BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

PRESENT: Chairman Thomas Monaghan, Severin Beliveau, James Bowers, Francis Brown, Patricia DiMatteo, Stanley Evans, Joseph Hakanson, Peter Johnston, Geneva Kirk, Richard Morin, Ellen Wasserman. Absent: Robert Boose, Robert Dunfey, Alan Elkins, Richard Marshall and Harrison Richardson. Staff: Chancellor McCarthy, William Sullivan, Harlan Philippi, Mary Ann Haas, Samuel D'Amico, Richard Eustis, Russell Smith, Edward Winchester, Constance Carlson, Richard Spath, Robert Woodbury, Byron Skinner, Frederic Reynolds, Arthur Johnson and Judith Sturnick. Press and public.

Chairman Monaghan convened the meeting. On motion made and seconded, the minutes of the meetings of April 23, 1984, were approved as circulated.

1. Citizen Input. Mr. Ernest Gallant, Old Town, Maine, played a recording he had taped from a late-night music program broadcast over WMEB, the student-operated radio station at UMO. He said he was not naive about the type of music available on radio and he was not condemning broadcasting stations in general or the University's stations in particular. He said his intent was to provide information so the Trustees could decide whether the type of music was the kind they wished to have broadcast for student consumption. He pointed out that as holder of the station's FCC license, the Board had the authority to determine what could be aired and whether the content was compatible with traditional American values. Mr. Beliveau determined that Mr. Gallant had not received a copy of a letter to the Trustees from Professor Jonathan Tankel, faculty advisor to WMEB, which outlined the standards prescribed for operation of the student station. The Chairman directed that a copy of the letter be sent to Mr. Gallant and he thanked Mr. Gallant for taking the time to speak to the Board about his concerns.

2. Chairman's Remarks. Mr. Monaghan, whose term in the Chair is expiring, expressed his appreciation to the Trustees and the staff for their support during his term of office, and he called attention to President Sturnick's recent inaugural address on the meaning of education, which he said he had found particularly thoughtful and relevant. Mr. Brown, who will be retiring as Vice Chairman, added his thanks and commended Mr. Monaghan for his service in the Chair.

3. Chancellor's Report. Chancellor McCarthy commended the outgoing officers for a rewarding term. He also took note of a number of people he said should be publicly thanked for their support of the University's request for a supplemental salary appropriation, which has now been approved by the Legislature. The Chancellor said that the unions had been very helpful in educating the Legislature about the University's

needs, and he also recognized the efforts of Campus Presidents, administrators and Board members, particularly Trustee Beliveau. He expressed appreciation for the bipartisan support in the Legislature and the extraordinary contributions of Representative Stephen Bost, sponsor of the bill, and Senator Nancy Clark, Representative Elizabeth Mitchell, Senator Samuel Collins, and Senator Mary Najarian, Senate Chairman of the Appropriations Committee. Mr. Beliveau reported that the University's request was the only item before the Appropriations Committee in this session that was not reduced, and he said that Senator Najarian was responsible for maintaining the full level of funding for the University.

3. Presidents' Reports

- University of Maine at Presque Isle. President Carlson reported that for the first time, a sizable number of UMPI seniors will be continuing their education through graduate studies. She noted that the connections between business and education which have been stressed at UMPI are apparently being strengthened elsewhere as well. One UMPI student accepted by Duke University in its MBA program has been advised that Duke now requires two years' business experience prior to matriculation in their graduate program.
- University of Southern Maine. President Woodbury reported that the contract has been awarded for renovation of the Campus Center and commended USM students, who have pledged \$50,000 to help fund that project.
- University of Maine at Orono. President Johnson reported that the Bingham Trustees have reaffirmed their interest in UMO and have added significantly to their endowment of the Center for Study of Early Man. President Johnson also reported that the Campus's marine science effort is developing into a high quality program that will enable UMO to take a leadership role in the Gulf of Maine.
- University of Maine at Augusta. President Skinner reported that the Campus would hold a tree-planting ceremony later this week to commemorate the lifework of Dr. Martin Luther King. President Johnson, UMO, and Governor Brennan will be present for the ceremony. President Skinner also reported that UMA and UMO will co-sponsor a summer institute which will feature author Ivan Illich and other European intellectuals to provide a forum for intellectual exchange.

4. Gifts, Grants and Awards. Mr. Hakanson, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the recommendation and moved its approval. The motion was seconded, and it was

VOTED: to accept with gratitude all gifts, grants and awards listed under date of May 21, 1984.

5. Supplemental Retirement Plan. Mr. Hakanson reported that the Plan would improve benefits for older retirees. On motion of Mr. Hakanson, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: that the supplemental retirement plan prepared by the Emeriti Committee be approved with funding not to exceed \$25,000 per annum.

6. Capital Construction Status Report. Mrs. DiMatteo called attention to the report which was circulated for information with materials for the meeting.

7. Admissions Standards. Mr. Monaghan took note of a report from the staff on current admissions standards and practices that was prepared in response to his request for a study of the admissions area to determine whether the University's standards should be strengthened. He said that after receiving the report he was wholly satisfied that the standards are adequate and appropriate. Elaborating on the report, Chancellor McCarthy said the study had provided the Administrative Council an opportunity to examine and debate commonly held beliefs. He said the staff had concluded that standards for admission can best be defined in two categories: ordinary and extraordinary. Ordinary standards are those associated with the completion of the traditional high school requirements. Extraordinary standards are applied in two ways: 1) the special requirements designed to insure success in certain programs, i.e. the emphasis on mathematics for prospective engineering students; 2) the performance-based measurements for prospective students who lack the traditional academic background, such measurements most often being applied after admission. Mrs. Wasserman suggested that the University examine its experience with open admissions, as well, and weigh such issues as the need for remedial programs against the time required and costs involved in the delivery of such programs. Chancellor McCarthy agreed that these are very important issues and he said a lot of work is being done in this area. He indicated that the mix of students in higher education is changing radically and the University will be dealing, at all levels, with more non-traditional students whose different requirements, life-styles and educational goals will have significant implications for the delivery of higher education programs.

8. New Program, UMPI. Miss Kirk presented the recommendation and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and

VOTED: to approve the Bachelor of Science in Educational Computing, to be offered by the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

9. Governance and Reorganization, UMA. Miss Kirk presented the recommendation. During discussion, President Skinner responded to questions from

the Trustees about the proposed salary adjustments. On motion of Miss Kirk, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to approve the Proposed UMA Governance,
reassignments made therein and salary
adjustments.

10. Academic Calendars. Miss Kirk called attention to the academic calendars for each Campus for the coming year, which listing was presented for information with the materials circulated for the meeting. No action was required.

11. Employee Compensation Increase, 1983/84-1984/85. Dr. Evans, Chairman of the Personnel and Employee Relations Committee, presented the recommendation, which had been discussed earlier in an executive session of the Committee. Dr. Evans reported that the three-part recommendation provided for 1) implementation of the collective bargaining agreements approved by the Board in February contingent upon funding, which has just been approved by the Legislature; 2) equity for non-represented employees including 3) senior executives: the Chancellor, Vice Chancellors, and Campus Presidents. Dr. Evans

MOVED: that the Chancellor or his designee be directed to take appropriate administrative steps to:

1. Implement collective bargaining agreements
2. Provide equivalent salaries, wages, terms and conditions of employment to non-represented and confidential employees
3. Provide Senior Executive Officers (Chancellor, Vice Chancellors and Presidents) in 1983/84 a TIAA-CREF retirement contribution increase of 5.4% but no increase in salary and in 1984/85 a salary increase equivalent to that received by other University professional employees.

The motion was seconded. During discussion, the Chancellor responded to questions from Mr. Beliveau concerning the increase in the retirement contribution for senior executives. The Chancellor indicated that the retirement contribution for these individuals would be raised from the current 8% to 13.4%, beginning July 1, 1983. He noted that this was an alternative way of paying the increase and the dollar

amount would be slightly less than a 5.4% increase in salary. In the second year of the biennium the 5.4% increase for senior executives would be applied to salaries. After further discussion, the motion was VOTED.

12. Appointment of Assistant Professor, Electrical Engineering, UMO.
On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Mr. Keith Alan Christianson, as Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, University of Maine at Orono, effective September 1, 1984, at an academic year salary of \$34,500 for the initial one-year appointment.

13. Appointment of Assistant Professor, Electrical Engineering, UMO.
On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Dr. Peter J. McKenny, as Assistant Professor of Electrical Engineering, University of Maine at Orono, effective September 1, 1984, at an academic year salary of \$35,000.

14. Appointment of Visiting Professor of Electrical Engineering, UMO.
On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Dr. Waldemar Soluch, as Visiting Professor of Electrical Engineering, University of Maine at Orono, effective September 1, 1984, at an academic year salary of \$32,000, for this one-year appointment.

15. Appointment of Associate Dean, UMO. On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Dr. Fred B. Knight, as Associate Dean of the College of Forest Resources, University of Maine at Orono, effective September 1, 1984, at a fiscal year salary of \$50,382. This does not represent an increase in Dr. Knight's current salary.

16. Appointment of Director of Instructional Systems, UMO. On motion

of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Mr. Andrew Abbott, as Director of the Instructional Systems Center, University of Maine at Orono, effective July 1, 1984, at a fiscal year salary of \$30,600.

17. Appointment of Manager, University Printing Department, UMO. On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to authorize the appointment of Mr. Johnston G. MacDonald, as Manager of the University Printing Department, in the Public Information and Central Services area, University of Maine at Orono, effective May 28, 1984, at a salary of \$30,000.

18. Salary Adjustments - Faculty/Administrators. On motion of Dr. Evans, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to approve the following salary adjustments:

Edgar Cyrus, Chairperson, Department of Theatre/Dance, UMO, from \$27,073 to \$30,073, for additional duties as chairperson of the department, effective 9/1/84.

Paul Uttormark, Acting Director of Sponsored Programs Division, UMO, from \$40,447 to \$42,847, for additional duties as acting director of the department, effective 4/1/84 - 8/31/84.

Philip Nesbit, Chairperson of Department of Music, UMO, from \$25,559 to \$28,309, for additional duties as chairperson of the department, effective 9/1/84.

19. Report of Nominating Committee. At the February meeting the Executive Committee appointed a nominating committee, in accordance with the Bylaws of the Board, to present a slate of officers at the annual meeting. The Committee consisted of Dr. Evans, Chairman; Mrs. Wasserman, Mr. Dunfey and Mr. Marshall. Dr. Evans reported that the Committee nominates Mr. Hakanson for the office of Chairman, and Mr. Morin for the office of Vice

Chairman. Mr. Monaghan called for other nominations from the floor. There being none, Miss Kirk moved acceptance of the slate. The motion was seconded and carried. Mr. Hakanson thanked the Trustees for their confidence and good will.

20. Revision of Bylaws - length of Trustee terms. Mr. Brown presented the recommendation which was initiated to achieve conformity with a recent change in State statutes. On motion of Mr. Brown, which was seconded, it was

VOTED: to revise the By-laws of the Board of Trustees of the University of Maine by replacing Section 1.2a with the following:

The Board of Trustees consists of sixteen persons. All members are appointed by the Governor in accordance with State Statutes. Fourteen members are appointed to five year terms. A full-time University of Maine student serves as a voting member for a two-year term, and the Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services serves as a voting member, ex-officio.

21. Revision of Bylaws - repeal of mail and telephone ballots. Mr. Brown presented the recommendation which he had initiated. He pointed out that State statutes require public bodies to take all actions in public session and he suggested that the provision in the Bylaws for mail or telephone ballots violates the spirit of the law. He said that while the mechanism is rarely used, it should be repealed. On motion of Mr. Brown which was seconded, it was

VOTED: that Section 4.8 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees be repealed.

22. Trustee Calendar 1984-85. On motion of Mr. Brown, which was seconded, the Board voted to adopt the following calendar for FY 1984-85:

NEW FUNDS:

Restricted:

The Maine Association of Broadcasters Annual Scholarship Fund was established at the University of Maine at Orono in 1984. This fund shall be used for scholarship assistance to a student majoring in Broadcasting. The recipient shall have attained a 2.7 grade point average and shall have demonstrated an interest in pursuing a career in broadcasting through his/her coursework. Selection shall be made each spring by the Chairman and faculty of the Department of Journalism and Broadcasting in consultation with a member of the Maine Association of Broadcasters. The fund shall be administered by the Office of Student Aid.

The Muscongus Bay Archeological and Paleo-ecological Research Fund was established at the University of Maine at Orono in 1984 by Mrs. Elizabeth B. Noyce. The fund shall be used to support archeological and paleo-ecological research in the Muscongus Bay area. The fund shall be administered by the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

To provide for disbursement of income from funds previously established in the University of Maine Foundation:

The William Bowdoin Nealley Athletic Scholarship Fund was established in 1984 in the University of Maine Foundation at UMO by friends and associates of Bill Nealley. The awards shall be made on a non-need basis to a member of the men's varsity basketball team at UMO, but should such scholarships be discontinued, the income from this fund shall be used at the discretion of the Directors of the University of Maine Foundation. Preference shall be given as follows: 1) to a graduate of Bangor High School, 2) to a graduate of any high school in the Penobscot Valley, and 3) to a graduate of any high school in the State of Maine. Selection of the recipient(s) shall be made by the Director of Physical Education and Athletics and administered by the Office of Student Aid.

To provide for disbursement of income from funds previously established in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle.

The George T. Corey Memorial Scholarship in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1981. The scholarship will be awarded to a full time student at UMPI from the Caribou area. The recipient should be a fairly recent graduate of Caribou High School and demonstrate high academic achievement and promise. If income from the corpus of the fund exceeds a full tuition scholarship, an additional scholarship may be awarded.

New Funds continued

The Alumni Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1977. The income will be used to provide an annual \$500 unrestricted scholarship and to provide partial operating expenses for the Alumni Association of the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

The Aroostook County Historical Center Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 to promote and support activities sponsored by the Aroostook Country Historical Center at the Library of the University of Maine at Presque Isle. A five-member advisory committee made up of UMPI library staff, a member of an Aroostook County historical society and others will annually submit proposals for expenditure to the President of UMPI.

The Caroline Gentile Scholarship in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 by the Alumni Association in honor of long-time faculty member, Professor Caroline Gentile. Student applicants must be in the field of Health, Physical Education, Recreation or Elementary Education. Only Juniors or Seniors are eligible and must have a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or better.

The Distinguished Lecture Series Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 by a group of University administrators to improve and elevate the academic and intellectual climate of the campus. Funds will be used to subsidize the expenses of lecturers invited to the UMPI campus. Speakers will be chosen who have made an outstanding contribution in their fields or in some walk of public life.

The Math/Science Academic Achievement Scholarship in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 by the faculty of the Math/Science Division at UMPI. The award is to be made annually, if there is a qualified candidate, to a highly motivated student enrolled in a Math/Science Division major program, with selection to be made by the Chairperson of the Math/Science Division.

The Merriman/Alumni Field Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 by the Alumni Association. The corpus of this fund, as it grows, will be used for landscaping, improvement, and sign construction on the Alumni Field site.

The C. A. Nutter Scholarship Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1984 to benefit a Mars Hill student attending the Presque Isle campus. Initial funding came from the Walter Dearborn family and the Mars Hill Rotary, with selection to be made by the Office of Student Financial Aid.

New Funds continued

The David G. Flewelling Memorial Scholarship in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1982. The scholarship will be awarded annually on the basis of academic merit. Applicants must be a graduate of a Maine secondary school. Applicants must submit an original essay of no more than two pages on any aspect of the broad topic, "The Family's Role in the Education of Their Children." Final selection of applicants will be by a committee appointed by the President of the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

The Alice and Hazen Stetson Scholarship Fund in the Foundation of the University at Presque Isle was established at UMPI in 1981. The income will be awarded annually to a resident of Aroostook County who has completed at least one year of a degree program and is enrolled at UMPI. When the annual income exceeds the annual resident tuition of the recipient, the scholarship may then be awarded to more than one student.
