulting and technical services to Maine's small and/or failing businesses, and new entrepreneurs. A recent study, using a variety of conservative measures, concluded that the Institute has had a direct impact on development of new business in the State which has produced 500 new jobs, annual business sales of \$18,000,000 and generated nearly \$4,000,000 per year in new tax revenue.

President Constance Carlson, UMPI:

- A decrease in Fall enrollment is attributed to an untimely vacancy in the position of Admissions Director during the critical period for student recruitment. The position has been filled and recruitment is underway for next year.
- The 1981 Salutatorian has received a Rotary International Scholarship worth \$9,000 - \$12,000 to study at Montpellier University in France next year.
- To increase the community's awareness of the quality of the Campus, a series of events have been initiated which have included a breakfast for community business people to highlight the growing business program at UMPI; a concert featuring the Bangor Symphony Orchestra sponsored by the Campus and the local Kiwanis Club, which raised money for

scholarships; a Soviet Symposium which was presented under the leadership of the Soviet Studies program, the State Department, CIA, and with the cooperation of USM, UMO and the Chancellor's Office.

- The Campus has been awarded a \$200,000 Title III grant under the program for strengthening developing institutions. The grant is the largest of its kind to be awarded in Maine and it will enable UMPI to improve its academic and student services programs.

Acting President Frederic Reynolds, UMM:

- The Campus recently hosted the second annual conference on environmental studies sponsored jointly by the Presque Isle, Fort Kent and Machias Campuses. The conference was well attended and the participants explored their interests in peat bogs, Atlantic salmon, and blueberry production, among others.
- This past weekend, the University Women's Club and the Alumni Association sponsored the annual Homecoming celebration which was well attended.
- An increase in Fall enrollment is attributed to an expanded admissions staff which was funded from the Title III grant awarded to UMM last year.
- A grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities will enable the Campus to initiate study of a core curriculum.

Chairman Evans thanked the Presidents for their reports which he said reflect a high level of Campus leadership, inter-Campus collaboration, and interaction with the central administration, and he noted that these are the kinds of activities which have attracted the interest of other multi-campus institutions as they attempt to improve their own governance structures and internal relationships.

3. Report of the ad hoc Community College Study Committee. Dr. Evans recalled his appointment of an ad hoc Trustee committee in September, 1980, to examine the status of the community college effort in the University, and he invited Mr. Brown, who chaired the study committee, to present its report. Mr. Brown indicated he would not detail the report itself since it had been widely circulated prior to the meeting. He noted that the Committee had been charged to assess the community college situation in the University, and to consider needs for the future with attention to availability of resources, problem areas created by the State's geography and population distribution, and the economic status of prospective students. He expressed his appreciation to the other members of the Committee for their efforts, and to the staff whose assistance supported the Committee's deliberations.

Mr. Brown pointed out that part-time students constitute 38% of the University's enrollment at the present time and given the demographic projections and economic outlook, it is likely that further changes in the composition of the student population can be expected. He said that after extensive examination of community college operations, local and national, the Committee concluded that there is no single ideal model, and he noted that in the University system each Campus involved with community college activity has developed a different approach to meet unique local needs. He said that in the course of its study, the Committee gained a deeper understanding of the University's community college program and how that is being received and, on balance, Committee members believe the University is performing quite well in this area. The greatest weakness perceived by the Committee is the lack of any means to bring together those who are engaged in the operation of the several programs, to share their knowledge and experience for the benefit of all. Given the potential of the community college function, the Committee further concluded that it would be most important to suggest a means by which the University could utilize the talent and experience of those in the system who have been involved in community college activity. To this end, Mr. Brown reported, the Committee's central recommendation called for the establishment of a Council for the Advancement of Lifelong Learning to strengthen and expand the community college program. The Committee also recommended that the Council be established on an experimental basis with a review and evaluation of its accomplishments after a period of two years. On behalf of the Committee, Mr. Brown requested that the Board accept its report and implement the recommendations.

During discussion, Mr. Robinson raised questions about the financing of adult education. He suggested it would be appropriate for the University to consider whether a distinction should be made for tuition purposes, between undergraduate education and community college programs where many of the students tend to be working adults. Mr. Brown said the question could be explored again by the Council on Lifelong Learning, but he pointed out that the Board accepted the concept of equity for all students in its adoption of the academic planning report in 1977. Chancellor McCarthy said that the community college programs in the University are not separate and distinct from the undergraduate curriculum, and that the community college programs simply provide a more liberal access to undergraduate education. He added that the courses which are available primarily for self-enrichment are free-standing courses offered on a self-sustaining basis. Mr. Brown reported that the Study Committee came to realize that most of the adult learners are in fact career oriented students seeking essential job training, re-training or advancement skills. Mr. Robinson said he was not expressing disapproval of the program, but rather calling attention to the need to look carefully at the University's priorities in terms of available funds. He said it may be necessary to consider where responsibility lies for funding programs, in order to justify requests for State appropriations. Mr. Keene said it would be important to clarify any misperception by the public of the University's programs, and that it should be made clear that self-enrichment courses are self-sustaining. Dr. Evans said that the concept of an open university will be important in maintaining a qualitative and com-

petitive institution for the future, and he pointed out that the community college component helps to supply and support other programs in the system. After further discussion and on motion of Mr. Brown which was seconded it was

VOTED: to accept and implement the Report of the Trustee ad hoc Community College Study Committee.

4. Gifts, Grants and Awards. Mr. Hakanson, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the recommendation, and on his motion, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to accept with gratitude all gifts, grants and awards listed under the date of October 26, 1981.

5. Energy Conservation Modifications. Mr. Richardson, Chairman of the Physical Plant Committee, presented the recommendation. During discussion, Mr. Eustis responded to questions of interest. On motion of Mr. Richardson, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the following energy conservation modification projects to be funded through federal grants and the energy bond issue:

6. Purchase of Property, UMO. On motion of Mr. Richardson, which was seconded, it was



VOTED: to authorize the acquisition of the property at 378 College Avenue, Orono, from Professor and Mrs. Roland Struchtemeyer for \$63,750, subject to staff approval of the Title Certification and Deed and the Board further authorizes the use of accumulated reserves from land sales and funds from the Orono Incentive Budgeting Account to cover the acquisition cost.

7. Capital Construction Status Report. Mr. Richardson called attention to the report which was included with the meeting materials for information. No action was required.

8. Personnel Action - UMO. Mr. Morin, Chairman of the Personnel and Employee Relations Committee, presented a recommendation for a change of title to Assistant Vice President for Finance and Administration for Mr. Alden Stuart who now serves as Director of Budget and Fiscal Services. No change in salary would accompany the change in title. In response to questions from Mr. Beliveau, President Silverman reported that in addition to responsibility for the budget and fiscal services entailed in his present position, Mr. Stuart would perform other duties within the broad spectrum of responsibilities assigned to the Vice President for Finance and Administration. There was brief discussion of the wording of the recommendation when President Silverman indicated that the Campus administration had intended that Mr. Stuart would retain his current title along with the new title. Subsequently it was determined that there would be no replacement for Mr. Stuart in his present position and that the new title was intended to recognize significant additional responsibilities. The President concurred with a suggestion that the new title alone would be acceptable. On motion of Mr. Morin, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize a change of title of Mr. Alden E. Stuart from Director of Budget and Fiscal Services to Assistant Vice President for Finance and Administration at the University of Maine at Orono effective October 26, 1981.

9. Personnel Action - UMO. Mr. Morin presented a recommendation for a change of title for Mr. Philip Dufour to Assistant Vice President for Research and Public Service, which carried no increase in base salary but proposed an administrative stipend of \$3,600. During discussion it was determined that there was some uncertainty about the rationale for the stipend in this instance. Chancellor McCarthy explained that stipends are appropriate when administrative responsibilities are added to other duties and he noted that the Board has approved a stipend scale which indicates what individuals will be paid for temporary assignments. He pointed out that without a stipend mechanism, the University would be committed to a salary level which has no relationship to the position the individual returns to when a temporary assignment is finished. Mr. Beliveau and Mr. Monaghan expressed reservations about the stipend mechanism to the extent it might be used to circumvent the salary structure. Mr. Keene said he thought the concept had merit but he recommended that the Board

review the stipend philosophy at some point. It was suggested that the stipend proposed for Mr. Dufour be integrated into the salary and President Silverman indicated he had no objection. At Mr. Robinson's request, it was agreed that the recommendation would be acted upon, as presented, with the understanding that President Silverman would re-examine the compensation structure for this position and report to the Board at the next meeting. With this understanding and on motion of Mr. Morin, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to approve the recommendation for a change of title for Mr. F. Philip Dufour to Assistant Vice President for Research and Public Services, and an administrative stipend of \$3,600.

10. Collective Bargaining Update. Mr. D'Amico, Associate Vice Chancellor for Employee Relations, reported:

- Faculty unit - under the auspices of the fact-finders, the University is meeting informally with the union to reduce the number of issues to be considered.
- Professional unit - fact-finding has been filed and a package of informal, tentative agreements will eventually be sent to the membership and the Board.
- Police unit - a joint fact-finding request is being prepared by both parties which has not yet been submitted to the MLRB.
- Clerical unit - negotiations are continuing for the unit's first contract.
- Service & Maintenance unit - negotiations have begun for next year's contract.

Mr. Richardson asked what had been done to implement the Board's request at the last meeting that the University's position on faculty contract issues be made public. Mr. D'Amico reported that in a meeting with the fact-finders which was held the same day as the Board meeting, University negotiators had agreed to withhold publicity until the issues have been more clearly defined and narrowed. Chancellor McCarthy noted that the University's position in fact has been published in the Chancellor's Newsletter which is distributed throughout the system.

Mr. Morin moved adjournment to executive session for discussion of collective bargaining matters. The motion was seconded and VOTED.

Following the executive session, Chairman Evans reconvened the meeting.

11. Other business. Dr. Evans presented a proposed resolution submitted by David Spellman to the Executive Committee during its agenda briefing earlier in the session:

Proposed Resolution.

That the Board of Trustees, the Administration, the Faculty and the Students put together an informal committee to consider the following:

1. What level of funding is necessary to keep our faculty and staff in order to maintain and promote the quality of the University of Maine;
2. What and Where are the resources of this funding;
3. What can reasonably be expected from these resources; AND,
4. How these resources are to be tapped.

Dr. Evans announced that discussion of the proposed resolution will be held by the Executive Committee at the next meeting, in lieu of the agenda briefing for faculty and student representatives.

Dr. Evans announced that the next meeting would be held in Bangor on December 7, 1981.

Endowments

The Ellen W. Platz Scholarship Fund was established at the University of Maine at Orono in 1981 by Ellen W. Platz. The income from the Fund shall be distributed every school year to deserving students attending the University of Maine at Orono who are in need of financial assistance in order to complete their undergraduate college education. Awards shall be made by the Office of Student Aid at UMO.

The Luther N. Amos Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 at the University of Maine at Orono by a bequest from Luther N. Amos, Class of 1917. The income from this fund is to provide assistance to a student with financial need, with preference to be given to a student enrolled in the College of Engineering and Science at the University of Maine at Orono. The recipients of this award shall be selected by the Office of Student Aid.

The Michael Woods Art Scholarship was established in 1981 at the University of Maine at Augusta by family and friends in memory of Michael Woods, artist and faculty member at the University of Maine at Augusta. The income will be awarded annually to an incoming freshman student pursuing an academic program in Art. The selection will be made by the Chairperson and a member of the Art Department at UMA.

Restricted

The Camden Rotary Scholarship was established in 1981 at the University of Maine at Augusta by a gift from the Camden Rotary Club. The award will be given annually to deserving Camden or Rockport residents who are taking courses through Mid-Coast Community College Services. The awards are to be made by the Director of Financial Aid at UMA.

To provide for disbursement of income from funds previously established in the University of Maine Foundation:

The Irene R. Wells Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 in the University of Maine Foundation at the University of Maine at Orono through a bequest from the estate of the late Irene R. Wells. The income from this fund is to be used to provide scholarships to deserving students enrolled at the University of Maine at Orono. Awards shall be made by the Office of Student Aid.

The Herbert A. and Eleanor L. Leonard Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 in the University of Maine Foundation at the University of Maine at Orono by Herbert A. Leonard, Class of 1939, for students majoring in Animal and Veterinary Sciences, with preference given to associate degree students in Animal Technology in the upper third of their class and who have a bona fide interest in large animal agriculture. Awards shall be made annually by the Office of Student Aid in consultation with the Scholarship Committee of the College of Life Sciences and Agriculture.

The John G. Sinclair Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 in the University of Maine Foundation at the University of Maine at Orono through gifts from friends of John G. Sinclair to honor his years of service in the forest industry. The income from this fund is to provide scholarships to needy students from the State of Maine who are enrolled in the School of Forest Resources and major in Forestry and Forest Products at the University of Maine at Orono. Selection of award recipients shall be made by the Office of Student Aid in consultation with the Dean of the College of Life Sciences and Agriculture.

The Patrick P. Marino Memorial Fund was established in 1981 in the University of Maine Foundation at the University of Maine at Orono by family and friends in honor of Patrick P. Marion '78. The income from this fund is to be awarded annually to a needy undergraduate student at the University of Maine at Orono with a satisfactory academic record, and preference shall be given to members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity. The selection of the student shall be made by the Office of Student Aid.

The William and Jennie Buchanan Scholarship Fund was established in 1981 in the University of Maine Foundation at the University of Maine at Orono by friends and family of the late William and Jennie Buchanan. The income from the fund is to provide scholarships for needy students who are enrolled in a curriculum leading to a degree in nursing. This scholarship is available only to students who are graduates of Penquis Valley High School, Old Town High School, or Stearns High School enrolled at the University of Maine at Orono or the University of Southern Maine. The selection of the recipients shall be made by the Office of Student Aid.

Steve Gould Award

December 22, 1907 - October 26, 1979

Created by the family and friends of Steve Gould in loving memory of a man of honest and passionate concern for others. The Award shall be made by the President of the University of Maine at Orono to those persons or organizations who have by their conduct demonstrated superior qualities of unselfishness and compassion in the course of service to the University and its ideals. Students, staff, faculty members and organizations serving the University of Maine at Orono community are eligible for this Award which shall be granted at such times, and in such amounts, as the President in his sole discretion deems appropriate.
